Nambour residents urged to support Majestic Cinema as tough times hit industry

'Save Our Cinema'

HINTERLAND residents have been urged to rally behind Nambour's Majestic cinema as its parent company faces an uncertain future.

Majestic Cinemas, which operates nine regional cinemas on the east coast, including one at Nambour, has gone into voluntary

administration. The cinemas are still trading under administration while the company undergoes a restructure with a view to continuing operations into the future.

A statement to its moviegoers cited natural disasters, the pandemic, Hollywood strikes and a lack of consistent major movie releases as contributing to difficulties over the past four years.

Maiestic Cinemas chief executive officer Kiren Dell said business had been down by 30 percent across the industry during the past 18

Mr Dell said Majestic leased eight of its nine cinemas, meaning it had fixed expenses to cover with reduced revenue and this had resulted in accumulated debt.

He said attempts would be made to renegotiate leases while under administration to put it into a better position to continue trading.

"Administration doesn't mean we are closing and it doesn't mean we are being liquidated or sold off," he said.

Milo said this year was shaping up as a busy


one for the association.

Police officer and army reservist in bid for Div 10

A Police Officer and Army Reserve Major driven to improve life in the hinterland has raised his hand for council.

Peter Walsh, who has worked as a First Response Officer at Nambour Police Station for more than 17 years, will contest Division 10 at the local government elections in March.

He will take on sitting councillor David Law and another contender, Camillo Primavera, for the right to represent what is the region's biggest division, and includes Nambour, Yandina, Mapleton, Eumundi and Kenilworth.

Mr Walsh, who has lived on the cusp of Nambour and Woombye for 24 years, said he wants to work together with the whole community for better outcomes for all residents.

"I've seen that there are needs in our towns, particularly at the basic level, that are not being adequately covered. I feel that we in the hinterland, not just in Division 10, need a voice that's prepared to represent the people," he said.

With a back to basics focus, he wants to see improvements to community safety, infrastructure, waste management and maintenance.

"There's times when I've seen mothers with a couple of kids pushing a pram on the road



because there was no footpath or the grass was knee-high. That's not how we should be in the modern era. Safety is the first priority" he said.

Mr Walsh suggested a restructure of funding to reflect the area and distances that dollars had to stretch in the hinterland, compared to the more heavily populated coastline.

"Division 10 has many key areas that need addressing such as; sealing of high impact dirt roads, completing missing links, improving footpaths, and reducing illegal dumping.

"These issues, together with other key community priorities, indicate that the funding model must meet the real needs of the hinterland."

He believes that the role of the council is to

get back to the basic needs of the community, in areas such as community safety, infrastructure, waste management and maintenance.

"When there's limited funding, we should review the imperative needs, consult with the community and work together to determine areas of high priority," he said.

Engaged and active in community

A member of the Woombye Lighthorse, the Rural Fire Service and Nambour RSL, as well as a volunteer relationships coach and life skills mentor, Mr Walsh believes that it is vital to be engaged and active within ones community.

He advocates the essential role that community services, church and sporting groups have towards building a resilient and safer society.

"When we have a better quality of life, we have better communities," he said.

Mr Walsh did not want to promise specific projects for different areas, rather making it clear that solutions come from collaboratively working together with all stakeholders to ensure that Division 10 can thrive now and in the future.

Woombye farmers mark 50th anniversary

LONG-TIME local farmers Ray and Merilyn Clark celebrated 50 years of wedded bliss at Woombye Hall on January 21.

The Clarks reminisced about their half-century journey since their paths crossed at a Palmwoods dance in 1973.

"We had about 30 guests from across the generations," said Merilyn.

Ray came to Woombye in 1961 after his parents bought a farm in Diddillibah Road.

'We met at a Palmwoods Dance in 1973 and then we decided to get married in 1974, on Jan-

uary 19 in the methodist Church in Caloundra. "We got along all right. We liked each other," said Merilyn.

"The last 50 years has all been pretty good I suppose you could say. When you work hard together on a farm you have to be able to get along. We worked with each other a lot over the years, growing pineapples and avocados and other different things. You just go with the flow and do what you have to do.

"We've still got pines and avocados to this day. And we have hydroponic herbs at our farm. It's called Clark's Veges. We have a sign here on the Didillibah Road roadside."

Still selling veges

Ray and Merilyn still sell their veges at Yandina and Fisherman's Road markets on Saturday and Sunday respectively.

They had four children and now have six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Sadly the family has not been without tragedy. Their middle child, Bruce, passed away in 1995 aged 12. "The other boys (Trevor and Darren Clark) still work on the farm and our daughter (Joy Tomkins) is a schoool teacher and has a house on the farm. She's got her own little block.

School yard sweethearts married for 60 years

GRAHAM and Sandra Soutter met on Sandra's first day at school at Keil Mountain 74 years ago. Last Sunday (January 28) the schoolyard sweethearts celebrated 60 years of marriage. The celebration was held at Woombye School of Arts lower hall, the very same hall that hosted their wedding reception on January 25 in 1964.

"My mum met my dad on her first day of school at Keil Mountain," explained daughter Rose Soutter, the second youngest of six. "They have known each other now for 74 years and have been happily married for sixty of those.

Graham cut cane in his early days and was the first man in the district to drive a cane harvester. Prior to harvesting Graham held the record for cutting the most cane by hand.

Sandra's maiden name is Pringle. Pringle Road in Nambour is named after her family.

Two days off a year

It was in Diddillibah that Graham and Sandra started farming strawberries, tomatoes and a few other crops. "The work was hard with only two days off each year: Christmas day and Bathurst," said Rose of her motor sports-loving parents.

"They opened a fruit and vege shop in Mooloolaba and after many years retired, nearly broke, no house, no 7.5 acres of lush Diddillibah farm land. Just themselves and their tired bodies, moving to our house in Nambour owned by my eldest Sister, Kath."

They are now both in there 80s. "Dad is a heart attack survivor and mum has had two



strokes. Yet even after all of this they are two of the happiest people you would ever meet and their love for each other has no bounds," said Rose

In 2022 Graham was diagnosed with stage four prostate cancer and Sandra battles extreme fatigue since suffering three strokes.

"They love having us around for our monthly family lunches but, aside from that, it is difficult to convince them to leave their house even for Christmas Day. So you can imagine our surprise when some weeks ago they started dropping hints about us kids throwing them a party."

Graham said it was letters of congratulations from local and national leaders that sparked the couple's enthusiasm for a celebration.

"I hadn't checked the mailbox for about ten days so I thought I had better do it, I opened the door and there was a heap of mail," said Graham. "The first one is from Ted O'Brien, our Federal Member. The next one is from the Governer General, David Hurley. Then the Premier of Queensland, Steven Miles. Then our State Member, Robert Skelton, followed by Prime Minister Anthony Albanese. And last of

all, but by no means least, King Charles and Queen Camilla. And a week before, there was Jeannette Young, the Governor of Queensland. All offering Sandra and myself sincere congratulations on our 60th Wedding Anniversary. We were stoked."

"I guess it reassured them that this milestone is indeed a huge deal," said Rose.

"It's really important to emphasise that we are open for business."

The announcement that Majestic Cinemas had gone into administration prompted calls of "use it or lose it" by some concerned hinterland residents

Division 10 Councillor David Law initiated his own 'Save our Cinema' campaign, imploring people with the time and money to go to the movies at Nambour's Majestic, or to buy movie tickets for others.

"Logically, I'm thinking that the Majestic Theatre company, when it's looking to 're-structure' is going to be choosing some cinemas to keep and some to close," he said.

"Let's give them a reason to make Nambour one of the ones they keep."

He bought two tickets to Force of Nature to give away to kick off the Save Our Cinema campaign and encouraged others to do the same.

"This simple action also spreads a little community spirit around town as those who have a little spare cash can help out those who don't."

He said the cinema was an asset to the town and he was also speaking to the council's economic development team to see what could be done to help, although the building is privately owned

On social media, there were more calls to support the cinema to keep it in town.

RE/MAX Nambour property agent Scott Walters was an avid supporter. "I've personally seen about two dozen movies at this beautiful venue and it would be such a shame to see them close down. I encourage everyone where possible, if there's a movie you want to see and it's within your means to do so, take some time soon to support our local cinema," he wrote.

Movie club member Peter Filsell said Nambour was lucky to have a cinema in town. "Please support them. All four of the cinemas in there are great – all different. Undercover parking is in the building," he wrote.

"Go and see a movie before it becomes too late and we'll have to find time to drive to the coast and pay hugely for parking!"



"PEOPLE like us don't get these sort of things." That comment from a community member reminded Winston Johnston just how special it was to find himself in the Australia Day honours list.

The Sunshine Coast division five councillor and Maleny Show Society life member has been named as a recipient of the Order of Australia Medal for his service to local government and the community.

A humbled Councillor Johnston paid tribute to those he had worked with over the years to make things happen.

'The OAM, I don't look at it as something I've earned but as something everyone else has helped me to earn," he said.

"If you don't have strong support and people working with you and helping you do things, it's hard to do them yourself.

"I just want to thank the community and tell them that's it's a great honour. The way I look at it, I was just doing what I love doing.

Born and bred in Maleny, Cr Johnston community involvement began work at 15 in the ANZ bank.

But by 18, had moved into the insurance industry and, at the direction of his boss, found himself convenor of the Miss Insurance quest, which fed Queensland entrants into the Miss Australia quest.

Show Society president at 23

By 23, he was president of the Maleny Show Society and he has also been heavily involved in the Maleny Lions over the years.

"I was always very community-oriented. My mother and father always said make sure you put into the community more than you get out of it," he said.

In 1982, Cr Johnston was elected to the Landsborough Shire Council, later known as Caloundra City Council, and served three

He successfully ran for election for the Sunshine Coast Council in 2020 and has announced his intention to stand again this year.

Aside from his role as a councillor, Cr Johnston has been on the Sunshine Coast Tourism Development Board, the Landsborough-Maroochy Water Board during construction of the Baroon Pocket Dam, the Sunshine Coast University planning committee, and the Sunshine Coast Hospital Board.

He said he loved serving the community and getting thing done.

Bittersweet history:

Museum to unveil updated book on the locomotives that drove sugar industry

ON Saturday February 24 mayoral candidate Rosanna Natoli will launch the Nambour Museum's book, Locomotives of the Moreton Central Sugar Mill by Clive Plater OAM. The book has been published in the wake of the 20th anniversary, last December, of the mill's closure in 2003.


This is an updated and much expanded second edition of one launched in 2013 by then-Governor Penelope Wensley AC for the 10th anniversary.

It contains many never before published photos from Clive's family collection and fellow light railway enthusiasts. The book is no longer just about the locomotives but now includes sections about some of the major infrastructure associated with getting the sugar cane to the mill. The history and loss of the heritage listed lift span tramway bridge over the Maroochy River in the February 2022 flood is well presented.

As with the first edition 10 years ago the book is dedicated to Edgar Plater, Clive's father. Edgar worked at the mill for 51 years on the locos and tramlines. Following his retirement in 1981 he maintained a keen interest as the mill's honorary historian. His diaries relating to the tramlines and bridges from 1960 to 1981 were still being used for reference by mill staff 20 years after he retired.

These diaries that are in Clive's custodianship have also helped with material for this book. Clive says his father just outlasted the mill by a couple of months, passing away in February 2004. Hence the choice of February 2024 for this book launch.

The books will be on sale at the Nambour Museum for \$15 each with all proceeds to the



museum. Purchase a book on the Launch Day and receive one free adult admission to the museum.

The Launch is scheduled for 1pm for invited guests but the general public are most welcome to come along during our special extended hours of 10am to 4pm.





100 years of faith, unity:

Sacred Heart Maleny marks Centenary 1924-2024

ALENY celebrated a remarkable milestone on Sunday February 4 as the Sacred Heart Catholic Church commemorated its centenary.

Parishioners, past and present, and members of the wider community filled the church to overflowing.

The Mass was celebrated by Archbishop Mark Coleridge, Archbishop of Brisbane. State and local members of government, people of other faiths and of the Maleny community were all welcomed by Vince Carbery who, with his family, became parishioners in 1940. Vince also had the honour of performing this same welcome nearly 50 years ago when he welcomed visitors to the opening of that second church.

The Archbishop spoke with great feeling, yet realism, about his hope for the life of the church of the future because of small rural communities like Maleny and its self-reliance and generosity of spirit.

In 1924 the Ave Maria, a traditional Latin hymn to Mary, was sung at the opening. On Sunday it was once again sung with great feeling by Margaret Taylor, Maleny's wellknown operatic singer.

All moved to the Pat Daley Centre for refreshments donated by Holy Cross Funerals and served during the morning by Maleny CWA and Maleny Rotary.

A cake cutting followed and 'memorabilia' was sealed in a time capsule for opening in 25 years. More than 20 people worked on the centenary committee and many more assisted generously over the four months of preparation.

Gratefully refreshed visitors were then treated to a presentation of the history of the Maleny Catholic Church. Liz Caffery held her large audience spellbound with a history of



Maleny from the Jinibara people of the Range up to the 1870s and the opening of the first Maleny church in 1924.

The Heart on the Hill

The morning ended with the launch of the book by Jack Wilcox AM - The Heart on the Hill on which four members of the History Group had been working for many months (Liz Caffery, Anne Minter, Vince Carbery and Judy Berlak).

Liz Caffery, the author of the book, explains: "As I began to explore their beginnings, I realised that this self-reliant little

community, cloistered amongst the green hills, cherished a strong pride in its identity... the people were committed, communal and caring. In the book, I wanted to know not only how that spirit evolved but why it has endured for more than 100 years. This became the narrative of 'The Heart on the Hill...'

Actually, Council should be praised for their work regarding homelessness

I read with interest your article 'Father of eight enters contest for Division 10' (Gazette, January 24). As a community worker working directly 'on the ground' with many people experiencing homelessness, including those who are sleeping rough on the street, I do not feel this story was a valid reflection of efforts made by Council, and in particular Councillor David Law in relation to this issue.

As part of my role I also work with Council

As part of my role I also work with Council on their responses to the housing and homeless situation. While we all share the frustration of Council and State government regulations impeding progress on housing, from my experience it is simply not true that Council is not engaged in this space.

David Law, the current Division 10 Councillor, has been a particularly strong advocate for people experiencing homelessness. David is actively engaged with local community groups and community centres working in this space, as well as meeting with, listening to and advocating for people currently experiencing homelessness. In my time as a worker in this space, I have had greater interest and interaction with David, than with any other elected representative at any level of government.

Council's Community Development team is also funding and facilitating a long-term lived experience program where people who are or have experienced homelessness are informing and educating council and other organisations on the reality of life on the streets. They humanize people experiencing homelessness, actively destignatizing this group of people, as well as giving advice on how to be a good ally.

Palmwoods January 30 traffic chaos a fiasco

What happened today (January 30) in Palmwoods should never be allowed to happen again. From about 1pm and into the evening the road flooded under the rail bridge and absolute chaos ensued.

Council and/or Police had informed the Transport and Main Roads Department at about 1pm of the flooding problem yet nothing was done until about 3.30pm when barriers were erected to stop 4WDs roaring dangerously through the flood water.

Traffic was backed back for kilometres in all directions and this was made even worse when the barriers were erected. All traffic in each direction had to use the single lane raised pedestrian way which was chaotic enough without adding in Jubilee Drive and Chevallum Road.

Police said that due to accidents and other flood issues they could not do traffic control. So why did Council or Main Roads Dept not organise traffic control?

Every time we have a weather emergency on the Coast it seems the area descends into chaos with no one taking control or responsibility.

I understand Council has an Emergency Hub so why did they not organise assistance?

Questions have to be asked why Council were not present to control the traffic flow. And Council should not reply that it was a State Government issue! Both the State Member and local councillor's phones were on

When weather disasters hit our region residents need to know who is responsible for taking charge and organising action. Until now we have not had a clue and simply muddle through. As this spot floods regularly we need to know what can be done to ensure we do not get a repeat of 30 January the next time floods close this road. Never again should we have to experience such chaos.

... Council responds ...

The following is most of a statement provided by a Council spokesperson:

The safety of our community and staff is our number one priority. At times, roads may be closed due to flooding or other natural disasters, trees or power lines over roads, or landsline

QPS, TMR and Council continue to work together to manage road closures and provide traffic control across the Sunshine Coast.

Regional weather conditions and accessibility to sites can also be hampered by severe weather conditions and our ability to get staff and crews safely to the sites.

Crews are dispatched on a triage system, based on the highest needs, as well as available resources and to ensure the safety of the public and respondents. Prior to roads being closed to traffic, a site inspection is required. The road closure information is as accurate as possible at the time it is entered. However, as conditions change quickly, this information should be used as a guide only. Council's team lists and signs known closed Council roads as conditions and resources permit.

For the joy of gliding

I recently spent a glorious day in the hinterland and happened to stop at Gerrard's Lookout on my way home. I was soon to be joined by a dedicated paraglider and an eager team of onlookers who gave their words of encouragement, engaged in interesting conversation and helped when the wind would not co-operate.

Dealing with conditions less than ideal, it was easy to see how a collaboration of patience and determination was needed to get off the ground. What I also observed was that it only took one person following their passion to bring together a whole group of people, who in that moment were innately connected with the same purpose, the same desire, the same sense of wonder, the same anticipation.

To everyone's delight and relief, we were able to witness the magic of flight. It reminded me of the eagles I had seen on a previous visit. While entranced in this newfound freedom, I had forgotten about my aches and pains, my own entanglements and the parts of me that felt a little broken.

What became abundantly clear was that I needed more of that – not the gliding, although this does seem like magnificent fun! Nature Watch with Don McGlusky of Diddillibah

I photographed this stately bird on one of the private jetties in the Maroochy River on Bradman Avenue.

They are found in many countries throughout the world. The Great Egret's overall plumage is white, and, for most of the year, when not breeding, the bill and facial skin are vellow. The feet are dark olive-grey or sooty black, as are the legs. During the breeding season, the bill turns mostly black and

the facial skin becomes green. Also at this time, long hair-like feathers (nuptial plumes) hang across the lower back, and the legs become pinkish-yellow at the top.

The Great Egret feeds mainly on fish. Both sexes construct the nest, which is a large platform of sticks, placed in a tree over the water. The previous years' nest may often be re-used. Both sexes also incubate the eggs and care for the young (usually two or three). Breeding season is from October to December in the south; March to May in the north. The incubation period is 28 days. The chicks are able to fly forty days after hatching.

How to make Queensland's traditional Rosella Jam

Hinterland Homesteading with Racheal Pascoe

T'S time! I am hoping you have lovely big fruit on your rosella bushes that will soon be made into delicious jam.

Harvest time

You will need a pair of sharp secateurs and a clean bucket or basket. Do the picking nice and early in the morning to beat the heat. Only pick the biggest fruit which is on the lower part of each branch. The fruit does need to be snipped off, pulling the fruit off by hand just tends to damage the branches. The fruit is called a calyx and it is ideal to pick them at 25-30mm in diameter. You can store them in the fridge until you have enough to make into jam. Snip the fruit off while being careful not to damage the tiny new fruit which is forming nearby. Work around each bush systematically. Picking rosellas is a slow process, so it is great to pick with a friend, so you can chat the time away. Once you have the fruit, rinse it in the kitchen sink with fresh water. This removes any loose plant bits, ants, petals etc.

Peeling and processing

Inside each calyx is a green seed pod which needs to be removed but kept. It is easy to peel all the red flesh off each fruit, but you will end up with red fingertips! Put the flesh in a clean bag and separate all the seed pods into another bag. Keep going until you have peeled all the

Built-in setting agent 'pectin'

How clever! Each seed pod contains pectin which is essentially the naturally occurring setting agent. There isn't any need to buy jam setter, instead you will need the juice of some lemons. One nifty thing you should know about rosellas is that they freeze really well at this stage. So if you decide you haven't got time after all to make jam this week - no worries - stock pile your peeled fruit in the freezer instead. Keep the seed pods with the fruit they came from. The amount of pectin produced is just right for that amount of fruit.

Hopefully you have been busy buying up Australian sugar and saving glass jars ready for your jam session. You will notice that rosella jam fetches a good price at the markets and smaller stores. It is because it is a labour of

love to grow, harvest and process rosellas to make the much sought after jam.

I really hope you enjoy the jam! Remember to keep picking the fruit as the growing season can wrap up really quickly once the weather turns cooler. It is possible to overwinter the plants, ie keep them until next season but I haven't ever had much luck with this myself.

Rosella Jam Recipe

Cover the seed pods with water in a saucepan, bring to the boil and return to a simmer for 2 hours, leaving saucepan lid just

Then strain through gauze or a clean chux cloth, save the liquid.

Discard the green seed pods. Put the red fleshy parts of the fruit into a large saucepan and add the liquid from the seed pods and simmer for about 30 mins.

Match how many cups of mixture you have with sugar ie adding a cup of sugar for every cup of mixture. At this time add fresh lemon

The juice of one lemon for every 4 cups of mixture. The lemon takes away some of the sweetness. Gently simmer for 20 mins or until it is jellied. A good way to check is to take a teaspoon full and put it on a ceramic plate. When it has cooled it should be thick and sticky. If not, boil for longer.

Have your clean jars ready, you can heat them on trays in the oven. Pour the jam into the jars while they are still hot, this ensures they are sterilized.

Put each jar lid on tightly and leave to cool. You will in time hear all of the tin lids pop down and seal. It is important to know that making jam is a messy affair and you really can't walk away from the kitchen while it is on

How do I know this you might be wondering? One year I took my eyes off it and walked back into a larva flow of red sticky rosella jam running over the kitchen bench and down the cupboard. Big big mess and such a waste of effort.

I think the flavour is just divine - tangy like raspberries with chunks of deep crimson fruit. It will keep in the pantry for $1\bar{2}$ months unopened and once opened should be kept in the fridge. Enjoy!





What to do about the housing crisis? Here's what our office reckons ...

Real Estate Column with RE/MAX Principal Tristan Brown

ITH the state election looming in October this year, it's very likely that the current housing crisis will headline each of the political

parties' campaigns. With this in mind I was curious as to the opinions of our industry professionals within our RE/MAX Property Sales office.

Over the course of the week I asked each agent what one particular issue they would like the State Government to address to improve the existing housing crisis. Each person was asked to provide their response regardless of their political allegiances or irrespective of which party was to win the election.

Property investment is good

Garren Reisinger (Sales Agent): "I believe that we need to change the way the government perceives investors. In recent years investors have been receiving unfair criticism for the housing shortage. Let's get back to incentivising investors as we greatly need to increase the supply of rental properties. It's important to remember that without Mum & Dad investors there would be minimal properties available for rent.

Unfortunately, it's very apparent that the government is unable and/or unwilling to supply the necessary housing. The rental price increases are driven by a lack of supply and not by investors directly."

Stamp out stamp duty

Stephanie Black (Sales Agent): "I'd like to see the stamp duty exemption increased. Currently, if the property value is less than \$500,000, you may be eligible for a full concession. This means you won't have to pay any stamp duty. This price point is significantly outdated and has not kept up with the price increases experienced over the past 3-4 years. It's a considerable increase but for it to be effective it needs to rise to either \$700,000 or \$750,000."

Maintain negative gearing

Jason Stock (Sales Agent): "It would be a disaster if the government was to remove negative gearing. We would see an influx of investors selling their properties and therefore only exacerbating the rental property shortage. The removal of negative gearing would have the opposite desired effect of what is greatly needed right now."

Streamline approvals

Scott Walters (Sales Agent): "I'd like to see the government work with local councils to streamline the process for development approvals.

approvals.
"The relevant precautions and consider-

ations must always be of the utmost importance, however currently the process is far too inefficient and time consuming.

"The timeframes given by council are very concerning and only further contribute to delays in new housing approvals. There needs to be a focus on improving this."


Reduce additional costs

Jody Chatillon (Property Management):

"I believe it would be beneficial for the government to look at reducing some of the additional costs that only get applied to investment properties. As is stands, investors pay more stamp duty, they get charged more on their Council rates, more on their mortgage, more on their insurance and they pay Land Tax. With these costs regularly on the increase, rental prices must increase to allow the investor to stay in the market, all the while for most people, wages remain stagnant."

Ideally, it would be great to see the future government involve the industry professionals, such as the REIQ and Propertyology Founder, Simon Pressley. The acknowledgment and implementation of their advice is invaluable and greatly required.



Queenslander on Western Avenue lovingly restored

This Old House: Highgrove, 210-212 Western Avenue, Montville. A column contributed by Montville History Group

IGHGROVE is a lovely, genuine 19th century Queenslander with many of Lits original features intact or lovingly restored. It has high ceilings, French windows, decorative veranda brackets, pull chain light switches, fretwork breezeway panels above the doorways, polished timber floors, VJ's throughout and casement windows with

The current colours of the cottage are wattle yellow, with prophetic purple and vivid white trims and heritage green decking. The inside has been painted a soft yellow with antique white trims, and antique white in the dining room and hallway with vivid white trims.

The house has a box roof and had originally wrap around verandas. This building style was in vogue in Queensland in the period from 1880 to 1900.

There are no details of when the house was constructed, but it is assumed to have been completed in 1886. It became known as "Highgrove" and was relocated to Western Avenue in Montville.

The land that the house currently resides on at 210-212 Western Avenue was subdivided in 1992. The farmland has had a range of crops, and there are currently still a dozen macadamia trees left surrounding the resulting one-acre plot.

The site was a great choice, with views over Lake Baroon towards Witta and North Maleny, framed by hills and the neighbours' paddock with half a dozen pet cows and two donkeys.

The house was moved on site in two sections and placed on concrete stumps

The original single skin wall is still preserved at the front of the house. The two side verandas were enclosed to provide an ensuite to each of the two bedrooms and a study and dressing room. The side and rear walls of



the property have been cladded and insulated.

At some time, before or after the move, the living room was extended onto the old veranda, and a new kitchen was added. A new veranda was added behind the living room.

The large square deck behind the kitchen was added to the rear of the property in 2008, providing a great spot to watch the sunsets over Baroon Pocket.

Recent occupants have included Garth and Christine Greenaway, who owned this home between 2002 and 2006 while trying to develop a golf course in Montville. After that it served as a holiday home to Greg and Joanne Bess from Brisbane for 12 years before again becoming home to permanent residents, Brian and Wanita Morgan.

Current owners Mike Spilsbury and Janny Spilsbury-Schakel moved here in early March 2021. They have done a large number of repairs and updates, taking away modern additions where possible, as well as replacing the dated kitchen and bathrooms. The new kitchen and bathrooms with their walk-in showers are sympathetic to this Queenslander, simple with clean lines while also practical, using the latest materials.

The focus is now on the garden, which will be a project for many years to come.

'Inviting' pools can become a trap for our overheated wildlife

N the extreme heat we have been experiencing, everything is drawn to water. But this can be perilous for our wildlife. Bandicoots, pictured, possums, koalas, birds and reptiles are just some of those trapped and often drowning in pools. They too want to cool down or may need a drink of water.

Unfortunately, swimming pools are inviting as a water source for animals, native and domestic. We don't consider what will happen if they go into the water and can't get out again. Now being recognized as a major problem, people have devised some ingenious methods of preventing animals from drowning in backyard swimming pools. Floating mats, or rafts made from pool noodles can be secured to a tethering point. It is important to ensure that whatever is used as a tether is not also a tripwire for those walking or running around

the pool. There are a number of commercial prod-



ucts now available such as Frog Logs. You can simply install one or more of these around side of the pool. The more the merrier! Positioning of the "safety ramps" is important. It is always best to place any floating, tethered device relative to where the water is flowing. Pools circulate water towards the skimmer basket so if positioned correctly the animal will be carried towards the safety 'ramp'. To find the best spot, throw something light into the water and watch where it ends up. Always make sure the mat is firmly up against the pool wall so the animal can climb out easily.


