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'Food Trucks Friday Fest' planned for **Nambour Town Square**

A group of Nambour's community leaders, pictured, is working with Council to organise a September markets event featuring food trucks and musical entertainment around Lowe Street and the Town Square.

It's all part of a plan by the team, convened by local businesswoman and Tramco Director Rhonda Billett, to activate and energise the CBD and to raise money for further events promoting

Nambour and "activating" spaces in town.
The "Food Truck Friday Fest" will happen monthly, with the first planned for September 9 from 4pm to 8pm near the intersections of Lowe, Short and Queen Streets.

Food Truck Fridays will alternate with the already-established and successful 'Nambour Forecourt Live!' events on Friday nights.

"Our Nambour community groups met again recently and identified the Nambour Lowe Street precinct as a space in the community that needs some attention and activation," said Rhonda, "Fun times and loads of smiles are what's in store for this area of Nambour.

The bright lights on Lowe Street will be lit up and the street will play host to its first Food Truck Friday Fest.

"In our working partnership with Sunshine Coast Council we hope the community embraces the event and has a little fun on the streets of Nambour."

It's all part of the main game in which Nambour Chamber of Commerce, Reimagine Nambour, Tramco and Nambour retailers are working alongside Div 10 Cr David Law. Mayor Mark Jamieson and key council staff to advocate for the town through an Economic Activation Plan.

It's aims to work within the plans, groups and resources that are already in place, such as

the recently-announced Nambour Activation

"The thing that got me going was seeing the 2024 strategic plans for Nambour and realising that we were falling short of where it was hoped we'd be at this stage," Ms Billett said. "I've had a business in town and I think it's important to give back."

Ms Billett said it was important the groups presented a united front to work with Council to get the best possible outcomes for the town.

The team is working to deliver new Nambour events, CBD revitalisation and business activation. "We already have the established brand 'IAmNambour' developed in 2021 by ReImagine Nambour. Our collective organisations aim to leverage off this brand and grow the local economy encompassing the 'IAm-Nambour' brand into our future projects.

"Nambour is a large catchment area and one of our first priorities is to focus on events that stimulate the economy and support business and make Nambour a vibrant place to live, work and play."

To that end the team was also looking at promoting a maxi-event to fall in line with the already-established and successful Nambour Rodeo and Retro Rocks Nambour.

Spring Affair to help create homely rooms for Maleny's palliative care patients

A remarkable and determined band of volunteers have been fundraising for 38 years to make life a little easier for patients and staff at Maleny Soldiers Memorial Hospital.

The Maleny Hospital Auxiliary are deeply committed to supporting the hospital and the broader Maleny community.

Auxiliary President Diana Bryce said Maleny locals were protective of their hospital.

"Everybody is grateful that it's here and we must keep it, so we will keep supporting it," Mrs Brvce said.

The auxiliary fundraises to help purchase equipment and supplies.

"We have put a lot of equipment into this hospital over the years - 'extras' that they wouldn't otherwise have or would be waiting a long time to acquire," she said.

"We've just authorised the purchase of a slit lamp - a microscope used for eye examinations - so that people with eye concerns can be looked after at the hospital rather than having to go to an optometrist or down to the main hos-

The auxiliary's current fundraising efforts will go towards the refurbishment of palliative care rooms, including making the rooms larger and providing a bed for partners to sleep close

"We don't want to do the bricks and mortar, but we'd like to have a hand in making the rooms more like a bedroom at home, or a home away from home; to create a more pleasant and warmer environment for patients and their families.

Maleny Hospital Senior Medical Superintendent Dr Kris McQuaid said the funds raised by the hospital auxiliary helped ensure specialised services could be delivered at a local level, minimising the need for patients to travel to larger

Maleny provides a 24-hour emergency centre as well as an inpatient unit. The inpatient unit provides treatment and management of conditions such as palliative care, rehabilitation for those who have suffered such things as strokes, or following surgery such as hip or knee replacement, as well as caring for those with other medical conditions.

Director of Nursing and Facility Manager, Karen Croker said the hospital auxiliary donated equipment that brought extra comfort and convenience for patients, and often meant people could stay local and didn't need to travel.

"Aesthetics are important for palliative care patients; their families spend a lot of time here and it's important that people feel comfortable and as close to normal life as possible.

"The auxiliary funds will help to make the rooms and our beautiful verandas welcoming and calming and more suitable for the palliative patient and their family.


"We are extremely fortunate to have our auxiliary volunteers to connect our health service with the local community; they contribute so much to the wellbeing of our patients.

Mrs Bryce said an enjoyable morning was planned with beautiful food, flowers and fashion and some very nice raffle prizes.

Old photo sparks traffic discussion

THIS old photo of Currie Street, featuring its central parking and single lane, sparked a vibrant conversation on Facebook last week.

Residents had their say about parking, traffic flow and traffic calming ideas for Nambour's Currie Street.

Robyn: "Nooo. While I'd love more parking for the main street, going down to one lane will just create a huge bottleneck."

Peter: "Centre parking is a ridiculous idea. It's dangerous, narrow lanes, plenty of other options. Get rid of the right turn lane from Currie St (heading north) into Lowe St."

Pete: "Great idea. Should have been done when the bypass was put in. Lots of regional towns use it and it passively slows the traffic speed down and makes high streets safe. There's cars doing 70-80km regularly through (Currie St).

Trevor: "We have had centre parking in Nambour before when the National Highway ran through town. No doubt you will get engineers saying it doesn't comply with their current handbook but we are applying 2022 rules in towns that were built 100 years ago. No parking spaces ... No business."

Vivinne: "When we had centre-parking Currie Street was the Bruce Highway going through! It worked then. The space is still there. Just some proper forward planning and decent coordination of traffic lights and it would be a cinch."

Melissa: "When council moves staff out to Maroochydore you should see more parking."

Councillor backs calls for CBD traffic, parking investigation

IT'S the face of Nambour and its main thoroughfare. Currie Street is a key element of the CBD and integral to plans for Nambour's revitalisation.

However, once referred to as the 'Magic Mile', the main drag has looked tired and unwelcoming for more than a decade. Empty shopfronts are the result of a main street choked with heavy traffic, starved of parking and unwelcoming to pedestrians.

Now residents and shop owners are renewing calls for a revamp, to make their street more inviting and encourage people back to the

marginal seat provides promising impetus for some much needed attention to the once proud

Local shopkeeper Deb Lawson reignited the long-term issue recently by starting a survey which has now attracted 1000 signatures.

The survey coincided with a Queensland Cabinet visit to Nambour last month, during which Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey threw his support behind an investigation into traffic and parking concerns.

Mr Bailey promised to have his team look at options for improving pedestrian experience and increasing parking. Options include calming traffic at either end of town, looking at parking and traffic routing, and improving traffic lights sequencing.

Div 10 Councillor David Law said last week he backs any moves to improve the street for pedestrians and retailers.

"Those four lanes in the middle of Currie Street virtually cuts the town in half," Cr Law said. "It's great to see that the Minister understands the problem. He even experienced the same issue when he was a councillor in Moorooka. So he gets it."

Cr Law was confident strategies could be applied to encourage shoppers to park and stay

longer. "We do get really heavy traffic through town but if we could calm it and control the flow I think it would make a big difference," he said.

We'll have to wait to see what the experts say but to me we need to slow the traffic down, and I'd like to see traffic moving through the middle of the street so you keep the cars and trucks away from the footpath and away from pedes-

"If you get the moving vehicles away from the people, they'll start to feel safe and stay longer

"I think something needs to be done from from Maud Street right through to Petrie Creek Bridge and Price Street, single lane in each direction.

"I will do anything I can do to improve the situation in Currie Street based on what the traffic modeling says we could do.

"There is a lot to do but the (recently announced) Namba Activation Project provides excellent opportunities for action.

"I think Currie street is improving slowly. Businesses are coming back. But four lanes is unhelpful and we may need to be strong enough to put up with spending one more minute in the car going through town in order to save our main street."

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A rock wall, climbing rope net and a spiral slide will feature as part of the new play space inspired by Nambour's history. It will replace the existing playground at Quota Park, Nambour.

Quota Park gears up for new playground

COUNCIL has released plans for the next stage of Quota Memorial Park's playground improvements - a 7-metre-high 'Spire Gear Tower'.

A contoured rock wall, climbing rope net, banister slide, internal climbers with various levels of challenge, a rope elevator, and a huge spiral slide will all be part of the park's refresh.

Division 10 Councillor David Law said he was excited works would soon start on the impressive junior and toddler play space.

"With Quota Memorial Park being such a popular location for families with varying aged children to visit, council has redesigned part of the playground's layout to make it more assessable

The artist impressions show various sized 'gears' on the outside of the tower to provide a meaningful connection to the park's history.

The old playground was based on the 1894 Moreton Central Sugar Mill theme and the skate park features a cog from the mill.

The playground upgrade will also see a new table tennis table installed in the junior play area and the existing 'Evos' play unit will be

relocated within the play space and the basket swing moved to the toddler play area.

"Parents will be pleased to know the view lines between the Youth Activity Precinct and the junior and toddler play spaces will be improved by replacing the picket style fence with a pool style fence.

"The tower's bubble windows, hole panels, and rope elevator all help to provide a great view for the kids, while allowing parents and carers to see into the tower for supervision."

Council will add greenery with additional shade trees around the playground. An additional shade sail will also be installed.

Experts to draw on visions, old and new, in Nambour **CBD** reactivation plan

A plan to shape Nambour's town centre for the next 10 to 15 years is being created by Sunshine Coast Council in collaboration with the

Div 10 Cr David Law said the plan would be carried out by Council's Placemaking and Design Office, drawing on previous community engagement and planning.

The team would draw on 10 years of feedback and visioning documents produced by council and the community to form the basis of the precinct concept plan. "The precinct concept plan, feasibility and implementation plan will provide a clear and detailed understanding of how the town centre will look and function, how much it will cost, and provide a roadmap for when each stage of construction can occur," Cr Law said.

He said council would engage closely to ensure outcomes aligned with the values and visions of Nambourians. In the early planning phase of the project, council has held a series of conversations with key community groups, facilitated a community Think Tank workshop and analysed all documents produced over the past 10 years on Nambour's town centre by Council and by Reimagine Nambour.

Council has also updated several plans which guide future social infrastructure investment in the region. "It was necessary to undertake a review of these documents and implement their relevance to planning for the Nambour centre area," said Čr Law.

"These investigations have now formed the basis for the precinct concept plan."

A series of community events in February 2023 and an online survey would allow the community to provide feedback on the draft concept plan.

From March to May 2023 that community feedback will be reviewed, and changes made to the plan.

In May 2023 the plan will be presented to the community ahead of Stage 1 construction.

"A draft precinct-wide concept design and implementation plan will be produced this year (2022) for presentation to the community where we ask, 'have we got it right?' in early 2023," Cr Law said.

The plan will contain a draft concept plan and individual concept plans for each of the identified areas within the precinct, as outlined in the image.

"This project now aims to build on all of the great work that has been accomplished over the past 10 years by the community and council and continue to collaborate with exiting initiatives such as the Special Entertainment Precinct and the Nambour Tram," said Cr Law.

Nambour's changing role an opportunity for future

As the once thriving capital of the Maroochy Shire, the centre has undergone a series of changes over the past 20 years leading to a sense of loss among longer-term residents. In addition to the relocation of the sitting council chambers, the bypass of the Bruce Highway, the closure of the sugar mill and changes to agricultural production have also contributed to a perceived decline in the importance of the town.

This loss of identity and the changing role of the centre is now being seen by many as an opportunity to take forward what is already great and reimagine and redefine the town's future. Recently the relatively affordable housing and commercial property has seen an influx of younger people attracted to the town's central locality, good transport options, entertainment precinct and appreciation of a green and leafy aspect.

Nambour now and into the future

Cr Law said Nambour Centre was a vibrant hub of the hinterland, servicing the business, entertainment, cultural, health and education needs of the town and the surrounding communities. It was also well-connected via the rail system, local bus services, improved roads and an extensive network of pathways.

OWNERS of a Mexican restaurant are encouraging others to go al fresco and take advantage of a recent Council initiative to waive footpath dining fees.

Troy Hoffstede and Virginia Homer's Currie Street restaurant La Salsa De Vida is well known for its outdoor streetside dining.

But Virginia said she only found out about the Council waiver when she received her latest notice and "it was zero". She reckoned more people would probably jump at the idea if they knew about it.

"I received a notice and the amount payable was zero so I rang up and asked why that was and the lady told me it was because of this new initiative. It was great news and it's good for our bottom line. Especially since our Liquor Licenses came through at the same time.

"It will be appealing for people because the various charges can be a little overwhelming.

"It's definitely an incentive and it has saved us hundreds of dollars because we're over the square metreage.

"If we want people to come to Nambour we need to have a visual appeal and that's what's outdoors dining provides. Can you imagine Currie St, if it was all like this?

"Our customers love eating out, especially in summer, when this area is packed. In the hotter weather these tables go out straight away."

Div 10 Cr David Law said any business within the Special Entertainment Precinct could take advantage of the waiver which also applied to on-street trading and temporary entertainment

"It's great to see Troy and Virginia making it work and we would like to see more businesses taking up the opportunity," he said.

'I Am Nambour' Ambassador Rhonda Billett thanked Council for the important initiative.

"La Salsa De Vida Mexican is a great example of what outdoor dining can do, not only for their business, but also for dining culture in Nambour," she said. "This week I visited all restaurants, cafes and bars in the SEP of Nambour and delivered application forms to make it easier for busy business owners to join in the fun of activating Nambour's CBD."

About the Waiver

In June 2022, council introduced a further initiative within the Nambour SEP in an effort to support local businesses. Fees have been waived for any local law activities requiring a permit within the Nambour SEP. This fee waiver

- · Operation of an amplified music venue on private property within the SEP
- Footpath dining
- Goods on footpath
- Temporary entertainment events
- · Other commercial activities, such as temporary food trucks.
- The fee waiver includes application fees, renewal fees and rental fees.
- · Fee waivers do not include licences issued under State Government Legislation - such as Food Licences.

WCBA repeats calls to thwart potential overpass

WOOMBYE Community and Business Association (WCBA) has maintained its concern about the potential for a road overpass to be constructed over the railway line into Woombye thereby splitting the town in two and attracting heavy traffic through the village.

Concerns were sparked by historic plans such as a Landsborough to Nambour Rail Corridor Study Fact Sheet from September 2008 that shows a map of Woombye with a proposed overpass from Back Woombye Road to Blackall Street to replace the current underpass, see pic-

It is an issue the WCBA's Ken Hudson is passionate about having seen the demise of many regional town shopping centres when heavy traffic destroys the small-town feel.

"We are very concerned that this will direct even larger volumes of future traffic from the hinterland and all areas west of Woombye, and Palmwoods directly into the streets of Woombye," says a draft letter sent to State MP Rob Skelton and Councillor for Div 5 Winston Johnston.

"Traffic is already increasing at an alarming rate. We are particularly concerned that the scout hall will be wiped out, and the Woombye Memorial Park, CWA Park and 2nd Light Horse Regiment - Woombye Troop will be irreversibly impacted. This is not acceptable to the residents, traders, community groups and sporting clubs of Woombye."

The WCBA says community responses to Council's Blackall Street community engagement, late 2020, were characterised by comments such as 'pedestrian friendly', 'slowing traffic', 'improving safety', 'retaining existing character'.

"The streetscape design will deliver on these community aspirations, any overpass increasing traffic volume through the centre of town is totally against the community's

expectations," said WCBA Vice President Grant Palethorpe. "It would undermine the efforts being made by Council to retain the town's historic character and enhance walkability and safety for the town's residents and visitors.'

The WCBA said it was critical for government planners to nominate an alternate traffic corridor bypass and incorporate it in the new town plan "before even more development spreads into locations suitable for the future bypass".

"Our Woombye Community & Business Association believes the long-term preservation of our lovely village and adjacent residences is a very high priority.

"Hence, we passionately desire this important issue be addressed now, and included in the current rewrite of the town plan.'

In reply, Transport and Main Roads (TMR) said it did not have any current plans for an overpass through Woombye village, and there was no funding allocated to investigate any such proposal.

They said the proposal outlined by Mr Hudson would have significant impacts in a highly constrained environment. "Any major changes to access requires careful planning and detailed investigations.

"We consider many factors when determining future upgrades, including impacts to the surrounding community and input from affected residents.

"We understand the village atmosphere of Woombye is an important part of the community and existing buildings and infrastructure are important community assets.

"TMR would like to reassure the community that we remain committed to keeping the community updated on any major projects in the planning, design or construction phases."

Div 5 Cr Winston Johnston said he fully appreciated the concerns expressed regarding any planned rail overpass at Woombye. "(But) unfortunately any future project by the Queensland Government and TMR is controlled by the State in every aspect.

"Even if Council were able to amend the future town plan, State Government has absolute control and will override any TP provisions, just like they do with Schools, Emergency Services and any other State facility. The relevant person to direct concerns is therefore the State Member for Nicklin."



Expert details Coast & Nambour's great railway rip-off

THE Sunshine Coast, and Nambour in particular, was being dramatically under-serviced when it came to rail services for the region, according to Sunshine Coast Rail Upgrade Advocate Jeff Addison.

Speaking at a Nambour Chamber of Commerce meeting last week (Thursday, August 4) Mr Addison said the Sunshine Coast had been over-promised and shortchanged time and again by successive governments.

Mr Addison outlined a litany of raised expectations and inflated promises and said a duplicated track line to Nambour was an essential part of the mix to bring rail infrastructure into line with other parts of Australia.

He criticised the State Government for raising expectations of duplication to Nambour when the current funded plan for rail duplication ended 26 kilometres south of Nambour, at Beerwah. "It really is a false claim. It gives people a false impression, that rail duplication is coming to Nambour."

Mr Addison said, in fact, the works for Nambour consisted of a park and ride facility at the back of Coles. "Nambour is going to get an extra 50 car parks," he said.

"The closest the rail works come to Nambour will end at Beerwah. So there's no rail duplication anywhere near."

Duplication important to boost freight

In a broader sense, Mr Addison said rail duplication to Nambour was important as it would allow rail freight transport to free up roads. Unlike passenger transport, freight made money for the government Passenger services were subsidized by the government by

He referred to a recent Sunshine Coast Daily story which compared the allocation of funds to the Gold and Sunshine Coasts for bus and rail from 2011 to 2021.

Nine times the funding for Gold Coast

"On the Sunshine Coast, they spent \$150.7 million on bus and rail projects. On the Gold Coast over the same period they spent \$1.38 billion. More than nine times what they have spent here on the Sunshine Coast. And we are two-thirds the population of the Gold Coast.

"And that's why I get so angry with this government, when they quibble and say that they're doing a great job with rail duplication, when they're spending \$160.8 million compared to what they're outlaying constantly on the Gold Coast.

"Whether it's light rail, heavy rail, duplication, you name it: We seem to get the short straw every time, and that needs to end."

Mr Addison said a single-track in and out of the Sunshine Coast was insufficient to service the needs of the third largest regional area in

"Compare us to the Redcliffe Peninsula line, for example, it was started in 2013 and opened in October 2016.

"On the day it opened, it opened with 650 train services per week. The Sunshine Coast has 250 train services per week, plus 75 rail buses, making 325 services per week. Exactly half what the Redcliffe Peninsula Line opened with."

Mr Addison said over the years he had met with just about every state or federal MP about rail service to the Coast and all of them agreed it should be a priority.

"I met with Annastacia Palaszczuk, when she was Transport Minister in 2011. I met with Warren Truss when he was the Shadow Infrastructure and Transport Minister in 2013. I met with Campbell Newman in 2014."

Many 'services' are, in fact, bus services

Remarkably, he said 23 percent of "services" on the Sunshine Coast were actually "bus" ser-

"We've got 325 services. Of those, 75 are rail 'buses'," he said.

"The rail bus takes an hour and a half to go the 54 kilometres, from Nambour to Cabool-

"There are a couple of them that are express, but generally most of them drive in and out of every single station, the 11 stations between Nambour and Caboolture.

"Why would you catch the rail 'bus'? In fact for one or two of them, it's actually quicker to wait for the next train, because you get to your destination at the same time.

Two tracks all the way to Nambour 'subject to negotiations', says Minister

TRANSPORT and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey is keeping expectations low on the possibility of rail duplication (two tracks) all the way to Nambour.

The Minister would not commit to a time frame but reassurde the community, saying progress was being made.

He hoped to do a deal with the new Federal Labor Government.

"We are duplicating tracks between Beerburrum to Beerwah. And, beyond that, a stage two will be subject to negotiations between federal and state governments for an agreement which I am committed to doing with the new federal government."

Mr Bailey said the state would like to see a duplicated line all the way to Nambour.

"Clearly a single line to Nambour is not going to cut it, in terms of demand and the population that changes over time."

TMR said the Queensland and Australian Governments had committed \$6.25 million for the Beerburrum to Nambour Rail Upgrade Duplication Study.

This study will inform the overall North Coast Line planning work north of Beerburrum and provide further insights into the priorities and timing of future upgrades between Beerburrum and Nambour.

In any case, Mr Bailey said rail duplication from Beerwah to Nambour would require extensive consultation with communities in Mooloolah, Eudlo, Palmwoods and Woombye

before any work could begin.

"Whenever we do rail upgrades, we do a full heritage and character study," he said.

"So we go in, someone independent does us a full study on what are the things that are significant that we want retained, and we protect them in terms of any upgrades.

"We will work closely with communities in Woombye and Palmwoods to make sure those heritage features are protected. And in many cases, enhanced."

Royal visit honours Yandina workers rebuilding Tonga

A Tongan Princess visited seasonal workers in Yandina last week to acknowledge their work raising money to help the country rebuild after a devastating volcanic eruption and tsunami.

Workers in Australia are sending money back to Tonga to aid the rebuilding phase after the event impacted 80 percent of the nation's 170island group.

Her Royal Highness Princess Angelika Lātūfuipeka Tuku'aho visited Bunya Fresh tomato farm in Yandina as part part of her goal to visit as many Tongan seasonal workers in Australia as possible.

"After the volcanic eruption most of Tonga's economic sectors collapsed, such as tourism and fishing," said Public Officer of the Brisbane Tongan Community Suli Layt. "The key sector maintaining Tonga's economy right now is remittances sent from overseas. And the seasonal workers represent a major part of that remittances back to Tonga. So, effectively, the seasonal workers are, you could say, the backbone of Tonga's economy right now.

"And that's seasonal workers in Australia and New Zealand. So it means a lot to the workers,

but it also means a lot to Her Royal Highness, the Royal family, and the Government of the Kingdom of Tonga to make a site visit, to engage with the workers and to demonstrate the appreciation of the government for the great work that they're doing in stimulating Tonga's economy during such a difficult season in Tonga's history."

Her Royal Highness met with about 20 of her fellow citizens at Bunya Fresh. Last Friday she headed to the capital for a dinner at Brisbane City Hall organised by Tonga Relief Charity President and recently-appointed Nambour Uniting Church Reverend Maile Molitika.

"Even though Reverend Maile has relocated to Nambour, he still maintains his role as president of the Brisbane Tongan Community and the greater diaspora of the Tongan community in Southeast Queensland," said Mr Layt.

On Saturday, at the Pullman Hotel, the Princess launched her book about the role of men and women in Tongan culture.

Princess Lātūfuipeka is a member of the House of Tupou and sole daughter of Tupou VI, King of Tonga.

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Andrew McLean holds up a pic of his dream car. What would a vehicle looks like if it prioritised efficient and aerodynamics? That was the question that Aptera asked. And this is the result.

Andrew plugs in to mean, green electric machine

IT'S a two-seat, three-wheeled vehicle, classified as a 'auto cycle'. It can travel up to 1600kms in a single charge courtesy of inbuilt solar panels.

Maleny man Andrew McLean is getting one hot off the production line.

Manufacturer, Aptera, has created the world's first 'never charge' transportation solution, Andrew says. The average Australian commute is around 30 kilometres a day. If you leave the Aptera in the sun all day, solar panels will give an extra 65 kilometres of 'free from the sun' travel. "It's like a petrol fairy putting free fuel in your tank," says Andrew.

"It is, of course, electric, but it has the equivalent efficiency of 300 mile-per-gallon (0.8 litres per 100kms)".

"I'm a mechanic, and five years ago I heard that we would be driving cars that use just 10 percent of the energy of today's cars. I didn't believe them. Well, it's just about to land."

The Aptera, which means "wingless flight" in Greek, is more aerodynamic than the side mirrors of a Ford F150! The three-wheel-drive version will do 0-100 in 3.5 seconds, with the 2WD version a more tame, but still snappy, 5.5 seconds. It, of course, can be charged like a normal

Due to come into full production in California at the end of the year, with a right hand drive version to land in Australia in 2024, the base model costs US\$25,900.

"Some say it's a mix of the Jetsons, a spaceship and the Batmobile, but one thing is for sure, it will turn the commuting world upside down," said Andrew.

Local sleuths solve mystery of photo of orchard from 1907

THE beginning of this mystery came about at our weekly coffee group late last year. My friend Anne Veivers had visited an auction house in Toowoomba and seen a lovely old photo of an orange orchard in Mapleton. As a descendent of the first pioneers of Mapleton, the Smith family, I found this fascinating.

Contact was made with the auction house owner to arrange a photo be taken and emailed to me. He explained that it had been hanging in the Nambour Railway and that it was in a series of commissioned framed photos in some local railway stations in the early 1900s. To my pleasant surprise it was indeed our Smith family photo. The orchards were located near Baroon Falls (later called Mapleton Falls) on Mapleton Falls Road. In the picture are some of our family members.

What was surprising is the size of the framed photo - one square metre! I made contact with our Council Heritage Library in Nambour to find out if they were willing to purchase and save it. With the wonderful help of Karen Harper, Carol Hawley and team from the Heritage Library, we were successful.

We established that the Government Photographer at the time, was Mr Henry Mobsby who had taken the photo. Mr Mobsby had taken over as official artist and photographer for the Department of Agriculture in 1904 and continued in this role until his retirement in 1930.

The 1907 photo has Mr David Smith Senior standing on the left of the orange case, with his son Councillor T. D. Smith in the background (my Great Grandfather).

Mr O. Gorman in the foreground on the right hand corner the early pioneers of Mapleton. Similar gigantic gum trees as seen in the background once occupied this farm, which were felled by stoving, then burnt. The timber frame is made of Bean Tree and has the inscription

"Orange Orchard Mapleton".

The Queenslander Newspaper in 1911 wrote the following of Mr D Smith: "In 1894 the first spring cart was driven down the range to Nambour, and although the event seems insignificant today the occasion marked an important era in Blackall Range history, and the day when the residents assembled to cheer the sturdy pioneer as he essayed the journey fraught with so many difficulties is still memorable in Mapleton. Mr Smith on this occasion, carted 5cwt (250 kgs) of produce and took 3 days to accomplish the return journey. Considerable improvements were effected to the roads at this stage, and carts and wagons now replaced the weary pack horse."

In 1889 David Smith who owned farmland in Redland Bay, was considered one of the active pioneers of Redland Bay.

He sent his two young sons, Thomas and William, to search for agricultural land, with the knowledge that tall timber grew on good soil and that red soil was suitable for growing citrus fruit and vegetables.

David had read that some newly-surveyed land on the Range west of Petrie's Creek was available for selection. With swags and food the boys set off by train to Brisbane and onto

They boarded a Cobb & Co coach to Woombye and Currie's Knob to arrive at Tom Petrie's Hotel, which later became the town of Nambour.

With help up the Range through the tangled mass of vines and scrub by two guides (Mr Howard and John Murtagh) they reached the top to set up camp beside a swampy lagoon.
David Smith was renowned as the "Father of

Mapleton".

With his two sons and daughter (Amy) the families farmed and helped establish the foundations of the village, like the school, hall, roads, tramway, church, cemetery and the Farmers and Fruitgrowers Progress Association.





There were so many of them that their guano (excrement) killed the trees. This was an exceptionally large colony. Another small colony can be seen beside the old Bruce Highway near Fed-

Both sexes have the same buff colouring on the neck and breast during breeding season. A normal brood is three chicks but can be as many as five or six if food is plentiful. - Don McGlusky, Diddillibah



A skillful conversion of a simple, past used, large wooden electric cable reel has brought delight to the 20-plus children attending the Palmwoods Community Kindergarten.

Post-election survey results back in

After the May election I launched an online feedback survey and a local tour to hear from constituents about the issues important to them. I have read each response individually and thank the over 350 constituents who completed my Fairfax Constituent Survey.

Some key takeaways include:

• Top three national issues were climate change (23% of responses); the economy/ reducing debt (20%); and national security/ defence (18%);

• Top three local issues were infrastructure, especially rail and roads to better service a growing population (67%); cost of living, especially housing affordability/availability (20%); and the environment (11%); and

• 34% of people prioritised 'taking action' as a marker of service to the electorate.

Listening Tour on climate and energy

In my new role as Shadow Minister for Climate Change and Energy, it's my job to help refresh the Coalition's climate and energy policies ahead of the next federal election.

Continuing on from my local Fairfax constituent survey, my starting point is a listening tour. The tour started recently in the electorate of Hume with my colleague Angus Taylor where I met local residents impacted by Transgrid's HumeLink transmission network. I also met with local farmers to discuss a proposed Solar Farm Project and inspected the land on which it will be built. I will continue my tour throughout August to gain a deeper understanding of the impacts of Australia's energy and climate policy on all Australians. I will take a technology neutral approach to the tour which will include visits and briefings of existing and emerging energy sources including hydrogen, solar, wind, coal and gas. This is an important aspect of the tour which will allow for a complete understanding of the complex energy dynamics involved in powering Australia into the future.

Roadworks finished at Showgrounds

As show president, I am happy to advise the Maleny Showground Road and carpark construction has been completed which had the approval to progress by my fellow councillors. Works included a new 150 metre road formalising the access to the ground keepers accommodation and storage shed, as well as extending the access to the south east of the showgrounds and around to the rear of the equestrian arena. The upgrade means the Maleny Rangers Football Club has gained 10 new formal carparks and a PWD bay out the front of their club. There's also a hard stand area to assist with parking at training and game day – I think we can all agree it's a real win for the club and community.

Pathway and fountain upgrades

Works will begin this month on the construction of a 155-metre-long stretch of new concrete pathway along Hatten Street, Mooloolah Valley. The pathway will be 1.8-metres wide extending from the existing path at 15 Paget Street, around the corner to Hatten Street and up to Jones Street. This is a great asset for Mooloolah Valley and I am very happy that this work is to take place. The new pathway will link facilities and enable easier and safer access for all. The project is expected to commence mid-August and I would like to ask that all residents use patience while the work is being undertaken and completed.

Also, the existing drinking fountain outside of the Maleny Community Centre on Maple Street will be replaced with a fountain, water bottle filler and dog bowl.

Montville Village Association have started a petition to amend and expand the current Draft Southern Sunshine Coast Public Transport Strategy to extend it to the whole of the Sunshine Coast region and to change the key priority from a spinal, mass transit solution along the coastal corridor to a region wide, interconnected, flexible and adaptable solution that will service not only those who currently live here but those that will come in the future. 

How to avoid altercations with domestic pets

WE are still getting many calls about wildlife being hit by cars. Being breeding time for so many species, animals are on the move and of course the cars never stop! Wildlife can appear on roads in the most unexpected places.



Finngean the swamp

Suburbīa is a place where all the secretive animals come out at night and it is not unusual to get a call from someone who has seen an echidna in their yard and wonder if they should be moved. No, they are just cleaning up the termites in the area, under cover of darkness.

It often seems that the small animals are the most reclusive and their survival may depend on this. With macropods, the kangaroos like open spaces where they can use their powerful speedy legs to their best advantage. The smaller wallabies and pademelons depend on hiding for their safety. This is why they are found in the bushier areas. Their tracks are tunnels through the undergrowth.

Swamp wallabies just have to be the cutest. Of course, every native animal that comes into care is always the most beautiful ever! Swamp wallabies become such feisty individuals. So gentle, but they become so independent as they grow. By release time, it is very easy to see they are ready for the wild. If swamp wallabies and pademelons are kept in care for too long it is sad to see their natural instincts dwindle. When released at the right time, they have no urge to visit or see humans. They want to find those hideouts in the bush! Foxy and Finnegan, the two little swamp wallabies in my care at the moment, are a source of never-ending entertainment as they play in the yard. Changes on horizon for how we commute by Jeffrey Addison Sunshine Coast Commuter

A pleasant announcement came out of Queensland Parliament's 'Estimates' last week when the Government released the new SEQ railway network structure (SEQrns) for Cross River Rail (CRR).

This shows how the network will operate when CRR becomes operational in 2025, and it'll mean changes to how we commute from the Sunshine Coast, with Central station to be sidelined as a major stop-over.

RAIL Back on Track, a web-based public transport advocacy group founded by Robert Dow in 2006, had been calling for its release for over two years.

In fact, the advocacy group even went so far as to publish their own SEQrns based upon what was known from the redacted 2017 Business Case and the various 'Request for Project Change' documents.

Most impressively, the organisation got it right!

A Media Release from RBoT issued on 4 August explains the changes and why they need

I deleted some sentences/words for brevity.

Why Gold Coast line trains can no longer travel direct to Brisbane Airport with **Cross River Rail**

There are technical reasons why this had to change.

Currently, trains from the Gold Coast cross the Merivale Bridge, merge onto the CBD lines "keep right" (on the suburban tracks) through the CBD and onto the northern lines, and then peel off to the right onto the airport spur after Eagle Junc-

But with Cross River Rail, trains from the Gold Coast will now enter the tunnel, pass through the new underground stations (including Albert St and Roma Street in the CBD) pop up near Exhibition and merge in from the left to the northern lines. If you continued to run them to the Airport, they still would need to peel off to the right to enter the airport spur.

Having trains merging from the left but peeling off to the right creates a situation called a "conflicting move".

It's the equivalent of weaving across several lanes of traffic, and would cause knock on delays to all other lines and reduces the capacity of the network.

It means Gold Coast to Kippa-Ring/Caboolture/Sunshine Coast trains stay on one side, and Ipswich to Airport trains stay on the other side. Because there are no conflicting moves you can run the maximum number of trains reliably.

More trains mean a shorter wait to interchange.

Whilst some Gold Coast passengers might not like changing trains with luggage, it's a fact of life that passengers on every other line (Ferny Grove, Caboolture, Ipswich, Cleveland etc.) have coped with this for years.

In the long term, this new line pairing could support a Coast 2 Coast service from Coolangatta to Maroochydore, and RAIL Back On Track supports continued upgrades to provide a fast rail service along the full length of this corridor.

Sunshine Coast, Caboolture and Redcliffe commuters will pass through the Exhibition station and utilise the new tunnels if crossing the river, but they'll need to change trains for
