Dulong locals call for clarity on quarry

A growing number of Blackall range locals and community groups are concerned about the potential impacts of Sunshine Coast Council plans to lease the Dulong Quarry to a commercial operator by mid-year.

Council resolved at its ordinary meeting on 8 December 2022 to contract its Dulong and Image Flat quarry business and operating sites to a private operator by 30 June 2023. It's aiming for a 10-year lease with 2 x 2 year options. It plans to release Expression of Interest packages later this month, with submissions due 12 weeks later in April. Council's evaluation process will be closed.

Worried residents have formed the Dulong Quarry Action Group, with 50 people from the immediate area attending the group's first public meeting at Kureelpa Hall on Saturday, and additional apologies and concerns flowing in by email. Dulong resident and group spokesperson, Anne Veivers, says people are frustrated there's been no community engagement and an inadequate amount of clear communication from Council on the matter.

"People in our area only heard of the plans thanks to a local community organisation sharing the news initially, and neighbours

spreading the word from there," Anne said. The quarry currently operates around 12 weeks per year, with trucks transporting material along Sherwell Road and the busy Mapleton to Nambour Road in the first instance.

"Operations are permitted at the quarry six days a week between 6am and 6pm, but we've heard there's a possibility of 24-7 operations, so we're fearful of how big and busy the Dulong Quarry could become in private hands, right on our doorstep.

"We believe the commercial operator will be to page 2

Father Richard retires after 50 years service to Anglican Church

SUNDAY January 29 will be a sad day for the parish of St Augustine's Palmwoods as they farewell their much loved priest-in-charge Father Richard Gowty and his wife Margie.

Fr Richard had retired from the parish of St Mark's Buderim in 2012 and was planning a life of golf, golf and more golf, though family, friends, church life and of course the Geelong Cats were hugely important.

This was not to be and he was persuaded to accept the position as priest in charge of St Augustines in 2013. This was only a part time position, but he and Margie quickly became an integral part of the loving and caring church family and many happy, busy and fulfilling years followed.

Margie took over the position as manager of St Augustine's Op Shop after retiring from teaching at Matthew Flinders and, like her husband, loved playing an active part in the life of the church and the wider community.

"The Op Shop has been so much a part of my life and it has been wonderful to be part of the church in the community this way," says Margie.

The people of Palmwoods have strongly supported the shop. It has been a joy to be involved in the lives of so many people. I can't tell you how grateful I am for this rich experience."

Fr Richard was ordained priest in St John's Cathedral Brisbane on St Andrew's Day 1972, and so his retirement comes after 50 years of service as a priest.

Significantly, a wonderful service to give thanks for his ministry was held in the cathedral on November 30 last year, with people from past parishes attending.

Fr Richard's first appointment was as a curate in Toowoomba then he served in Gatton, Indooroopilly and Buderim. In between there were stints in the UK and Austin, Texas, as well as many chaplaincies in Germany, Italy and Spain.

The service on January 29 will bring to an end a lifetime of faithful and com-• To page 3

bound to work within all current operational restrictions, but we're unclear on those details, and despite spending weeks seeking information from Council to address our apprehensions, nothing has yet been provided.

"People have expressed valid concerns about dust and associated health impacts, noise, road damage, road safety, environmental impacts to nearby waterways and native animals, negative effects on property prices and lifestyle and more.

"Blasts are currently limited to two times per year, but we don't know if that will continue or what the parameters on those blasts will be going forwards.

"We believe the minimum extraction amount will be 50,000 tonnes of material per annum, but we're not aware of any upper limits. So, for all we know, it could increase to a million tonnes with hundreds of truck movements per day.

"We support economic growth for the broader region, but not at our expense as ratepayers, residents, business owners and road users, and certainly not at the expense of this special and beautiful area we call home.

"Our community shares a strong sense of stewardship and responsibility for protecting our local natural environment as well as each other, and we think it's reasonable to expect Council to do the same.

"It's beyond time we got the consideration and answers from Council we deserve."

Popular chemist retires after 40 years in profession

POPULAR Nambour Pharmacist Tim Logan is retiring after four decades helping sick people with their medical needs.

Mr Logan will spend his last day at Nambour Amcal in the Plaza this Friday (January 20) after 28 years in town and 40 years in pharmacy.

Mr Logan, who is one of three partners in the business, said he had enjoyed being able to help people from all walks of life over the years.

"It's a profession where you can make a big difference to people's lives," he said. "Where you can help them out when they're in vulnerable positions, when they're very unwell. People recognize that pharmacists are a good point to turn to for advice and that's what we try and provide at Amcal.

"One abiding memory I have was of a guy who came in who was all sweaty and clammy and complaining of an upset tummy. My training told me that some of those symptoms could be associated with heart attacks. So I recommended that he go up to casualty. And sure enough he was suffering a heart attack. And he came back a few weeks later to thank me. And that was very rewarding and there have been many rewarding episodes over the years.

"When I first started we used typewriters and we hand wrote repeats and we had to put in codes for medicines to send off to the government to get paid for the PBS (Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme) subsidy.

"And now everything is computers and laser printers and instant access to Centrelink records to make sure someone's entitled to a concession. So I think it's much better nowadays."

Mr Logan was heavily involved with the Pharmacy Guild over a number of years where he became state president and also acted on several occasions as the national president.

He said he would consider revisiting his profession occasionally.

"After I have some time off I might do little sessions here and there. I might still do vaccine clinics and that sort of thing, depending on whether my colleagues or any other mates I know need a hand. But I'm certainly looking forward to having a rest after so long."



Call for relaxation of temporary housing laws in light of crisis

THE housing crisis on the Sunshine Coast does not look like it will improve any time soon. Under the circumstances, Woombye resident Helen Andrew says its wrong that many residents who are having to resort to affordable accommodation like caravans and tiny homes remain at risk of eviction by the Council.

The Sunshine Coast's subordinate local law 'Establishment or Occupation of a Temporary Home' currently restricts the time frame to park to no more than four weeks in a 52-week period without a permit. A permit costs \$514.

While Council staff do not actively pursue those breaking this law, they will act on it if they receive a complaint.

This happened to Ms Andrew when she and her husband Ron allowed Western Australia resident Darlene to park her caravan on their land. Darlene had not been able to return to WA during border closures in 2020.

"A neighbour complained to the Council, they got in touch, and ultimately, Darlene was given the notice to vacate," she said.

"We were shocked and disgusted. We asked for compassion, given the circumstances, but it didn't make a difference.

"Unless this law is changed or suspended, no one living in caravans, buses or tiny homes has any security or certainty."

The situation prompted Helen to spearhead a campaign to suspend this local law until the new town plan is implemented.

"A short email from people can help provide more security for people choosing different permanent housing options," she said.

"I sent a very personal email to (Council CEO) Emma (Thomas) and received a cut-and-paste, tick-and-flick reply explaining the local law with instructions on how to apply for a permit, which costs \$514," Ms Andrew said.

"This reply did not address my concerns, and I will ask for a response that addresses my concerns as a landowner who wants to help people during this housing crisis."

Ms Andrew also hopes the new town plan recognises that these housing solutions are no longer viable temporary housing options but permanent housing choices.

Tiny home advocate from Polkadot Community Inc, Jimmy Hirst, said suspending this law would enable the many local people living on a knife's edge to enjoy stability and breathe a sigh of relief.

"It also allows the region to create a housing model which supports more affordable living and enables our significant elderly and retiring population to age in place. It also leads to better outcomes which improve mental health, connection and wellness, and lead to a more meaningful way of life.

"Land sharing and sharing goods in small communities is a significant win-win for residents and local regions alike with economic, environmental and social benefits," he said.

"I'd be proud to see the Sunshine Coast Council showing leadership in genuinely taking care of the needs of its citizens like so many other councils in Australia are doing."

"The entire state of NSW has taken action to respond to clear and urgent community needs to relax the rules on temporary housing to alleviate the brutality of escalating property values until better solutions can be found, so it's time for Queensland and the Sunshine Coast to catch up."

Response from Council

REPLYING to Ms Andrew, *see article left*, Sunshine Coast Council says it appreciates that the recent rapid increases in the cost of owning or renting a home on the Sunshine Coast has been causing some people to consider moving into temporary accommodation to remain on the Coast.

It says the current local law for a temporary home allows for a person to set up temporary accommodation on a property for up to four weeks without an approval and, depending on the type of temporary home proposed, allows approval to be obtained for the placement of a temporary home on a property for up to 18 months. By requiring approval to be obtained, Council says it is able to appropriately manage any amenity and health issues that might arise with a temporary home. Council looks particularly at such matters as the location and placement of the temporary home and the management of waste and grey water produced.

Recent changes have been applied to the Planning Regulation 2017 to remove the requirement for the occupant(s) of a secondary dwelling to be a part of the household occupying the primary dwelling on the property. Council says this change has the potential to make more accommodation options available.

Happy New Year, and my 2023 Priorities

There are good reasons why people flocked to the Sunshine Coast over this Christmas period – we are a lifestyle capital and we locals enjoy the world's most enviable way of life.

As we enter 2023, I reaffirm a pledge I made in my maiden speech in 2016: "to be Sunshine Coast's man in Canberra and not Canberra's man on the Sunshine Coast". My loyalty lies at home and I'll continue fighting for our region.

This year, I want to see tangible outcomes where I have secured funding, including: completion of the Maroochydore Road / Mons Road interchanges of the Bruce Highway (over \$300M); ramping up of Phase One of the North Coast Rail Line (over \$500M), and; starting work on the Mooloolah River Interchange on the Sunshine Motorway (over \$300M).

These aren't my only priorities, of course, but they're the big ticket ones.

This project will involve supply & installation of a new galvanised posts; supply & installation of a new shade sail and new turf if required.



Maleny low marker cards rare double to end 2022

MALENY golfer Garth Bailo scored a rare albatross in competition last November at Maleny Golf Club in Queensland's Sunshine Coast Hinterland and then aced the par 3, 17th a few weeks later to cap a memorable 2022 golfing year! A scratch marker, Garth, 39, is

a former club champion at both Maleny and nearby Beerwah golf clubs and once helped legendary Aussie larrikin test cricketer Doug Walters try to improve his golf drive off the front foot during a local visit in 2010.

After teeing off on Saturday November 12, from the Stone markers on the 456m dogleg left par 5 second, Garth's prodigious 320m drive left him with just an 8 iron approach shot in from about 135m which hunted down the pin with laser-like precision to find the cup.

Then, during the last Monthly Medal competition round of the year on December 31, Garth jarred his tee shot with that same 8 iron from the back markers on the tricky 147m par 3, 17th.

The albatross was a first for Garth and while he had two previous Aces

up his sleeve – the first at the age of 10 with his father Rob's old cut down 4 wood - neither was during a competition.

The odds of scoring an albatross are estimated to be as great as 6 million to 1 so it's a rare feat indeed - one achieved by just a few hundred golfers around the world each year, compared to 128,000-odd aces.

According to former senior USGA director and Golf Digest contributing editor Dean Knuth, an albatross requires "two great shots" by a player with both "length and ability", and

Garth's game ticks both boxes admirably.

"Only a small percentage of golfers, less than 10 percent, ever reach a par 5 in two," Knuth notes in a reference post on the PGA's web site. "That means 90 percent of golfers don't have a chance of making one."

In fact, most golfers have a better chance of being struck by lightning than making an albatross.



Some alarming insights into our rail system

THE Queensland Competition Authority's (QCA) charter is simple: "We regulate the prices and

terms of access for monopoly infrastructure in Queensland".

I came across a document about the Queensland Rail (QR) network and rail-freight operator, Aurizon Network.

Both organizations operate as a monopoly, meaning there's no competition for their services, and as such come under the auspices of the QCA.

Aurizon Network is Australia's largest rail freight operator and is Australia's largest coal export rail network, here in Queensland.

Îts original name was Pacific National and it was formerly owned by the Queensland Government, who sold it off in 2010.

I will never understand why states sell off income-producing assets for a short term gain, but I digress.

QR's network involves more than 6600km of track in Queensland and, since 2010, no longer operates freight services.

It does allow access to 'below-rail services.' These comprise the tracks and associated infrastructure such as signalling.

In March 2019, QR was given the opportunity to respond to a QCA draft recommendation that wanted to make a 'declaration' over parts of the QR network. A declaration would allow third-party access to the network, thus providing an opportunity for competition. As QR rightly made out in their response, passenger transport services are state government subsidised so the chances of competition are next to none.

I won't go into the detailed specifics today on their entire argument with the QCA, as it is a complex mix of networks, freight options and intermodal accesses, totalling some 770 pages.

Their 11 March responses did provide some interesting and alarming insights into our rail system in Queensland.

Here are some facts and statements on the state of rail play in Queensland – it's not good news as rail is being left behind in the funding stakes compared to roads – and that comes at great cost to all of us.

• p15. Queensland Rail faces intense and increasing competition from road operators. • p26. The competition posed to rail in the

transportation of freight by road operators has intensified in recent years given significant improvements in road vehicle productivity and substantial investment in road networks, a trend which is set to continue. Accordingly, over the last decade, Queensland Rail has seen freight traditionally moved by rail switch to road transport.

• p27. Rail suffers a range of challenges compared to road freight. These were summarised in the 2015 Ranbury Report:

- Transit Time: Even if rail could match road on the line-haul transit time (which it does not), rail cannot match door-door transit time, due to the Pick Up and Delivery (PUD) legs at each end, and the extra rail terminal times (including waiting for loading/unloading, waiting for the train departure time slot, and the activities post-train arrival). This is exacerbated by the limitations on train scheduling imposed by sharing track with passenger services (in Sydney and Brisbane), and the constraints of single track corridors.

We well know the limitations of single track corridors that have been strangling our region (and freight) for decades.

Fascinating puggles can struggle in the heat

I am sure there is a logical reason in nature for echidna young to emerge from their burrows in the heat of summer.

Nevertheless, for a native animal that is prone to heat stress, it seems very contradictory. A puggle burrow hovers around a cool 20 degrees, and adult echidnas do their foraging for termites and such in the cool of the night.

Every year, from January on, our Hotline receives calls regarding young echidnas that have left their burrows. They may have been accidentally excavated or it may have been time for them to emerge. They are totally independent, but do not always cope well with the challenges of the outside world.

This year, one young echidna came into care when found looking unwell. It was under some trees, with flies around it, which was an indication of an infected wound above the tail. Xrays fortunately showed no fractures but the wound would need care. WILVOS to the rescue!

In the final stages of being dependent on their mother coming to the burrow to feed them, these visits may be up to ten days apart. This is why it is so important not to relocate echidnas. There may be a young in a burrow nearby that would die without that sustenance. Females only form a pouch when it is time to lay the egg into the pouch. They don't have teats, but a milk 'patch' that the puggle will nuzzle on. Absolutely unique, fascinating creatures.

They love water, are actually quite strong swimmers, and love to take a bath. When coming into care they always utilize a heavy shallow dish of fresh water when given the chance. One of my favourite native animals.

Old bridge to make way for new-look interchange

DEMOLITION of the original eastbound bridge connecting Nambour to Maroochydore over the Bruce Highway is set to start on January 20 marking a significant Bruce Highway milestone.

The original two-lane concrete bridge was built in 1990 as part of the Nambour Bypass, and has since been replaced by a new, two-span one that will carry four lanes of traffic, including active transport facilities for bike riders and pedestrians.

From 7pm on Friday 20 January until 5am on Monday 23 January 2023, weather and construction conditions permitting, construction crews will work continuously to demolish the old bridge.

The old bridge consists of one large concrete structure, which sits above four lanes of the Bruce Highway traffic.

To maintain the safety of motorists during the demolition, all Bruce Highway traffic will be detoured through the Maroochydore Road interchange.

Motorists are advised to expect significant delays at the Maroochydore Road interchange and encouraged to avoid the area if possible. Extra time should be allowed for journeys.

Transport and Main Roads says it appreciates roadworks can be frustrating for surrounding

residents and businesses and every effort will be made to minimise the impacts of the demolition on the community.

In the lead-up to the weekend works, traffic travelling from Maroochydore Road to Nambour Connection Road has been realigned onto the newly upgraded, westbound bridge to enable the demolition to take place.

The project is expected to be completed in mid 2023 (weather and construction conditions permitting).

It is estimated to support an average of 380 direct jobs over the life of the project.


