Stalwarts to gather for reunion to honour **Yandina Speedway**

Kirby's cattle paddock and began what was to become known as the Yandina Speedway. Ray was the first president of the amateur Nambour Saloon Car Club which commenced the racing

Sunday August 16 this year is exactly 50 years to the day since the first race on the track, which later became a professional international standard venue, literally carved from the bush. "We used a chainsaw and cut the trees down at ground level and we just raced over them," said Ray. "The trees were the outside fence. It was a real bush track at first ... and because of all the stumps and the trees cut out of the bush you could sort of veer right off track, and come

"I started racing in open wheelers in 1954 at Lowood race track," said Ray. "Then I went TQs (Compact Speedcars) and I've raced everything since. I even had a go at a pillion on a motorbike sidecar once. I got dumped on the track but

the fumes from the cars ahead. You look at the bloke in front and you say I'm going to get past him because I can't stand the stink of his fuel!" Current Sunshine Coast Speedway president Jim Cowley said, "The club owed its existence to

people like Ray." Jim started racing at Yandina over 40 years ago at 16 and continues to race today. "Yandina was our local track but now it's

IN 1970 Ray Austin carved a track out of Kev a housing estate," he said. "So we've thrown our weight behind Mothar Mountain Speedway in Gympie. At the moment we have 40 to 50 active members who get together for the friendliness, companionship and the thrill of racing. That's what it's all about. Whether we win or not it doesn't matter that much as long as you have a good race with someone. And we do race anywhere around the country from Cairns right down to Victoria and even Western Australia."

Ray's daughter Debbie Collier has organised a reunion and a commemorative lap of the old track site, for this Sunday August 16.

"Dad had the vision and desire for a track close to home," said Debbie. "Back in those days the starter stood on a 44 gallon drum to wave the Starter's flag.

"The first Saloon car race meeting was held Sunday 16th August 1970. Nambour Saloon Car Club formed 15th May 1970, commenced the racing at Yandina. Des & Dulcie Atkinson purchased the ground and Sunshine Coast Speedway Club was formed."

Debbie has produced a video honouring the race track's proud history. It will be on view at Yandina Historic House after the anniversary.

ever the club's commitment to their community and service has not wavered. 40 years ago, Alan Heading, who has since passed away had the idea to start a business directory as a way of supporting and promoting local business and providing a new fundraising avenue for Apex to continue its work in the

community. Alan was a Life Member of Maleny Apex, who grew up on a farm in North Maleny and went on to own a successful earthmoving business after the closure of the butter factory in Coral Street that had once supported numerous Hinterland families

Alan's wife Bev Heading reflected on the time when the very first Apex Business Directory was put together: "The first edition was printed pages spread around our pool table and other tables of Apex members' homes. We would go around picking up a page at a time and stapling the book together. There may have been the odd page or two left over at the end of the night!' While Alan developed the initial concept, it was the entire club and all its members and their families who worked tirelessly to produce the directory and liaise with local business and community and I know this ethos continues with the club today," Bev said.





Coast's best ribs & brisket

EVERY so often you have the good fortune to stumble across what appears to be a 'hidden' he said. "For example, we only use baby back gem, only to find out that it is in fact a well known, highly sought after "go to" for locals. This sums up Smoken Dog BBQ in Yandina.

Smoken Dog is truly a family affair, run by Dave and Dineo Levell and their young daughter Talitha. "Talitha mans the phones and takes the orders for us," said Dineo. "She is such a great help." And since starting

their enterprise three years ago, Dave and Dineo need all hands on deck as their reputation has quickly spread far and wide for having the best ribs and brisket on the Sunshine Coast, with people traveling from Caloundra and Noosa for their sensational authentic smoked ribs.

"We started out selling our food at festivals and events, and eventually started our own restaurants which have always been simple, "pop up" style venues," Dineo said. "We have always moved around a bit and I think people have tracked us down by reputation," Dave added. Their food has been so well received that the couple are now planning to open a second restaurant at Kings Beach, Caloundra in the coming months.

Trained in a catering school in Cheshire, UK, Dave always had a passion for cooking. "I have built our own ovens and carefully source the wood we use," said Dave. "There are all kinds of elements that come together to produce the

flavours and texture of excellent smoked meat ribs, which are more succulent, flavoursome and tender, and we always slice our brisket, rather than pulling it, because pulling dries it out. Slicing retains the juices and the flavour. And the meat is smoked for 14 hours, so the flavour is incredible."

"All of our sauces are homemade, to our own recipes," Dineo said. "A lot of commercial Bourbon based sauces, or BBQ sauces are really sweet and they overwhelm the flavours of the meat. So we have made our own sauces, and people really seem to enjoy them."

The evidence of this enjoyment is that over a typical weekend, Dave and Dineo sell over 300kgs of ribs alone. "As soon as we open, people start to line up and collect their orders," Dave said. "Often, our last customers of the night are local chefs who have finished their shifts and come here to eat," he said. "We take that as a real compliment."

Alongside the ribs and burgers, you will also find wings, onion rings, loaded fries, roasted sweet potato and cheesy corn on the cob.

Whether you take a seat and enjoy your food under the stars, or take it home to eat, one thing is an absolute certainty, and that is that you won't leave feeling hungry.

WHAT welcome rain, but it made for more calls for our Hotline 5441 6200 volunteers. One tiny little brushtail possum was found under a dripping tap one afternoon.

Poor little darling was frozen and had to be taken down to the Australia Zoo Wildlife Hospital immediately

we want. With some animals we feel like they come in, get cosy and warm, and then they think, "we can die in comfort now"!

Another ringtail possum was found curled up in the shelter of a patio. Trixie was a miserable little girl, with fur loss over her face and body. Fortunately there was no infection, just the effects of exposure away from the warmth of her family. Now snuggled up with her new 'family' she is improving fast.

Constant rain also means the loss of nectar from our native flowers so the nectivorous birds probably see a run of rainy days as a 'drought' for them! After the rain it is always lovely to see all the lovely new growth leaf tip for possums, and the plants providing plenty of fresh flowers and native fruits for our birds. My kangaroos are busy grazing on the juicy grass!

It's a great time to plant native plants. Trees, shrubs, groundcover and grasses will all draw in a beautiful array of wildlife, especially come springtime. It is a joy to watch the birds feeding away in the garden.



The 2019 round of grants bought new bibs, balls and hoops for netballers at Mapleton State School and we helped Nambour Community Centre lease a new car to carry out home visits. take vulnerable people to appointments and deliver food parcels.

A small grant allowed some Compass trainees to have fun on a school holiday program and bought new kits for the Nambour Wildcats soccer team.

The Ken Mills Toyota grant bought school shoes and uniforms for children in need, via St Vincent de Paul and thanks to Sundale Limited we gave almost \$10,000 to Nambour Meals on Wheels to buy new fridges and improve food safety.

There was even some money for Spiral Inc to fund new art projects for locals with a disability.

"Money for charities like these has never been more important and we are so proud of the work we do," the spokesperson said. There are hundreds of worthy projects in Nambour,



Recycle program turns waste to mulch

ORGANIC food waste from local businesses is being turned into compost in a project aimed at reducing landfill. Ten local businesses have agreed to keep their organic waste for collection y Yandina Community Gardens.

Federal Member for Fairfax Ted O'Brien said funding amounting to \$34,000 would help the Yandina Community Gardens initiative.

"I particularly love that there will be three different composting options on display for the public to learn about reducing and composting organic waste in their own homes."

Food Waste Program Project Officer Emily Boyd said the pilot program would run for 12 months. The program uses three compost systems to process waste: the worm farm, hot-aerobic compost system and now the black soldier fly larvae system. "Our aim is to divert as much food waste from landfill as possible so we're picking up all the food waste that is generated from local businesses such as cafés, restaurants and fruit shops and composting it back at our site," Ms Boyd said. Businesses need to separate their regular plastic and other landfill waste from the compostable organic waste, then Yandina Community Gardens will do the rest.

He's given over a million books to school children and over forty million dollars to support education. He has also endowed over five thou sand college scholarships for teachers.

In addition to this he has written hundreds of novels in many different genres-Murder mystery, romance, science fiction.

Many of Patterson's books feature Alex Cross. Alex Cross is a crime, mystery, thriller series. The series focuses on the Metropolitan Police Department detective and father, Alex Cross as he faces threats to his family and the city of Washington D.C. Several of these novels have been adapted to movies.

Both Morgan Freeman and Tyler Perry have portrayed Alex Cross in these movie adaptations. Another popular series (and my favourite) is the Women's Murder Club series. It features Lindsay Boxer - a detective in the San Francisco Police Department.

She is strong, brave and uncompromising. 

A fortnight ago I had the privilege of hosting Prime Minister Scott Morrison on a tour of The Ginger Factory at Yandina. I was able to personally pass on residents' feedback about the Federal Government's support measures which were shared with me on my recent road trip to Nambour, Woombye and Yandina. We also heard directly from staff at The Ginger Factory. 81 of whom have been receiving JobKeeper. In fact, The Ginger Factory's CEO Andrew Bond openly thanked the PM for the JobKeeper initiative and described it as the shot in the arm their business needed.

JobKeeper changes

Last week, changes were announced to the JobKeeper wage subsidy program to give greater access to more businesses and workers. This will be particularly welcomed by local aviation, hospitality, tourism, accommodation and retail sectors which will again feel the brunt of Queensland border closures.

From 28 September, local businesses will only have to demonstrate that their GST turnovers have declined by 30 percent (not-for-profits by 15 percent) in the previous quarter – not multiple quarters as was originally the case.

More employees can also receive JobKeeper support. Eligible workers who were employed as at 1 July 2020 can now access JobKeeper. This

There is no change to the tapered rates or two-tiered system which comes into effect from 28 September.

At that time the JobKeeper payment reduces will apply for employees who worked less than pre-COVID).

Pony Club riders back in the saddle


MOOLOOLAH Pony Club riders are ecstatic that they can finally go out compete, hold club muster and clinic days.

They have seen a jump from 69 in 2018 to 96 members in 2020. The club welcomes riders of all ages and


abilities. "It warms my heart to see the smiles on the kids' faces as they head out on their ponies with their friends," said Club President Jus-




