World-class cellist back on home turf in Montville

WORLD-RECOGNISED cellist Sam Lucas is arriving back in Montville this month to catch up with his family, but to also host local concerts in preparation for a prestigious competition of the world's elite cellists.

Sam grew up in Montville, attending Montville Primary School, but is today based in Germany, where he has a recording contract and studies at the Robert Schumann Conservatorium, Dusseldorf.

He is this year a finalist in the Queen Elisabeth International Cello Competition, which is the biggest competition of its kind in the world this year, patronaged by the Belgium Royal Family, with a grand prize of 25,000 Euros plus worldwide concert engagements.

Sam is the only Australian finalist at the event, open to the world's 50 leading cellists aged under 32, selected from 350-plus applicants to be held in Brussels from May to June.

"It's the most prestigious global competition - it gets incredible attention from the Belgium public and royalty, Europe's classical music elite and is televised and widely publicised by the Belgium and European media - and all entrants are challenged to perform at a flawless high standard," Ian Lucas, of Lucas Parklands, Montville, said.

"As his father, I'm proud and excited, but music lovers here on the Sunshine Coast have that to look forward to as well."

Covid-19 meant Sam last visited home in 2019 and hasn't seen his family since January 2020. But while here catching up with loved ones, he

"Gatherer is all about fair trade," said Debra. "Fashion is one industry notorious for unfair conditions and low pay for workers, so for us from the start, we have made the choice to only work with designers and companies who practise fair trade processes.

"From fashion, to footwear, bags, accessories and beauty - we have looked high and low for products we can feel confident are fair trade. Our motto is 'Living Kindly' and this applies to people and animals alike.

'We love products with a story and working with brands that are advocating for change in the world of manufacturing.

Debra said she'd always hoped to own her own store and create a label.

"I'd worked in fashion amongst other things in Melbourne and loved it! Being creative is where I prefer to be and working within the cruelty free space.

"After my move to Nambour and the Sunny Coast that dream started to come to the forefront again, considering this beautiful lifestyle we enjoy here - it just felt more like this was the

place to do it.

"After leaving a corporate role last year and finding myself unsure about where to go from here, I came upon the perfect location and just went for it. Ensuring that the brands we support are Fair-Trade has definitely taken a little more time than first thought, but we know it's worth the wait."

Debra said she was excited by Nambour's colourful streets and it's developing personality.

will perform local concerts at the prestigious Lucas Parklands auditorium, Montville, and will treat local music lovers and help fine-tune his performance program for the Brussels finals.

"Sam is returning to Montville, where it began for him, which is exciting for our family, but it's also wonderful for his friends and lovers of classical music who have a rare chance to see him perform his complex and demanding repertoire specifically designed for the Queen Elisabeth event," Ian Lucas explained.

"To be named finalist in such a prestigious event is a wonderful achievement, it marks the culmination of many years of hard work and dedication, and is a real credit to his talent and commitment."

Sam first played cello at the recommendation of a teacher at Montville State Primary School, at a time when the rest of his family was learning piano. His love for the instrument grew and developed. His path to his professional career in Europe began during his senior year, when he became the first Australian awarded the prestigious Sir Edmund Hilary Scholarship, which took him to the University of Waikato. Soon after, he was selected from all

New Zealand tertiary students to perform for Prince William and Princess Katherine during their Royal Tour.

It was in New Zealand that Sam was invited to audition for the cello class of Pieter Wispelwey of the Robert Schumann Conservatorium. Sam was accepted and Pieter remains his teacher today.

For one of his local performances, on February 25, Sam will be accompanied by South African-born pianist Berta Brozgul, who joins the list of accomplished musicians to feature at Lucas Parklands. She appears thanks to the strong personal recommendations of internationally-renown Australian pianist Piers Lane.

Miss Brozgul was born in Cape Town, studied in Salzburg in Austria, and at Australia's National Academy of Music in Melbourne. She has performed throughout Australia, including with the Queensland Symphony Orchestra and with the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra.

Lucas Parklands is set on a 30-acre property just outside Montville. The property features the performance hall, which is adjacent to the main residence and guest suites. Much of the hidden property is undisturbed rainforest, which sits adjacent to the Kondalilla National Park. Home prices increase by up to \$650,000

NEW data from Core Logic shows exactly how much hinterland house prices have exploded since the Covid pandemic.

Experts put the massive increases down to demand generated by southern migration to the Sunshine Coast coupled with record low interest rates.

The data from November 2021 reveals how much each suburb's value has grown since March 2020.

Median house prices in some suburbs have grown by more than \$500,000 in 18 months. The highest price growth on the Sunshine Coast came from Sunshine Beach which saw a 74 percent rise from \$1,780,000 to \$3,100,000 a change of over a million dollars.

The highest price growth in the Gazette readership footprint was at Chevallum which grew 70 percent to \$1,575,000.

Nambour median home prices grew by \$133,500 to \$545,000.

Maleny home prices grew 28 percent to \$802,500.

Woombye home prices rose 42 percent to \$518,00 while Yandina Creek saw a massive 77 percent increase.

micron sidelines donors

THE Lifeblood Nambour Donor Centre has issued a call for new and existing donors to come off the bench as the pandemic sidelines an estimated 100,000 donors across the nation.

An estimated 20 per cent of the nation's donors have been unable to donate on any given day in recent weeks due to record numbers of people isolating or currently unwell with COVID-19, according to Australian Red Cross.

Lifeblood spokesperson Cath Stone said it was as if winter had come early with cancellations and no shows peaking and less than one in two appointments resulting in a donation.

"Traditionally we see high numbers of no shows and cancellations during the winter months, with many regular donors unwell, but we've never seen numbers this high in the

middle of summer," Ms Stone said.


"It's a real challenge for blood supplies because even in the midst of a pandemic there are still cancer patients, trauma cases, pregnant women and unborn babies who all require donated blood.

A first year apprentice carpenter from Eudlo has had his ute stolen by thieves before he was able to get his licence.


"My son has worked hard and saved and payed cash for this very clean original Hilux," said his father Tim Dodd.





from Woombye Community Library


WHAT a great time we had at our Story Time Event on January 19.

Council's decision on SW Yandina challenged

In December last year Sunshine Coast Council rejected a 265 lot development application at Southwest Yandina because the developer, Noel Covey, failed to comply with a request to modify the plan in order to meet Sunshine Coast Planning Scheme (2014) requirements.

Brothers Gordon and Murray Oakes, who own the former cane land bordered by Wappa Falls, Creighton and Bracken Fern Roads have lodged an appeal against Council's refusal in the Planning and Environment Court.

The 12 reasons for refusal given in the Sunshine Coast Council's Notice about Decision include:

• The plan did not reflect traditional rural town residential qualities such as large lots, open streetscapes and mature street trees.

· The plan did not provide for larger-than-average lot sizes which appropriately transition to adjacent properties on Wappa Falls Road and Bracken Fern Road.

• No vegetated buffer had been provided between the industrial land to the east and the housing estate, nor along Wappa Falls Road.

· The drainage line in the south-west corner had not been protected.

· Road A (which will carry traffic from Creightons Road and the estate) had not been designed to operate in a safe and efficient manner.

The design of Road A was critical for over 100 property owners south of the subdivision, all of whom will be forced to negotiate the four roundabouts in the housing estate once the Creightons Road exit is closed. These are rural properties, owning or requiring the services of big vehicles like trucks with earth moving equipment, tankers for sewerage pump outs and horse floats. Road A needs to be able to accommodate this type of traffic.

It's not too late to create an estate we would all be proud of. Unfortunately the current design has many local residents concerned. Even though this is a code assessable development application Council received more than 200 submissions from residents.

Developers should abide by Council's Planning Scheme Requirements. Performance Outcomes spell out what is expected. The Community rely on these Performance Outcomes to ensure everybody's interests are protected.

This service will once again be discussed at budget meetings in May and perhaps Council's new Waste Management Contractor can provide a more cost effective contract for carrying out this desirable service.

My wife and I are out of work for refusing vaccines

We have been advised that you are interested in Covid stories and the impact on local residents. Both myself and my wife have been stood down from our jobs because of Covid mandates.

I work in retirement living and they could not mandate the injection quickly enough. My wife has worked in a government organisation in Nambour for over 30 years and they could not mandate it quickly enough either.

I am prone to focal seizures (a type of epilepsy) which are controlled by medication. Seizures are a side effect of the Covid vaccine. Therefor I chose not to get vaccinated. Ironically, my colleague, who chose to get the jabs, is now off work because she has Covid. So I don't believe the vaccine stops infection.

Questions for Ted O'Brien

I was very interested to read about Ted O'Brien's planned Sunshine Coast road trip in late February, in the Sunshine Valley Gazette.

I hope he realises he is likely to be asked about the federal health initiative of rolling out trial Covid vaccines in 5-11 year olds.

Covid poses virtually no risk for children 5-11. The vaccines don't prevent Omicron. The vaccines don't stop its spread.

The Omicron variant is not dangerous enough to justify injecting our children, in order to make us make us feel safer. I suggest parents and Mr O'Brien acquaint themselves with the TGA's Database of Adverse Event Notifications. It lists adverse events resulting from the vaccine.

On January 18, 2022, only 8 days into the rollout in this age group, a 10 year old is reported to have had a bundle branch block (coronary event), post-Pfizer.

On the same day a 5 year old is reported to have had a basal ganglia haemorrhage (stroke), post-Pfizer. There were a total of 150 adverse events listed in 5-11 year olds, just between January 10 and January 19.

Mr O'Brien responds ...

I write in response to a letter-to-the-editor from Grace Brown.

The issue of vaccinating children is a sensitive one. I know this as a parent of young children myself. While I agree that vaccinations should not be mandatory, I must correct Mrs Brown's assertions out of concern for public health.

Firstly, Australia's vaccine experts - ATAGI recommend COVID-19 vaccines for 5-to-11year olds. I have checked, time and again, and ATAGI's recommendation is based on extensive trial results which demonstrate that the Pfizer paediatric vaccine is highly effective.

Secondly, I would caution against drawing conclusions on the risk of a vaccine by quoting statistics directly from the TGA database without knowledge of extenuating circumstances behind individual cases. The TGA must transparently list all adverse events regardless of whether or not they are experienced as a direct result of the vaccine. The TGA is itself very clear about the risk of drawing conclusions from a self-assessment of its database.

Thirdly, Australia's experts note that unvaccinated children will remain at greater risk of adverse outcomes relating to the COVID-19 pandemic than vaccinated children.

As for me, personally, I am fully vaccinated and my family is following the advice of our GP whose advice, consistent with ATAGI and the TGA, is that vaccinations work. I recommend that you also get advice from your GP.



THE Omicron wave proved to be the straw that broke the camel's back for brave brewer Adam Tomlinson who closed his Nambour bar on Sunday February 6.

Stalwarts Alehouse & Brewery opened nearly two years ago, carrying hopes of leading a promising resurgence for the town's Currie Street.

Adam said in another time the pub would have flourished.

But painful lockdowns, staff shortages, supply chain issues and stress had taken their toll on the fledgling business.

It officially closed its doors Monday (February 7) but the brand will remain and Adam is looking to possibly co-lease the premises.

"Stalwart Brewing Co will continue and now focus on building its brand with new brews in bottle shops and bars," said Adam. He planned to continue to brew at the Ale-

house premises for at least another 12 months at this stage and focus purely on bottle shop sales "keeping the company and the brand

"I'll be concentrating on Stalwarts, my cur-

rent lease is for another 12 months. I do love the idea of co-leasing the place with someone running the front-of-house and kitchen. The place is too good to be vacant for too long. As long as we get through this pandemic there will be better times ahead.

"Still the reality is, while this continues, it is going to be tough. I'm worried about other small business too ... as long as we have restrictions. It's such a terrible time.

"Looking back I signed a lease early March 2020 and ten days later they shut the pubs down in Queensland.

"It was a tough way to start and unfortunately the Alehouse has only ever been open in the pandemic. Still, I'm proud of the two years that we had there.

"A huge thank you to our regulars and all Stalwart customers for supporting us over the past two years.

"The love of craft beer and good times with friends and family will carry on and continue to build Stalwart's legacy.'

In the meantime Adam said he'd returned to his old job as a surveyor and was about to go working FIFO in the Surat Basin gas fields.



Platypus, antechinus and lorikeets on the mend

There has been a variety of wildlife species coming through the WILVOS 5441 6200 Hotline

A young platypus was found near a camping ground at Imbil. Disorientated and not looking well, it was probably confused by all these strange beings camping in the usual peaceful

The platypus was transported through to the Australia Zoo Wildlife Hospital where hopefully it was able to be treated and eventually returned home.

My antechinus that came in at a few grams were released this week in their manmade nest.

It was lovely that they were able to go back to where they came from at Brooloo. The wonderful couple who found them as tiny joeys drove them all the way to Yandina and came and picked them up to take them home.

On their property they have a lovely bushy area selected, with plenty of leaf mulch on the ground and bugs in the trees. The antechinus had great hunting skills and I hope they will do well back in the wild.

Again the poor lorikeet populations have been hit with the Lorikeet Paralysis Syndrome. Research is still being done into just what causes this. It seems to be brought on by seasonal fluctuations and possible diet choices.

These birds need to be taken to a wildlife centre as soon as possible. Early treatment can mean the difference between life and death. Also, what may seem like LPS could be a fracture somewhere in the body. Early diagnosis is crucial to prevent unnecessary pain if there is a fracture.

The quiet sinking of the forgotten Nautilus project

Many readers may be familiar with CAMCOS (Caboolture to Maroochydore Corridor Study) that determined the route for the proposed 40km heavy rail line from Beerwah to Maroochydore.

None of you will be familiar with NNAMCOS. The NNAMCOS study (Noosa-Nambour and Maroochydore Corridor Options Study) we were told, will examine the benefits of extending the

mately to Noosa. It would later be renamed the Nautilus Study - before it disappeared altogether from government websites between 24 June and 27 July 2010. The South East Queensland Infrastructure Plan

rail line initially to Maroochy Airport, and ulti-

and Program 2006-2026, p40 described it thus: "Nautilus will revolutionise transport and improve the quality of living in the northern part of the Sunshine Coast by sustainably connecting communities and enhancing the prosperity, character and diversity of the region."

So said the (vanished) website on 1 July 2007. What do we know of it?

We know the study existed and its budget was \$6 million over 4 years, from 2005-2009.

We know that engineering companies; Maunsell and Arup, were commissioned to carry out studies during phase one of the Nautilus project. Maunsell provided a Public Transport Scoping Access Study into transport corridors into/out of Maroochydore as well as a Strategic Transport and Transport Economic Study.

Arup provided an Environmental Analysis report for the entire study area.

The NNAMCOS project proposal and plan for Phase 1 (concept analysis) was completed.

We know that Transport and Main Roads (TMR) signed a confidentiality agreement with a company called Bitzios Consulting in May 2007. Bitzios carried out the Nautilus Stage 2b Public Transport Study.

Why the secrecy?

The Internet Wayback machine, uncovered the proposed timetable:

Phase 1: Background information, visions and values (January–October 2006) Phase 2 (a and b): Development of corridor

options and terms of reference (October 2006 -November 2007) Phase 3: Detailed corridor analysis (December

2007 - November 2008) - this wasn't completed Phase 4: Corridor finalisation and study handover (December 2008-June 2009) - no infor-

mation found. We know it was to present its recommenda-

tions to the Queensland Government in 2009. That may or may not have happened. We know that by 31 March 2009, the investiga-

tions had ended at Phase 3 (above). We know the Nautilus study was completed in 2009-10 according to South East Qld Infrastruc-

ture Plan and Program (SEQIPP) 2010-2031, p9. A search was conducted of Queensland Hansard, Questions on Notice, the Queensland Parliament Library, the Tabled Papers database, the National Library of Australia Trove Data-

base and the State Library of Queensland. No trace of the report can be found.

The only parliamentary mention found was a Question on Notice (QoN 1443) by Ms Carolyn Male in 2006.

"There are also investigations into possible public transport link extensions from Maroochy north to Noosa and westwards to Nambour – (Nautilus Study).'

It may have been taken to Cabinet - where it will remain classified for 30 years.

Why such extreme action was taken to hide this taxpayer funded report, will likely not be known until 2040.
