# Nambour's oldest Dad turns 103!

FREDERICK Sandell has accomplished a lot over his 103 years of life but his proudest achieve ment remains his family.

Born at Lithgow, New South Wales, on January 15, 1921, Fred's first job was at the steel works in Port Kembla as a junior clerk, but just three months later he became a commercial

His job would take him around the country, with his first major appointment as an accountant at South Portland Cement at Berrima, a subsidiary of BHP.

In 1953 he accepted a position as works secretary at Mount Morgan Mine.

In March 1954 he met his future wife Jean at the Criterion Hotel on the day the Queen and Prince Phillip came to Rockhampton.

The Sandells lived at Mount Morgan until 1969, when Fred took on a job at Brambles Industries in Sydney.

But the yearning for Central Queensland was too strong and in 1973 he returned to Rockhampton, becoming finance manager and secretary of Capricornia Newspapers, where he worked until his retirement in July 1988.

In a stark change from his accounting years, Fred and his wife Jean retired to the family



# MPs fly flag for pride in Australia Day

WITH Australia Day under pressure from governments, corporate Australia and local councils, Member for Fairfax Ted O'Brien has launched a response by supplying free Australia Day merchandise to his electorate.

Designed with the message "Proud of our Country" and "Proud of our Flag", complimentary bumper stickers are being offered by Mr O'Brien to his constituents as part of his call to Australians to celebrate Australia Day with pride and patriotism on January 26.

The Federal MP said he was fighting back against controversial moves to silence or cancel Australia Day. Locally, Mr O'Brien criticised Sunshine Coast Council after its decision to re-schedule and re-brand its annual Australia Day Awards ceremony, which have traditionally taken place on January 26. "Where was the public consultation in my own community about this decision?" asked Mr O'Brien saying Council removed the Australia Day awards "on the quiet".

The Sunshine Coast Council has replaced its Australia Day Awards ceremony with a community awards ceremony dubbed the "Biosphere Community Awards", which will be held in mid-June.

A council spokesman said the change "provided an opportunity to align with and promote our unique global Biosphere status".

"Sunshine Coast Council continues to support Australia Day and is a proud host of the Australia Day Citizenship Ceremony, attended by more than 250 recipients and their guests annually," the spokesperson said.

"I stand against any attempt to cancel or silence Australian patriotism," said Mr O'Brien.

"Australia Day is meant to be a day of unity, to celebrate our liberal democracy, our values of freedom and equality, and to give thanks to our 'way of life' which is the envy of the world.

"At least citizenship ceremonies are set to proceed here on the Coast, but I'm astounded that councils elsewhere have gone even further by denying new Australians the opportunity to



become citizens on our national day.

"I'm calling on all proud Australians to not only celebrate this Australia Day but to do so with positivity and optimism.

"It's why I'm providing Australia Day merchandise," said Mr O'Brien. "I refuse to let the anti-Australian brigade ruin Australia Day and so let's respond to their woke negativity with expressions of pride and patriotism."

# Member for Fisher backs pride in Australia

MEANWHILE, Federal Member for Fisher Andrew Wallace encouraged his electorate to "Sign, Show, and Share" their pride in the nation on January 26.

# Father of eight enters contest for Division 10

A NAVY veteran and advocate for the homeless will take on sitting councillor for division 10 David Law at the March local government election.

Camillo Primavera is so far the only person to challenge Mr Law to represent the division, which stretches from Nambour and Yandina up to Mapleton and out to Kenilworth.

Mr Primavera, of Nambour, said he had decided to run for council after being incensed by the council's lack of action on the housing criss.

He said the a Housing and Homelessness Action Plan passed by the council seemed to be no more than a piece of paper that had not been put into action.

He has been involved in trying to free up unoccupied buildings and land for occupation and said he would continue trying to help in

the same practical vein if elected.

He flagged that he had little time for council regulations which limit occupation of a tiny home or caravan on private property to four weeks without a permit.

"I will continue to look for properties and land that is quite suitable for tiny houses without the b.....t playing out between the council and the Planning Act when its entirely possible," he said.

Prior to moving to the Sunshine Coast, Mr Primavera was founder and director of a charity in Maryborough, REST (Recovery, Education Services and Training, for homeless families and children.

He described homelessness as a humanitarian crisis and said solutions were needed now.

Aside from homelessness, he is standing on issues including youth crime, sustainable development, transparency in local government.

He is also interested in the rising cost of living and wants a review of the council's finances and a close look at rate increases.

Mr Primavera, a father of eight and grandfather of 12, was a nurse in the navy and medic in the army reserve before moving to Queensland Health, where he worked as a nurse manager at a hospital. He also trained as a naturopath.

A justice of the peace for 30 years, he has a dislike for injustice and an interest in helping out where he sees need in the community.

"I like to help people," he said.

# 'I want to be the mayor that listens'

COMMUNITY, business and sporting identity Ashley "Tugboat" Robinson has vowed to listen and look first before making promises about what he will do if elected mayor.

The former publican, founder of the Island Charity Swim, and Sunshine Coast Rugby League life member has thrown his hat in the ring for the position held by Mark Jamieson for the past 12 years.

If elected, Mr Robinson plans to get himself out to communiites in the region so that residents can speak directly with him.

"I want to be the mayor that listens. What I want to do is go out in the first 12 months and have Meet the Mayor mornings where people come and tell me what the council is doing right and what the council is doing wrong and what things need fixing. That's one thing I will promise," he said.

Mr Robinson, of Wurtulla, a married father of two and grandfather, is about to begin two months leave from his job as development manager of the Alexandra Headland Surf Life Saving Club to concentrate on campaigning.

He has committed to a full review of the council's financials if elected and wants to look at whether or not rate rises are necessary.

"I don't want to make any promises about anything to anyone until I look at the financial situation," he said. "The first thing you do when you go into a new business is have a look at the P&L (profit and loss statement) and work out where you're spending money and what you've got to spend," he said.

A former Nambour High student who grew up on a pineapple farm, Mr Robinson said the hinterland would be treated fairly if he was mayor. "I grew up at Eudlo. Dad grew up at Mossy Bank, Mum grew up at Palmwoods, my grandfather had a bootmaking shop at Palmwoods. "I love the hinterland and I know how frustrated people in the hinterland get when they see money being spent at Mooloolaba.

"I want to be a mayor for the whole of the Sunshine Coast. I'm not going to make any promises about sealing roads until I've looked at the financial situation but I'm certainly going to make sure the hinterland gets its share of funding and infrastructure," he said.

Mr Robinson said cost of living, user-friendly public transport, and balancing population growth with lifestyle and amenity were high on his list of priorities.

"The population is coming. We've just got to figure out what's the most sustainable way to accommodate them and that keeps our lifestyle and amenity as good as it can be.

"I think everybody agrees that the next four to eight years are critical as to which way we're going to go."

Mr Robinson's working life has been spent mostly in hospitality but his public profile has grown in line with his community involve-

He was manager of the landmark Mooloolaba Hotel in the 1990s before moving into management with two successive companies that had stables of several hotels and taverns, one of which had a charity foundation, through which he coordinated the building of an orphanage in India.

He has invested much of his spare time in rugby league, particularly as chairman of the

Sunshine Coast Falcons for the past 11 years, and in the Island Charity Swim, which has raised \$2 million for Sunshine Coast special schools over more than 20 years.

An animal lover, he has also supported animal welfare causes with his wife, Sheila.

#### Knack for leadership

Mr Robinson said the success of his projects had been down to the support of others but admitted he had a knack for pulling a team together.

That is actually one thing I have got – I can get people rowing the boat the same way." He revealed he had previously considered running for council and put it back on his agenda when Mark Jamieson announced he

would not run again in March. "When the subject came up, I had a bit of a look at it. I thought about running the first time Mark Jamieson ran but I realised their campaign would be too big and my wife didn't think it was a good idea," he said.

"I've always been interested in council and the strategies and the decisions they make.

"I thought, 'Here's an opportunity that's come at the right time for me. I'm going to put my hand up and see how I go,' and my wife, Sheila, was quite supportive. She said: 'Give it a go. You're not going to die wondering'."

# The Coast is entering a critical stage, says mayoral candidate

MAYORAL candidate Min Swan has described feeling a "responsibility" as a long-term Sunshine Coast resident to run for the region's top job.

The businesswoman has joined Montville's Wayne Parcell, community identity Ashley Robinson, television presenter Rosanna Natoli, sitting councillor Jason O'Pray, and council critic Michael Burgess in nominating to fill the vacancy which will be left by Mark Jamieson, who has announced he will step down at the March local government elections.

"I'm a long-time Sunshine Coast local – 30 years – and I believe that the next four years, in particular, but the next four, eight, 12 years, are critical to the future of the Sunshine Coast," Ms Swan said.

"When I was watching the rumours of who was going to nominate, and as they were nominating, I felt I had a responsibility to put myself out there.

#### **Corporate experience**

"I have all of the corporate experience and the small business experience, I believe, to manage the board – the councillors."

"It wasn't something on my radar. It wasn't something I intended to do. But we really need the next four years to be in the hands of a rational, level-headed person who understands the views of all residents."

Ms Swan, of Buderim, has run her own events management company, White House International, for the past 15 years and chairs the Sunshine Coast Business Women's Network



Min Swan said a key to her successful strategic work had been setting a vision and bringing people along with change.

The business handles company launches, conferences, council functions, mayoral balls, as well as "back-end" operations for eight chambers of commerce from Cooroy, in the Noosa shire, south to Kawana.

Originally from Bendigo, Victoria, Ms Swan moved with her parents to the Sunshine Coast when she was 16 and became vice-captain at Maroochydore High a year later.

She was running a financial planning firm with her then-husband at 21 and after growing that business, was approached to handle strategic planning for a corporate organisation.

#### Vision, consultation the keys

Ms Swan said a key to her successful strategic work had been setting a vision and bringing people along with change.

She hoped to do the same on the Sunshine Coast but was aware people felt they were not being heard.

"I don't have any ideas about why they aren't being heard but I would make it a priority to understand that more," she said

"For example, in the hinterland, I can see the enormous opportunities that particularly the

Range has. It's really about bringing everyone on board and making sure they feel heard."

Ms Swan emphasised her experience in small and big business and dealings with businesses and organisations on the Coast would stand her in good stead as mayor.

"I know what it's like to do 4am wages, to start in a corporation and draw up a strategy and go to meetings and talk to the CEO, and I can talk to the man in the street."

## Breadth and depth of knowledge

"I am a long-term local with a breadth and depth of knowledge across the Sunshine Coast."

Ms Swan said her staff and clients were supportive of her mayoral intentions and options were in place should she be successful on election day.

A mum of two children aged 10 and six, she said she had support, particularly from her parents, and was confident she could manage the role of mayor without affecting her children

"It's that old adage: if you want to get a job done, ask a busy person," she said.

# **Experienced** councillor risks role for top job

SITTING councillor Jason O'Pray says he is the right person for the job of mayor of the Sunshine Coast.

Mr O'Pray is the only present or past councillor who has so far raised their hand for the mayor's seat, which Mark Jamieson has announced he will not recontest at the March local government election.

Mr O'Pray said he was ready for the job and could start the next day.

"I'm experienced, I'm the right age – I'm 50. I'm fit and healthy. And I've got 12 years experience - 12 years on the council," he said.

The division eight councillor has held the economic development portfolio, which includes tourism, aviation and digital services for the duration of his council career said it was time for him to "step up".

His campaign is based on five pillars: protecting the Sunshine Coast lifestyle, the economy, community and community services, environment and sustainability, and infrastructure.

#### Sustainable growth

He said one of his priorities would be managing growth in a sustainable way.

"What we need to do is make plans in the next few years, with our population set to go to 500,000 by 2041. That's a target set by the state government.

"That's a terrific change and we need to make sure we're on top of that and our planning scheme is the most important element of

Mr O'Pray voted against the controversial Sekesui development proposal for Yaroomba which was approved by a majority of councillors, and eventually, a court, despite not

#### **Hinterland Portfolio**

He said he was also keen to establish a hinterland portfolio which he envisaged would be overseen by two divisional councillors and the mayor.

Mr O'Pray said he also wanted to extend work undertaken at the North Shore Sports Complex in his division to provide female team rooms and change rooms for female athletes and umpires to sports facilities in the hinter-

"The Matilda effect is happening, not just in soccer. We are seeing increased female participation across all sorts of sports - AFL, hockey, surf life saving."

Having achieved success with about 10 viewing decks along the coastline in his division, he also wants to make funds available for "lifestyle infrastructure" such as viewing decks in the hinterland.

Across the region, he wants to establish a cybersecurity strategy, trial kerbside rubbish collections, and look into the prospect of soft plastic recycling at the council's new recycling facility, just off the highway at Bli Bli, and is keen to introduce a pensioner discount for pet

Mr O'Pray said he talked to his daughters, aged 15 and 19, before making the final decision to run for mayor.

"There's the good, the bad and the ugly with mayor, a lot of ugly. My girls have to be ready for that. That's important."

#### 'All or nothing. It's a risk'

Mayoral candidates cannot run for election as councilors at the same time which means that if Mr O'Pray's tilt at the top job is unsuccessful, he will no longer be on the council.

"It's an all or nothing situation. It's a risk. It does require a bit of courage," he said.

"It does require the okay from the family because I do step out of the comfort zone to be mayor but I've had amazing support from the small business community and the tourism industry. It's quite humbling," he said.

# More bad weather, same bad road: MP

THE weather has again dished it out to Queensland this summer with cyclones, storms and flooding rains.

Member for Glass House Andrew Powell has reminded the new Minister for Main Roads there is work still needed to repair roads damaged from similar events nearly two years ago.

In early 2022, a drain on Kilcoy-Beerwah Road at Cedarton failed and half the road slipped away.

Rightly, one lane was closed and traffic lights installed to allow regulated usage of the road.

However, this was only ever intended to be a band-aid fix until design and construction work could properly – and safely – mend the road.

"It's been 686 days of locals, tourists and business operators having to sit at the lone traffic light on Kilcoy-Beerwah Road and there doesn't seem to be a start, let alone an end, in sight for the roadworks," said Mr Powell.

"I understand that there are more immediate priorities following the recent cyclone and storms, but how much longer are Hinterland locals going to be asked to wait?"

When asked on several occasions last year, the Department of Transport and Main Roads stated that rectification works will require multiple design elements due to the steep embankment failure and the high risk rating the site received during the post-flood inspec-

They've also mentioned that significant work has already been undertaken to complete detailed damage assessments and site investigations, but they cannot confirm the timing for when a contract for construction will be announced and works commenced.

"I have written to the new Minister for Main Roads to remind him of the long overdue repairs. Because from where I stand the community have just been abandoned," said Mr Powell.





# Our wealth and prosperity hinge on exports: candidate

#### by Janine Hill

A CANDIDATE for the Sunshine Coast mayor's position says the Sunshine Coast must lift its exports to have a bright future.

Michael Burgess, a retired businessman with an interest in sustainability, said exports were essential for wealth, and prosperity was vital for the region's future.

"Prosperity is always based on wealth. You don't have a prosperous place that does not export," he said.

## Three policy thrusts

Mr Burgess is running a campaign with three main policy focuses: regeneration of the environment, protection of the local lifestyle, and the creation of the prosperity which he said was necessary to support both of those.

"There is little point in having short prosperity that does not allow for people to enjoy the lifestyle they wish in an environment that is just not being destroyed, but is getting better," he said in a background statement.

Mr Burgess has calculated gross regional product per capita, a key economic indicator, as \$58,600 on the Sunshine Coast in

He said GRP was \$48,700 in 2012 and should be \$62,100 given inflation which meant productivity had declined by about 6% a year.

"The decline has been consistent except for the year in which the government sent in a great deal of support for the covid unemployed."

he said.
"These figures are crucial because they are the only reliable indicator of whether there is money in the economy to allow all business, the principal local employers, to grow.

"It is not that no business is doing well.

"They may not be doing well enough to create jobs proportionate to population growth, and regardless of the individual business performance, there may be businesses who are not getting up or who are failing when they do because of the declining amount of money circulation per person in the region."

His comments cast some doubt on the positive picture painted by mayor Mark Jamieson in his State of the Region address last year.

Mr Burgess, of Kawana Island, has been a strong critic of the council for some years.

He began scrutinising the council after making an unsuccessful pitch to it in 2016 for a community farm and urban sustainability, concepts which he said had since received support from other councils.

## Second shot at top job

This is his second shot at election for mayor. He ran in 2020, coming third with 10% of the vote behind Mr Jamieson on almost 50% and then deputy mayor Chris Thompson on 33%, but ahead of another council critic, Don Innes, on a little over 6%.

Mr Burgess's website champions not only community farms but parking parks combined with farms to alleviate neighbourhood parking problems, and agrihoods - housing developments with farms at their heart.

He does not support the idea of a new sports stadium for the Sunshine Coast, saying communities derive no economic benefit from such infrastructure, and instead calls for an elite sports training facility.

#### **Business acumen**

He said his natural curiosity and business experience - beginning with an outlay of a few thousand dollars, he and his wife built a video business with 200 employees - would stand him in good stead for the job of Sunshine Coast

"There are 32,000 or so small & medium local businesses, there are 149,000 local jobs.

"It's not hard to see that without a vibrant local business environment, we won't have a stable & growing employment market in a prosperous and thriving community, with a lifestyle the envy of the world, in an environment protected from exploitation."

**BPHTI President Helene Cronin** OAM said she wanted to thank everyone who had been involved over the years.

'We would like to sincerely thank all our many loyal supporters who have stood by us through all the years of frustrations and disappointments," she said. "Their perseverance will now be rewarded.

"We now need to raise the necessary funds for the display building and we will shortly be holding a gala event to launch the fundraising campaign," Mrs Cronin said.



# War hero Nancy Wake's story brought to life

ATTENDING a women's breakfast, many years ago, I was fascinated from the outset by the speaker's subject, Nancy Wake.

Nancy was a legend and one very brave woman who had control of up to 7000 partisans in Maquis groups in the region of Auvergne in World War II. Wake's fame knew no boundaries, one of the hardest fighters, leaders, great organisers the world would later acknowledge .... though some years too late.

# The Gestapo named her 'the white mouse' for her ability to slip through their many traps.

In my research to direct another true story, I shared my thoughts with clients and friends and some older folk who knew of this amazing Australasian women (born in Wellington New Zealand back in 1912 with Māori heritage from her great grandmother) fearless and remarkable, who married Frenchman Henri Fiocca.

She was so appalled as a naïve young journalist witnessing the atrocities the Nazis performed in a Viennese Street, she declared to do everything in her power to remove the Gestapo who named her 'the white mouse' for



her ability to slip through their many traps.
I still feel Nancy deserved better recognition by both Australia and New Zealand for her incredible achievements, while France, England and USA awarded her medals promptly, and it is our honour to share her compelling story with followers of Lind Lane Theatre.

# Garden trellises and archways for protection

Homesteading Column with Racheal Pascoe

ANY plants in the veggie garden need a structure to grow well. Growing on a trellis improves air circulation, the amount of sunlight reaching the plant and makes the fruit a great height to pick. Keeping the fruit off the ground keeps some bugs at bay and also helps to minimise powdery mildew. A trellis or archway is a terrific structure to throw a net over to further protect your crop.

Tomatoes, cucumbers, melons, pumpkins, loofahs and chokos are some of the plants which need to be supported. A trellis needs to be strong enough to carry the weight of the plant when it is laden with fruit and should be installed before the plants grow too big.

## Make it yourself

A trellis does not have to be expensive. Ask the neighbour down the street for a few lengths of their bamboo or use an old gate or fence panel between a couple of star pickets. Hardwood stakes are also a good investment for your garden kit. Have a good look behind the garden shed to see what you can find. It is fun engineering something for the job from what you have around the garden.

## Arches for a more interesting garden

Garden pathways leading to archways you get to walk under makes for an even more inviting garden walk. Making a garden arch can be as simple as 4 star pickets, some large black poly pipe bent over and mesh in between. It is really satisfying to walk under an archway you have built when it is covered with passionfruit or big loofahs hanging through.

A trellis might only be in the one spot for a season, then it might be moved to another

location for a different fruit. It does not need to be permanently fixed in place. That is one thing I just love about the garden space, it is always changing and we are challenged to come up with new solutions each season.

Joining the components of a trellis can be done by wire, string, baling twine, old strips of fabric, zip ties and if you are married to a plumber like me - duct tape sometimes!

Once the trellis is in place, plant your seedlings or seeds along the bottom and keep them well watered and mulched.

When they are tall enough, encourage them to grow through the trellis, some might need some support hanging on. You can gently tie them up each time you see them reaching for

If you haven't tried growing fruit or veggies on a trellis or archway, maybe you could give

Go and check behind the garden shed, I bet there are plenty of materials to make a start but if you are missing something, be sure to pop into the Nambour Produce Agency, they will be happy to help get your sorted with stakes, wire mesh etc. Happy gardening!




