Anzac crowds back in force

THOUSANDS of people flocked to hinterland services as traditional Anzac Day commemorations returned on Sunday.

From a moving Dawn Service in Quota Park Nambour to Maleny's rousing Maple Street parade, hinterland towns commemorated in touching and inspirational tributes.

Marching bands, schools, dignitaries and community groups joined veterans as onlookers applauded to honour those who paid the ultimate price.

Long-time Maleny resident Matthew Howard said it was the biggest main service turnout he could remember while Nambour RSL Sub

Branch President Royce Ayton said the Dawn Service was the biggest since 2016, the year of the WWI Centenary.

Mr Ayton said the response was a powerful reminder of the continued dedication of Australian people to the annual traditions of Anzac Day. "I firmly believe that every Anzac Day is special — it is a day of the year when we can commemorate and reflect as a community and individually – on the determination, sheer courage and sacrifice of not only our Gallipoli heroes but our modern day soldiers, sailors and airmen whom continue to serve today," Mr Ayton said.

On Anzac Day we pause to commemorate not only the 106th Anniversary of the landings on Gallipoli in 1915, but to remember the commitment and sacrifice of all our men and women who serve and have served in conflicts and on service.

"We look forward to welcoming everyone back to the Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show in 2021."

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
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Pretty servo? Pretty unlikely, says Yandina community group

YADCA has rejected the suggestion a new fuel an existing development application for a serstation, planned for the heart of Yandina, can be designed to blend in with surrounding historic buildings.

"The developer, Pearl Energy, has produced some pretty drawings for this project, but they are quite unrealistic," said YADCA President Nigel Anns. "If this is allowed to go ahead it will ruin the centre of our historic town.

Mr Anns was responding to an article in the Sunshine Coast Daily which quoted a spokesperson for the developer, Pearl Energy.

A spokesman said the service station would "reflect Yandina's history and architecture".

The proposed development has met with concerted opposition from community and business groups with over 200 written objections lodged with Council so far. Concerns centred on loss of visual amenity in the historic town centre, as well as increased and unsafe traffic at the busy corner of Farrell and Stevens streets.

The spokesman told the Sunshine Coast Daily that the company was in the process of responding to a number of issues raised by Sunshine Coast Council. "We will be happy to discuss further as the application progresses," he said.

The spokesman told the paper that Yandina was selected as a potential site as there was vice station on the land, which is zoned by the council for a service station use.

'That statement is misleading," said Nigel. "The development application was lodged by Pearl Energy themselves; and the zoning of the land would also allow for a community centre or a group of retail outlets more in keeping with Yandina's village feel.

"We are not opposed to a second service sta-tion for Yandina, but not in this location."

In response to council's concerns, developers said the new proposal "reflects the traditional rural town architecture and character of Yandina". "The design approach subtly skews the angle of the gables to re-create traditional roof forms with a mid-20th century influence. This shape also facilitates better views and visual sightlines through the site to Yandina School of the Arts building opposite the site on Stevens Street," the response said. Nicklin MP Robert Skelton said he was

"backing residents all the way" in the fight.

Mr Skelton said the proposed development is "not the right fit for Yandina" and has written to the Deputy Premier Steven Miles, Minister Mark Bailey and Mayor Mark Jamieson expressing his views.

Nambour vaccination hub call

NAMBOUR should be considered as a regional vaccination hub as the nation confronts challenges with the COVID vaccine rollout, according to C-Square general manager Tracy Martin

Ms Martin said it was important regional areas were well catered for as supply and distribution difficulties hit home.

"As an accessible centre for much of the Sunshine Coast and Hinterland, Nambour would seem to be a prime location for a vaccination hub to support the area," Ms Martin said.

Ms Martin said C-Square had responded to a public tender from the Department of Public Works for a vaccination hub in February

"We suggested one of our vacant floors, over 1000 sqm in area, well serviced by amenities for both staff and the public, with multiple entrances and exits to manage the flow of people and many other features that would make it well suited for this purpose.'

She said Nambour was well serviced by public transport and C-Square had 130 car spaces with

2 hours free parking for visitors.

But she said so far there has been little feedback. "Perhaps now is the time to re-focus on this opportunity for Nambour.'


"A vaccination centre will help with getting the vaccines in people's arms, which is critical to getting the economy moving overall. It could be at C-Square, or at another suitable location. but a local hub would provide better health outcomes and generate more foot traffic and exposure for Nambour."

Fairfax MP Ted O'Brien said the Federal Government's role was to support the states in setting up the hubs. "The Federal Government supports the states

and territories operating vaccination sites and services, where required, to supplement the primary care network," he said. "To support this, the Commonwealth will contribute 50 per cent of the genuine net additional costs incurred by states and territories to set up additional COVID-19 clinics after 21 April 2020, where necessary."

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Everest challenge scales great heights for Parkinsons

on Mount Coolum is a 42-climb challenge over five days, accumulating 8848 metres – the height of Mt Everest.

The challenge raises money for Shake It Up Australia and Parkinson's Disease research.

The Everest on Mt Coolum challenge is all about raising awareness and funds to help find a cure for Parkinson's Disease.

"You can do it locally by trekking your favourite hill, or stairs, it's up to you, form a team and share the load," said organiser Gary McKitterick Gillett from Trek Ready Himalayas. Gary, 60, works at Nambour General Hospital's Acute Restorative Care (ARC) ward with Parkinson's and Dementia patients.

He said Everest on Mount

Coolum was also excellent fitness training in preparation for plans to trek to Mt Everest Base Camp in mid October.

"Every two or three years I go to Nepal and do a trek and I raise money for the Shake It Up foundation," Gary said. "Every dollar we raise goes straight to Australian research by the Australian foundation, which is linked to the Michael J Fox Foundation."

This year's Everest on Mount Coolum takes place July 26 to 30 and people are welcome to join the team or set their own schedule and location.

"Anyone can get a team together or incorporate the activity into their current fitness regime. The concept is simple, you just have to accumulate 8848 metres over a week, a month, or

three months. It's up to you and your trainer. Use the stairmaster, the local hill, the stairs in your building, or join us on Mt Coolum or Mt Gnun Gnun, its your choice as to where you participate.

THEY come from diverse backgrounds but share a passion to provide comfort through their love of crafting.

The Sunshine Linus group began back in June 2010 when 20 interested ladies attended the first meeting. The name was inspired by the Peanuts cartoon strip character who gained comfort and warmth from his blanket. Judie Bellingham was the founder and first President.

'She belonged to a volunteer quilting group in Brisbane that made quilts for children and adults undergoing long term hospital treatment," explained publicity officer Glorianne Porter.

"Judie was aware that many quilters living on the Coast would like to help those in need in their own community so the group developed here.'

Sunshine Linus now has over 80 members and distributes a range of items (not only quilts) to over 120 different organisations.

President Kaye Nightingale said the group provided support to hospital wards and care associations such as aged-care facilities, hospices, special schools, the Reconciliation Group and foster care groups. Members are encouraged to "make what they love making", said Kaye. "But a wish-list is cre-

ated each month to let everyone know what items have been requested by the various organisations.'

Some of the items include rugs, beanies, scarves, shawls, quilts, sensory items, baby items, children's clothes, drainage bags and toiletry bags, soft toys, teddies and children's activity bags.

"The comfort given to those who receive these items lovingly hand-made by members of Sunshine Linus, completely free of charge, with no strings attached is incalculable," she said. "It helps to restore their faith in the kindness and generosity of others.'

"People with dementia find comfort by patting our weighted toy pets because the added heaviness makes them feel more realistic. We also make blankets to fit wheelchairs and rugs designed for people undergoing dialysis treatment whose feet tend to get cold."

Distribution coordinator Jenny Dettrich said one of the main tasks for members at each meeting was to sort and distribute the many beautifully hand-crafted items that are made and donated.

"There is a very stringent process to follow as items must be quality checked, labelled, sorted and bagged before delivery,"

said Jenny. "It makes a busy but rewarding time for all involved." Of course, the monthly meetings also provide opportunity for

members to make new friends. learn new skills and meet together with like-minded people, said Glorianne.

"It offers a chance to share stories about life's joys and challenges, to show and tell what members have been creating and most importantly to have a laugh together," she said.

Every second month there is an extra gathering called an 'Activity Day' where members get the chance to work together to complete a specific project or learn a new skill or technique.

"When someone teaches a new skill everyone develops a newfound admiration for their fellow members and for the craft itself.

Sunshine Linus is a volunteer, non-profit group that relies mostly on monetary donations and donations of fabrics and notions.

With the assistance of the Nambour Uniting Church they provide a space where donated fabrics and haberdashery can be stored and put to good use.

During this time of pandemic Sunshine Linus has continued to operate but under strict social distancing guidelines. Members

Re-discovering chocolate's traditional qualities

NYONE seeking traditional chocolates won't get much more authentic than the lineup at Chocolate Country Montville. Chocolatier and owner Julie Walters said her shop was the legacy of her yearning to bring back traditional methods and ingredients and rediscover the true flavours of yesteryear.

"I wanted everybody to experience what real chocolate tastes like," Julie said.

"I use high quality cocoa content Belgian chocolate in all my creations. I grow it on my farm, and source and use other ingredients from nearby local producers."

Julie said she purchased chocolate country and set about changing the small hinterland shop into a temptation destination.

"We're removing all palm products and inferior low cocoa content chocolate to give the public the true taste of chocolate that has been absent from our childhoods," she said. "I feel too many people have accepted what is put in front of them by large producers with no regard to the environment or the animals living here or the real taste of the products from our childhoods."

Julie said her eyes were opened while travelling through Borneo in 2014 where she witnessed the devastating effect of the palm oil industry on the environment and the animals. "I promised myself I would do all I could to avoid this product in my creations.

"We have removed the fudge range that was supplied from America in powder form," she said.

"It was full of palm oil. It's everywhere on the coast. As a result we have created a truly uniquetasting crumbly flavoured range of fudges bringing back the flavour from the past.

Julie said customers appreciated Chocolate Country's passion for caring for the environment and striving for quality.

"When people come into our shop or attend one of our chocolate schools they love to feel part of a changing tide of people keen to shop and eat sustainable products sourced from small independent farmers. Chocolate Country started slow but we are gaining ground on the mass producers — not through producing more - but by delivering the type of quality that's all but disappeared in the industry."

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

"From that moment on, I knew that I wanted to help other women and mums feel as good as I did."

Steph said she completed her Certificate 3 and 4 in health and fitness and ditched her 9-to-5 admin job. "Not long after that, I fell pregnant with PJ but I continued to work right up until a couple of weeks before I was due and returned to work when he was 4 months old. Having a work environment where I am able to bring my children with me to see what I do has been amazing."

Jess said when Covid hit last year she took the opportunity to rebrand and created Movve.

The restructured program aligned with Steph's passion for helping parents move and do things they thought were beyond them.

"The feeling I get seeing the joy in clients' eyes when they do something they never thought they could do or would do is something I can't explain," she said.

Steph has loved every minute of her new role as Facility Manager and her enjoyment is reflected in feedback from clients.

"I never actually ever thought of myself as a



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
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

BreastScreen Service returns to Maleny Hospital

THE free BreastScreen Queensland Service is returning to the Maleny Hospital from 20 April to 14 May 2021 and local women are encouraged to put their health first and book a breast screen.

Queensland women have one in seven chances of being diagnosed with breast cancer by the age of 85. This means that women can't afford to skip breast screens.

"It can be hard for women to find time for themselves but it's important they do," said Dr Alison Roper, Medical Director of BreastScreen Queensland Sunshine Coast.

"A simple 30-minute breast screen every two years could literally save a woman's life and ensure they are there for their family in the future.

"What screening does is bring forward the time at which breast cancer can be diagnosed, so that the cancer can be found when it's small, confined to the breast and hasn't spread to the lymph nodes," she said

The BreastScreen Queensland Service is free, female, fast and friendly. Women aged 50 to 74 are strongly encouraged to have regular screens however the Service is free to women 40 and over.

Data to drive town planning decisions in Woombye

REAL time data on people movement, water use and ambient temperatures is being captured in Woombye to help Sunshine Coast Council improve its delivery of services and facilities into the future.

Division 5 Councillor Winston Johnston said 10 sensors had been installed on poles along Blackall Street for the Data Driven Decision Making (DDDM) pilot project which is part of council's Smart City Framework.

"Capturing real-time data is becoming increasingly important to council because it provides definitive information which shows us how we can improve the way we plan for the future and deliver more efficient services and infrastructure for the Sunshine Coast community," Cr Johnston said.

"This pilot project in Woombye is now capturing real time information about pedestrian and vehicle movement in the area. It is capturing data on how long they're in this area and their direction of movement."

Twenty car parking bay sensors have also been installed to capture data about how many vehicles use parking bays, how long they stay, and the peak times.

A networked water meter is also providing council with data on how many people are using public amenities in Woombye, how much water is being used and if there are water leaks.

Clergyman's stirring words inspired remarkable Anzac courage under fire

President of the Nambour RSL Sub Branch **Royce Ayton's** Dawn Service Address

firmly believe that every Anzac Day is special - it is a day of the year when we can commemorate and reflect as a community and individually — on the determination, sheer courage and sacrifice of not only our Gallipoli heroes but our modern day soldiers, sailors and airmen whom continue to serve today.

I would like to share with you a moment in our history which embodies the Anzac legacy.

Frank Pogson Bethune was born in Hamilton Tasmania in 1877. He was an unassuming clergyman who enlisted in the AIF in Hobart on the 1st July 1915. He was 38 years old. For reasons of his own Frank chose to take up arms instead of serving as a padre.

He embarked for the training camps in Egypt in February 1916 and in late march boarded the troop ship "Transylvania" bound for France.

On route, soldiers on board were upset by orders given to the ship's captain – the mood became tense and uneasy. With no padre aboard, Bethune requested permission to address the troops. To over 1000 soldiers, he gave the following speech:

"We know what we have come for and we know that it is right. We have all read of the things that happened in France. We know that the Germans invaded a peaceful country and brought these horrors into it.

"We come of our own free wills – to say that this sort of thing shall not happen in the world as long as we are in it. And what if we die? If it were not for the dear ones whom he leaves behind, might not a man pray for a death like that? We know we are not heroes and we do not want to be called heroes. Did not every one of us, as boys, long to go about the world as they did in the days of Raleigh or Drake? And didn't it seem beyond hope?

"Here we are on that great enterprise and with no thought of gain or conquest, but to help to right a great wrong. With our dear ones behind and God above, and our friends on each side and only the enemy in front – what more do we wish than that?"

It is easy to see, from this address, that Bethune was a man with a strong resolve to do his duty. One of the units at the fore was the 3rd Machine Gun Company. Their mission was to defend an area of the Ypres Salient known as Spoil Bank. On his reconnaissance Lt Bethune, commanding the company's No 1 section found his position untenable. His guns had a severely restricted field of fire and if the enemy were to attack, the gun crews would be killed almost before they could bring their guns to action.

Bethune asked his commanding officer to be allowed to choose a better position. His request was denied. Orders were orders. As a matter of honour, Bethune asked if he could be placed in charge of the most dangerous post, which was severely exposed to enemy attack. This was agreed.

Bethune asked for volunteers from his section to follow him to the post. With an unswerving sense of duty to their fellow soldiers and their country, every man stepped forward.

As they were moving to their position, the section was overtaken by a runner, who informed Bethune that his orders had been changed – the section was now to defend an area more to Bethune's liking – it was the perfect position for a gun fight.

'If the section cannot remain here alive, it will remain here dead. But in any case, it will remain here.

At this time, the Australian and British infantry had been at strength near Bethune's guns, but they were moved back to prepare for the attack. This left Bethune's guns and his seven man section dangerously exposed and on their own. With the responsibility for the safety of this section of the line in his hands, Bethune felt it necessary to issue his men with these inspiring and famous written orders. They read:

Special orders to No1 section. March 13, 1918.

1. This position will be held, and the section will remain here until it is relieved.

2. The enemy can not be allowed to interfere with this program.

3. If the section cannot remain here alive, it will remain here dead. But in any case, it will remain

In the dying days of the great German offensive, he was wounded in both the left knee and left foot – he recouperated well but was left with a permanent limp.

On the 16 May 1919 he returned home to Tasmania and moved with his family to Dunrobin where he farmed until 1936, assisting occasionally in the Hamilton Parish.

He died of cerebro – vascular disease in Hobart on the 4 December 1942. He was survived by his wife, two daughters and two sons. The elder, Walter Angus, became Tasmania's Premier.

Despite his stern character, Frank Bethune had been popular with his men and his parishioners.

His whimsy was exemplified when, pinned down in a shell hole by enemy gunfire, he passed the time by calculating the cost to Germany of keeping him there.

Lieutenant Bethune's story is one of many that have become part of our Anzac legacy. His determination, courage and devotion to duty embody all that it is to be an Anzac, and an Australian. With the pride and honour of the thousands that have come before us in history, we pay our respects to the service men and women, survivors and fallen alike, that have sacrificed so much to defend their country, its flag and its colours.

By August 1916, just months after his arrival in France, Bethune was promoted to Lieutenant and his unit, the 3rd Machine Gun Company, was active in many of the campaigns on the western front.

By March 1918, the German army was on the move. The Australians were sure that a major enemy attack was brewing – and attack they did. As the Germans poured through gaps in the British and French fronts, some units were simply obliterated.

The Germans adopted a new tactic known as the flying wedge – bombers and machine gunners were positioned at the front of the German line to advance on the allies and disrupt their lines. Meanwhile, specially trained German storm troopers would attack the allies from the flanks.

Many of the towns that earlier had been won with allied blood were now lost to the enemy. When the city of Albert was seized by German forces, the Australian Divisions were rushed to seal the breaches in the lines. here.

4. Should any man through shell shock or other cause attempt to surrender, he will remain here dead.

5. Should all guns be blown out, the section will use mills grenades and other novelties.

6. Finally, the position, as stated, will be held.

 FP Bethune Lt. Officer in Charge No 1 section.

For 18 days the section withstood attack after attack. They were subjected to constant artillery barrages of high explosives, shrapnel and gas shells, but they held their ground.

The headquarters of the 1st division AIF circulated Lt Bethune's special order.

Copies of the order were distributed to the American forces on the Western Front, as 'an admirable model of all that a set of standing trench orders should be'.

Lieutenant Bethune was awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. It is what the Australian and New Zealand flags represent: courage, pride and freedom, which our servicemen and women have sworn to defend.

Let us remember, with respect for those past, and hope for our future, the service and sacrifice of our service men and women.

We must not forget today's veterans, the young men and women whom have returned from Afghanistan, Iraq and places from around the world. These people, in their young lives, have observed things that you and I would hope to never witness in our life times.

It is our responsibility as Australians to ensure that our veterans both young and old receive the care and recognition they so justly deserve.



Airman's devotion to crew earned him Victoria Cross

Address given at the Mapleton Service by Wing Commander Peter De Waard.

E are gathered here to honour the memory of gallant men and women who sacrificed their lives in service to their country. By your presence here I know there is no doubt in your hearts and your minds that today is significant.

I am sure that you are all aware that the term Anzac comes from words Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. Most of us were taught this from the earliest days of primary school.

However, I feel the term Anzac has transcended the physical meaning to become something else. It is not a specific place, nor is it a campaign or even a war. It is not a ceremony, nor is it a parade. Anzac is an inspiration - it embodies the qualities of courage, discipline, sacrifice, self-reliance and in Australian terms, that of mateship and a fair go. That, to me, is what 'Anzac' really means.

We do not commemorate Anzac Day to glorify war. War is not a thing to be celebrated. Anzac Day is the simple recognition of the sacrifice, commitment and unselfish devotion by young men and women of the Defence Forces in times of conflict.

The spirit of Anzac, forged on the beaches of Gallipoli in 1915, has been passed from generation to generation of Defence Force personnel. Our history is filled with amazing stories of courage and devotion to duty.

On Anzac Day, we often hear the Gallipoli story recounted. However, as a member of the Air Force, and given that this year marks the 100th birthday of the Royal Australian Airforc

Middleton ordered his crew to bail out. Five bailed out and were rescued. Two refused to leave their captain and friend. Middleton then piloted the aircraft away from the populated villages and attempted to ditch in the English Channel. The aircraft crashed into the sea, killing all three men.

Middleton's devotion to duty and his crew saw him posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross and promoted to pilot officer.

He was 26. Middleton, and so many like him, fought valiantly for our country and for what they believed in. And like him, many knowingly went to their deaths. For they knew that happiness comes from freedom and freedom comes from courage and sacrifice.


We should be eternally grateful to those of the past who have helped preserve our nation and our way of life. We should also be thankful that today, members of the Australian Defence Force are deployed around the world, maintaining the security of our nation. We pause to remember them, as they commemorate this day with their mates, but away from their families. We think of those who have returned from past and present conflicts, broken in body or mind. And we remember their families who make just as many sacrifices as those who deploy, and do so without recognition.

Keep bright their memory. On a beach at Gallipoli, in the skies over Europe, on the waves of the Pacific, in the jungles of Vietnam, and in the desert of the Middle East, the men and women of Australia have set a standard that endures today. Let us never forget their courage, devotion and sacrifice. For in remembering them, we keep the spirit of Anzac alive.

And keeping the spirit of Anzac alive, is the payment we make on a debt we can never repay. Lest We Forget.

I would like to instead tell you the story of a fellow airman.

This particular airman was Flight Sergeant Ron Middleton, a jackaroo who found himself piloting a bomber aircraft during World War 2. It was a cold November evening over Italy. Despite running low on fuel, he skilfully piloted his bomber through heavy flak to successfully attack an enemy factory. It was not an easy task. One shell exploded in the cockpit and he suffered atrocious injuries, including having his right eye shot out of its socket.

The aircraft was severely damaged and icy wind lashed his face through the damaged windscreen. They could have baled out, but Middleton was determined to get his crew safely back to England. He knew what fate awaited them if they were captured over enemy territory.

Against all odds and under heavy fire, Middleton and his crew finally made it to the English Channel. Then their fuel ran out. As they limped over the English coastline,

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
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




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Print makers make an impression at the Old Ambo


and his companions.

Winter time holds many dangers for wildlife

UR WILVOS 5441 6200 Hotline gets an increase in calls for kangaroos, wallabies, possums and bandicoots at this time of year.

It is that time of year when darkness falls early, just at the same time that workers are returning home. Not a good combination for our nocturnal animals that are emerging to forage at dusk.

In the last week in Ninderry alone there have been four adult kangaroos euthanized due to injuries from car impact. They are just ones I know of - so many more will have come to grief. A Hotline call came

through today that reminded me of another problem as winter approaches. Possums and birds find their way into fireplace chimneys.

This is not a good scenario in summer. It is disastrous in winter. Now is a good time to get a qualified tradesman to climb up on your roof and check that animals are unable to access the chimney.

It only takes a small opening to entice some inquisitive marsupial or bird into the space. Preventing

access to the chimney may save you the later expense of dismantling the fireplace to release a trapped animal! As the food sources lessen

in the cold months, our tawny frogmouths also suffer. Their diet is mainly insectivorous, including those delicious spiders, cockroaches and grasshoppers.

These are the same insects often poisoned by householders. The toxins then settle in the fat deposits of tawny frogmouths, and they draw upon these fat deposits in lean times. Sadly, these birds are often not found until they have progressed to the stage of convulsing on the ground.

There are so many aspects to think about when it comes to our native animals. How we live our daily lives can make a difference.

Drive carefully, make nestboxes to put up in your trees, plant native plants and minimize your use of insect sprays.

This one will colour your tongue blue

'T'S a Blue Tongue. But not

the Blue Tongue Lizard, Lthis is a plant, the Native Lasiandra, Melastoma malabathricum, seen flowering on an autumn day at the Gardens, it has lovely largish mauve flowers with petals up to 30mm long with yellow stamens.

The nick name is Blue Tongue as the hairy pinkish edible fruits stain the tongue blue/purple. This was a bush tucker plant and its said young boys ate them then woud pretend they were Blue Tongue Lizards by poking out their tongues, apparently the fruits are sweet. Its also said the First Nations people cooked and ate

the roots.

Large oval grey green leaves ribbed lengthwise also hairy with a middle stem, 6-11cm long x 2-4cm wide, quick growing and adaptable. It prefers moist-wet sites in sun/ shade. Can grow to 2m x 2m. Use as a feature, a hedge or in a pot.

Come and check it out near the Contemplation pond on the other side of the lagoon in the Maroochy Regional Bush Botanic Gardens Palm Creek Road, Tanawha, Old.

Mental Health responders for the Coast

Queenslanders experiencing a mental health crisis will have greater access to enhanced mental health services with the expansion of a highly successful collaboration between the Queensland Ambulance Service (QAS) and Queensland Health. The program pairs a specialist Paramedic with a Senior Mental Health Clinician from the HHS to provide a first, timely and appropriate health response to patients experiencing a mental health crisis. Last year the QAS responded to more than 60,000 people experiencing a mental health crisis, a 23 per cent increase from the previous year, representing around 13 per cent of QAS (000) calls.

Last call for Sunshine Coast Art **Prize entries**

ARTISTS from across the nation have just under one month to submit their entries into the Sunshine Coast Art Prize - one of the most eagerly anticipated regional art awards in Australia.

Entries are already flowing in from Australia's best contemporary artists all vying to be selected as a finalist and gain the attention of this year's judge, the high profile Director of the Museum of Brisbane, and former leader of a number of Queensland's leading cultural institutions and projects, Renai Grace.

The overall winner of the prestigious Prize will not only take home \$25,000, the work will become part of the regional Sunshine Coast Art Collection. The artist will also receive multiple and ongoing promotional opportunities.

Community Portfolio Councillor Baberowski said the acquisitive Sunshine Coast Art Prize was steadily pushing itself forward in the Australian calendar of go-ahead and admired visual arts awards in Australia.

All entries submitted will be presented for review to a pre-selection panel, from which 40 finalist works will be selected to exhibit in the Sunshine Coast Art Prize 2021 exhibition at the Caloundra Regional Gallery.

Signs of danger for our new trains

SPADS is an acronym for Signals Passed at Danger. It's when a train driver doesn't stop a 147m,

260 Tonne New Generation Rollingstock (NGR) train [or other types of train] before a red signal.

It also applies to other colour/combination signals that are passed without authority to proceed.

There are variations of rail signals in Queensland, similar to traffic lights with colours and mixed combinations of green, yellow, red and white lights.

They are by necessity more complex than those used on the roads.

There are also blinking yellows, double mixed colours and small diagonal white lights that indicate facing points.

A red signal may allow another train to pass ahead (with changes to points causing derailment if transgressed), or it may be to allow a vehicle level crossing to open its boom gates or it may be because of a trespasser within the rail corridor.

SPADS are measured as a ratio of their occurrence over one million kilometres of train travel.

It's seen as a precursor to train collision or derailment and thankfully, driver error rates are generally considered low - but it may only take one event to change that perspective for ever.

A Courier-Mail report on 18 February found train drivers causing SPADS were distracted by COVID concerns, personal problems or were chatting to colleagues.

It found the majority of drivers were speeding. It showed the distance before a train finally stopped was up to 195m past the signal, including at three road level crossings.

It reported thirty-three SPAD events in the last 9 months of 2020 with that figure continuing to rise into 2021.

Queensland Rail's own graph shows a considerable if not startling increase in SPADS since mid-August 2020, rising from 1.68/million km up to 2.30/million km by February 2021.

It shows that in the prior year period it reached a maximum 1.85/million km, in January 2020.

These rising figures are cause for concern.

On 23 March 1985 a train driver and passenger were killed and 31 injured in a head-on train collision at Trinder Park.

An NGR train has a maximum capacity of 964 people, comprising 454 seated and 510 standing. The consequences of running a red light resulting in a catastrophe, doesn't bear thinking about.

Automatic Train Protection (ATP) is one form of technology that assists in lowering SPADS.

ATP controls the headway (distance) between trains and can stop a train if it detects that a red signal is going to be passed.

It stops a SPAD in its tracks.

A form of ATP, the \$43m European Train Control System 1 (ETCSI) is currently being installed between Gympie North and Caboolture.

The \$634m European Train Control System 2 (ETCSII) is being rolled out from Milton to Northgate to increase safety.

A third line of defence is Queensland Rail's 'Rail Management Centre' that monitors the network 24 hours a day, 7 days a week - in real time, and allows staff to prevent a train from progressing.

Here's to lowering the SPADS and unused spades.

Deal Sealed

I popped in to see Yandina Creek resident Angelo Reitano in person recently, to deliver some good news. Angelo had contacted my office to ask for our assistance to get his gravel road, Zgrajewski Road, sealed. My visit to Angelo came with an announcement that the Federal Government has allocated \$3.2m to seal the road. The funding comes from Phase 2 of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Funding, which is a \$1.5 billion initiative to support local jobs, businesses and boost the economy during COVID-19.

The Labor Government was warned by the Auditor-General three years ago that there were serious problems with Queensland's roads. They did nothing! And the maintenance backlog has now blown out from \$4bn to almost \$6bn.

The Auditor-General forecast that our maintenance backlog would grow to \$9bn this decade but at the current rate we're going to be well over \$10bn. While Cross River Rail sucks up all the cash, road users across the state and especially here on the Hinterland are left to deal with more potholes, more dodgy bridges and more dangerous roads. They've completely lost control of road maintenance.

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
