Maleny's gender neutral golf tees have opinion divided

SINCE its inception Maleny Golf Club has strived for innovation and is now challenging conventional golfing stereotypes by adopting gender-neutral tees.

Maleny's club Pro Wayne Perske said the new 'Farm', 'Obi' and 'Mountain' markers were designed to enhance flexibility and encourage enjoyment of the course by all players regardless of their gender or ability.

"This means players can choose which tees they want to play from, according to their abilities without the stigma of being boxed into gender roles," Wayne said. "Our course ratings reflect the difficulty

for both men and women and players will be able to play competition golf in mixed competitions from the tee block of their choice."

Wayne said some men would prefer not to play from the red markers because they have been designated as ladies tees for so long

"By playing from a more appropriate tee-box, more golfers will potentially be hitting approach shots with short or mid-irons instead of hybrids and long irons," he said.

"This could result in a more enjoyable round, with better scores and maybe even fewer lost balls."

However, anyone keen to win Maleny's next Red Belly Challenge on Wednesday April 21 will be playing off the black Mountain Tees.

The club's recent Facebook post announcing the Tee changes unexpectedly went viral. It generated media attention here and

abroad after attracting thousands of page views and hundreds of comments, some negative but the majority overwhelmingly positive.

The launch of the new tees, the addition of the course's third Par 5 hole and construction of a spacious new infinity edge practice green coincided with celebrations yesterday (13 April) to mark the first anniversary since all 18 holes were opened for play last year.

The golf club's program of continuous improvement will also see a number of new tees on other holes brought into play soon.

They include the Par 3 5th, the 9th which has been extended from a Par 4 to Par 5, and the Par 4 10th, 13th and 15th holes which will generally lengthen the Par 69 layout and enhance safety.

Plans are also afoot for construction of a larger on-site storage shed which will accommodate member's golf buggies.

The longer term focus remains on securing sufficient funding for a permanent clubhouse.

Viral response has April fools pranksters re-floating rum idea, but it's a bit tricky

IT started out as an April Fool's Day joke: to create a "Rum Reef" on the site of a local ship wreck.

It was based on a true story. "In 1880, the vessel The Agnes sank in the mouth of the Maroochy River after striking a large rock. The ensuing salvage effort recovered dozens of cases of Queensland rum and as the history books tell - one hell of a party started," the guys from Woombye's Sunshine & Sons posted.

They then detailed plans to bring those festivities to the 21st century with the sinking and eventual recovery of barrels of their Nil Desperandum rum adjacent to the site of the 140 year-old wreck.

It was posted on April 1. It was a joke. But the stunt gathered so much interest that they began to think it actually had legs.

"As some people rightly suspected the Rum Reef was all an April fools stunt," said Sunshine and Sons co-founder Matt Hobson. "Even so, we weren't quite expecting the radio interviews, media, and unprecedented interest it generated in our rapidly approaching Nil Desperandum rum release.

"It reinforced that rum drinkers love our slightly wacky ideas. So this will hopefully not be the last you hear of it. It's definitely put some



Anzac Day at Gympie Road, Nambour, 1961

Traffic was diverted for Anzac Day ceremonies, which were held at the location from 1928 to 1989.


A replica cenotaph in Quota Park was consecrated on 22 April 1990 and here Anzac ceremonies are performed in a more peaceful setting to this day.

Festival to light the fuse for more street art murals in Nambour

STREET Art Nambour is planning a major celebratory festival to celebrate another year of murals and fundraise for an expansion of the initiative.

Fuse Fest will be held on Sunday September 12 from 10am to 8pm at Nambour Showgrounds.

The festival involves a "fusion" of artisan breweries, food stalls, artists, craft manufacturers, artist groups & musicians, according to organiser Lorraine Taylor.

And it is all part of a journey towards a bigger vision: "We want to expand the street art concept to other hinterland towns over the next five years and create a trail of not only murals but also of artisan brewers, winemakers, hotels, cafes and food manufacturers.

"The Map we produce already makes it easy for tourists to view the murals, but we want to expand the concept and add other uniquely local destinations for all to enjoy."

Ms Taylor said overseas travel restrictions had reignited the local and interstate drive market which presented a golden opportunity. "It has taught us to

appreciate our home states and to venture out on the roads again. But, we need attractions.

"Three years of creating murals has taught us what the public loves. With the help of Sponsors we can achieve a lot. We have the artists and the producers. But we still need all the assistance we can get."

Ms Taylor said this year's Street Art Nambour had a theme of "Tradition". "We are doing 5 murals of those people that helped make Nambour great in the past. As part of that we are featuring Sir Clem Renouf on a wall in Nambour. This will be funded by Sundale Retirement Village on a wall to be decided.

"Sir Clem was from Nambour and was not only a pioneer with Polio vaccines but, according to those who knew him, a lovely man. We want to celebrate his life as part of Nambour's heritage."




Council rates 64% for satisfaction

Woombye monument stands to ensure we remember them

THE Woombye War Memorial is located in Memorial Park, Woombye. The Lands Department was petitioned by the Woombye Returned Sailors and Soldiers Imperial League of Australia in 1920. The petition was

granted in December 1920. The Memorial Park was surveyed and gazetted in 1921. The purpose is gazetted as 'Soldier's Memorial'.

The Woombye War Memorial is a monument consisting of a broken column with a laurel wreath around the top and an Australian Commonwealth Military Forces badge at the base. The column is supported by four carved pillars on a sandstone base on a large concrete plinth. The memorial was unveiled on 18 June, 1925 by the Governor, Sir Matthew Nathan.

The memorial was produced by A.L. Petrie and cost £121/5/2 (one hundred and twenty one pounds, five shillings and tuppence). Funds were raised for the purpose of erecting a suitable gate. The gates were erected in April/May 1926. – See Anzac Day coverage Page 19

Legendary concert pianist to perform in Montville's renowned auditorium

LEGENDARY Australian pianist Piers Lane will be performing two concerts in Montville in May.

Based in London, Maestro Lane is arguably Australia's most successful concert pianist, and will visit the Sunshine Coast to perform concerts at Lucas Parklands on May 29 and 30.

Ian Lucas, of Lucas Parklands, said he had long hoped Mr Lane would perform at the Lucas Parklands private concert hall, often described as one of the two best venues of its size in the world.

"Piers Lane has captivated music lovers globally for several decades, so we are incredibly pleased that he has made time in his busy touring program to perform for us at Lucas Parklands for Sunshine Coast music lovers," Mr Lucas said.

"He's an inspired pianist who presents the most generous programs to his audiences.

"French concert pianist Pascal Rogé, who played at Lucas Parklands twice 10 and 12 years ago, said he believed, for its size, it is one of the two best performance venues in the world."

The first Piers Lane recital on May 29 will be quite unique: all Chopin, predominantly the Nocturnes, presented at twilight in a room lit by candlelight alone. The second concert on May 30 is a 2.30pm matinee where Mr Lane will present two Beethoven sonatas and followed by the Chopin Waltzes.

"You can imagine how incredibly proud and excited I am that he will be performing here," Mr Lucas said.

The Lucas Parklands concerts and auditorium is located in a private setting near Montville and surrounded by native rainforest, is growing a strong reputation for attracting world class artists and programs. The 150-seat hall features soft lighting and large windows that provide a natural backdrop to an intimate and acoustically brilliant performance space.

"Other performers have commented that they have played in much bigger venues, but they haven't played in more beautiful places.

Community Gardens members find that this connection to earthly pursuits helps physically, mentally and even spiritually.


Last year when COVID hit we started a 'Reflection in the Garden' twice a month to provide a safe space to gently allow the symbols and presence of nature to heal and inspire.

Potential to re-shape main street for Woombye's public amenity

COUNCIL planners have highlighted potential within Woombye's streetscape to extend the footpath and re-purpose parts of Blackall Street for public amenity.

Extending the sidewalk for pedestrians, gardens and possibly dining is a type of "tactical urbanism" that also serves as a traffic calming measure. It helps slow down car traffic on the adjacent road as well as enhancing the look and charm of the main street.

The realigning is one of a raft of measures under consideration based on community feedback to Council's Blackall Street Streetscape Project.

The Project aims to create an attractive vibrant town centre, tell Woombye's story and improve pedestrian access & parking.

The Project has been allocated \$75,000 for Community engagement & design and \$450,000 for Construction in 2021-22. Div 5 Cr Winston Johnston expects more funding will be forthcoming in future budgets. "A preliminary budget allocation of \$450,000 by the previous council, was never going to be enough to deliver this project," said Cr Johnston. "And I expect significant extra funding from either the June Budget and/or, from a State Stimulus Funding Grant."

Construction is to be delivered mid-2022 after the finalised plan is presented to the pubic in May this year.

The re-purposing would could provide more space for the public to sit, relax and enjoy the atmosphere and character of the traditional main street.

It could include outdoor dining to support local businesses.

Council's next move is to prepare a draft design that will be presented to the public for review.

MAPLETON-BASED Olympic archer Ryan Tyack is on track to clinch another spot on the world podium with the countdown to the Tokyo Olympics in July well underway.

The 2016 Rio Olympics Bronze medallist has secured a spot on the Australian archery team and has been training up to 45 hours a week, firing off an impressive 250-300 shots a day with Sunshine Coast Archery Club, located at Ballinger Park Sports Complex.

Tyack first discovered archery at age 10, when his mother insisted he get off video games and try his hand at a sport.

"I wanted to do archery or fencing because of the video game I played, so I nagged her, she rang the club and they had an open day that same day," Tyack recalled.

"I was terrible but I loved it. The first coach I had told my mum not to bother bringing me back, I'll never be good and to just give up.

"She didn't tell me that, but after five years I was able to win a Youth World Championship and I achieved that from doing it again and again and again and working hard at it."

In the meantime, training itself is almost a full-time job for Tyack.

"You do sacrifice a lot of time, my main day job was doing public speaking in schools but that slowed down slightly with Covid. Any support would be very welcome," he said

Palmwoods traffic petition:

'We're working on it', says Main Roads

A petition calling for improved road safety at dangerous Palmwoods intersections has attracted over 1100 signatures and the attention of the Department of Transport & Main Roads.

Palmwoods mum Jocelyn Anderson instigated the petition calling for traffic safety measures at the notorious intersections.

Ms Anderson said Palmwoods needed urgent attention especially to the busy intersection under the railway bridge at the Woombye-Palmwoods Road/Čhevallum Road and Jubilee Drive/Margaret St junction.

A Transport and Main Roads spokesperson said the department was working with Council on the issue.

"As Jubilee Road and Margaret Street fall under the Sunshine Coast Council's (SCC) jurisdiction, we are working with council to address the safety concerns at these intersections.

"Investigations into possible short-term options to improve safety in the Palmwoods village area, including the Woombye-Palmwoods Road/Chevallum Road and Jubilee Drive/Margaret Street intersections, are continuing.

"Key stakeholders and the community will be advised of any proposed safety treatments or improvements following these investigations

"In addition, we are undertaking a review of the existing 50km/h speed limit through the town and investigating options for improved pedestrian connectivity within the Palmwoods village area, in consultation with SCC.

"The outcome of these investigations will be known in coming months."

The spokesperson said the location of the Jubilee Drive and Chevallum Road intersections, and rail bridge presented challenging constraints.

"Any upgrade will be significant and require extensive planning as part of a longer-term solution for the Palmwoods community."



Invasive weed threatens koala habitat as authorities employ losing strategies: says expert

THE Blackall Range is on the brink of losing its best koala habitat and majestic old growth transitional rainforest unless steps are taken to hold back a flood of the invasive weed Blue Morning Glory.

Well-known Maleny weed expert Jeanette Nobes feared the Western Escarpment right back to Reesville would also be impacted unless containment lines were employed urgently. Ms Nobes said poor management of the weed which can grow between 1-4 metres a day, especially after heavy rain events, was creating a "disaster of almost unrecoverable proportions".

Failure was inevitable unless authorities changed tactics along the Kenilworth Road section at the Witta Reserve end which is the "front line" of this battle.

She said the Department of Transport and Main Roads and Sunshine Coast Council had failed for six years to implement the correct strategies to protect the Witta Reserve. The Reserve is owned by the Queensland Wildlife Preservation Society but is in partnership with Council to help keep it free of invasive weeds.

"I advised Council back then at the meeting I called on the site six years ago, and repeatedly since, what was needed. The Morning Glory had to be prevented from crossing to the western side of Kenilworth Road through the stormwater drains. Two containment lines needed to be built urgently outside the boundary lines of the reserve. But instead they have allowed a 1km river of Morning Glory to travel from the Curramore Soil Dump down to the boundary of the Witta Reserve through the storm water drains. And the containment lines have not been built to halt its march."

Ms Nobes said that it was virtually impossible to eradicate Blue Morning Glory once it took hold in an area. "It grows like a cargo net. The only totally effective management is prevention. You have to build containment lines. Just as you would build a fire break to contain fire. "Containment lines provide a clear area for access, and so you can turn it back on itself, ready for eventual spraying. Every site has to have a specific management strategy. This situation could have been prevented had the morning glory been stopped from going through the storm water drains to the western side of Kenilworth Road.

Ms Nobes said authorities failed to appreciate how invasive -- morning glory was. "This site has many different areas where different strategies have to be used if we are to be successful. When an invasive weed grows at the rate this one does you have to contain it foremost, just cleaning up what has been left to grow over many years achieves nothing. Because it is still growing at the head, which is what is happening at this site. It is 15 years since the original morning glory was dumped on the Curramore Soil Dump. But despite my requests for it to be sprayed back then, it never was until three years ago, but then only around the dump.

"It seems Main Roads and Council have learned little from the Palmwoods-Montville road morning glory disaster."

Ms Nobes is known locally as the Morning Glory Lady and holds a Diploma in Conservation and Land Management. She has worked in rainforest conservation education and bushcare for over 40 years, having spent fifteen years researching, working on strategies, mapping and photographing its patterns of growth and eradication.

She said it was disappointing that her advice had not been taken on board and she was now unable to do any further work on the site herself. "To think that this forest has stood for thousands of years not impacted by anything at all because of its vertical escarpment. And yet in just 15 years we have bought it to its knees. It is now on the verge of being lost and all the fauna that call it home as well, because of a vine.

"But I do believe we can still save the forest, we have to, it is just going to be so much harder

now. I am calling on Council to pull together all available resources and 6 staff and myself to build the containment lines and other work urgently, if there is to be any hope of saving the Koalas, especially, and the forest."

Responses

Glass House MP Andrew Powell said he shared Ms Nobes' concerns and had written to the Department of Transport and Main Roads and to the Minister. "The TMR stockpile that brought the weeds onto Maleny-Kenilworth Road has been sitting virtually unused and neglected for years now," he said.

"Locals like Jeanette have written to TMR and the Minister. We've even brought key TMR officials out on site to show them the need to maintain or remove the pile but they haven't, and as a result the weeds have now marched in to the pristine nature reserve.

"The government talk a lot about protecting koalas, as they should, but it's disappointing to see them abandon our local wildlife by doing nothing to stop this weed invasion of their own making."

A Transport and Main Roads spokesperson

told the Gazette the department prioritised invasive plant maintenance based on the Biosecurity Act 2014 (the Act), with a commitment to controlling prohibited and restricted invasive plants identified as a high or medium risk by local governments.

"Blue Morning Glory (BMG) is not identified as a restricted invasive plant under the Act, and is not listed as priority species under the Sunshine Coast Council (SCC) Local Government Area Biosecurity Plan 2017.

"However, we are aware BMG and invasive plants along Manley-Kenilworth Road near Curramore Road at Maleny are a concern for some members of the community.

"In response, we have previously collaborated with Council on a stand-alone treatment strategy for BMG and other invasive plants at this location.

"In 2018 we provided Council with funding for the treatment of BMG and other invasive plants within the Curramore Road stockpile site and its immediate surrounds. Last year we provided funding to manage invasive plants within the road reserve directly next to the stockpile site. This work has been completed."

On April 14 a German attack was repulsed by the Australians and British artillery. This was the first time German land forces had been defeated in World War II. The Australians held Tobruk for eight months.

Holding Tobruk denied the Germans use of the harbour and slowed their advance towards Egypt and the strategic Suez Canal.

The Australians and their comrades became known as the Rats of Tobruk, a name bestowed upon them by a German propaganda broadcaster who described them as rats living in holes in the ground.

In typical fashion the Australians turned the intended insult into a 'badge of honour'. As the 'Rats' never received much recognition for their efforts the Rats of Tobruk Association struck their own distinctive T medal.

They eat a broad range of small aquatic creatures, and supplement this with water weeds.

The males have white eyes making them easy to distinguish.

The common name "hardhead" has nothing to do with the density of the bird's skull, instead referring to the difficulty encountered by early taxidermists in processing the head (ewww!).

Clinic helps restore movement and bring back quality of life

Maleny Soldiers Memorial Hospital is helping to restore hope and quality of life for Parkinson's Disease patients through its renowned Movement Disorder Clinic.

The multi-disciplinary clinic treats patients with complex movement problems, such as end stage Parkinson's Disease, and determines a care plan based on individual's needs. Ryan Gee said helping people get back to a more normal life was incredibly rewarding.

The Maleny hospital is one of the few in Queensland equipped to care for people with Parkinson's.

Maleny welcomes brothers on 'Really Big Walk' for Parkinson's

After walking 270 kilometres over nine days, Member for Greenslopes Joe Kelly and his brother Vince have finished A Really Big Walk, in support of people with Parkinson's in Queensland.

In honour of their parents who were both impacted by a Parkinson's diagnosis, the brothers were eager for a challenge that would push them to make a difference. They finished in Coolum on Sunday.

On Thursday they dropped in to Maleny Soldiers Memorial Hospital to acknowledge the support their mother received from the renowned Movement Disorder Clinic.

"I guess for me, The Big Walk is also about doing something that I know Dad was unable to do for the last few years of his life, and that Mum is now struggling with, and that is actually walking," Joe said. "Walking is such an important part of health. It's such an important part of life, and you don't know what you have until it's gone." "My father was diagnosed with Parkinson's in the mid 1990s and after nearly 20 years of managing the condition as best he could, we sadly lost him in 2013.

"My mother was also diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2012 when she was 74 years old.

"There is currently no cure for Parkinson's, so the support services Parkinson's Queensland provide are so important in ensuring those with Parkinson's are able to live a relatively normal life."

Parkinson's Disease is a degenerative neurological condition, which can result in the loss of the ability to walk, eat and speak, as well as presenting problems with depression, memory, sleep and chronic pain.

Mr Kelly said he saw all these symptoms in his mother and most of them in his late father. "It has been really difficult to see the people I love go through these changes."

The brothers had already raised more than \$36,000 by Thursday, with three days to go.

Team provides hope by assisting with speech and swallowing abilities

Nambour's Restoring Hope Parkinson's Therapy (RHPT) mission is to restore and maintain the speech and swallowing abilities of people living with this complex neurodegenerative disease.

the corner for any one of us," she said. **Bear** RHPT offers the Parkinson's Voice **mad** Project evidence-based SPEAK OUT and weekly LOUD Crowd group sessions established by Samantha Elandary and her team from Dallas USA.

The RACQ Foundation recently provided funds to purchase nine iPads and storage cases to enable RHPT to improve and expand their services to people living with Parkinson's Disease (PD) across the Sunshine Coast and Queensland. The difficulty in providing a face to face assessment and therapy program, weekly LOUD Crowd group sessions and choir activity was made very real with the Covid-19 pandemic. Telehealth was a viable option to provide this service but many participants were unable to access the required technology. These devices have been purchased and are currently being set-up and will enable people to access therapy via tele health.

Parkinson's Voice Project (PVP) also run an international grants program and RHPT

recently received a grant for the third year in a row. This grant supports the provision of SPEAK OUT and LOUD Crowd therapy through training opportunities for Speech Pathologists and Speech Pathology students, as well as speech therapy supplies.

Restoring Hope Parkinson's Therapy have also received support from local Members of Parliament. Rob Skelton MP paid the invoice for street signage at the clinic and Andrew Powell MP awarded RHPT a Local Heroes Grant to be used to improve indoor signage.

From the 1st August 2020 Restoring Hope Parkinson's Therapy has provided group speech therapy services without charge. Fundraising, regular and "Pay It Forward" donations are necessary to raise funds to support this vital service.

Glue traps are cruel traps for wildlife

RECENTLY one of our rehabilitators received a rather distressing call through the WILVOS 5441 6200 Hotline. It was about a butcher bird.

This poor bird had one of the sticky mouse trap strips attached to its wing. There was no way the bird could remove it by itself. The lady who found the bird did the right thing and was using a small amount of oil to gradually remove the strip a piece at a time. With the WILVOS carers' help the strip was eventually removed and then the oil cleaned off. The bird was housed in a secure box overnight with food and water provided.

The next morning the bird flew off very strongly, and has since been back to revisit. This was one very lucky bird, thanks to a member of the public who rescued the bird from a slow death, and called WILVOS for help.

These glue traps, or sticky traps, are a very cruel method of catching mice and rats. They may die a slow death, stripping their skin off in their panic to escape or even chewing at their limbs to try to get off the adhesive. Please talk to any shops selling these traps and ask if they would consider removing them from their shelves. There are more humane ways to catch mice and rats.

Some years back I was brought a little feath-

ertail glider that had climbed onto one of these traps. It was an awful job removing the tiny animal, whilst trying not to distress him too much. He even managed to sink his sharp teeth into my finger! Little skinks, wrens and many other animals come to grief on these glue traps.

Sometimes inventors can have a very shortsighted view of their product. Seemed a good idea at the time!

Coast gets ready to welcome back Kiwis

THE Sunshine Coast is rolling out the welcome mat and getting ready to welcome back Kiwi visitors.

This follows last week's announcement by the New Zealand government for quarantine-free Trans-Tasman travel for Australians to start from 11.59pm, Sunday 18 April, 2021.

Visit Sunshine Coast CEO Matt Stoeckel warmly welcomed the news as a critical step for the region's tourism recovery.

"Prior to the pandemic, New Zealand was our number one international market with 84,000 annual visitors, 650,000 room nights, and an

economic value of \$110 million. It's a market that also has huge potential for the Sunshine Coast and strategically important for the region.

"Previously, the New Zealand holiday visitor would stay for an average of 7.9 nights, and with seasonal direct flights from Auckland, Kiwi travellers have found our climate, nature-based experiences and laid-back lifestyle particularly attractive over the winter months.

"We know there is huge pent-up demand in New Zealand for international travel and have been working in the background to prepare for the borders to reopen."

Maleny receives 156mm in 24 hour dumping

Maleny received an Easter bucketing with 156mm falling in a 24 hour period until 9am Tuesday April 6.

The hinterland saw 80-100mm falls in the 24hrs to 9am Tuesday April 6, but Maleny was the most affected.

Nambour received 24mm on Easter Monday and 81.2mm on Tuesday.

The Bureau of Meterorology said recent heavy rain was a result of the La Niña 2020-21 effect, which was now fading.

At the national level, Australia experienced its wettest, coolest summer in at least five years due to La Niña.

Rainfall was above average across the entire season, and December 2020 was the third-wettest since records began in 1900, according to the Bureau of Meteorology (BoM).

While we are past the height of La Niña in Australia, the BoM is expecting the La Niña will fade and go back to normal conditions by April/May this year.

"Without La Niña we expect to receive normal average rainfall in winter, not exaggerated as we've seen during the summer and autumn," a spokesperson said.

Council seeks input on public transport

MARK a spot in your calendar. Your chance to have a say on the best public transport options for our region kicks off on 28 April 2021.

Over an eight-week period until 22 June 2021, residents and visitors will have the opportunity to provide their valuable feedback on a range of options being considered in a draft Mass Transit Options Analysis report.

The Options Analysis is the second phase in the business case process being undertaken for the mass transit project.

The options considered in the draft report range from bus network upgrades to a quality bus corridor to bus rapid transit, trackless trams, light rail transit and more.

Transport Portfolio Councillor Rick Baberowski said while public transport was a State Government responsibility, council was leading the important planning work to attract state and federal infrastructure funding and needed community feedback and support to achieve that.

"We know we need sustainable and efficient transport options that can move us around quickly as our population grows yet still protect our local lifestyle and environment," Cr Baberowski said. "We are considering a range of options, and we are keen to know your thoughts."

The outcomes of the community and stakeholder feedback about the mass transit options will inform the finalisation of the Mass Transit Options Analysis report, which will then be submitted to council for consideration.

Cr Baberowski said the comprehensive community engagement process would seek community opinion on a wide range of potential options to help council make recommendations to the State Government for further consideration in the final phase of the mass transit business case process, the Detailed Business Case.

There will also be the opportunity to have a say about the various ways in which the forecast growth in the coastal corridor could be accommodated over the decades ahead, from medium rise development concentrated around stations and centres to lower density development dispersed more widely throughout the corridor.

Feedback received about the various ways of accommodating growth will help inform the preparation of the new planning scheme, which is proceeding over the next few years. Visit council's website and sign up to receive project updates and have your say when consultation begins on 28 April, 2021.

Sugar Mill locomotive was named in honour of fallen workmate

Leslie Charles (Sandy) Plater was born in Maclean, NSW on 30th November 1918 and moved to the Nambour area with his family in 1921

Like his father Charles and elder brother Edgar he worked at Nambour's Moreton Sugar Mill. He worked horses on tramline work, fired on the steam locomotives and drove oil locomotives.

He enlisted in the 9/49th Militia Battalion at Nambour on the 11th January 1940 and was taken into the 2/15th Battalion AIF on the 3rd June 1940.

After training at Redbank and Darwin he sailed on the Queen Mary from Sydney on 28th December 1940 bound for the Middle East.

In 1941 Les served in Tobruk during the famous siege and was promoted sergeant on 8th July 1942.

On the 1st September 1942 the 2/15th Battalion participated in Operation Bulimba which was an operation designed to test tactics and strategies for the upcoming Battle of El Alamein.

During this three hour operation the bat-talion suffered 61 men killed in action [KIA] or fatally wounded including 'Sandy' Plater who died of wounds [DOW] on 2nd September.

These casualties were the worst suffered by the battalion during World War II with almost 30 percent of their total wartime losses occurring in this three hour battle.

Sergeant Les Plater has the unusual honour of having a locomotive named in his remembrance.

After the war the Moreton Mill purchased four small ex-Department of Defence petrol locomotives and one of these was named 'SANDY' by Les' workmates with mill management approval.

The locomotive is preserved and on display at the Nambour Museum.

Nambour bomber pilot paid supreme price to spare crew and save English village

WORLD War II pilot Jim Hocking, from Nambour, paid the ultimate price in 1944 when he sacrificed his own life to save his crew and residents of a town in England.

Jim was posted to England and attached to the Royal Air Force [RAF] in August 1943 for training in bomber aircraft. He was promoted to Pilot Officer having completed his training.

The next step for Jim and his crew was to convert to four engine heavy bombers, training on Short Stirlings

Their final training mission on July 27 and 28 1944 was a night flight, cross country then out over the North Sea. Just 25 minutes after take-off from West Wratting airfield near Cambridge two engines caught fire and the Pilot Officer ordered all crew to parachute to safety while he stayed at the controls to divert it from crashing into the town of March in Fenland.

In saving the town Jim paid the supreme sacrifice. Were it not for his bravery hundreds of people may have died.

His act has never been forgotten by the town about 120km north of London.

On July 28 1988, the 44th anniversary of Jim's death, a memorial plaque was unveiled and dedicated at March's historic Saint Wendreda's church.

In 2015 Jim's bravery was finally recognised by the Australian Government with the posthumous awarding of the Star of Courage which was accepted by Jim's brother Alan.

Alan was honoured that the townspeople of March still remember and continued to honour his brother.

"Out of the tragedy of war a lasting friendship has developed with so many families in the March area, and March is now a second home to members of the Hocking family," Mr Hocking said at the time.

In 2019 the March Museum honoured Jim

Beaufighter pilot, Lloyd Francis Ritchie

LLOYD Ritchie was born in Brisbane on 6th December 1922, only son of Francis and Martha Ritchie of Blackall Terrace, Nambour. In 1928 Lloyd commenced his education at the Nambour Rural School and successfully completed his Junior Examination in 1938. He completed his senior schooling in Brisbane and gained employment with the Commonwealth Bank.

In June 1942 Lloyd enlisted in the RAAF in Brisbane and started training as a Beaufighter pilot at Wagga Wagga, N.S.W. After graduating as a Pilot Officer he joined 31 Squadron which was posted to the Northern Territory in October.

31 Squadron's missions were into the north western areas of the Pacific Ocean plus the Flores, Banda, Timor and Arafura Seas north of Darwin. In August 1944 Lloyd was promoted to Flying Officer. On the 24th September 1944 Lloyd's Beaufighter and another piloted by Squadron Leader Wilber Wackett left Coomalie Creek airfield on a mid-afternoon mission to provide 'top cover' to Catalina Flying Boats. Returning in darkness the two Beaufighters encountered difficulties locating their airfield due to thick smoke from bushfires and both crashed with the loss of both pilots and Squadron Leader Wackett's navigator. Lloyd's navigator bailed out and was found safe the next day.

with an event to give people the chance to listen to letters he had written.

A book on his life and actions - March Hero was also showcased at the event.

Jim is also commemorated at the Nambour Museum where a replica of his award is displayed.

The March War Museum has a permanent display which includes a model of Jim in his pilot's uniform and replicas of Jim's medals.

Jim's sacrifice led to the establishment in 1997 of a Friendship City Agreement between Fenland District Council and the former Maroochy Shire Council. It continued with the formation of Sunshine Coast Council in 2008.

Jim Hocking was born in Nambour on the 12th December, 1922, the son of William and Eva Hocking. He attended the Nambour Rural School and then went on to be a foundation student of the Nambour High School. After leaving school he worked at Whalley's Garage in Currie Street, Nambour

SITUATED on a wall inside the Mapleton Hall is an honour board to acknowledge all the WW1 enlistees from Mapleton and Districts.

In addition, in 1979 a seedling from the Lone Pine at Gallipoli was planted at the Mapleton Hall Sportsground in memory of the Anzacs.

This seedling was one of two offered to the Nambour RSL from a consignment sent to Australia by The Turkish Government.

Unfortunately, after some years, this tree struggled & was replaced with one donated one by Maroochy Shire Council Parks & Gardens. The tree was planted by Chairman Ed DeVere & Mapleton RSL Branch President Mr Brian DeVere.

Despite locating Lloyd's crashed plane and

an extensive search no sign of him was ever found so he has the unusual distinction of being 'missing in action' on mainland Australia. Llovd is commemorated at the Adelaide River War Cemetery's Memorial to the missing and the Nambour Museum.







Shelter improved at Woombye Cemetery Winston Johnston Division 5 Councillo

Visitors to the Woombye Cemetery now have an improved shelter available to them. The refurbishment has provided a much-needed facelift, restoring the shelter to near-new condition.

The upgrade delivered a new concrete pad, removal of the defunct storage shed and new pathway/handrail around the ashes wall.

Other works included repainting, replacement of rotten posts/new post supports, removal of the existing weather board wall, new seating, a new bin and stand and the safe removal of old sheeting.

New floodway

Maleny's concrete floodway on Bridge Creek Road (where it meets with Wells Road) will be replaced to improve safety for all road users and make future maintenance easier.

Works on the new concrete structure are expected to begin in late April and are anticipated to be finished by mid-July 2021 (weather and site conditions dependant).

Some undergrowth and vegetation immediately beside the existing floodway must be cleared to provide suitable room for construction of a side access track.

Department of Agriculture and Fisheries requirements have also been considered and fauna spotter catchers will be onsite during excavation and clearing to ensure the wellbeing of any wildlife.

Change to rape defence law

During the last sitting week, the House passed two important pieces of legislation. The Criminal Code (Consent and Mistake of Fact) and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2020 was passed, which removes mistake of fact as a defence to rape and sexual assault.

By providing clarity in these laws, and making consent laws more accessible, and with better safeguards, we will have the strong legal system in place to keep more Queensland women safe and hold perpetrators to account.

We have enshrined in the Criminal Code principles like silence does not amount to consent, consent once given can be withdrawn and the self-intoxication of a defendant cannot be relied upon by that defendant to show that they were mistaken about whether or not consent was given and that was reasonable.

This will provide clarity for judges to properly direct juries and get better outcomes for victims.

The Child Protection and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2020 also passed which seeks to improve permanency outcomes for children in the Child Safety system based on recommendations provided to the Government.

Internet coverage raises valid health concerns Letter

I'D like to make comment in response to recent letters regarding Hinterland NBN coverage and con-

cerns of slow internet speeds and connectivity. The Sunshine Coast Hinterland covers such a unique and natural landscape, it doesn't surprise me that many residents are conscious about their health.

Areas such as these also offer environmentally sensitive people a living space largely free from the saturation of environmental stressors found in built up urban areas.

I understand the concerns and frustrations about the speed of internet connection.

However, I don't believe that the installation of fixed wireless infrastructure will solve these problems and there are now people living in close proximity to towers who still do not receive fast and reliable connectivity.

The solution is not to build more wireless towers. The solution is to provide residents

Killing 'Building Queensland'

The 'Building Queensland Act 2015' received Assent on 6 November 2015. It established Building Queensland (BQ) as an independent statutory authority on 3

December 2015. In a nutshell, their role was a Queensland version of Infrastructure Australia.

They were to lead the development of detailed business cases for projects with an estimated capital cost of delivery of \$100 million or more and assist with those between \$50-100 million.

One of its very first tasks was to examine the Beerburrum to Nambour Rail duplication (B2N) and produce the Business Case.

That detailed Business Case (of which we only ever saw a summary) was presented to the Building Queensland Board in the final quarter of 2016.

I met with BQ in November 2016 for a briefing on the project.

What's interesting is the correspondence that the BQ Board Chair Mr Alan Millhouse received on 26 November 2020 from Deputy Premier and Minister for State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning, Mr Stephen Miles MP.

What did they do to deserve this swift arbitrary dismissal?

In the letter it says that Mr Cameron Dick MP, Treasurer and then Minister for Infrastructure and Planning had issued a direction under Section 19 of the Act (on 7 September 2020) and advised that BQ would cease to be a statutory authority and that it was the Government's intention to introduce legislation to that effect as soon as possible.

I discovered this via an email from BQ on 25 March 2021.

The 7 September letter from Treasurer Cameron Dick stated they were to be moved into Queensland Treasury, this move was later changed to the Department of State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning (DSDILGP).

The BQ Board was advised to 'continue to work collaboratively' with Minister Miles' department (the DSDILGP) and implement their absorption via 'an orderly cessation of activities.'

This was before any cessation or repeal legislation had been passed.

No personnel were to be hired and no new activities were to begin.

The Chair had been appointed for his second three year term in December 2018 and his term wasn't due to expire until December 2021.

What did they do to deserve this swift arbitrary dismissal?

The answer may lie in an extraordinary letter received by the BQ Chair on 6 January 2021, this time sent by Mr Mark Ryan MP, on the Deputy Premier's letterhead, and as Acting Minister for State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning.

In it he reiterates the Deputy Premier's direction NOT to commence any new activities without consulting the Minister's Department (DSDILGP).

He then explicitly says; 'I also direct BQ to:' • 'NOT exercise the function of preparing and maintaining the infrastructure pipeline document ...' (a small bell tingles)

• 'NOT exercise the function of giving the responsible Minister a copy of the updated infrastructure pipeline document ...' (alarm bells ringing) • 'NOT exercise the publishing functions under Section 17 of the BQ Act except the requirement ... to publish a Ministerial direction.'

COVID vaccination roll-out

Updated medical advice has been provided for the COVID-19 vaccination program which has resulted in the decision to recommend the AstraZeneca vaccine only to those over the age of 50. It is now preferred that those under 50 take the Pfizer vaccine. The program is continuing, particularly for the most vulnerable Australians in Phase 1B including those over the age of 70 who are not impacted by this revised advice. Flood monitoring sensors

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) will soon begin works to install flood monitoring cameras and sensors across several high-risk locations in the Glass House electorate. The sensors and still-image cameras will provide near real-time information to TMR, alerting them when water is approaching a road or bridge. The sensors provide TMR with the height of the water above or below the road, and this information will be used to minimise any bridge or roadway closure periods due to flooding impacts. Sensors will be installed at Elaman Creek in Conondale; Woombye-Montville Road at Jubilee Drive, Palmwoods (camera only); and Palmwoods-Mooloolah Road (Neill Road) at the Mooloolah River.

with fast, reliable and secure access through fibre internet with wired connectivity that is not adversely affected by the same interferences as wifi and is a much better option for those with sensitivities and other concerns.

My understanding is that the provision of fixed wireless may have been decided as the more cost effective option but considering the amount of complaints received, how cost effective is it really?

I don't believe it's about people having to move out of their home to meet their needs nor should communities be disadvantaged by having wireless and satellite as the only option for NBN. This is where people need to come together to find common ground as industry and government are more likely to listen if the demand is there.


