

### Rosanna Natoli aims to bring community voice to Sunshine Coast leadership

TELEVISION presenter and university lecturer Rosanna Natoli has formally announced she will run for mayor of the Sunshine Coast at the March local government elections.

If successful, Ms Natoli will be the second mayor in her household.

Her husband, Joe, the sitting councillor for division four, was mayor of Maroochy Shire prior to its amalgamation with Caloundra and Noosa shires in 2008 to form the Sunshine Coast Council.

She revealed she had been thinking about nominating long before current mayor Mark Jamieson's mid-November announcement that he would step down at the next election

"I was thinking about it for a couple of years when it really started to be the community colliding with decisions being made by the council," she said.

"That's when I started to think the community wasn't being listened to and local government is meant to be the level of government closest to the people and it hasn't been really close for a while."

Aside from meaningful consultation, Ms Natoli said infrastructure was a big issue for the Sunshine Coast and she would advocate for heavy rail from Beerwah to Maroochydore, the duplication of the train line to Nambour and hydro or electric buses to every suburb on the Coast.

She said she would like to see more gravel roads sealed, more support for agricultural businesses in the hinterland, and different ways of providing housing "because what we have done isn't working".

Mr Jamieson has said that someone with experience running a big business would suit the job of mayor but Rosanna believes her professional experience, community involvement, and ability to communicate stands her in good stead.

She planned to spend the next three-and-ahalf months connecting with the community as much as possible.

"I think that's what people want, someone

who represents them," she said.

A journalist who has worked with Channel Seven on the Sunshine Coast for 29 years and taught at the University of the Sunshine Coast for 24 years, Ms Natoli has donated her time to MC at charity functions.

The mother-of-three is patron of homelessness charity Roofs to Recovery, the Sunshine Coast Oriana Choir, the Maroochydore Orchid Society, the Sunshine Troop disabled dancers, and the Rise2 Foundation for domestic and

family violence recovery, is an ambassador for the Buderim Hospital Cindy Mackenzie Breast Cancer Foundation, and is a member of the Journalism Education and Research Association of Australia.

Ms Natoli said her husband had been supportive of her decision to run for mayor from the start.

She felt society had advanced enough to accept that a woman could be mayor at the same time as her husband was a councillor.

### Festival director and lawyer to run for mayor

A HINTERLAND dynamo has become the second person to put up their hand for the Sunshine Coast's top job.

Wayne Parcell, a Montville resident of almost 20 years, has publicly declared his intention to run for mayor of the Sunshine Coast at the March 2024 local government

Mr Parcell's announcement follows that of television personality and university lecturer Rosanna Natoli, wife of division four councillor Joe Natoli.

Mr Parcell, a lawyer by profession, is director of The Rangebow Festival, a celebration of diversity, inclusion, sustainability and reconciliation spread across the hinterland towns of Maleny, Montville, Flaxton and Mapleton.

He is also the president of the Montville Village Association and when president of the Montville Tennis Club, has driven the rejuvenation of the Montville tennis courts.

Running for public office has been on Mr Parcell's mind since he was a teenager but he decided to finally do it after a bit of a push from others following Mark Jamieson's announcement that he would not seek a third term as mayor.

"The time is right. The mood I'm picking up from people is that they are looking for a change. They are looking for a different way of the council doing business," he said.

"I think the council has done a good job but I think people are looking for a more open and transparent type of operation from council so they can be more confident in the decisions that are being made and have more faith in what's happening and have a higher level of satisfaction in what the council does," he said.

Mr Parcell, who has adopted the slogan "change that matters to you," said hinterland people did not feel they were being heard by the council while coastal residents could be heard but not understand why certain decisions were made.



He said the Sunshine Coast's population was diverse and he would like to see the council engaging with a wide variety of people.

There's many different communities out there that have different needs. They need to be included. They need to be understood."

Mr Parcell, 64, a part-time strategic consultant for a law firm, believes he has the right skill set for the job of mayor.


After growing up in a domestic violence household on Brisbane's southside, he went on to study law at university and worked in the public service for 15 years, earning a medal in the Queen's birthday honours for his outstanding work.

He has more than 30 years' experience in immigration law in private practice and with a global firm and 25 years on the boards of charities, including for homeless LGBTIQ+ youth.

His husband, Brett, and two adult children from his first marriage, who compete with two Burmese cats for his affections, are supportive of his run for mayor.

#### Cr Law confirms second run for Division 10

DIVISION 10 councillor David Law has confirmed he will seek a second term on the Sunshine Coast Council.

"I have the energy and passion to represent the people of Division 10 in all the towns; Nambour, Mapleton, Kenilworth, Yandina, North Arm and Eumundi," he said.

Councillor Law said he approached the role of councillor by listening to what communities and individuals really wanted, then acting on their behalf, citing the Mapleton off-leash dog park as an example.

"It was started and completed within two years of my election in response to overwhelming community demand. It is very well used and an asset to the town," he

Cr Law has pledged to continue his regular high attendance at community meetings across the division, as well as continuing twiceyearly drop-in sessions in every town.

"That is how I stay connected to the communities and can be most effective,"

A Nambour local for over 20 years and the father of three now adult children, Cr Law says the Nambour Revitalisation Project will remain a major focus for him.

"The overall aim is to make Nambour more 'people-friendly', so more shade trees, wider pavements, more space for people to walk and sit, better connection between areas," he said.

"The award-winning re-design of Nambour Council Forecourt has transformed a hot, concrete space into a green, welcoming, shady area with seating.

"This shows us what is possible throughout the rest of the town.

"Community feedback tells us which areas to focus on first.

"In addition I have secured funding for Nambour Library and Customer Service Centre to be renewed as well as creating new community meeting spaces. There continues to be 200 council staff working out of Nambour."

No stranger to advocacy, Cr Law said the skills learned in his career in disability, which ended with him as national manager, would continue to drive important projects for the hinterland.

High on his agenda is the Nambour-Coolum Recreation Trail, the Petrie Creek masterplan, Nambour Revitalisation Project, Eumundi Streetscaping and Yandina off-leash dog park.

As the councillor with the Community Strategy Portfolio, Cr Law instigated the council's Housing and Homelessness Action Plan, adopted unanimously by the full council in July 2023.

"We now have a plan so that, in collaboration with the community housing sector, we can create affordable housing. I'm excited to continue this work."

Cr Law remains a selffunded independent candidate who has never belonged to a political party.



### Cr Johnston back for more amidst council changes

DIVISION five councillor Winston Johnston will throw his hat in the ring for another term on Sunshine Coast Council.

Councillor Johnston is something of a local government veteran. He was first elected to the Landsborough Shire Council in 1982 and remained in office until 1991, by which time Landsborough Shire was known as Caloundra City Council, a forerunner of the Sunshine Coast Council area.

He made a local government comeback in 2020 when he successfully stood for election against nine other candidates for division five after the retirement of long-serving councillor Jenny Mackay.

Councillor Johnston's opponents this time will include Greens candidate Tracy Burton, who came second last time, and journalist and former political staffer Richard Bruinsma.

Cr Johnston said the Sunshine Coast Council was in a good position and continuity was important given mayor Mark Jamieson's decision not to seek a third term.

"The Sunshine Coast Council is probably one of the biggest, if not the biggest business on the

Sunshine Coast," Cr Johnston said.

"It can take a bit long to get things done but overall, I'm very happy with what's been achieved over the last four years," he said. Cr Johnson said the council had sold the

Cr Johnson said the council had sold the airport lease at a profit and the involvement of the Walker Corporation in the Maroochydore CBD had turned that from a loss-making to a profit-making project.

He said the council had been able to lobby for the retention of inter-urban green break to the south and had also bought land for environmental purposes, including an expansion of the Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve at Maleny.

The council was now ready to begin enacting an excellent master plan for an ecological park adjoining the existing reserve which would be a project of major significance to the hinterland, he said.

Cr Johnston said he had successful advocated for over-grown vegetation obscuring the views from three major lookouts on the Range to be cleared.

"Personally, I believe the state of our parking, roads and lookouts has been improved, especially parking in my division. I've put in requests for works to be done."

### Yandina Pony Club in limbo

### Seeking new home amidst growth

IT was the Australian pony club of the year last year, but the Yandina Pony Club is effectively homeless.

The pony club has been forced to use other club grounds and even hold events off the Sunshine Coast because its 1.2ha Andersons Road grounds are too small and have no water or electricity.

Sunshine Coast Council, which has high hopes of hosting Olympic events in 2032, has not connected the basic infrastructure the club has been seeking for at least eight years.

President Kate Pilcher said that without water, it is difficult for the pony clubbers to give their steeds a drink.

"We have a solar pump and a tank and can pump some water but people generally have to bring their own water for their horses," she said. While waiting for the council to come

to the party with water and electricity, the thriving club's membership has more than doubled over eight years to close to about 130, meaning the grounds are too small for it.

Kate said 4ha grounds at Fellowship Drive, Doonan, which had been used by the Eumundi Pony Club prior to its closure last year, would be suitable but were occupied by Hoofbeats, a horse sanctuary and trauma healing service for women and girls.

"The council contacted us 12 months ago saying, 'We've found a solution. Would you like to go to the old Eumundi Pony Club grounds?' Absolutely. And then they said we can't get in for at least 12 months."





The thriving club's membership has more than doubled over eight years to close to 130 and has outgrown its facilities.

Kate said the council then offered the pony club the use of another section of the Fellowship Drive property but it was over-run with weeds and unsafe.

Kate said the council has made other suggestions, including using the Nambour Showgrounds, which turned out to be fully booked; using other pony clubs' grounds, which came at a cost; or seeking out private land, which it did but the council then demanded the club obtain event permits or apply for a material change of use, at a cost of thousands of dollars.

Secretary Chenoa Trama said the club would

be "club-hopping" around four different locations in February and March and was unlikely to be able to host some of the events it had planned for 2024.

"We keep seeing light at the end of the tunnel but then it goes dark," she said.

Kate said the lack of a suitable, perma-

nent grounds was starting to affect the thriving club's membership.

"We're now in danger of losing members because we haven't got suitable grounds," she said.

Kate said swapping the locations of Hoofbeats and Yandina Pony Club made sense but the pony club would also be interested in sharing Fellowship Drive with Hoofbeats.

A Sunshine Coast Council spokesman said the council had been in discussions with Yandina Pony Club about a tenure solution at Fellowship Drive, Doonan.

I'm also aware that for many, this will be a difficult time of year as cost-of-living pressures continue to rise. It's hard to factor in presents under the tree and extra food on the table when bills, rent and grocery costs are still on the rise. Next year is an election year and I look forward to sharing with you how an LNP Government will demonstrate we have the Right Priorities for Queensland's Future - including tackling the cost of living.

### Grant to help 200 families

THE Buderim Foundation Thompson Charitable Fund is pleased to announce a new \$50,000 grant to Aus Living Support Ltd to assist vulnerable Sunshine Coast residents find more permanent housing.

He said clients were often single mothers, some reestablishing themselves and their children after escaping domestic violence, often away from the support of families and friends, who were facing multiple challenges.

"This rental support gives our clients a chance to breathe, regroup and gain the courage to face the challenges so they can again support themselves and their children.

Mr Harrison said through the applications received by Aus Living, they could see that the average rent for a small home on the Sunshine Coast had increased to about \$700 a week.










### Long-awaited tram project eyes 2025 arrival

THE much-anticipated Nambour 'Tram' will arrive a little late at its first stop.

TramCo chair Greg "Rogo" Rogerson said

it could take up to six months longer than first thought, or even a little more, to deliver a fully operational tram.

"The original Gantt chart we compiled when we eventually knew all the design, engineering and compliance issues, had delivery at the end of 2024," he said.

"In reality, I don't think it will be this early but I do think around July 2025 is fairly feasible."

Tramco has had to gingerly feel its way

with construction of the tram, which has been specifically designed to run on the two-foot gauge, heritage listed, cane train tracks.

Greg said TramCo was in discussion with Bradken Engineering, Innisfail, to nail down a price for the bogeys now that the final drawings and engineering for the tram bogeys had been signed off by Covey Associates Engineering and their Independent Competent Person, ADA Engineering, Melbourne.

He said creator Russell Anderson, who had come up with the extraordinary tram design, had been instructed to collect present day costings on the laser cut, 25mm thick plate steel and associated parts needed for the bogey build.

Greg revealed further details of how the tram



would be built, saying it
would run on two, fourwheeled bogeys, one at
either end, each driven
by a 48 volt AC brushless
motor, driving through
SEW transmissions which
will provide power to the
front pair of bogey wheels.
The super capaci-

The super capacitor-powered, electric tram would rely heavily on regenerative braking, but would also run a six pot/ piston disc brake, with a single disc mounted on the "lazy", unpowered axles.

Four of the pistons will be hydraulically actuated, with two pistons being electrically actuated to act as a parking brake. On top of all the above-mentioned braking, the armatures of both electric drive motors will also provide an additional mechanical brake.

Greg said the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator required the tram to have excellent braking and above all, be extremely safe.

"If we're running up and down the street and someone steps out in front of the tram, or a vehicle swerves and stops on the tracks, we need to be able to stop incredibly quickly and safely, which wasn't necessarily the case in the old Moreton Central Sugar Mill days where the locos were diesel and even steam powered, and they had to contend with the inertia of over 100 metres of heavily loaded cane bins linked behind," he said.

Greg said the project was running to budget but he said it was likely more funding would be needed in the future as costs of materials and manufacture had risen incredibly.

"I would be naive if I didn't flag we were going to need more down the track. I always say that the Good Lord will provide. At the right time, things just seem to happen," he said.

#### **Tramfest boosts coffers**

Tramco has staged TramFest events to help boost the coffers. The last one for the year, which Greg described as a Christmas thank-you to the Nambour and hinterland community which has stuck by the tram project, was held on December 9, bringing music, market stalls and food trucks to Mill Street and the tram terminus.

"We got a lot of support and I'm extremely happy that we're giving back to the community that's supported us," Greg said.

The main event was Powderfinger drummer and former Nambour High student Jon Coghill with swamp bluesman 8 Ball Aitken.

# MP maintains advocacy for age verification

IN a recent appearance on the Mamamia podcast, *The Quicky*, Sunshine Coast MP Andrew Wallace discussed his ongoing efforts to implement age verification on online pornography.

The Federal Member for Fisher's advocacy is aimed at protecting young Australians from harmful online content.

The Sunshine Coast MP, who chaired the Protecting the Age of Innocence Inquiry under the former Coalition Government, said he was committed to making the internet a safer place for children and to protecting women from family and domestic violence.

Wallace's campaign addresses growing concerns about the links between pornography consumption and real-world violence against women.

"There is an irrefutable correlation between the access and use of hardcore pornography and domestic violence," Mr Wallace told the podcast. "Access to hardcore porn leads to increased instances of domestic violence. If you maintain that access, then you are effectively giving free license to domestic violence.

"Nobody wants that. We all want domestic violence to be something of yesteryear but, to do that, one of the things we can do is to limit access to hardcore pornography for young people. All we're asking for, is that what you can and can't do in the real world is replicated in the online world. I don't think that's too much to ask for."

Studies show the link between pornography and domestic violence includes reinforced harmful gender stereotypes; unhealthy and sexist views of women and sex; and condoning violence against women.

The total number of women's deaths by alleged violence in 2023 has climbed to 71, according to Australian Femicide Watch.

Last month, the Albanese Government voted down the Opposition's motion to trial age verification technology which Mr Wallace says would help keep children safe online, as recommended by the eSafety Commissioner.

"Other countries are already introducing these restrictions," Mr Wallace said. "It's time we do the same here in Australia."

#### Be an 'active bystander' and help stop domestic & family violence

A group of community members in Maleny got together recently for a Bystander Action workshop run by Lifeline and organised by Speak Up Now - Stop Domestic and Family Violence, Maleny and the Blackall Range.

Domestic abuse occurs when one partner in a relationship uses any means to dominate and control the other. This can be physical, verbal, psychological, financial, social, or take many other forms. The causes of domestic violence are complex, and include factors in the individual, the relationship, their community and society.

Key to understanding why most victims of domestic violence are women, is recognising societal beliefs that men should control their partners and women should be submissive. While this is changing, there are still underlying beliefs and attitudes that we may not be fully aware of, that enable behaviours that can lead to domestic violence.

Participants then discussed how community members might consider ways to help prevent domestic violence, and reasons they do not get involved. Finally, they considered actions they might take before, during, and after being aware of situations that could result in domestic or family violence.

Wheels of hope:

#### Maleny Resident rides 10,000kms on eBike pilot program

SIMON Raby jumped at the offer to hire an ebike from Maleny bike co-op in order to ease his daily commute to work.

Simon has ridden around 10,000 kms in 18

Simon has ridden around 10,000 kms in 18 months on the e-bike which he says "flattens out the hills".

"And, yes, I'm grateful for the motor after a day's work," he admitted. "I live 12.5 kilometres from town. I can get to town and back twice on one charge."

It costs about 10c to charge an e-bike, so it has cost Simon about \$20 in electricity and about \$300 in maintenance to travel the 10,000 kilometres. A new car on finance would have cost him \$27,000 for that same time.

But it's not just about the money.

"My health and fitness have never been better," Simon said. "I was in good shape in my 20s, but I hit that slippery slope. I wasn't well – physically or mentally; quite depressed actually. I faced my 50s with dread.

"So I ditched the car and was lucky enough to be chosen for the Maleny eBike pilot program. 18 months of riding instead of driving helped me to turn that emotional and mental



battle around. I look forward to be fitter in my 60s than I was at 20."

In fact, Simon reflects with a solemn tone, "I wouldn't be here today if I were still behind the wheel."

The eBikes were supplied by Eco Villages Australia. "Active travel makes sense, we know the benefits," said Co-Founder Andrew McLean. "Enjoying the journey is more important for our mental and physical health than the destination.

"Good for us, good for the planet – it's a win-win. We call on governments to provide better active travel infrastructure so that more people like Simon can benefit. At fraction of the cost of what we spend on roads."

ANY wildlife injuries are easily preventable. Fishing line entanglements are always upsetting to see.

It helps to cut fishing line into small pieces, place in a container and take home for disposal. Add a scissors to the tackle box, so no lengths of line, or hooks, end up in our waterways.

The plastic bait bags are also a danger to our native animals. Another beautiful little platypus recently died because of ingestion of a small plastic bag. It is an ongoing battle for our majestic marine turtles.

There are more vehicle impact situations with animals as Christmas approaches. I remember starting my Christmas Day a few years back with the unpleasant task of having to have a lovely big kangaroo euthanized. She had been hit by a car and left severely

injured at the side of the road. Fortunately, a wonderful passerby rang the Hotline so the kangaroo could be put out of her pain and suffering.

There is also an increase in reports of dogs chasing wildlife. Kangaroo joeys are often found days after the mother has been attacked, or just chased. It is a long haul back to health for these little joeys.

Christmas is a happy time to be spent with family and friends, so if out and about always remember the WILVOS Hotline operates 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year.

# Evolution of Denbie House

This Old House: telling the stories of landmark homes of the Blackall Range. This week G Plowman of the Montville History Group visits Denbie at 334 Flaxton Drive

HIS old house at 334 Flaxton Drive, Flaxton just north of The Craft, has withstood the test of time, and is as recognisable today as it was in the early 1930s when Frank and Doris Hetherington made it their home.

They bought the house and a parcel of land where Frank established a mandarine orchard and ran a few cattle in the back paddock. His choice of property may well be attributed to his elder brother, D'Arcy owning the farm directly opposite. The proud homeowners called their forever home, Denbie, after the ancestral home Denbie House in Dumfriesshire, Scotland, and a neatly framed name plaque above the front door welcomed their visitors.

Frank and Doris had five children, David, Shirley, Robert, D'Arcy and Enid. They all grew up at Denbie and attended the Flaxton Provisional School.

Frank, a veteran of WWI, devoted much of his spare time to supporting local men and women who went on to serve in WWII.

He also took an active role in the Patriotic Society and in fund-raising for the Flaxton School and other community events.

He helped build the Montville Soldiers Memorial Hall, now St Mary's Church and Community Hall, and in later life became a church elder.

Doris helped run the Brownies and supported the CWA.

The house, typical of its time, had wide front verandahs looking eastwards towards the sea.

The front steps were few in number but because of the uneven hillside location, many more steps were needed to access the kitchen via the back door on the western side.

The high wooden piers on the northern side permitted access beneath the house.

This was always a handy space for storage and as a place for kids to play on a rainy day.

It also permitted access for pest control which, in years past, usually consisted of spreading a layer of lime over the dirt beneath the house.

Lime was seen as a deterrent for fleas and cockroaches.

Apart from signage on the rooftop and battens enclosing the underfloor area, the

external appearance is little changed.

Before electricity was connected the kitchen contained the mandatory wood stove and stove recess. Frank, Doris and the kids spent considerable time with axe in hand splitting firewood at the woodheap close to the back steps.

They then had to be lugged up the steps and dumped into the wood box beside the stove.
Older houses like Hetheringtons had no

built-in cupboards or wardrobes.

The kitchen dresser housed the dishes and cutlery and a shelf above the stove recess carried canisters and containers of food items for everyday use. Each bedroom had a wardrobe and dressing table or chest of drawers.

A tall-boy or linen cupboard stored clean sheets and towels where the lady of the house often left a small sachet of lavender to impart a pleasant clean smell.

The lounge cum sitting room looked north through a line of casement windows fitted with panes of translucent 'bubbly' glass.

The Hetheringtons kept a wind-up gramophone here and when they played their old 78RPM records, the music wafted like a zephyr to fill the adjacent garden and trees with melodies.

For years, a tall avocado tree grew in the front yard, and it became a favourite tree to climb for generations of Flaxton kids.

Like the bamboos at Dixon's corner, Hetheringtons' avocado tree also served as a landmark to guide unfamiliar travellers.

Frank died in 1984 and with all their children now adults, Doris left the district.

During their long years of residence in Flaxton, the Hetherington family were respected members of the community and were always ready to lend a helping hand whenever it was needed.

No longer a family home, the house has become a commercial enterprise firstly as Hilltop Gallery and more recently as an

### Positivity in the face of Parkinson's

PETER Stidolph decided on his approach to Parkinson's disease the night after receiving his diagnosis.

While the rest of the world went to sleep, Peter went through a storm of emotions before reaching a decision before sunrise which has defined the last six years of his life.

"I thought, 'How the bloody hell am I going to get through this? We have three girls ... I was expecting I couldn't work," he said.

"And then I thought, 'You've never thought this way before. Get off your a...e, boy. You've never thought about your symptoms like this before so turn it around."

Peter, of Palmwoods, had been living with symptoms of Parkinson's for years before he was diagnosed with the disease so he resolved to keep living and approach life with positivity rather than surrender.

With that attitude, he has become involved in supporting others with Parkinson's and initiating fundraising activities despite his own personal challenges.

His involvement includes the Restoring Hope Parkinson's Therapy annual carols at Sundale Palmwoods, the Parkinson's Queensland fundraising walk in 2022 and 2023, the Nambour and District Parkinson's Support Group management group, and the Sundale Palmwoods residents committee.

### How to keep backyard chickens

Hinterland Homesteading by Racheal Pascoe

delightful childhood memory I have is the excitement of checking for chicken Leggs. I can still remember the thrill of finding eggs.

I wanted our children to have the same wonderful experience, so we have kept chickens for years now... they provide us with eggs and are a terrific animal for children to learn to

Keeping chickens is not difficult, but there is a bit of set up involved to be organised and also a little daily care of the birds is required.

The Sunshine Coast Council has a document on their website called 'Keeping Poultry and Birds' which outlines the rules, so you will be able to find out what applies to where you live.

It defines how many birds and what sort of birds you are allowed to keep regarding the area (suburb) and size of land you live on.

The placement of the pen on your property is also important, it must be a certain distance away from perimeter fences and neighbours' buildings, so keep this in mind when planning.

Read and research first, so you will be doing the right thing when you get your chickens.

The last thing you want to do is get your neighbours offside by having a noisy rooster and not adhering to the rules.

#### Bok bok bok

The initial set up of the pen is important. Chickens need to have a clean and dry run which is fox, dog and cat proof.

This can mean having to concrete mesh into the ground to protect them. Chicken tractors are terrific as they can be moved around but many do not have mesh floors. Dogs and foxes can lift and dig under pens to get to the chickens.

Carpet snakes are sneaky and like to eat chickens but can be kept at bay with fine mesh on the pen. Chickens need to be locked up each night, away from predators.

Keep the cost of building the pen down by



sourcing secondhand timber, wire mesh etc from Marketplace, Gumtree and Refuse shops.

#### Feeding your chickens

I use the fine laying mash (chicken seed) from the Nambour Produce Agency. Chickens should also have access each day to clean water and some greens as well.

I save kitchen scraps for them and I grow green leafy vegies for chook food. The outside leaves of cabbages are ideal. There are a few foods that are not good for chickens, they include avocado, citrus and onions.

Ask for some bedding straw at the Nambour Produce Agency, that will be ideal to put in the nesting boxes for the girls to lay their eggs on. A point of lay chicken will cost about \$30 and

it shouldn't be too long before you have your first egg. There isn't anything quite like the delighted squeal from a child as they find their first egg!

#### **Healthy chickens**

You can tell a healthy chicken by the comb on their head. It should be a lovely red colour and standing up.

If it is not standing up, there is a good chance that the bird is not well. Maybe it might need dusting for mites or worming solution put in the water.

Chickens really are easy to keep and healthy birds hardly get an issue, but occasionally you might get a sick chook and the internet is a fabulous source of information to help you nurse your friend back to health. Letting chickens



roam freely around your yard is lovely to see.

#### Free poop

They poop as they go which is great for your garden, but it is disappointing when they destroy gardens looking for worms!

This is when it might be time to make a permanent bigger run for them to enjoy.

Keep it interesting for the birds by having a swing made out of rope and a big stick or hang an entire cabbage for them to peck at and fill an old tyre with dry dirt as a dust bath.

They will just love it!

I still enjoy opening the door to the nesting boxes each day and seeing how many eggs there are. Simple joys each day.

"They had all worked on pieces, even some people who were vision impaired, and to see the joy in them having their art admired by the public was the highlight of the festival," she said.

"They were really inspired and they felt so productive.

"That for me was one of the key moments of the festival."

She said the festival had benefited from wonderful artists who had hosted

workshops to share their knowledge. Councillor Joe Natoli donated his time to sit for portraiture masterclass.

Another well-known face to make Sculpture on the Edge was Gardening Australia personality Costa Georgiadis, who was particularly taken with extraordinarily realistic porcelain floral arrangements by Iris Syu.

Gretchen said a festival dinner with music and dancers had been a beautiful evening and people had enjoyed listening to a panel of artists about how they had become and forged their way

The proposed showrooms range in size from 411sq m up to 500-600sq m but Mr McArthur said two prospective tenants, including a clothing retailer, were looking at taking double showrooms.

"There's a fair bit of interest. I've got two in the pipeline for 1102 and 1158sq m," he said.

Mr McÁrthur said a pet store, liquor outlet and a food business were also interested in leasing opportunities.

He said plans for the site also included 20 two and three-storey townhouses behind the showrooms. Access to all would be along a

The council issued approval in 2017 to Nambour Developments (No 135) Pty Ltd for showrooms plus 20 townhouses on the site.

The approval included the provision of 77 carparks for the commercial component and 35 carparking spaces for the residential area.

Local businesswoman Rhonda Billett is pleased about the development, saying it was something needed in Nambour.

"As a business owner, talking to locals daily, they frequently talk to me about the constant need for more businesses with a strong emphasis on manchester, whitegoods and clothing," she said.

# Urban density via unit-style living key to CBD growth: agent

**Q&A** with RE/MAX Property Sales Director Tristan Brown

N this interview RE/MAX Property Sales Director Tristan Brown shares his secrets to business success and ideas for transforming Nambour, focusing on urban density and revitalising the town centre to enhance community engagement and lifestyle.

### Q: Real estate is a hugely competitive field and yet you've taken on two agencies in the last few years (Nambour and Caloundra). Can you share one secret that has helped you grow in such a short time?

"I think for me it's energy. It's always trying to operate with high energy and good intentions. At the end of the day, I think people feed off your energy, they want to be around good people, happy people, people that are striving for something more. That energy can become infectious. And also, the energy can help you when things aren't going well, push you through. If I

look back on the last three years in particular of running the business, we've always tried to maintain and remember how important it is to have the right type of positive energy in the office. And off that, you can build your culture."

#### Q: What attracted you to the RE/MAX model?

"It was the people. 100 percent the people. I think when you talk to most people who have had interactions with any RE/MAX office domestically or internationally, they are good people with a strong culture and really important core values.

"For me, it starts at the top, and RE/MAX Australia is owned by a wonderful family, the Davoren family. And I just always felt that they were coming from the right place. They were interested in always helping me first. And that gives you great security."

#### Q: What attracted you to Nambour?

"Look, I've always been one for the

#### Q: What would you like to see for Nambour?

"I think the next thing that I would love to see in Nambour is more high density or medium to high density unit-style living in the city centre. I think that's how we're going to have that density of people that will encourage more retail, more coffee shops, restaurants, a greater night life. "Of course, people do still want houses and good size yards, but it's not actually attracting people to engage with the CBD. They live around Nambour but they might not eat, drink, socialise, and traditionally shop in Nambour. I think with

urban density, that medium-to-high density, it's far more convenient for somebody to simply jump in the lift and go down from their unit, and wander in and have a coffee downstairs or at the restaurant half a block away than it is for mum and dad, who live out on the fringe of Coes Creek, to jump in the car, and drive in, and try and find parking in town. They might as well drive to the Coast."

#### Q: Are there any particular values or principles that guide your business practices?

"I really genuinely believe that passion gets things done and it gets them done all the time. I've always been passionate and I've always had a saying, and it sits on my wall, it says, 'Always remain passionately discontent'. It is a reminder to myself that it does not matter what we achieve, what we do, to always have that little niggling thing in the back of your mind that says, 'Hey, come on, let's look for the next thing. What else can we get excited about?' It is wonderful to look back and reflect on what you've achieved. But again, that is simply just the by-product of the actual journey.

"People tell me I'm always heavily focused on growth. I am, because I find that through growth, you're forced to learn, you're forced to get better, you're forced to make mistakes, you're forced to take risks. And it's a little bit scary, but what keeps me excited is that even if I fail, hopefully in some small way, I've improved personally and professionally."
