A TWIST of fate will see Powderfinger drummer Jon Coghill play a rare gig in his hometown of Nambour this Saturday (December 9) with swamp-blues-rocker 8 Ball Aitken.

Jon and 8 Ball have agreed to team up for the Tramfest Christmas Festival, a community event and fundraising for the Nambour trams project, in Mill Street from 4-9pm.

The pairing came about after Jon found himself within arm's length of TNTCo chair, former Sunshine Coast councillor, hot-plate ace Greg "Rogo" Rogerson at a Sunrise outdoor broadcast from Nambour on Father's Day.



Jon, Sunrise weatherman Dan Anstey, and reality TV producer Dan Munday – all Nambour High students made good - had just been crowned Nambassadors on TV and Mr Rogerson had the sausages sizzling on the barbecue when his phone rang. "I had a pair of Ansell gloves on and was covered in grease from my armpits to the tips of my fingers when my phone rang in the back pocket of my Levis," Rogo said.

'I'd had a chat to Jon. I hadn't seen him since I was on council. Jon was standing in front of the council chambers talking to someone else. He was about 10 feet away.

"I sidled up to him with my bum towards

him and gave him a nudge with my elbow and said, 'Can you pick up this phone for me?'

Jon dipped into otherwise forbidden territory and passed the phone to Rogo, noting the call was from 8 Ball, who he had interviewed while working as an announcer at ABC Coast FM.

8 Ball, who had agreed to play at Tramfest, was calling to say that his drummer could not make it but he would handle the gig on his own. "I said, "Hang on a minute. Does the name Jon Coghill mean anything to you'?" said Rogo, who got off the phone and went back to Jon.

"I said to Jon, 'He's just rung me to say his drummer can't do Tramfest'," Rogo said. "Jon looked at me. He looked right into my eyes and said, 'No, Rogo.'

"I said, 'What do you mean, 'No'? You're the hot drummer from Powderfinger."

Jon, who has only played one gig since Powderfinger's finale in 2010, finally agreed to talk to 8 Ball about it. "I thought I wouldn't be able to do it. Then I spoke to 8 Ball, the nicest and coolest man in country and boogie, and listened to the songs," Jon said. "I was in. He's awesome and the songs are killer. I'm thinking of asking Rogo to be my agent now."

Rogo expects the combined pulling power of 8 Ball, who has 25,000 online followers, and the Powderfinger presence of Jon to draw possibly the largest crowd ever to Tramfest. "I'm not sure what we've had before but I think this will surpass anything we've had before," he said.

Entertainment will also include All Strings Attached, Lazy Guns and The String Fusion Rock Orchestra, plus there will be the usual food trucks pop-up bar, face painting, markets, and a rock climbing wall, and Santa will drop in with gifts for the kids during the event.

TNTCo has thanked the Nambour Chamber of Commerce and the Sunshine Coast Council for their financial support of Tramfest.

8-Ball, who lives at Glasshouse Mountains, has been touring but will play another gig with his whole band on 6 January at the Maleny RSL.

Creative sisters set up shop in old church

TWO creative Nambour-based sisters have opened the doors of a store showcasing the work of artists and artisans.

Michelle Hearden and Kerry O'Connell have long-threatened to go into business together and now they have finally done it.

The Sunshine Artisan Collective store in the old Methodist church building on Mons Road, Forest Glen, opened Friday, 3 November.

The sisters' business plans came together after Michelle and her husband moved to the Sunshine Coast from Western Australia to help Kerry with their elderly mother, who is now in full-time care.

"My sister and I have always talked about how, if we were ever on the same side of the country, we would do a little business," Kerry said.

"My sister had moved over and we were having a day out and we happened to be going to Forest Glen.

"I said, 'I'll show you a church that would be perfect for a business and we drove past and it

had a 'for lease' sign out the front." The sisters swung into action.

Kerry, a sewer, and Michelle, a painter like their mother, could see a need for an outlet for

other creatives like themselves. The shop stocks a variety of work from about 25 artists and artisans, mostly from the Sunshine Coast but also from Gympie and including a contact or two from WA.

"There are so many talented people here on

Kerry said they were not a gallery and aimed to keep prices affordable, with items for sale from \$5 through to \$1000 and everything in between.

Positivity in the face of Parkinson's

PETER Stidolph decided on his approach to Parkinson's disease the night after receiving his diagnosis.

While the rest of the world went to sleep, Peter went through a storm of emotions before reaching a decision before sunrise which has defined the last six years of his life.

"I thought, 'How the bloody hell am I going to get through this? We have three girls ... I was expecting I couldn't work," he said.

"And then I thought, 'You've never thought this way before. Get off your a...e, boy. You've never thought about your symptoms like this before so turn it around."

Peter, of Palmwoods, had been living with symptoms of Parkinson's for years before he was diagnosed with the disease so he resolved to keep living and approach life with positivity rather than surrender.

With that attitude, he has become involved in supporting others with Parkinson's and initiating fundraising activities despite his own personal challenges.

His involvement includes the Restoring Hope Parkinson's Therapy annual carols at Sundale Palmwoods, the Parkinson's Queensland fundraising walk in 2022 and 2023, the Nambour and District Parkinson's Support Group management group, and the Sundale Palmwoods residents committee.

Peter was one of several Glass House electorate residents presented with volunteer awards by MP Andrew Powell on 17 November.

Mooloolah Valley Community Association stalwart Jason Carroll, who gives generously of his own time to drive community events, including Mooloolah's first ANZAC Day dawn service this year, also received an award.

Nambour grandma makes female boxing history

BOXER Lyn Mills did not get a win when she flew to Melbourne for her first fight last month but the consolation prize was not too bad.

Lyn, 71, went home with the record for being the oldest female boxer to fight in a competitive bout in Australia.

"Unless someone else comes in who is older than me, I've got that," she said.

Lyn was beaten unanimously at Ferntree Gully on 25 November by Victoria's Karen Watts, who at 62 had youth on her side.

Until then, Lyn had only ever fought in an exhibition match at the PanPacific Masters and was approached to take on Karen, who had been unable to find anyone in her age group to fight.

Lyn, who trains with Charlie Wetere at the OneHeart gym, Nambour, ramped up the running and dropped cake and biscuits to shed 9kg for the bout.

Although Charlie had schooled her up for the fight, she found Karen difficult to match. "She's got an unorthodox style," Lyn said.

"She was doing jabs but all over the place." "I got on top of her in the last round but it was too late by then."

She said she had no regrets about the fight and would do it again, even though she has been diagnosed with covid since she got back.

"It was a great experience. Even if I had known I was going to come down with covid, I wouldn't have given up the chance," she said. The fight has also led to Lyn being featured

in a yet-to-be-completed documentary. "My granddaughter has a friend who makes

documentaries, and my grandson is into UFC. They were sitting around talking and my granddaughter said, 'My grandma has a fight in November?

Lyn said she had been amazed at the opportunities that had opened for her since she began boxing.

"I never thought four years ago when I started training with Charlie that all this would evolve," she said.

"I never went there to fight. I went there to get fit, and then it went to training for the Pan-Pacs, then a fight, and now a documentary."

Lyn is under instructions from Charlie not to train for a couple of weeks but plans to get back into it - because who knows what will come next?

IT would seem a brave move to take on business with a small babe in arms but for Mel Law, it was a no-brainer.

When her niece, Jade, decided to let the Lillypod Café at Palmwoods go to pursue a life of travel and adventure, Mel jumped in.

"She came to me and said, 'What are you thoughts?' and I said, "Yes!"

Mel knew it was a great little business and her niece had put a lot of

effort into building it up but she also saw it as a good option for her small family.

Mel had been off work for eight



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months after the birth of Kaylen, now almost one, and her partner, John Sleeman, was slogging his heart out seven days a week working as a tree lopper to support them.

She did not want to send Kaylen to daycare at such a young age and could see the café offering them the chance to share care of their son and for John to have a better work-life balance.

John now works in the café two to three days a week, lops for the other two, and they juggle care of Kaylen between them, and with the help of a network of other friends with small children.

Café work is not new for Mel, who has been working in hospitality since she was a teenager. John is not quite so experienced, but she said he was doing a fine job behind the till. "He's got a great personality. Cheery and happy and gets along with people which is great," she said.

Friday Night Burgers:

Church's 20 year tradition of feeding homeless people

THE Sundale Community Foundation has put its money where some hungry mouths are.

The Foundation recently presented a grant of \$5000 towards Friday Night Burgers, which has provided reliable meals for the homeless and needy in Nambour for more than two decades.

Every Friday night, a team of volunteers gather at the Nambour Anglican Church to cook free hamburgers for members of the community who might struggle to get a decent feed.

Coordinator Coral McVean said between 75 and 90 burgers were served up every Friday between 6pm and 7pm.

Coral said the Anglican Church had hosted the weekly free feed for years. But the burger night's origins began with another church.

"It was started by a youth group at the Baptist Church in Nambour. They saw a need for the homeless to be given some assistance with a meal," she said.

"This was long before The Shack. They were very forward with their thinking."

The Friday night burger event has evolved over the years, moving from the railway station and the hands of the Baptist youth group to the grounds and auspice of the Anglican church.

Volunteers do not get quite so personally involved but there are still more than burgers on offer. Coral said a former hairdresser offered free haircuts and someone else arranged free clothing

arranged free clothing. "Everything we do is for free, and we are very non-judgemental. People ask, 'How do you know they need help?' I say, 'I don't know. I'm not in their shoes;" Coral said.

Coral said it had been rewarding to see some Friday Night Burger regulars get their lives back on track. She said the initiative was also rewarding for team members, including a young man who had not been able to work due to a disability but was proud to have a "job" counting donated stock. Burger ingredients come from the Suncoast Co-op and Coles Coolum, through Second Bite, a food rescue organisation aiming to eliminate waste and hunger.

Golden Fleece signage finds new home at Sommers'

THE Golden Fleece sign which once stood at Watson's Garage, Maleny, has been resurrected thanks to a sentimental servo owner.

The sign now stands proudly with two Golden Fleece bowsers at Sommers' Fuel Sup-

plies, Witta, where the display is turning heads. Trevor Sommers felt it was important the

sign did not leave the area when Watson's closed in 2021 after more than 60 years of trading.

With the help of good mate Neil Commings, a long-time Watson's employee, he approached the new owners about selling the sign.

"We went to see the new bloke and he wanted to sell the sign to an auction place," Trevor said.

"We explained to him that it was a part

of Maleny and we would appreciate it if he would sell it to us on the condition that we would erect it and it would never leave Maleny. "He had a think and

he agreed to sell it to us." Trevor engaged

Shane Bailey, of SRB Industries, Witta's version of the Rick's

Restoration TV show, to restore the sign.

Shane said the sign would have been one of the few, if not the only one, to have remained on display at a garage for more than 50 years.

"Golden Fleece was Australian fuel and it was bought out by Caltex in 1981 and all the

signs would have been torn down.

The rams were only made of blown plastic so when workers were pulling them down, they wouldn't have survived.

The sign was carefully removed from Watson's and taken to Shane's place where

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he removed the delicate ram and used it to make a mould for a new fibreglass one capable of standing up to another 50-60 years in the weather.

The corroded aluminium backing was cleaned and necessary electricals replaced in order to illuminate the sign once again.

Trevor also had Shane restore two 1950s fuel bowsers that had been rescued from a boat yard at Ningi, near Bribie Island, years ago to go on display with the sign.

The Golden Fleece sign and bowsers were erected at Sommers' Fuel Supplies at the beginning of November, where the precious garagenalia is guarded by a security system. Trevor said the owners of vintage and retro

cars were enjoying the Golden Fleece photo opportunity and people who knew the sign were glad to see it again.

"All the feedback we've had from locals is that they're so happy to see it stay in Maleny. It's not for me, it's for everyone."

Directory helps bridge gap between western and eastern wellness practices

SARA Miller knows from experience how hard it can be to find the right health and wellness help when its needed.

"In 2017, I went through a relatively life-changing experience. I had suffered with depression and things like that as well," Sara said.

"Nothing was really working for me and I was very lucky that I found somebody that could communicate with me in a more effective way than counsellors and psychologists and it turned out to be more along the lines of the eastern approach."

Last year, Sara was considering her options for the future, and decided to make it easier for other people to find the right practitioner for their circumstances.

She embarked on a mission to create a national online directory for health and wellness practitioners and has launched healthiihub.com. au, which will list traditional, allied and alternative health providers throughout Australia.

"I like to explain it as western meets eastern medicine. It's about holistic health," she said.

The directory has been a

learning journey for Sara, who has experience in government administration, fitness equipment sales, personal training and management but had never built a website.

She has worked her way through special directory-appropriate software to build healthiihub.com.au and has strategies in place to increase search engine optimisation for the directory and her clients.

"It's been a challenge but I have the motivation. I can't wait to connect with the commu-



nity, with consumers who are on their own journey, with health and wellness practitioners, and I can't wait for health and wellness businesses to market themselves and be seen," she said.

Sara plans to put a proportion of the direc-tory's revenue aside in the future to help other people on their health and wellness journeys through a scholarship or bursary-type program.

Police target vehicle theft in campaign

SUNSHINE Coast Police will conduct mobile and foot patrols in targeted hotspots throughout December aimed at identifying insecure vehicles and reminding owners of the importance of doing their bit to reduce this type of theft.

Sunshine Coast District Officer Superintendent Craig Hawkins said unlocked cars and homes were easy targets for criminals.

"Don't make it easy to become a victim and don't invite criminals to your neighbourhood. We have seen an increase in these types of offences across the coast over the last year and we are asking people to avoid becoming victims by simply locking their homes and vehicles, keeping property out of sight and keeping their keys secure".

"We are seeing that almost all recent occurrences of houses being broken into here in Coolum Beach and Peregian Springs have occurred through unlocked rear and side doors or through open or unlocked garages. Criminals are then taking car keys and making off in the owners vehicle", he said.

Superintendent Hawkins warned that often these stolen vehicles are used by the criminals in committing other offences and put the community at risk.

"Recently in Peregian Springs we saw a vehicle stolen using the keys criminals had obtained by gaining access to the house via an unlocked rear door.

"CCTV from another nearby house then showed them attempting entry into other vehicles in the street and moving on when finding them locked," he said.

Police will be checking the security of vehicles in hotspots including local shopping centres and residential streets throughout the Operation. They will be contacting owners or leaving a note on vehicles that are found insecure.

"We want residents and visitors to enjoy this holiday period. Secure it, don't Gift it," Superintendent Hawkins said.

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'Meticulous scrutiny':

Palmwoods divided on new Coles Supermarket proposal

A surprise application for a Coles Supermarket in Palmwoods has stirred community debate. Without prior engagement with council planners, the proposal, which conflicts with current zoning and size regulations, also has

residents divided. Div 5 Cr Winston Johnston said the project would be held to meticulous Council scrutiny because of its scale and the potential impacts on existing small businesses.

The site was originally earmarked for residential use. Added to that, the supermarket's size exceeds local planning schemes.

The project faces a complex approval process amidst a community torn on its necessity.

Cr Johnston said the application was lodged with Council early July 2023 and came "out of the blue".

"This application for a Material Change of Use came as a surprise to myself and council planners as there had been no prior notification. Nor had there been any pre-lodgement discussions with council planners," he said.

"Based upon current direct community feedback to me, our community is quite divided regarding this application. However, most residents want a supermarket, not necessarily a full line Coles supermarket."

Cr Johnston said the application carried "significant and complex planning matters" that would need to be negotiated and considered by the planning team.

Planning issues include:

• The subject land is zoned for medium density residential development and has a

long-standing court approval for residential apartments. This zoning prohibits the development of shops and/or supermarkets, as it is a residential only zone.

• The subject land falls outside the designated business zone for Palmwoods. Main Roads are concerned about access and also the applicant's proposed roundabout, Council has a Local Area Plan (LAP) for the Palmwoods/ Woombye area and this LAP restricts shop/ supermarket floor areas to be a maximum of 1200msq. Well short of the 3400msq stated in this application.

• It is important to note that the site works carried out over the last six months are as approved by the original court decision relating to the townhouse development approval (not for a supermarket). These completed works may not be adequate for a supermarket development or any other commercial development.

• A supermarket of 3400sqm, may have significant impact on existing retail shops in both Woombye and Palmwoods. For example butchers, bakers, newsagents, delicatessens, bottle shops, other supermarkets.

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· Council has already granted recently, approval for a supermarket between Hill and Church Streets, opposite Palmwoods Hotel. This approved site is located within the designated business zone for Palmwoods.

 The applicant will need to supply additional information to council's planners and consideration of all these matters will take many months. As Council enters the Election caretaker period at the end of January, continuing through until the swearing in of new councillors in April, a decision on this application is extremely unlikely to occur before May or June 2024.

"For those interested, although the Woombye Spar supermarket exceeds 1200sqm in floor area, that supermarket was established decades ago and as such is an existing pre-conforming development and therefore not subject to the current Local Area Plan for the Palmwoods/Woombye area," said Cr Johnston.

Group warns of Coast 'population explosion'

AN alliance of concerned community organisations has called for a population cap to be introduced by the Sunshine Coast Regional Council. The Common Sense Collective says a cap would allow adequate infrastructure to be funded and built prior to the influx of any more permanent residents.

Spokesperson Jack Szydzik said his group was particularly concerned about population growth and its effect on infrastructure.

"At the moment they're doing it the wrong way around," he said. "Our roads are already choking - ask anyone who has to travel to and from work every day or do the school run. 'Then there's all the other

service infrastructure that's required. A cap sends a strong message to State and Federal Governments. Only recently the media reported that the Federal Labor Government would not fund the massive infrastructure required for the Council's Corporate Plan and that the current Labour State Government has admitted that it does not have a plan to fund the infrastructure.'

A media release from the group says Council's Smart City Framework and Implementation Plan quotes current population as 350k

"And it will grow to 520k," the media release says. "That's an increase of over 150,000 people to live in the Sunshine Coast along with massive spending on surveillance, reducing the

urban footprint of the area and promoting behaviour change in travel choice. What the plans do not address is the lived experience elsewhere in the world where such globally-promoted high density living and 15-minute cities has led to the creation of urban ghettos, increased homelessness and crime.

"Already the Council has run up a \$453 million debt, and with Federal Government and State Governments reneging on funding the forecast escalation in Council spending it is we ratepayers and renters who will be slugged for many years to come. Significantly, our current Mayor is not seeking re-election.

"In writing this letter we hope to alert all residents of Sunshine Coast of the impending nightmare about to engulf our beloved Sunshine Coast.

'The coming Council elections in March 2024 will not be just business as usual. The very fabric of our culture and liveability is at risk, but the politicians and bureaucrats who are inflicting this upon us won't be bearing the cost.

"What is urgently needed is a new team of councillors who will truly represent the local community. We urge concerned voters in every Division to seek out appropriate candidates and be sure to give them maximum support in their run for Council. Time is running out to save the Sunshine Coast.'

'Gap between pollies and the people' triggers election run

SMALL business owner, freelance journalist and former political staffer Richard Bruinsma will campaign as an independent for Division 5 in the 2024 Sunshine Coast Council election.

Mr Bruinsma said he was nominating because of the ever-widening gap between everyday people and politicians. He also held concerns about the lack of action on the cost of living.

She went on to work at the Whim Creek Hotel, south of Port Hedland, and the Waverley Hotel in Perth, the Emerald Hotel in central Queensland, and the Prince of Wales in Proserpine, before taking on the challenge of the rundown Beach House Motel in Townsville and finishing up at the Sleepy Lagoon in Tin Can Bay.

Jenny said the average pub worker lasted about five years in the industry but she had loved it too much to leave. "I've got amber fluid in my veins.

It's a passion. I just love doing it. I was brought up with it."

She mixed with people from all walks

of life in pubs and said customers generally wanted a chat, as much as, if not more than, a drink.

"Most of the blokes who come in for a drink come in for a talk. They're often lonely. They'd tell me things that they wouldn't tell their best friend."

She said that a good bar tender listened without lingering too long.

"You've got to stay on the move. I was brought up to have no empty glasses on the bar. People get cranky if they can't get a drink."

Jenny has been asked numerous times to write a book. She got 75 pages down 15 years ago but put it all away in a drawer.

She resumed after a resident of the retirement village where she lives suggested she try using a dictaphone to record her stories.

Jenny has been delighted by the response to the book. One man bought 12.

"He said he usually bought all his mates a carton for Christmas but this year, he was going to buy them a book," she said.

"I was writing them out to Richard, Bill, Bob ... I wrote out 12 books and he said, 'That's my Christmas shopping done'. I couldn't stop laughing."



Sad day as landmark Dome building Montville, bites dust

THE ruins of what was once the famous Dome at Montville have been removed in readiness for a transformation of the prime site.

The Dome, or what was left of it,

was acquired by a Victorian based property group last year after being on and off the market for four years. A local source confirmed the prop-

erty was again on the market but said the owning group was still considering options for the site and consultation with the Sunshine Coast Council and interested parties was ongoing.

The source, contacted through Montville Realty, said the site was zoned for mixed use and one option under consideration was to develop four business premises with perhaps three residences behind.

Another option was to construct backpacker-type accommodation with an attached hotel, "all very stylish", he said.

The source said restoring the Dome had not been an option.

"It was totally out of the question. It was past its life," we are informed. The Dome was built in 1972 by Roy

and Rosalind Hayes to house a gallery

and a bar. Inspired by the geodesic domes of American architect Richard Buckminster Fuller, it was regarded as a revolutionary and novel building in its day.

At one stage, it contained a model railway but was home to Gallery D and a glass blowing studio prior to its closure.

The Gazette was informed the development of the site by the group in partnership with another party could be considered pending interest in the site. – Janine Hill

A DOCTOR is in the house at Montville again, much to the appreciation of its residents.

The Montville Health Centre has opened in the main street premises vacated by Ochre Health earlier this year, which also led to the chemist moving out.

General practitioner Doctor Peter Herbert saw the need for a doctor in the township and recognised an opportunity to gain a work-lifestyle balance.

Dr Herbert has owned a house in the area for more than 20 years and is now enjoying the opportunity to walk to work.

He said work was still being completed to set-up the clinic, mostly on the online and technical fronts, but he had begun seeing patients.

"It's a task to get the connectivity to set-up e-scripts and Medicare and other IT stuff but we've got to get through it," he said.

"It takes about a month to make it all work and get telephone and internet. The internet on the Blackall Range is terrible so we're getting a Starlink dish."

"I just wanted to give something back and do something for the community.'

Dr Herbert said small towns were being disadvantaged by a federal system which provided greater financial incentives for general practitioners elsewhere, and the effect was compounded during a GP shortage.

"A place like Montville, it needs to keep its services and they need the chemist back as well. We're working on that, trying to get it to happen."

Council slammed for scrapping Aussie Day Awards

LOCAL MPs have expressed their deep concern over Sunshine Coast Council's decision to discontinue its annual Australia Dav Awards.

"This is the sort of woke nonsense that people would expect to see from inner city Greens councillors that are driven by left ideology," said Federal Member for Fisher, Andrew Wallace MP.

This follows the Council's announcement that the Sunshine Coast Biosphere Community Awards would replace the Australia Day Awards, which acknowledged outstanding service in the community.

"I cannot believe Sunshine Coast councillors would be pursuing this path. If the Sunshine Coast Council can take no pride in Australia as a nation, then they should hang their heads in shame."

Glass House MP Andrew Powell described the decision as gob-smacking.

"What a huge blow to the many amazing individuals and community organisations in our region that go above and beyond," he said. 'Whilst protecting our environment is important, the Sunshine Coast is so much more than that. And it's because of contributions in business, sport, the arts, tourism, service clubs, community groups and so much more."

Mr Wallace said if a Coalition Government was in power, he would recommend that the council be stripped of its power and responsibility to undertake citizenship ceremonies.

"This raises the question once again with Sunshine Coast Council whether the bureaucrats are running the Council or whether the councillors are running the Council.

"Is the tail wagging the dog in Sunshine Coast Council?'



"It's what manifests for her when she wears the boots and what the boots mean to her," she said.


"It's about how people can be quick to judge someone but no-one really knows what someone has been through or are going through at the time.

"It's something that's been in my heart but I always wondered about what other people would think. I never wanted to step outside the box and do something different," she said.


"How many people on the Sunshine Coast wear cowboy boots downtown? But I think I've grown on my journey so much and I can really resonate with Clancy."

One home, two families: The story of 365 Flaxton Drive

This Old House: telling the stories of landmark homes of the Blackall Range. This week G Plowman of the Montville History Group visits 365 Flaxton Drive.

THIS old house at 365 Flaxton Drive, Flaxton has no name, but it was once home to two of Flaxton's best known families who devoted their time and effort to benefit the community. It was known firstly as Hetherington's place and later as Copeland's place.

This lowset home sits comfortably close to the eastern edge of the Blackall Range. High ceilings promote coolness and give a feeling of spaciousness. Sash windows let summer breezes flow through to cool the interior. On the east, the windows frame the matchless views over coastal farms and far beyond to sandy beaches where ocean waves crash white against the shore.

When Anzac and WWI veteran Alfred D'Arcy Carruthers Hetherington, usually known as D'Arcy, returned to Australia in 1918 he purchased his citrus orchard at Flaxton and in 1922 married Christina Morris. D'Arcy had worked with the Flaxton community to establish the Flaxton Provisional School which opened in the same year. Later, the three Hetherington daughters, Margaret, Isobel and Elizabeth made the short walk up and over the hill to school.

D'Arcy Hetherington's father, Robert Blain Hetherington, retired as Police Magistrate at Warwick in 1924 and purchased an orchard in Flaxton plus his retirement home in Maroochydore. D'Arcy's younger brother, Frank, owned the farm directly opposite and for a time in the early 1930s, all three Hetherington families were farming at Flaxton.

When the citrus industry on the Blackall Range was decimated by disease most farmers turned their hands to dairying and pineapple growing to earn their living. The Hetherington orchard was hit hard and after nearly 20 years in residence, the family sold their house and farm and went to live and work in Brisbane.

The new owners, Roy and Marjory Copeland moved in and began growing pineapples in the land to the south of the house. They brought up their sons, Brian, Ken, Ian and Geoffrey here and all four attended the Flaxton School before all going on to higher education.

Mr and Mrs Copeland were great supporters of the Flaxton School and the local community. Roy, also a veteran of WWI, spent some years of the Second World War working at the Flaxton sawmill which was considered by the Manpower organisation as an essential industry. Marjory was an active supporter of the Flaxton CWA and Montville St. Mary's church.

The farmhouse has no near neighbours and for over one hundred years it has looked to the east and watched on as the early morning sun paints the sky in red and the ocean waves in glittering silver.

Externally, the house has changed little over the years, but progress has forced some changes. All rural houses once depended on rainwater collected from the roof and stored in tanks to supply their drinking, bathing and clothes washing needs.

The once familiar sight of corrugated iron tanks sitting on elevated tank-stands are now a rare sight. The installation of sewerage or septic systems has seen the demise of the tiny outside building which once housed the lavatory. With the coming of electricity, the old stove recess, wood burning stove and chimney have long gone.

With the passing of Roy and Marjory, one of their sons took over the family home and Copeland ownership continued for over forty years.

More recently the home has been rented as a 4-bedroom cottage on two levels with a study, bathroom and ensuite. The house front sits at ground level but is stumped at the back and partly closed in underneath with cement blocks. This century old home remains a reassuring link with the past and forms part of the fond memories of the many Flaxton children who adventured here with the Hetherington and Copeland children.

From garden to vase: growing your own cut flowers made easy!

Homesteading Column by Racheal Pascoe

There is something wonderful about having fresh flowers in the house. A vase of colour in my kitchen or dining room just lifts me. I love the colour, the smell and best of all, I love that I grew them myself! You can grow your own flowers to enjoy and share with others. I promise it is not that difficult.

The best ones to start with are sunflowers. They are hardy and once established, they kind of just get on and do their thing. Now, where to buy seeds? The very best value is to buy them by the big scoop at the Nambour Produce Agency. They even have some already bagged up ready to go. This way you can be generous when planting. Get the kids or grandkids involved, they can dig the soil, help you plant and care for them with watering. Many flowers that are good as cut flowers in vases love full sun, so choose your spot in the garden accordingly. Sunflowers need to be grown in the full sun.

Be mindful when planting seeds. Not too deep – not too shallow. A good rule of thumb (green of course!), is that a seed contains enough energy to grow through the soil up to the surface the distance that it is big. So, if a sunflower seed is about a centimetre, then plant the seeds only 1cm

below the surface, this way you will have most success with germination.

Sunflowers can be planted in trays or pots or directly in the ground where you want them. Once planted, keep your seeds damp, water each day at the start. You will see some action in 7-10 days. Once they are about 3 inches high, you can cut back the watering to every other day. Sunflowers will take about 10-12 weeks to get glorious heads on them. When picking them to enjoy inside, strip each stalk of most of the leaves, to reduce wilting. Oh and don't forget to leave a couple of heads out there for the bees and parrots!

JANISSARY Barracks Inc, a Turkish medieval re-enactment group specialising in traditional archery, is thriving on the Sunshine Coast hinterland.

Established in 1999 by Dr Zafer Sarac, the group has grown to over 50 members, with 23 active archers. They hold regular Sunday practices at the Abbey Museum medieval festival grounds and Tuesday sessions on Sarac's property in Eudlo.

A staple at the annual Abbey Museum Medieval Festival in Caboolture, Janissary Barracks is keen to expand its reach by offering archery lessons to the local community.

"We're eager to teach archery to students and adults alike," said Dr Sarac, reflecting the group's commitment to preserving and promoting the ancient skill.

"As a sport, archery is a very popular activity around the world. It is the same in Australia," said Dr Sarac. "In addition to its past successes in modern archery competitions, Australia has sent four traditional horse archers to Mongolia for the World Horse Archery championships.

"It is a very active sport. Turkish traditional archery is linked to other Asiatic archeries, especially very closely with Mongol archery. It is more challenging than modern archery, because you have to learn a variety of skills to be able to hit your target, which could be positioned in different situations.

"We also do horse archery which, again, requires a completely different skill set. Apart from two Turkish members, all our members have a different country of origin.

"The youngest member is an 8 year-old-girl, and the oldest is a 75-year-old gentlemen."

Judy Exley's life of community, scouting and dedication

Vale: Judy Exley 1937 to 2023

LIKE many Montvillians, Judy retired to Montville. In 1995 she and husband, Gordon, bought a home at Negus Road, an open planned house with generous decks on a large, sloping block which allowed them to pursue their passion for gardening. She loved her 28 years in Montville. Judy was born in Leeds in 1937. In her teens

she became a Scout Leader and her passion for and commitment to Scouting was born. Judy and Gordon married in 1959 and emigrated to Australia as 'Ten Pound Poms'

under the post-war Assisted Passage Migration Scheme. After renting in Hawthorne and Geebung, they were finally able to buy a home in West Chermside in 1965.

There, they had three children: Beverly (1965), Paul (1966), and Russell (1970). It was there that Judy and her whole family became more active in the Scouting movement. She became District Commissioner, West Chermside District of the Queensland Scout Association; coordinated the 8th Australian Jamboree in Brisbane and assisted in running the 16th World Scouting Jamboree in Sydney.

She was presented the Chief Scout Award for Meritorious Conduct before retiring from active roles in Scouting to become manager of the Scout Outdoor Centre in Baden Powel House.

One aspect of Judy's Scouting legacy that every Montvillian on Western Avenue would recognise was her passion for walking. For years, she and Gordon would walk around eight kilometres every morning along Western Avenue and down the Narrows and back.

As a result, they were more than able to undertake the hike to the first camp in the Everest Section of the Sagarmatha National Park. Even when the Narrows Road became too steep for them, they continued to walk Western Avenue every morning and joined a group lobbying for the provision of footpaths along the road on safety grounds.

Judy brought her appreciation of community and the management skills she had developed through Scouting to the Montville Community. Along with Gordon, she volunteered to deliver meals for Meals-on-Wheels along the Blackall Range. This lead naturally to her becoming a volunteer at Range Care.

Then in 2009, when the Montville District of Neighbourhood Watch looked like closing from a lack of support, Judy agreed to become its Area Coordinator.



With the help of secretaries, Lenore Tonks and later Jocelyn Bannister, she restructured the group, increasing 6 large Zones into 10 smaller, more manageable ones; recruited 10 Zone Coordinators who in turn recruited two or three 'Blockies'.

Neighbourhood Watch was now an organisation of almost 50 volunteers managed by Judy through quarterly meetings – a tribute to her organisational and management skills.

Initially, their role was to welcome new residents, brief them on security measures and distribute local newsletters – The Village Crier and later, the Montville/Flaxton Happenings. Judy always had a smile and a contagious laugh that soon had new residents feeling like they had found a friend.

When the Montville/Flaxton Happenings closed in 2005, the loss of reliable local news was felt by a range of local groups including Neighbourhood Watch.

In 2009, Judy approached the Montville Rural Fire Brigade to produce a joint quarterly newsletter with Neighbourhood Watch.

This newsletter was printed free of charge by the office of local State Member, Andrew Powell. 3,200 copies were distributed through Neighbourhood Watch. Later, the Montville Village Association

Later, the Montville Village Association (MVA) was invited to include a regular column in the newsletter.

When Judy retired from Neighbourhood Watch management, she continued as a 'Blockie' until failing health prevented this. Judy was a regular attendee of MVA meetings, actively supporting many of its community initiatives.

She will be remembered for her initiative, leadership, friendship and dedication to the Montville community.

A Montville farmer, builder, fireman & worker for the community

Vale: Desmond Barry McCulloch 1939 – 2023

DES arrived in Montville 70 years ago, in 1953 as a fresh-faced fourteen-year-old. His parents had bought a pineapple farm on the southern side of Western Avenue, and later rented a second farm on the northern side of the road.

Des worked as a farm labourer chipping 'pines' for £1 (\$2) a day to help support the family. In 1962, Des's parents moved to Sandgate, selling the southern farm and Des took over the rent of the northern farm. After batching for 18 months, he married Bev Duhs in 1964. The first thing the newly-weds did was to take out a bank loan to buy the farm.

The farm income was so poor that Bev was earning more working at Coles than Des could make farming, so he went to work with his uncle building farm sheds, cow bales and pig sties out of concrete and concrete blocks.

However, from 1970 on, he worked for a number of Sunshine Coast builders expanding his skill base and becoming a much soughtafter builder and tiler. With Bev working at Coles and Des working as a partner with builder, Arthur Walker, an after-hours farmer and night tiler, they were able to pay off their loan and start their family: Michelle then Michael.

Both Des and Bev shared the values of living in a small community and contributing to its wellbeing. In the early 1970s, Des joined the new hall committee fighting to save the old School of Arts Hall infested with white ants and requiring urgent repairs. Des restumped the building, ran the front rod across the width of the ceiling to pull the sagging wall in, eradicated the white ants, repainted the hall inside (at night) and installed concrete steps at the main entrance. This mainly voluntary, afterhours work, led by Des, restored the hall as a community facility for another 50 years.

Although the restoration of the hall was the biggest community project Des was involved in, it wasn't the only one. He helped build and stand the Bell Tower at the St Mary's Church of England Church. He helped stand a new flagpole in the Village Green. And with Bev, he helped in setting up the Easter Dawn Service in Carpenter's Place, Carols by Candlelight on the Village Green, the ANZAC Day Dawn Service at the World War One Memorial in front of the hall and was a willing supporter of School P&C Working Bees.

His donation to many a school fete consisted of a truckload of pineapples for the local fruit



stall. Not a committee man, Des however agreed to become a Trustee of the Montville Sports and Recreation Grounds in the 1980s until 1992 when it was transferred to the MVA.

With his truck, his tools and his experience, Des was always the first to be approached to help another community project.

Des was also a well-regarded member of the Montville Rural Fire Brigade. He was elected First Officer of the Brigade in 1984, and stayed in that role for 10 years. Des and Len Gorsch had 4x4 tractors with 500 litres spray units with hose reels (for their orchards) which they adapted for fire-fighting purposes when needed.

Under Des's leadership, the brigade acquired its first official fire truck in 1986 and soon after a 5000-litre back-up tank on a trailer.

Des and Bev loved their dancing and over the years organised dances to raise much needed funds towards the extensions for the Montville Hall, including change rooms, toilets, storerooms and kitchen.

In 1999, Des and Bev were jointly presented with the Montville Citizen of the Year Award for their service to the community over four decades. They relocated to and spent the next 23 years creating a very successful avocado farm, leasing their much smaller Montville farm – their family home. After Blackbutt, they retired to a three-quarter-acre block behind the Glasshouse Mountain Sporting Precinct where Des could still have his vegetable garden and fruit trees.

Over the last couple of years, Des and Bev have worked closely with the Montville History Group to record Montville's history over the second half of last century – still quietly serving the community they claimed 60 years ago.

It was a credit to the committee that before banking this cheque a couple of weeks later, the treasurer made sure that the lady was quite sure it was what she really wanted to do! What integrity!





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
