<u>Drummer's Memories of Nambour:</u>

From Petrie Creek to Powderfinger

JON Coghill has fond memories of his Nambour childhood: creek swims, after-school bike rides, and the playful challenges of

dodging swooping magpies.
"I used to walk home from school," the former Powderfinger drummer said. "I lived up at Oxleigh Crescent just across from the Showgrounds there. And you'd get on your bike with your mate and just go. Nambour was one of those places where if you just had a couple of hours in the afternoon, you could do whatever you want."

Petrie Creek was a particular favourite. "I used to go fishing in Petrie Creek," he said. "I used to go swimming in a water hole down at the showgrounds. And it was one of the most fantastic places to grow up, because you could do whatever you want and you never really got into too much trouble. It was so much fun getting dived by a magpie or chased by a dog."

This Saturday will see Jon returning to Nambour to promote the town on national TV. "It always feels familiar and feels nice to be

back in Nambour," he said. "I went to Nambour High School for 12 years. I started drumming when I was about 12. I think it was because my dad, he was a jazz musician, and they used to have band practice in the lounge room and I just used to go in and watch them play.

"And then I went to Brissie to go to uni, but I still worked back at the Nambour Hospital and I worked at the Big Pineapple and places like

And while he never joined a band in those days, music was always close to his heart. "I did play in a few musicals up in Mapleton with a group of friends who put on some musicals up there. I played in the Nambour High School musicals. I remember we did Grease."

Jon credits a work ethic honed in Nambour for some of his subsequent career success. "It's funny, and it might've been my parents or

Reshaping Nambour: Council releases draft designs for CBD

has revealed draft concept plans for Nambour CBD.

Council says the Nambour (Namba) Place Plan aims to help revive the region's historic hub. guide its future, and fuse its growing reputation as a creative and welcoming

The Plan features greener streets, wider pathways, art installations and open spaces.

Sunshine Coast Council Division 10 Councillor David Law said this approach ensured that

designs for the town's public space met the values and needs of the community "I'm excited to release the draft design which encompasses five streets within Nambour's town centre which really captures the essence

of the hub," Cr Law said. "One of the highlights for me in this plan is the improved pedestrian experience with cooler greener streets, welcoming spaces, and generous footpaths to encourage outdoor

dining and socialising. "The design also encourages a more active main street where people feel comfortable, safe and connected as they walk through town.

"This ensures we are servicing the business, entertainment, cultural, health and education needs of the town and the surrounding communities. I'm pleased to see the project drawing inspiration and direction from community engagement and this next stage honours and acknowledges how quickly the town is changing and expanding.

Cr Law encouraged residents to view the concept and share their feedback via an online survey before September 22.

The community can also meet the project team at one of the pop-up sessions running until September 14.

Council's plan missing one key component

IT is impressive. It is appreciated. But there is one key ingredient missing from Sunshine Coast Council's Nambour Place Plan for the CBD: convenient street parking.

In fact, the plan seems to indicate a reduction in parking spaces. This despite a petition

raised last year and signed by a thousand people, calling for more parking in town. A petition which was

all but ignored by Council. Convenient parking is the lifeblood of any main street. You just have to ask shop owners. Indeed, you iust have to ask Coles and Woolworths who rely on an abundance of covered spaces to attract shoppers n Nambour and across Australia.

Ignoring convenient street parking options is a

disastrous planning oversight that threatens to choke the life out of Nambour's CBD potential. This is particularly so in Currie Street - already obviously suffering under the weight of years of neglect.

By placing aesthetics above practicality Council's draft plan (let's hope it is just a "draft") puts Nambour's dwindling main-street independent businesses under further pressure. There is obviously merit in making our

streets more attractive, and kudos to Council for attempting to entice shoppers from the two big shopping centres and into town by beautifying linking streets. But the best way to make the streets more attractive is to line them with vibrant shops.

To encourage character-filled, independent small businesses that make traditional towns

must make parking a priority.

And they should more actively seek the opinions of the mum and dad businesspeople and shopkeepers who are the CBD's key stake-

These customer-facing shopkeepers should have a huge say on what their street looks like and how it could be improved. They are the



experts. They are the ones whose livelihoods depend on a functioning CBD. They are the ones who have invested tens or hundreds of thousands of dollars in the CBD. They create the charm and character of the town. They make our streets vibrant and welcoming, serve customers and attract visitors. They are the faces of our main street. And they are the ones we should be listening to first, foremost and overwhelmingly in any discussion about the

This newspaper urges Council to reconsider its plan and make parking a priority.

We urge business owners and residents to have their say on Council's plan for Nambour before September 22. It's a Central Business District. Not a botanic garden. Trees are nice, but convenient carparking is essential.

Nambour Admin Building repurposing plan underway

Ambitious CBD plan stirs debate over priorities, parking

THE Nambour (Namba) Place Plan has arrived on most local business operators like a surprise birthday present: unexpected, not what they really wanted, but better than nothing.

The plan, released on 23 August, focuses on the Howard and Currie Street intersection, and Bury, Mill and Ann Streets.

The council media release which announced it spoke about greener streets, shade, art installations and wider pathways. But there was no mention of what businesses in Nambour have repeatedly asked for - more parking.

Trees in the concept drawings make it difficult to see how much will remain of existing street-side parking spaces.

The Gazette approached a number of small business operators in the centre of Nambour to seek their opinions on the plan. None of them had been aware the plan had

been in the making and some did not know it existed while others were disillusioned after years of wheel-spinning by authorities to care.

"I've been here for 20 years and there's been so much talk and (yet) nothing but it's good to see young ones getting in there and giving their opinion," said one business owner.

Another preferred not to get involved after having seen lofty council ideas achieve little for business elsewhere.

However, he did suggest that "given the way some of them come around corners," traffic calming would be in order if the council wanted to proceed with planting trees, as per

Lee Hillman, of Backbeat Records in Howard Street, was pleased to see some move towards reviving Nambour but queried the council's

"I think anything's good at the moment but if they've got money for that, surely they've got the money for parking," he said. Mr Hillman questioned the provision of street seating and outdoor dining when Nambour lacked shows and restaurants to attract

"I'm for it but it's probably putting the cart before the horse. There's got to be a reason for people to sit around," he said.

Vicki Arthur, of Mr Beesley's vintage clothing store in Howard Street, learned of the plan when council officers dropped off some flyers the day after its release.

Ms Arthur was disappointed the plan did not include centre or extra parking on Currie





Street and was confused about the attention Mill Street;

paid to Bury Street given the council had relocated its headquarters to Maroochydore, pulling workers out of town.

She was also bemused by the forecourt upgrade. "Haven't they already done up there?" Ms Arthur said Nambour had a theme when the old sugar mill was in town but there was

WOOMBYE resident has skewered Translink assertions that three-year-old studies clear operations at the rail stabling yard from any ngering noise issues.

James Kasmer and other nearby residents re unhappy about the noise from air-condioners running all night in Next Generation Rollingstock trains stabled at the Woombye yard, where the trains are cleaned and parked overnight ready for service the next morning.

Mr Kasmer accepts that air-conditioning should run while cleaners are working in the trains but said the noise from NGR air-conditioners running all night effectively turned a residential area into an industrial area.

Translink's responses to two recent media enquiries have referred to noise studies which liken the rail stable yard noise to normal noise levels. A 21 July Translink statement said independnet noise testing "found that operation of the stabling yard, including the NGR air-conditioning systems, was not a dominant noise source in the local environment and was around normal ambient levels."

In a 17 August response to further question, Translink provided a statement which said surveys in August and September-October 2020 "confirmed that the outdoor noise environment was primarily influenced by residential activity, local road traffic, natural sources such as birdsong, breeze blown vegetation and

trains on the North Coast Line."

"It was found the noise was not from stowed passenger trains (including train A/C systems).'

Mr Kasmer said the 2020 studies focused on noise between about 6am and 10pm rather than noise overnight, when the air-conditioners were now running

He said the noise studies also did not record noise between 10pm and 4am except on one night. Mr Kasmer believes the air-conditioners are being left overnight to control reported mould problems in the NGR.

"What other plausible reason could there be for TMR and QR to run air-con units through the night when trains are empty of people and sitting in complete darkness?" he asked. "QR admitted to mould issues on 5 March 2020 publicly on National Nine News in their NGR

"They led us to believe at the WCBA Meeting with TMR and QR in July 2020 at Red Bridge Motor Inn, that a fix was imminent. They never stopped running trains at night though. Čertainly not a permanent change. In 2023 we have some nights on, some nights off. There is no pattern other than the noise continues on and off.

"If there is no mould issue now, in 2023, please turn off air-con units at night and residents' concerns immediately go away."

Translink has said the air-conditioning is running on optimal settings while the NGR trains are in stabling mode to address humidity in response to complaints about odour on the trains.



Red Rose Rally to help stop domestic & family violence

SINCE January this year, there have been 35 confirmed deaths of women, and 10 children, from domestic violence in Australia. And this is just the tip of the iceberg. Queensland police attend 500 serious incidents of domestic violence every day. This has resulted in 2800 charges of non-lethal strangulation, among other serious injuries. Of course, many domestic and family violence incidents are not reported to police, so it is obvious that this is a huge societal problem.

To raise awareness of the issue and educate the community about what can be done to prevent domestic violence, and support victims, Speak Up Now - Stop Domestic and Family Violence (Maleny and Blackall Range) was formed as a collaboration between local service clubs in 2020. Since then, other organisations have also partnered with the group which recently, joined with 8 other communities in Queensland in holding a Red Rose Rally.

Red Rose Rallies are an initiative of the Red Rose Foundation, an organisation dedicated to monitoring domestic violence deaths and providing awareness and support for those affected by this increasing scourge of our community. A Rally is held after the death of every



Queensland woman killed due to domestic violence, with the community being invited to gather in a prominent public place, often with family and friends of the deceased victim, and

At Maleny's Red Rose Rally, we honoured the 3 Queensland women and a baby killed intimate partners in the last 3 months, along with the deaths of two innocent people caught up in one of those incidents. Each one was named, and remembered with a minute's silence, before each of the participants placed a red rose as a memorial. The vigil was held a Tesch Park, and many of the passing motorists and pedestrians signalled their support.





Reviving Montville: Chamber considers strategies to reignite business

THE MONTVILLE Chamber of Commerce will consider funding avenues for a possible promotional campaign for the town.

The chamber's July meeting, which was attended by the Sunshine Coast Council's head of business and industry development, Tim McGee, discussed ways to reinvigorate busi-

Chamber president Shiralee Cooper said promotion through both traditional and social media was under consideration and application could be made for a council grant.

Local business operators say the area has not hit full stride since covid due in part to changes in tourism patterns associated with flight costs

Tourism figures show that the number of domestic overnight visitors to the Sunshine Coast has not just flatlined but decreased by 0.1% since before covid.

The lacklustre tourism has been acutely felt in localities such as Montville, which are heavily reliant upon visitor spending.

"Montville's income is 5 percent local, 35 percent from the Sunshine Coast and about 60 percent from outside the Sunshine Coast so we're very much reliant upon money from elsewhere," Ms Cooper said. "It's quite a different demographic to other places, other than perhaps Hastings Street, Noosa."

Ms Cooper said there were also concerns that the loss of the local doctors' clinic and pharmacy would have a domino effect on other businesses through a loss of foot traffic.

"We want to keep people coming in and not go elsewhere to get what they need," she said. Ms Cooper said that aside from promotion, chamber members felt that the stage in the Russell Family Park, behind the western side of the shopping strip, would allow all-weather events to be held.

She said there was also support within the chamber for a regional gallery to be located at Montville but - without benefactors or support from the council which seemed to favour other areas - this would be difficult.

THE visible police presence in Nambour went to new heights recently with two mounted police spotted riding through town.

The mounted officers and their steeds took a leisurely evening walk through Currie Street on Wednesday, 16 August and were also pictured, above, at the Nambour Railway Station.

Queensland's mounted police are based at Moggill, in Brisbane's northwest, and are an uncommon sight on the Sunshine Coast.

The Queensland Police Service's media section had little information to provide on the mounties latest local appearance, apart from saying they were part of the "high visibility policing" in Nambour.

Mounted police officers carry out the same operational duties as other officers but from

There are only 10 mounted police officers in Queensland and each works mainly with two horses, one of which is often in training or a developmental stage, according to a QPS blog on the mounted police.

It says that fully operational horses are

trained for any situation, from suburban patrols to ceremonial events, and community engagement to working Safe Night Precincts.

The blog goes on to say that the horses usually start in suburban areas and progress through to the highest intensity environments, such as Safe Night Precincts as in Fortitude

Central Nambour has been designated a Special Entertainment Precinct.

No nightclubs have opened yet but the Currie Street patrol would have allowed the officers and horses to familiarise themselves with the area and with the community.

It was reported to the Gazette that the mounted police were greeted with smiles and waves from passers-by.

Business people, staff and regular visitors to the Nambour CBD area have noted an increased police presence in Lowe Street and nearby areas in recent weeks.

It comes after mounting frustration within members of the business community and the public over anti-social behaviour in central Nambour, particularly in the vicinity of the public square in Lowe Street.

important historical reminder to Maleny's dairying past from the turn of the century, linking the living and working lives of dairy farmers of that time to Maleny's built heritage. They are one of of the last

remaining examples in the district of a walk-through milking parlour, bestowing a high historical significance to Maleny, the region and to the dairy industry.

With community support, the Fairview Bails Restoration Committee will work to restore, maintain and preserve the historic site, in doing so creating another unique heritage experience for walkers on the Maleny Community Precinct.







SUNSHINE Coast Council says it recognises that, like many places in Queensland, the Sunshine Coast is in the midst of a housing crisis.

At the July 2023 Ordinary Meeting of Council,

1 petitions were tabled by Councillor David Law, requesting a reconsideration of Council's approach to providing for caravans, buses and tiny homes. This work is now under way and is guided by the Housing and Homelessness

The Community Portfolio Councillor asked the petitioners and anyone with an interest in assisting those in need of housing during this crisis, to consider how they could help support a person and provide a type of housing.

"Residents might be able to help someone in need by providing an opportunity for accommodation on their own property and there are a number of ways to do this," Cr Law said.

"Homeowners could think about adding a secondary dwelling on their property.

"A secondary dwelling is a permanent structure with a building approval that can be occupied by another household – and they don't have to be related to the main dwelling's

occupants.

"Alternatively it could be a temporary home for example, a tiny house on wheels, a caravan

"Under Council's Local Law, a temporary home can be in place for up to 18 months.

"For anyone interested in accommodating someone in a secondary dwelling or temporary home, further information is available on Council's website, sunshinecoast.qld.gov. au and search "building and development fact

"Council officers are always available to help with the process."

Council will continue to review its approach to providing for caravans, buses and tiny homes and will provide feedback on Council's





Echidnas are truly unique and fascinating Australian native animals

Nature Watch News from Donna Brennan Wildlife

SADLY our WILVOS Hotline is still receiving calls about echidnas. This always occurs during the cooler months, breeding time for these exquisite animals.

Males may spend considerable time in pursuit of a female echidna. In these weeks there could be a number of males following one female and this is called an 'echidna train'.

When an echidna is rescued, there are no obvious external features to define the sex of the animal. There are no teats, as puggles drink from a milk 'patch'. A pouch is only formed when the female is getting ready to produce an egg. She carries the egg for 10.5 days until the tiny puggle hatches. This little one grows quickly, becoming too large, and maybe a little prickly, to be carried around in Mum's pouch.

Fifty days after hatching, the puggle is deposited in a burrow. It may be a burrow in cool under the roots of a tree, or one dug under a pile of branches. The

burrow temperature is a cool 15 degrees. Mum may forage up to a kilometre away, returning to feed her youngster every 5 to 10 days.

This burrow is the reason echidnas should never be relocated. From September, should someone relocate an echidna, it may be a female feeding a puggle in a nearby burrow. Removing the mother means certain death by starvation for the puggle. These animals are so vulnerable. Even as adults they only have prickly spines as a defence. No teeth, and no poisonous spines. They have to be smart to avoid predators.

If an echidna is found in the yard, advice is to confine pets inside. The echidna will move on once the cool of darkness arrives, unless there are termites around. They will do a wonderful job eradicating them!

forces pause on Council quarry plans NORTHERN Blackall Range and Image Flat

Community

communities have convinced Sunshine Coast Council to pause its plans to seek private tenders to operate its Dulong and Image Flat

A detailed submission outlining community concerns with the proposal, and backed by numerous local and regional community advocacy groups requested SCC put an indefinite hold on releasing the tenders until all matters raised could be addressed.

Following extensive investigations and professional advice, hinterland residents are of the understanding that SCC-owned quarries at Dulong and Image Flat may be treated differently from private quarries in the region under the Sunshine Coast Planning Scheme (SCPC). If founded, the anomalies could offer planning and development, operational and commercial advantages to SCC that local private quarry companies do not share.

Vice President of Blackall Range Land Use and Planning Association Lindsay Holt was concerned that any advantages may also be transferrable to a successful lessee.

"Should a contract be signed between Council and a private quarry operator under the current planning arrangements, those potential advantages may never be wound back. Council needs to address these problems urgently," Mr Holt says.

"Community investigations have also raised concerns that under the current SCPS, residents living near Image Flat and Dulong Council-owned quarries may not have the same essential and expected legal opportunities for participation in planning application decisions as those living near private quarries."

President of Hinterland Quarry Action Group, Anne Veivers, says residents were worried that, if a private lessee applied to increase production at either Council-owned quarry, the community can't have fair input into the decision. "This is of huge concern to residents as they're the ones who stand to be most impacted in their homes by any future changes," Ms Veivers says.

"Hinterland residents living with Council-owned quarries must have the same rights as everyone else. The community is asking Sunshine Coast Council to demonstrate it's a level playing field for both public and private quarry operations and all residents equally in the Sunshine Coast region."

SCC advised hinterland residents late last week that it is taking the matters raised very seriously and will temporarily pause the quarr tender process while it considers the content of the community submission.

According to Mr Holt, it's a good start. "No one is against Council running their own quarries, but unfortunately, there may be problems relating to Dulong and Image Flat quarries that need urgent attention by Council.


