POLICE were out in force in Nambour last week following complaints about anti-social behaviour and public nuisance offences.

For the second time this month police patrolled the CBD, Quota Park and the train station in a move that has encouraged local businesses.

Nambour Acting Senior Sergeant Peter McNamara said officers had received complaints about disorderly, abusive and offensive behaviour, as well as fights, stealing and other general bad behaviour in shared spaces.

Patrols focussed on known Nambour hotspots, the CBD, train station and Quota Park.

Sergeant McNamara said police would maintain increased presence over the school holidays.

Maroochydore and Nambour policing units and the Brisbane Railway Squad conducted the opera-

It was a repeat of a similar response earlier this month which resulted in

10 arrests and 21 charges being laid. New member for Nicklin Rob Skelton said he "absolutely" supported police action to curb and control anti-social behaviour and crime. He welcomed an increased high profile police presence in Nambour CBD and congratulated officers for


remaining mindful of homelessness. "Our CBD must not only be safe and welcoming, but appear to be as

well. Nambour has seen an increased exposure to homelessness and poverty due to Covid-19, and so I urge police to be mindful that homelessness does not necessarily equate to criminal intent."

Business owners were grateful for the action. Marisa Page From Nambour News and Casket, who was held at knife-point in an armed robbery earlier this year, said everyone understood that vulnerable people needed support.

"(But) we have witnessed some very anti-social, nuisance behaviour over the past two years and it is a very welcome sight to see police presence in the CBD. Nambour is a great town with lots of potential and we would like to see everyone — local or visitor - to be safe and enjoy what our town has to offer. Thanks to police for all the assistance we have received over the past two years."



Hall honours Palmwoods gunner credited with shooting down legendary Red Baron

THE Aussie gunner credited with shooting down flying ace the Red Baron more than 100 years ago is to be honoured by Palmwoods, the town where he signed up to serve his country.

The identity of who killed Germany's most celebrated World War I pilot has long been the subject of controversy. But most experts now weigh the odds heavily in favour of anti-aircraft machine gunner Cedric Basset Popkin.

What's not in doubt is that Popkin hailed from Palmwoods at the time of his enlistment. He is named on the Roll of Honour at Palmwoods Memorial Hall

Now, 102 years after he fired at the Red Baron's triplane, landscaping work will pay tribute to the former local carpenter.

Eye-witness reports and forensic evidence at the time suggest Popkin (1891-1968) was the person most likely to have killed Manfred von Richthofen on 21 April 1918.

Popkin enlisted in the AIF on 6 May 1916. By 1918 he had achieved the rank of Sergeant and was a gunner in the 24th Machine Gun Company, part of the Australian 4th Division, which was stationed in the Somme Valley, France.

In 1964, Popkin told the Brisbane Courier-Mail: "I am fairly certain it was my fire which caused the Baron to crash. But it would be impossible to say definitely that I was responsible ... As to pinpointing without doubt the man who fired the fatal shot, the controversy will never actually be resolved.'

"When he enlisted he was living here in Palmwoods as a carpenter," said Palmwoods Memorial Hall Vice President Wendy Southam. 'His name is recorded on the Roll of Honour. There was a lot of controversy around who actually shot down the Red Baron. A lot of people thought it was a Canadian pilot but, according to autopsies and ballistics reports, the bullet was moving in an upward direction and that could only have come from the ground.

"The whole purpose of the landscaping project is based around honouring Cedric Popkin, to give him the recognition he deserves.'

Mr Popkin was born in Sydney in 1890. And, while he did spend a number of years in and around Palmwoods when war broke out, his chosen home was Tyalgum in the Tweed Valley where he is also honoured. The veteran lost his leg in the war but, remarkably, still managed life afterwards as a carpenter, postmaster and tobacconist. He is buried in Brisbane.

Popkin almost certainly was the one

Calibre 0.303 was the standard ammunition for all machine guns and rifles used by British Empire forces during World War I. However, it

is now considered all but certain by historians, doctors, and ballistics experts that von Richthofen was killed by an AA machine gunner firing from the ground.

Autopsies revealed that the wound which killed the Baron was caused by a bullet moving in an upward motion. It was reported that a spent .303 bullet was found inside Richthofen's

These facts, and the angle at which the bullet passed through Richthofen's body, suggest that he was killed by a long distance, low velocity shot from a ground-based weapon.

Many Australian riflemen were also shooting at the Baron at the time. So one of them may have fired the fatal shot. However, Popkin was an experienced AA gunner, the volume of fire from his Vickers was far greater (at least 450 rounds per minute) than the bolt-action Lee-Enfield rifles (up to 30 rounds per minute) used by the infantry. And Popkin was the only machine gunner known to have fired at Richthofen from the right, and from a long distance, immediately before he landed. Despite this the RAF ultimately gave official credit to a pilot.

Hero to the German people

Manfred Albrecht Freiherr von Richthofen was a Prussian aristocrat. He was an accomplished marksman and quickly earned a reputation as an ace fighter pilot.

He started painting his planes red so that he could be recognised in battle and so he would get credited with any kills that he got.

As his reputation as the most daring of the German pilots grew Richthofen became known as the Red Baron and went on to lead the Jagdgeschwader 1, often called The Flying Circus or Richthofen's Circus

He claimed to have won 80 air battles and was a hero to the German people.

The day the Red Baron was shot down

On the morning of April 21, 1918, the Western Front was quiet for the troops at Morlancourt Ridge near the Somme River. The stillness was broken as the Red Baron engaged a Sopwith Camel. A Canadian pilot in another Sopwith Camel joined the air chase and fired on the Red Baron from behind.

It is said von Richthofen broke his own rules by flying low across enemy lines in pursuit of

Experienced gunner Popkin calculated the Red Baron's return path would bring him just above the ridge line. He fired 70-80 rounds, causing the Red Baron to crash land in a field. The fatal bullet entered through the right side of his ribs. He was still alive when the soldiers arrived at the wreckage and reportedly said

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"alles kaput" ... which means "I am finished" before dying.

Fitting recognition

Palmwoods Hall President John Meredith said it was only fitting to recognise Palmwoods' connection to such a significant event in his-

"We also need to start planning for the Hall's 100 year anniversary in 2022," he said. "We'll do something special. It would be nice to find out about the old time dances that used to take place here. Maybe that would be an idea for inspiration."

Work is being carried out by George Davidson Landscaping on a grant from Council.

A wrought iron poppy will be a central feature of the landscaping. Excavation work will increase available space to the side of the hall and help attract more events and functions. Work will link with and be sympathetic to the existing Council landscaping work along Little Main Street. The Hall was opened on 12 May 1922.

immediate past president Timothy Smith said the police operations were encouraging. "I extend my support to all of those involved. Reducing the instance of anti-social behaviour, which has been a concern for the community for some time now, is another positive in the revitalization of the town.

"I am sure that the work that is now being completed by all of the government and NFP organizations is wholeheartedly supported by the Nambour Chamber of Commerce.

Businessman Andrew Pitcher maintains Nambour is on the brink of an economic bounce-back. He said the community was delighted to see the increased police presence because law and order was imperative to prosperity. "Everyone has a right to feel safe in their home town," he said. "Operations like this increase confidence for businesses, their staff and customers, and if it's good for business it's

Police facing wave of issues

AMID calls for more patrols police are caught in a delicate balancing act as they battle dramatic increases in mental health, youth justice and domestic violence work statewide.

A Police spokesperson said officers were aware of community concerns in relation to anti-social behaviour in Nambour and had taken a multi-agency approach to address these issues in a "proactive yet empathetic way". Hence Friday's initiative.

"Police have engaged with local community groups, business stakeholders and government agencies to identify vulnerable persons in the Nambour CBD and connect them with services that can assist them," a spokesperson said on

"The focus of today's (Friday's) operation was to provide a high visibility presence to deter public nuisance behaviour. The goal of the QPS is to maintain public safety while ensuring some of our most vulnerable community members receive the support they need."

A business owner who has witnessed shocking behaviour in Nambour CBD, including prostitution, gruesome assaults and serious drug crime, said she appreciated the police presence on Friday but remained somewhat sceptical.

"I suspect it is in response to the last few days where some drongos were back in the square and business people complained," she said on

"I do appreciate the police presence but it does need to continue on a regular basis and, with the exception of today, I have not noticed an increase in police patrols at all.

"I do understand that police are stretched and that it is great to give them some positives as they are always getting complaints — and I think that the police statement (above) is a fantastic sentiment and is a great goal for the police to aim for. However, I don't think that the police patrols are regular enough to ensure that the previous problems do not return. So I can't say that I am satisfied with their response in this area yet.

"But hopefully they'll continue to provide a high visibility presence to deter public nuisance behaviour on a regular basis.'

NAMBOUR Hospital has warned hinterlanders to remember the importance of proper hydration and sun safety as hot weather hits.

Nambour General Hospital emergency department director Dr Dan Bitmead said it was very easy to become dehydrated, especially when physically active, and it was important to be prepared and always bring water.

"Dehydration is the result of your body losing too much water and not being replaced quickly enough. Your body can lose water very quickly in hot weather by sweating, and you also lose water simply by exhaling," Dr Bitmead said.

"Remember it's not just the elderly or children that can be affected by dehydration, it can affect any Queenslander, even if you're fit and healthy."

Symptoms of dehydration include thirstiness, a dry mouth, headache or light headedness or dizziness.

Outgoing president sees bright future for Nambour

Nambour's status as a Special Entertainment Precinct (SEP) is only the second of its kind in Oueensland.

"I believe that business will again flourish in the future because of what is happening in this sector," he said. He said the ongoing work of the USC in C-Square would be a vital component in the development of Nambour as being an education hub.

"This, along with the introduction of some cutting-edge tech companies such as R4 Robotics to our community, will only enhance our reputation that Nambour is not just a great place to set up a business but also the local environment and facilities provides a great location to live and raise a family."

At the November 18 AGM Mr Smith handed over the reigns to a new board of eight. Under the Chamber's constitution the new board will elect a new president and committee.

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Robotics firm sees bright tech future in Nambour

PEPPER the Robot is part of the vision of local company R4 Robotics to redefine Nambour as an advanced manufacturing hub.

Founder Chris Kalle said Pepper, manufactured by Softbank Robotics had artificial intelligence for real world applications. "For instance Pepper can actually 'see' which patrons at a restaurant are anxiously waiting for service before your staff even realise," he said. "Pepper can then engage with that customer or let a staff member know that a table needs service."

NAO by SoftBank Robotics, another robot R4 Robotics' specializes in, can also be utilised in aged-care environments and hospitals. "It's about the human experience and sparking joy for people while solving a critical problem.

"Every business is unique, which is why robots can be so intrinsically helpful. With a robot you have the means to take the workload off your staff so they can focus on what they do best - being human. We're not building robots to replace jobs, we're creating a future collaborative workforce, as well as creating new jobs that we haven't even thought of yet.'

Chris said a new multi-legged robot was in development as part of a line of intelligent robots from R4.

He is keen to see Nambour redefined with a new technology hub in emerging technologies like robotics, AI and design.

C-Square Managing Director & Co-Owner Tracy Martin agreed saying the centre would be delighted to support a future tech hub, in the heart of Nambour. "It would be 100% aligned with our vision of business by day and arts and entertainment by night," she said.

Chris said having a future tech hub in Nambour would create a paradigm shift, creating enormous opportunities for locals and support the Sunshine Coast region with next generation

industry capabilities.

University of the Sunshine Coast Adjunct Professor Phil Graham supported the idea: "A future tech hub, especially one focused on new methods of manufacture and bespoke product design, is a natural fit for Nambour and an exciting prospect for its future."

"We've got a number of innovative businesses already using robotics technology like Maleny Dairies, Coyo and a growing underground of robotics startups here on the coast," said Chris.

"So having a local tech hub focused on industry and green manufacturing will be a game changer for the entire region."

R4 Robotics was born after Chris moved to Nambour in 2017.

Soon after Chris became one of the inaugural graduates of a world-first self-driving car engineer program.

"As part of the capstone project, in just 14 days, our team of four remotely developed an autonomous Lincoln MKV to navigate a parking lot, avoid parked cars, sense and stop at traffic lights - truly a robot car," Chris said.

The STEMM program operates out of Burnside State High School, where the race was held.

STEMM Coordinator Jacqui Deane said the Nambour Cup was always a hit with the girls, even if it did elicit a few squeals.

"We all really appreciate the community get-ting behind the girls like this," Ms Deane said.



Works begin on \$2.65 million 'water wonderland'

YOUNGSTERS and the young at heart will have a revitalised Nambour Aquatic Centre in 2021, with construction of the new Nambour Splash Park now underway.

The upgrade will deliver two water slides and a children's zero depth splash zone (a water play area which will include two toddler slides), along with the 30 new car parks which are already underway.

"Council owns nine aquatic centres throughout the region and the water slides here at Nambour will be a first for our facilities," Mayor Mark Jamieson said. "The construction project will support local business and trades while at the same time, delivering facilities that reinforce our aspiration to be a healthy, smart and creative region.

Sunshine Coast Council Division 10 Councillor David Law said the upgrade provided an economic boost to the area and promoted Nambour's revitalisation.

"The Nambour Splash Park will create a water wonderland in the heart of the hinterland, and I have no doubt it will be a drawcard to the town, empowering healthy and active lifestyles and facilitating many hours of fun for all ages," Cr Law said.

"During construction the pool will remain open but at times there will be noise and dust impacts. I'd like to thank pool patrons, park users and local residents in advance for their understanding. "The construction crew will do everything

possible to minimise any inconvenience while delivering the upgrade as quickly and safely as possible." Belgravia Leisure Chief Executive Officer

Nick Cox said the addition of a new Splash Park will provide the community with a state-ofthe-art attraction that will make the Nambour Aquatic Centre a major destination venue for the whole family. "Our goal with the upgrade to the aquatic

centre is to reinvigorate the venue and transform the space so that it goes beyond being a place for exercise, to a place where communities can get together to relax and reconnect," Mr Cox said.

The upgrade includes \$1,050,000 from the Queensland Government' for the larger water slides, \$500,000 from Belgravia Leisure and \$460,000 from council for the children's zero depth splash zone and an additional \$650,000 from council for extra car parking.


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



DID you know council is now converting waste to electricity at its Caloundra Renewable **Energy Facility?**

As the Service Excellence Portfolio Councillor, I was proud to officially open this facility, along with Cr Rick Baberowski, Cr Joe Natoli, staff from council's waste team and LMS Energy.

This facility is now linked to the power grid and generates 7000 megawatt hours of renewable electricity each year.

That's enough electricity to power 1200 homes, 24 hours a day, seven days a week delivering an innovative, sustainable and cost-effective solution to ratepayers.

Road safety boosted

Construction will begin in early December (weather and site conditions permitting) to upgrade three sections of Glenview Road at Glenview. All going to plan they will be finished by April next year.

The project has received funding from the Australian Government's Black Spot Program and will deliver a significant improvement for safe travel on this road.

Section 1 will include footpath and road shoulder work at the S-bend approximately 500m east of Stevens Road and will include a new footpath, retaining wall, fencing and drainage works.

Sections 2 and 3 will include new road edge guideposts, hazard signage, minor tree removal and digital warning signage to advise users of upcoming curves in the road.

BUSINESS sentiment as statistically measured is in full swing. Recent Westpac predictions show the future trend in growth rate will outstrip that after the GFC! How can that be?

The real truth of the matter is not so upbeat. Let me explain.

There are solutions to all of these problems. I have personally seen people in what could be considered "hopeless" business situations – coming out much stronger and profitable.

There is one single thing that is separating the pack - those that are succeeding despite the odds, and those who are on a downhill slide. The single thing is their state of mind.

Those who, through practice, beliefs, perseverance, or via support can maintain a view of Optimism for the future are the ones succeeding, or on a path to succeed in the coming

To explain why I promote Optimism as a first step answer - let's consider a reality check.

It is sad that small business owners, together with young men make up the majority of Australian suicides (refer ABS). This is predicted to escalate by 40% through pandemic related impacts to business. For every one who takes their life, there are many more who suffer mental health issues. Even the mildest depression can have a huge personal and of course business, cost.

So let's face it - it is real and it affects most of us whether we admit it or not.

Finding reasons for Optimism in your vision of the future will help you more than any other single thing. I encourage everyone to find and keep front of mind an optimistic future. Don't feel you have to do this alone. Here's a list of things you can do - choose what suits you: Join relevant motivational groups - virtually if not able to do it physically; join like minded business support groups; if spiritual - use your higher power; share and work with trusted mentors; read or "consume" as much as you can on personal development books; keep your life in balance (google Wheel of Life); explore and practice mindfulness.

I implore you to take this seriously. Test yourself - "Do I see an Optimistic future?". If you cannot truthfully and immediately say "yes" then join the rest of us and take some positive steps. When you can be Optimistic you can pass the learning on as a pandemic to beat the pan-

HomeBuilder

The Morrison Government is extending the HomeBuilder program from 1 January 2021 to 31 March 2021 which is great news for our local building sector and is protecting jobs through the construction of new homes and home renovations. The Beerburrum to Nambour Rail Upgrade (B2N). Unravelling the spin

WHAT do you think the Beerburrum to Nambour Rail Upgrade (B2N) actually is?

If you thought it was full rail duplication to Nambour, you have been sadly dis-track't-ed.

The problem is borne out of the limited funding for the 122.6km Sunshine Coast line from Caboolture to Gympie North (and all part of the North Coast Line). And it's enmeshed in the 80/20 federal/state funding squabble that continues to this day.

You may recall that I did an Opinion Piece on this in the SVG (August 26, 2020 p20).

[The original project cost was \$780 million, the state contributed \$160.8 million (20%) and the commonwealth contributed \$390 million (50%), leaving it 30% short-changed. This was the first time in history that our Sunshine Coast rail received federal funding. Public transport, including rail, is primarily the responsibility of

In actuality, today's short-changed project comprises just 13.8km of rail duplication from Beerburrum to Glasshouse Mountains to (1.5km north) Beerwah.

Yep, it's just two and a bit stations long for a \$550.8 million price tag.

The dual tracks stop shy of where the 20 year long-proposed CAMCOS heavy rail corridor is planned to branch off.

The current project could best be known as the Beerburrum to Woombye Rail Upgrade (B2W) IF you include the proposed passing loop extensions at Landsborough, Eudlo and Woombye.

Unfortunately, those passing loop extensions (which will improve freight) are only included in the stage 2 works - and there is not one dollar

That said, these passing loop extensions MUST be done on an improved alignment or else they will lock in the current tortuous alignment for decades to come.

Thus, there will be NO freight improvements under this current stage 1 rail plan.

The 2016 Business Case (BC) says there will be a 3 minute travel time saving for commuters from Caboolture to Nambour, but that was when the #2tracks actually went to Landsborough.

It seems futile explaining that the shortest rail passing loop in the entire 1668km North Coast Line (NCL) is located at Palmwoods because it's not slated to be extended.

That loop is 683m long and can only accommodate a freight train up to 650m long. The problem for the NCL being that Queensland should have freight trains 1500m long. But I

The B2N Rail Upgrade according to the 2016 BC was a \$780 million (around 20km) 'rail' project, comprising road re-alignments, road over rail overpasses and carpark (park 'n' ride) expansions at Beerburrum, Landsborough, Palmwoods and Nambour. The carparks are to cope with the expected passenger demand by

The bus interchange at Landsborough is a new addition to the works, not mentioned in the 2016 BC.

Here are some gems from that 2016 Business Case on what is needed:

"Duplication of the Beerburrum to Nambour section of the North Coast line is explicitly mentioned in this strategy as a key transport investment priority and is expected to contribute to achieving the objective of expanding the use of rail freight through improving the efficiency, availability and capacity of the freight paths on the North Coast line."

or this beauty ...

"Freight demand by 2023, currently available operator-preferred freight paths on the North Coast line will be at capacity and from this point onwards, additional freight will have to travel via road, given the insufficient availability of train paths between Beerburrum and Nambour."

I am in favour of calling stage 1 of the project the 'Beerburrum to Beerwah Rail Upgrade' (B2B) with lots of roadworks and carparks (needed by 2036).

Meanwhile the freight task which has a 2023 deadline gets put on the funding back-burner.

It calls into question the expertise of the decision-makers.

The Bruce Highway is being upgraded to 6 lanes from Caboolture to the Sunshine Motorway, Mooloolaba and rest assured those extra lanes will soon be taken up by more cars and an even whole lot more B-double semitrailers from 2023.

I usually say 'safe travels' or 'stay safe' to friends on road trips.

From 2023, that is about to become much more difficult.

Weeds overwhelming vegetation, wildlife

I recently attended an Invasive Weeds workshop run by Jeanette Nobes at Maleny RSL.

Jeanette is a consultant on invasive weeds and is passionate about dealing with these invaders before they completely overtake the beautiful environment on the Blackall Range. There were handouts available showing how to deal effectively with these pests.

Many of the woody weeds such as privet and camphor are overwhelming our native plants. As a consequence the natural foods that wildlife prefer, are squeezed out. Jeanette pointed out that these weeds are successful because they seed prolifically every year whereas our indigenous fruit bearing plants often only seed once every 5 - 20 years, putting them at a distinct disadvantage. Because of this many of our native birds and animals are compelled to eat the fruits of the weeds, compounding the problem by further spreading them.

Our wildlife is under enormous pressure with our expanding population and increased demand for housing. Many of us plant nectar producing garden plants that do not produce fruit for our rainforest dwellers, thereby encouraging nectar eaters, such as noisy miners and rainbow lorikeets, to the detriment of our fruit eaters.

I would encourage all residents to learn more about the impact of invasive weeds and attend workshops, if offered again, to learn why and how to deal with these weeds. Sunshine Coast Council has resources on their website under environment to assist weed identification and native plants best suited to replacing woody weeds. There are many lovely native plants such as blueberry ash, lillypillies and sandpaper figs which will enhance the environment and provide native fruits for our wildlife.

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


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Wildlife enquiries running hot—800 calls in a month

THE WILVOS hotline has been busier than ever. Eight hundred calls came through the Hotline in the last month from the 96% of the volunteers shifts recorded.

There were a huge variety of animals including birds, macropods, possums, gliders, echidnas and reptiles.

WILVOS also receive calls about other animals in distress, domestic and feral, and always ensure these are handled by the relevant organ-

My little red-necked wallaby, Traviata, is very happy to have a friend just a little bit larger than her. Lucy is bossy but they get along well.

We always try to group species with their own kind as it helps in their transition back to the wild. The joeys receive constant 'mothering' while young, but then they need to know and identify with their own species.

A very cute little swamp wallaby has been with me for a couple of weeks as another wildlife carer was moving house.

Banjo is forever entertaining as he finds his feet out in the backyard.

He is just at the stage of emerging from his mother's pouch so is often quite hesitant to venture into the big wide world, till his curiosity gets the better of him.

Naturally, he feels more secure after sunset and this is his adventurous time.

This exercise time is so important for them after every feed, allowing them to strengthen



their muscles and absorb sunshine for the vitamin needed for healthy bones.

It is sad to read about wildlife problems in different areas around Australia.

Bats always receive bad publicity because no one wants them roosting in their back yard.

I would not be happy to have a bat colony near my house, though I know they are fascinating animals that do so much good in the environment.

Where we hear about No Tree No Me with the koalas, in the case of bats it is No Bats No Forest, because their pollinating skills are unbeatable.

These problems are usually the result of habitat destruction by greedy, ignorant and thoughtless people.

WILVOS have had so many lovely, considerate members of the public contact the Hotline Their phone calls have saved so many native animals.

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


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




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
