Step back in time this Christmas

WE could all do with a little Christmas cheer this year and what better way to lift our spirits than stepping back in time at the iconic Montville Clock

The half-timber and stone shop is an enchanted world of hand-carved clocks, music boxes, weather stations, beer steins and snow globes.

"I think the shop offers an otherworldly experience for visitors," said owner Holly Hoffman. "The combination of the wood, the warmth and the European styling is nostalgic, comforting and an experience of Europe that many people would not otherwise enjoy. We really want our guests to feel welcome and as though they have walked into a family home, as much as anything else. That's what it represents to us. It is a fabulous place to bring the kids and browse. The walls are lined with unique hand carved clocks, but it's very easy to lose track of time in here!"

Holly and husband Daniel assumed ownership of the shop in March this year, taking over from Dan's parents and the shop's founders, Phil and

Hinterland weathers the storm

WEEKEND storms across the hinterland brought welcome relief from heat and dry but Council has warned future deluges could lead to more serious flooding.

Council's Disaster Management coordinator Cathy Buck said more rain was expected over the coming days.

"Because it has been so dry and our systems aren't full at the moment the rain has been able to soak in which is great, and that is why we haven't been getting a lot of flooding," Ms Buck said. "But certainly if we do get more events like this in a short space of time we are going to get that localised flooding.'

Maleny received more than 200mm of rain over the weekend and wind gusts on the Coast reached 90km/h but the worst of the weather was yesterday heading south. Council crews had been busy over the past few days clearing roadways and debris from public areas, and making sure storm drains were clear. There were landslips at Montville and Obi Obi Road in Kenilworth. McCarthy Road Maleny was blocked by flash flooding. Trees were down across the hinterland and various outages were reported with Energex crews restoring power to thousands of homes, including at

Yandina's Wappa Dam was over-capacity at 108.7 percent on Monday with water gushing over the spillway. Queensland Police Service Senior Sergeant Gary Brayley warned drivers to take care in wet conditions.

"I would really like to reiterate, please don't drive unless you have to and don't drive into flooded roads," Snr Sgt Brayley said.

"There is a lot of water out there, and there'll be a lot more before this rain event finishes plus a lot more people coming to our Sunshine Coast for the holidays, so we all need to take extra care."

The Bureau of Meteorology said there was a High (70%) chance of showers tomorrow, Thursday, most likely in the morning and afternoon and the chance of a thunderstorm about the hinterland. Winds would be north to northeasterly 20 to 30 km/h.

Fran Hoffman, who are naturally delighted that the business is staying in the family.

"It was such a weird scenario, taking over just as COVID hit," said Dan. "The business settled and immediately we had a meeting with staff to announce the takeover, reassuring them that nothing would change. The following week, restrictions were introduced. By Monday, we had to tell our staff not to come into work. It was highly stressful. For about six weeks we were completely shut down. Our staff had to be our primary concern."

Despite it being the worst possible time to become business owners, Holly and Dan are excited about the opportunities the Clock Shop presents. "Prior to taking on the business, we had plans to expand online, and lockdown panned out to be a great opportunity to build on the website and social media," said Holly.

"People are genuinely delighted by what they find here," said Dan. "They tell us that they haven't seen objects such as these since they were children, often when visiting their grandparent's house."

How this Palmwoods cafe got its name

A new gelato and brunch bar has opened in Palmwoods replacing the Cocoa Tree Cafe. Owners, Ann and Geoff Vollmer took over at the beginning of November and opened the doors two weeks ago.

And the name, One Weird Dog? "We actually have two weird dogs, but one is definitely weirder than the other," Ann said. "Teddy is a miniature Schnauzer who completely lacks personal boundaries. We hadn't decided on the name, and we were relaxing on the verandah with the dogs when he did something that was stranger than usual. I said to him 'buddy, you are one weird dog!' and Geoff said "that's it, that's the name". And so it stuck.

"Just in time for ice cream weather!" Ann said. A chef by trade, Ann wanted to open her own cafe so that she could cater for "weird

"I found that every time I went out to eat, I wanted to order something just slightly different to what was on the menu. I figured I was not the only person so inclined and this business has given me the opportunity to develop a beautiful 'mix and match' style of menu that allows for different tastes and dietary requirements," she said. "I am very much into healthy cooking and

eating and I am finding that 60 - 70% of our customers have specific eating requirements. It is wonderful to be able to cater for them."

One Weird Dog has a full menu that spans from breakfast to lunch, coffee, cake and gelato, and includes everything from fritters and waffles to burgers, bowls and tacos, with almost unlimited 'design your own' combinations. There is also a cabinet with an ever changing array of sweet and savoury goodies.

"Our full menu and brunch are available from 7.30am to 2pm and the cabinet food, coffee and gelato are available until our closing time at 4pm," Ann said.

There are 16 flavours of Maleny Food Co gelato and sorbets including Ginger and Macadamia, Irish Creme, Passionfruit Cheesecake and Salted Caramel alongside the more traditional flavours. There is also superb Koko Twist soft serve ice cream for those who are vegan or dairy free.

Open daily from 7.30am to 4pm, One Weird Dog is the perfect spot for the indecisive, fussy, or just plain 'unique' eater who enjoys real, fresh, tasty food, prepared with passion and served up with a great sense of humour.





WCBA looks forward to enterprising 2021

THE Woombye Business and Community Association (WCBA) held its AGM and Christmas Party at the Woombye Pub last Tuesday.

Re-elected President Debbie Kimber said she looked forward to working with the new committee which had been strengthened with the arrival of new people filling positions which had been vacant, including the treasurer and secretary. A new 'events and membership' role has also been established. The new blood would allow existing members to focus on working within their core areas of expertise, said.

"I can concentrate on grant applications and we will be able to focus on continuing to increase our membership," she said. "A larger membership demonstrates how engaged the community and business owners are, this helps

the WCBA in our funding applications."

Ms Kimber said WCBA had a productive year despite disruptions caused by COVID.

Membership has increased to 84 members through improved activity and increased profile. Many people are now using the website to join online and connecting through social media, thanks to the work of Vice President Grant Palethorpe and Daniella Possee (social media).

WCBA this year made a submission to Sunshine Coast Council's Blackall Street Placemaking consultative process urging any future plans maintain the rural feel and identity of Woombye. Speed, parking and shade were common issues that have been raised.

Hospital Auxiliary's 'infectious' generosity will be missed

NAMBOUR General Hospital hosted a 'thank you' event, to celebrate the hard work of the local Hospital Auxiliary, which ceased operations this year after more than three decades of

Made up of mostly volunteers, the auxiliary began in 1986, operating the hospital kiosk and gift shop. All proceeds from the non-profit organisation went to purchase vital equipment and improve patient care.

The auxiliary has donated over \$2 million in equipment to various hospital departments, made possible by the dedication of volunteers.

Some of the notable donations include \$136,000 worth of renal dialysis machines, at least four ultrasound units worth more than \$65,000 each and \$100,000 worth of orthopaedic equipment.

An emotional Auxiliary president Jean Whitney says it had been a rewarding experience volunteering and helping others for a

"The funds we have generated in the kiosk through volunteering has helped provide equipment for the hospital. This in turn allows the community to access better facilities and care,' Ms Whitney said.

"Many of the volunteers have been patients at the hospital at one time or another, so it's nice to be able to give back to the healthcare workers who look after us."

Along with kiosk, Auxiliary volunteers also ran the hospital's gift shop, where cards, magazines, soft toys and even hand knitted items could be purchased for patients.

They also provided catering for Nambour General Hospital events.

Nambour General Hospital Director of Nursing and Facility Manager Graham Wilkinson said the hard working and friendly faces of Auxiliary staff and volunteers would be greatly missed.

"The work of the Auxiliary over many years, and the impact they have had on purchasing necessary equipment for the hospital, as well

as the special connection they built with staff and patients has made a real difference to the hospital. We are greatly appreciative to Jean and her team," Mr Wilkinson said.

Dr Jo Deverill paid tribute to the Auxiliary's baking skills, pointing out one coconut slice contained enough calories to get him through a 10-hour shift.

The Auxiliary ceased operations earlier this year, in part due to challenges posed by COVID-19 restrictions.

"While we have ceased operations, the Auxiliary still has some giving left to do. We still have some funds in the bank and will use this to donate to Nambour General Hospital in the near future, as a final gift," Ms Whitney said.

Sunshine Coast Hospital and Health Service's Foundation Wishlist has taken on the operations of the hospital Kiosk and Gift Shop.



Junior Chamber forms with plans to give voice to Nambour youth

HIGH school students around Nambour will play a crucial role in the town's future if the founder of a newly formed Youth Chamber of Commerce has his way.

Burnside High School Captain Jack Watson is heading up the Nambour Youth Chamber of Commerce to give voice and purpose to young people and to help guide the town's future.

Jack said once the group was up and running, big picture priorities might include working on events and strategies at a local level to improve employment opportunities and encourage "entrepreneurship, activity and engagement" in the community.

Local activities and events would encourage involvement and help instil a sense of pride and purpose in the town's youth.

"I tell people that if we want to re-imagine Nambour then you will have to engage young people," Jack said, referring to the Reimagine Nambour initiative. "An increased sense of purpose will lead to decreased issues — like unemployment and drug and alcohol abuse — and help Nambour and its young people to grow and prosper."

The Nambour Youth Chamber of Commerce would involve high school students from state and private schools. It will connect and collaborate with professional business & industry leaders in the area.

The Youth Chamber presented an opportunity to gain valuable experience, make industry connections and gain access to employers and local, state and federal representatives.

"We will hear from inspiring guest speakers and community-minded people who have a focus on seeing the youth of our schools be successful and achieve their goals," he said.

Outgoing Nambour Chamber of Commerce president Tim Smith said his organisation had been striving to include youth in developing future strategies for many years and was fully supportive of the junior Chamber.

"At 16, Jack is an incredible young man," Mr

"He is currently a student at Burnside State High school while also studying Economics at the University of Sunshine Coast. Jack also holds the titles of (former) Youth MP for Nicklin and is a member of the Sunshine Coast Youth Advisory Group." Jack's immediate plans also include studying economics at USC next year under the Headstart Program.

Mr Smith agreed the Junior Chamber had the potential to grow into a powerful voice within the community.

Jack said he was looking for leaders to fill roles on the board with responsibilities such as: Vice Chairperson; Secretary; School Liaison; Public Relations; and Marketing.

It is envisaged the Youth Chamber will hold fortnightly committee meetings, probably at Nambour PCYC.

"The questions proved the value of this forum and brought up issues that were obviously of concern to members of the audience. We were pleased that the panel of experts we assembled were able to answer them or offered private counselling and advice later", she said.

The panel included Julian Porter, Managing Solicitor Suncoast Community, Tove Easton, Easton Lawyers Maleny, Ben O'Rourke and Lola Mashado (Relationships Australia Queensland), and Stacy Oehlman (Centacare Domestic and Family Violence Services, Sunshine Coast, formerly SCOPE).

Attendance was open to all members of the community and included representatives sent by many community groups.

Participants agreed the program was a thought provoking way to learn about individual rights and responsibilities and especially in terms of Powers of Attorney. A survey completed by most of the attendees indicated the value of the forum as 'most useful', 'good to learn there are services available', 'great panel'.

The Speak Up Now committee includes representatives of Rotary, Lions and Zonta clubs.

It is committed to taking these concerns into future events. There are more ideas for forums in the new year.

Hairdressers are seen as an important resource as they often hear about instances of abuse, so an information session will be held for them.

In addition there is the possibility of a community fun event to let people know the group is working hard to eradicate domestic and family violence on the Blackall Range.











Want to buy local? Palmwoods designer provides handy guide

A WEB designer has created an online directory of Sunshine Coast makers after finding that buying local is sometimes easier said than done.

Miranda Hailes, of Palmwoods, launched www.sunnycoastmade.com.au this month to connect local makers and potential customers.

The website, which comes just in time for Christmas shopping, has started with some 90 makers grouped into 12 main categories and 56 sub-categories.

They include artists, coffee roasters, jewellery makers, clothing designers, and gourmet food producers.

A big believer in buying local, Miranda came up with the idea for the website during the height of covid-19 restrictions in Queensland when buying local at markets was not an option.

"My husband and I looked at what products we were purchasing and looked at opportunities where we might be able to buy something locally," Miranda said.

"I realised that there might have been a lot of products to buy locally but it wasn't always easy to find them, and that's when I had the idea for the directory – one place that focused on products made and designed on the Sunshine Coast, and on Sunshine Coast brands as well," she said.

"I just wanted to bring it altogether in one place that was easy for locals to find what they wanted and that would raise awareness of what's made on the Sunshine Coast."

With a background in website design and online marketing, Miranda had the skills and experience to put it together.

Supported by her husband, Ron, Miranda spent months working on the website and researching Sunshine Coast makers, designers, producers and brands.

What she found was that there were twice as

many people making original products on the Sunshine Coast than she thought.

"There are so many talented people making so many wonderful products. We discovered in excess of 800 makers on the Sunshine Coast," she said.

"I'm constantly blown away. There are so many unique and incredible things made here."

Some of the Sunny Coast Made finds will surprise even long-term locals. They include Sunshine Coast-made pasta, eskies and carbon-fibre fins for die-hard divers.

Shoppers can search by category and sub-category or window shop through a varied offering.
The website also divides the greater Sunshine

Coast, including Noosa, into 15 areas so that shoppers can find products closest to them. Shoppers will be able to read the stories

Shoppers will be able to read the stories behind the brands in meet-the-maker articles and photos of makers and producers will allow shoppers to put faces or names to the brands and products.

Miranda hopes more makers will take the opportunity to get on board the website as time goes on, and that both consumers and local businesses support local makers and producers.

She said buying local boosted the local economy by keeping dollars circulating within the community.

It was also an environmentally friendly way to shop because it reduced the need to transport goods long distances, she said

Miranda said another benefit of buying local was that it strengthened community connections. She and Ron chose to bring up their children, aged 5 and 3, at Palmwoods because of its community feel.

However, she feels even closer to the community since discovering and meeting local makers in person and online.

"Along the way, as we were researching the business, it made me fall even more in love with




Russell Morris returns

Enduring Powers of Attorney

Mr Usher advised people to note that the law

regarding Enduring Powers of Attorney and Advance Health Directives had changed. New forms were introduced December 1 and the old forms can not be used. "If an old form is produced to a JP to witness, the witness must reject such form and request the use the new form. A JP cannot provide legal advice on any document produced to him or her," Mr Usher said. Forms completed before December 1 are still valid.

People wishing to obtain a new EPA or AHD should seek legal advice before approaching a witness. The witness now has a legal requirement regarding capacity of any person giving a EPA or AHD. Any person contemplating seeing a JP should allow at least 30 minutes for this to







Wildlife enquiries running hot — 800 calls in a month

AS our native wildlife struggles to survive the shortage of housing and food, feral animals also have an impact on them.

It is not only cats and dogs, but other species such as Indian Myna birds that reduce the populations of native species.

Anyone observing Indian Myna birds in their area are asked to contact the Customer Service of the local council.

Trapping can be done to avoid the takeover of habitat by this very invasive species.

It must be remembered that the feral species, the Indian Myna sometimes called Common Myna, is chocolate brown in colour, whereas our native species, the Noisy Miner, is grey in colour.

The easiest way to remember this is - Grey Good, Brown Bad!

Our noisy miners can be annoying but they don't do the damage that the Indian Myna does.

A fellow-WILVO and Coolum resident sent me a photo of chicks and an egg from one of her

The Indian Mynas evict pale-headed rosellas and rainbow and scaley-breasted lorikeets from the eucalypt hollow every year.

She said it is very distressing to see on an annual basis.

Removing the Indian Myna eggs also makes her feel bad, but we do have to prioritize with our native animals.

Sometimes it seems that everything is on a



damage and destroy mission of our unique Australian fauna.

With Christmas time approaching, nest boxes for birds and marsupials are a great gift.

Suburban yards house a variety of wildlife, often not seen, and they are always seeking



Great staff are worth finding

Business Ideas

RUSHING to employ someone to fill a job vacancy is usually a recipe for disaster. The wrong person can harm your business. Customers will not be as satisfied, you will be constantly worried about performance, and likely as not there will be a high turnover.

Great staff on the other hand can really improve your business. They may even provide a future path for business exit for those considering retirement.

We hear a lot about the difficulty in hiring good shop attendants, waiters and waitresses, bar staff, landscape assistants, builders labourers, to name a few. It can be much easier than you think, but it takes work - here are 7

Create a compelling offer. When advertising for staff it's similar to advertising to customers. You must sell the job to the candidates - if they have a selection of jobs and yours does not match their hopes and desires, or you don't have something compelling - then they will obviously select another employee. You are competing with all those employees. Create a compelling job offer that is not just about money and hours.

Identify the profile of your ideal staff member. Think the ideal staff member, their age, the way they act and behave, their interests, and motivations. Identify what media they are likely to use and hence where you should place advertisements.

Don't fish in the same pool as everyone else. The majority of job seekers are in the "seeking" pool because they lost a job - maybe because they were not suitable, or not qualified, or the wrong attitude. They are also people who have not been "snapped up" by astute employees who pick the talent long before it gets to be listed on Seek.com. Put your Ads into the media to catch the talent and attract - rather than sort through

Change the team structure to create the right job. If you are a business owner who likes doing the finance, order supplies, check invoices, attend to payroll and tax returns, not to mention BAS statements - then stick to those and recruit staff for the customer facing work. If on the other hand you don't like all those finance and logistics aspects - create the job finance and logistics job and stick to your forte in customer relationships. You may find someone who likes the accounting may do it more efficiently and come up with some great new ideas.

Seek referrals from previous great staff. For whatever reason people may well move on. Great staff who have "fitted in" will always let you know well in advance, and it is quite possible they have been thinking about who could replace them. Ask them openly for referrals, and to spread the word in their social network of like minded people. Make sure you give them the highlights - that Compelling Offer - to send

Develop and surprise your staff. Find ways to give your staff more and more responsibility - at a pace they are happy to take. Reward them for this - so they can see, and obtain growth. Help to train and develop their skills. Do this within a business mandate - that you want to be the best in the business, and therefore the staff are the best in the business.

Select Wisely. Attitude over everything else. Your attitude to the candidate is as telling as their attitude to you and the job. You can't measure attitude by reading a CV. Those with a great attitude that have an interest or skill in your business, may well find you. Always be on the lookout, and allow people to "come in off the street" and ask for jobs. Keep their details, and keep them in the loop with your business news by getting their email address to add to your CRM. As the business grows and/or staff have to leave - you have a ready made source of candidates without having to advertise!

Remember the better the staff the better will be your business -look after them and the right ones will look after you.






