

Pubs & TramFest to combine for epic Nambour food party

Mill Street to be blocked off for bars, flavours, rides and live bands

IT'S a street party and everyone in Nambour & hinterland is invited to come and taste the flavours of the world.

The Saturday July 29 event will combine the ever-popular Nambour favourite, Tramfest, with new-kid-on-the-block's Club Hotel Namba in a collaboration with Sunshine Coast Council's Curated Plate culinary festival.

"I went to the gym and I'd finished my sets when I got a call from my manager. He said, 'How would you like to play in Sydney'?" she said.


"I said, 'What? Really?' and he said, 'Yes, for the South Sydney Rabbitohs'."

"I was hungry for it. I just wanted it. I was hoping that some day, I'd get a phone call from somebody," she said.

Nancy's days start at 2.30am when she rises for a half-hour run to the gym, where she puts in an hour session before starting work at BFX, Yandina, which supported her to attend the Australian schoolgirls' competition last year and also offered her a job when she left school.

The business, operated by the Kendray family - Andrew and Catherine, and their daughters Georga, Dana and Rebecca - had been running from premises at the corner of Coronation Avenue and Rigby Street until the February fire.

Georga Kendray said nearby business Bat Fit Crazy offered shed space in Rigby Street which they gladly took up.

They rent two more spaces to get the floor space they need for the amount of stock they carry plus a workshop.

"There's a bit of running backward and forward. We'll be glad when that's all over," she The Kendray family plan on rebuilding once

their insurance claim for the fire has been finalised. "We are definitely going to be rebuilding it. We just can't do anything until the insurance

has been sorted out, which is frustrating," she

Georga said the family was grateful for the assistance from Bat Fit Crazy and other businesses, such as A. J Steel, which offered manpower to help the family get up and running again after the fire.


She said customers had also been supportive. "Our customers have been amazing. We still have people offering space in their sheds if we need to store anything," she said.

"A lot of them have waited for us to get the workshop up and running. They've been very patient and very understanding."


The public memorial service will be held on July 23 at 10.30am at Sunshine Coast Stadium to celebrate Ben's life and achievements.



Woombye club mourns secretary's sudden passing

Heartbreak and unity

MEMBERS of the Woombye Snakes soccer fraternity are mourning a much-loved friend, team-mate and club secretary.

Amber Stokes, a 46-year-old mother of two, died unexpectedly at home on Tuesday, 4 July. Apparently fit and healthy, Amber had been

for a run and had come home and lay down when she passed away.



Her children, Sienna, 17, and Cooper, 20, were home and raised help but despite the best efforts of attending paramedics, she was unable to be revived.

In the wake of her loss, the club cancelled its senior and junior matches for the weekend and the premier women's match on Friday 7 July.

A gathering was instead held at Snakes headquarters on Friday evening to remember Amber and support those feeling her loss most acutely, including club president Andrew Kinden, Amber's partner of nine months.

Andrew said he was trying to remember the good times rather than dwell on the unfairness of a life cut short

"There's no sense to be made of it. There's no meaning in it," he said.

"That's life, there is the loss of people. "She was just a beautiful person, my best

'We never had an argument, not one. That's just Amber, very easy-going in her own way. "She doesn't have a bad bone in her body. "She's just beautiful all over. Friends with

evervone.' Amber and her children had joined the Snakes several years ago. She and Sienna played together in the division one women's

Always on the lookout for committee members, Andrew recruited Amber as secretary and they formed a relationship.

'We all used to knock around together and nine months ago, we just got on really well and got together. It was a great nine months," he said. "She was just a beautiful person, my best friend": Andy Kinden with

He said Amber's death had shocked the club but members had been wonderful in the way they rallied together.

"The support, it's been unbelievable. It's just so good. It's all the club members and past ones," he said.

A GoFundMe fundraiser, Ambers Family Fund, to assist Amber's family with expenses had raised close to \$13,000 within two days. https://gofund.me/bcd8a9b1

An autopsy to determine the cause of Amber's death was held on Friday 7 July but the results had not been made available.

From novices to masters:

Discover the art of clay at the The Pottery Studio, Nambour

PATRICK Swayze and Demi Moore are nowhere to be found. In fact, The Pottery Studio at Nambour is a place where people are heading to lose themselves.

Studio manager Aelish Healy said playing in clay was not just a creative pursuit but a chance to escape from "real life" for a while.

"Some people want to achieve a piece," Aelish said.

"It's a huge investment for people to come and switch off and not really think about things that are going on in normal life.

"Once you're handling the clay, you have to focus in such a way that you can find yourself switching off from everything else."

The Pottery Studio offers one-off classes and short courses for people who want to try or learn how to throw pottery on a wheel or handbuild pieces in clay.

"Most of our classes are on the weekends.

People come in for two hours and make a piece, and come back and glaze it, and then we do four and six week clay courses for people who want to learn a little bit more," Aelish said.

'We get a lot of beginners, people that have never tried pottery or the last time they did it was when they were three years old.

"We get people in their 80s and 90s. People bring their mums and grandmas. A lot of husbands get dragged along."

Aelish said people expecting wheel throwing to be just like the scene from the movie, Ghost, were often surprised at how messy it was in real life.

Others had to adapt to the unfamiliar feeling of being a novice at something.

"We have people that make something a little big and wonky and they don't care and there are other people where everything has to be perfect," she said.

"It's interesting having these people together and how they work their clay together."

Support through troubled times

Fight on to keep families housed amid growing need

THE HEAD of a Sunshine Coast charity which supports battlers trying to keep a roof over their heads says there is no sign of the need

Aus Living Support helped 284 families who were struggling with their rent or mortgage repayments last financial year.

The charity provides up to \$200 a week in assistance to people who, through no fault of their own, find themselves unable to pay their rent or mortgages.

Chief executive officer Ian Harrison put out the call for donations to help keep locals in their homes as many continued to struggle to make ends meet.

"We're currently getting four applications a week for rental support. It's not easing off," he

'Many are single mums with kids'

Mr Harrison said many of those needing help had children in the household and many were women.

"Many are single mums with kids and there are a lot of ladies over 55 that now find themselves single and haven't had a lot of experience paying bills etcetera," he said.

'There's certainly more demand than usual. "A lot of the single mums have gone through divorce situations and have gone from double incomes to single incomes and are struggling to find the difference to make the rent.

"We all know that the cost of living is going up so there's that as well."

Mr Harrison said people were often able to recover after a little help getting past a financial hump

"If you can keep them where they are, they can often get their lives back on track but if

they don't have a home, it gets more difficult for them to do that," he said.

Mr Harrison said people were generally referred to Aus Living Support by other services.

Aus Living Support's work extends from Gympie to Caloundra and is funded through donations and two op shops.

Mr Harrison said the charity could offer financial support for eight weeks before reviewing

"We find people often aren't asking for a lot. Often, before we get to the end of the eight weeks, they ring us up and say, 'I've got a new job,' and they don't need any more help," he said.

"We're lucky. We've also had landlords put

New bushwalking trail opens at Maroochy **Bushland Botanic Gardens**

The track, called the Western Tall Gums Trail, is a 3km extension exploring for the first time the western section of the Gardens.

This bush trail showcases and enhances access to some of the more remote landscapes of the Tall Gums Reserve which will be greatly appreciated by visitors looking to stretch beyond our current offerings. The trail highlights a range of ecosystems traversing dry sclerophyll forests, flooded gums and ephemeral gullies either side of the headwaters of Mountain Creek. It is just one of the many walks available at the Maroochy Bushland Botanic Garden. There are walks for everyone including paved pathways suitable for strollers and short circuits that are great for families. This reserve is also home to a large koala population as identified by heat seeking drone surveys in May 2022.

This area of the Botanical Gardens was acquired by Council in 2012 using ratepayers Environmental Levy funds. The track construction costs were supported by funds received from the SCC Recreational Trails Partnership



THE safety and prosperity of our community will always be my priority.

I speak with our hard-working local QPS officers regularly and am proud of the work they have been doing to reduce crime in our

I reject the assertion from the Member for Maroochydore that crime is increasing in Nambour overall. QPS statistics show a clear downward trend over the last 5 years. Nambour is one of the safest places on the Sunshine Coast.

We're investing in front-line services and local infrastructure to give the police the resources they deserve. Increased detection of offences can be directly attributed to the Palaszczuk Government's crackdown on hooning with better legislation, better equipment like automatic license plate readers and high-tech drones, and increased recruitment.

At the last election the LNP actually wanted to have less front-line police officers for our community. They should be judged on their record, not their media releases.

This is in stark contrast to the State Government's commitment to provide the resources for a world-class police service, which Mrs Simpson voted in favour of in Parliament only last month. If she had an issue with the resourcing in our area, why did she not say something then?

I'm proud to be a part of the Palaszczuk Government making the largest investment in policing in Queensland's history, backed up in our region by the new \$9 Million Nambour Police Station, and the new \$4 Million Cooroy Police Station.

I also reject the assertion from the Member for Maroochydore that Nambour is in any way shutting down. Our town continues to grow as it transitions from being a former mill town to embrace a new creative and cultural identity with greater connections to community and country.

'Approved' numbers don't fill rosters: Fiona Simpson MP

IN the Last edition (July 5) Maroochydore MP Fiona Simpson joined Lowe Street businessman Tristan Brown in calling for acknowledgement of, and action on the issue of safety in the Town Square area. This edition, we asked Ms Simpson to further explain her concerns.

· What made you want to have a say in an electorate that isn't your own?

"I grew up and went to school in Nambour and Yandina as my home towns so I care deeply about the area. I've been inundated by concerned residents and business owners in Nambour who are sick of living in fear and being ignored by their local MP. They are very unhappy that Rob Skelton is saying police have enough numbers and he isn't listening. It is completely unacceptable to have drunk and drugged people hassling people on the streets with anti-social behaviour in broad-daylight. It's still happening regularly and police aren't resourced to get to the scene to deal with the issues in a timely way."

· Do you think it's the case that businesspeople are afraid to speak out? Have people told you that?

"Yes. I understand people who speak up can feel isolated and bullied and that's not right. Let's agree we all want to see Nambour thrive but covering up the problem won't fix up the problem. The State Government are lying about the actual police resources on the ground and that needs to be called out, not covered up. Sometimes there are only a couple of general duties police officers on shifts in Nambour and other towns on the Coast so the Coast is being short-changed of actual police. When Mr Skelton says police have the resources it's incredibly deceitful because "approved" numbers aren't actual numbers and they don't fill rosters. He's not listening. We've got to back people who want more police on the ground so this community can be all it deserves to be."

• You said last edition the Government was 'fudging police (boots on the ground) numbers'. Can you expand on that?

"The Palaszczuk Labor Government needs to be open and transparent with the Nambour

community about the true state of police resources. There are 72 fewer police in Queensland compared to September 2020, but the Palaszczuk Labor Government refuses to be open and honest. I understand there are sometimes only a handful of police on the ground per shift in the area."

• You said people had given up reporting crime. How do you know?

"I've had a number of people tell me they've reported daylight crimes, and it can take up to an hour for a police response due to lack of police. Others have said they never got a response. I don't blame police who are doing their best, I blame the State Government who are lying about the numbers of police available for rosters."

What should be done to alleviate business owners' concerns regarding illegal behaviour in the Town Square?

"Nicklin MP Rob Skelton should start listening to people in the Town Square area rather than denying the problem and denying the need for more actual police."

According to police statistics, Noosa & Maroochydore have higher crime rates (as per police stats). Why then should Nambour people complain about crime?

"Nambour doesn't have the significant influx of people for tourism, accommodation, shopping or a significant night-time precinct and it has a different retail offering to the denser coastal strip. But the crime in the community and on the streets is not acceptable. People have a right to be safe and feel safe."

Responding, but still not listening

THIS paper copped it's fair share of flack last edition and we get it.

Last edition's coverage was not ideal. It was one-sided. But, in our defence, Nicklin MP Rob Skelton's office was given days to reply to Ms Simpson's comments and chose to not do so. This paper should not be expected to hold back coverage of such an important issue for lack of a response from the local MP.

Thankfully his office has responded this week (see page opposite).

This paper admires Mr Skelton's obvious compassion for people doing it tough, his willingness to show up and support local community events and his advocacy for initiatives that help clubs, organisations and communities.

Those instincts are representative of the best spirit of the Australian Labor Party, instincts that are good and fair and directed at the most vulnerable.

But his office must be aware of the ongoing frustration of affected businesspeople we've spoken to as outlined in article after article during the past 12 months. And still there is a lack of direct acknowledgement of the affected people's legitimate and ongoing concerns.

People can and should have their say in Mr Skelton's survey described on the page opposite. And that is all well and good.

But, to this newspaper, the people Mr Skelton should be canvassing on this issue first, foremost and predominantly – are the businesspeople trying to earn their livelihoods in the troubled Town Square area: businesspeople who are subjected to regular intimidating, unpredictable, anti-social, drug-induced, drunken and/or unlawful behaviour in that area.

Businesses we've spoken to have been demoralised, ignored and when they try to speak up, intimidated.

This, despite the fact that they, their staff and customers are trying to go about their business under the strain of regular unlawful behaviour. It's high time to acknowledge their legitimate concerns and take appropriate action. Everyone is welcome in the Town Square, not every behaviour.


"And he's a business owner. This is just the hardships that general, normal people are going through.'

Accountant trades corporate life for bike shop bliss in Currie Street

MICHAEL Curry has not worn a suit for years and could not be happier about his escape from the corporate world.

After more than 20 years in accounting, including middle management at the Australian Securities and Investment Commission, Michael embarked on a radical career change.

He threw in corporate life to buy a bike shop, On Ya Bike, in Nambour two-anda-half years ago and is now willingly up to his elbows in chains, frames and derailleurs most days.

Michael has always loved tinkering with bicycles and completed some TAFE qualifications a in his spare time a few years ago.

During the pandemic, he reconsidered his working

"After the first 12 months of covid, it got close to Christmas and I said to my wife..., 'I'm over this. I don't want to do accounting any more'," he said.

"She saw there was a bike shop for sale in the Sunshine Coast hinterland."

Within a couple of weeks, they had packed up their house on the Gold Coast and the rest

Running a business, dealing with enquiries, and the repair work keep Michael busy. Bike repairs are no longer as simple as replacing a chain or tyre tube or missing nut.

"My biggest challenge would have to be in how technology in bicycles has changed. We've got all these e-bikes now. And lots of the brands have their own proprietary parts,"

Michael said.

Most of his work is for "weekend warriors" - recreational cyclists who, like him, like to get out and explore paths and trails or even compete a little on the weekends but are not necessarily elite athletes on bikes that cost more than cars.

"I don't care what you're riding, I'm just happy that you're doing it. You don't need a \$15,000 bike to go riding on the weekends," Michael said.

Charting new waters: Woombye author, Peta Miller, sets sail with debut novel

AFTER selling other people's books for a living, Woombye's Peta Miller now finds herself selling her own.

Peta, who has worked in bookstores and the publishing industry all her life, has achieved what many other writers only aspire to: having a book published by a major publisher.

The Ship's Midwife, published by Harper Collins, was launched at Berkelouw's book store, Eumundi, where Peta works, in June.

The historical fiction novel was inspired by a true story Peta stumbled

across during a trip to Stradbroke Island.

There she read a plaque at the Dunwich cemetery about a ship called The Emigrant, which had been on its way from England to Australia in 1850 with 276 people aboard when a typhus outbreak claimed 18 lives.

The vessel was forced to quarantine at Stradbroke where another 26 people died.

"I found myself wondering what it takes for someone to leave everyone behind and go somewhere where they don't know what awaits them," Peta said.

"This was in the days before television and mobile phones and the internet so people didn't know then what they know now.

Peta began researching not only The Emigrant but other ships which made similar journeys. Her research extended to all things from the period, including language and clothing, to ensure the book she wanted to write was

accurate for the time.

Peta initially wrote a young adult fiction novel which won her the Charlotte Waring Barton Award from the Children's Book Council of Australia. This included a mentorship through Harper

Collins which led to a publishing deal and to her re-writing the story as an adult fiction manuscript.

She said she was not tempted to try and tell the true story of The Emigrant and the people aboard, which has already been done.

"I'd read so many other journals from people so that, in a way, the story of people on The Emigrant became one of the stories, so I wasn't telling that," she said.



Maleny Show: New film honours enduring legacy of century-old event

THROUGH wars, droughts and floods, the Maleny Show has continued for a century. Now, one of Queensland's proudest regional traditions and those who made it great, are featured in a special documentary film.

The 100-year-old showcase of agriculture and community spirit, and many of those who have seen or helped it flourish, will be seen on the big screen.

A community screening was held at Landsborough Museum on July 12.

The film shares the stories and memories of many people closely involved with the Maleny Show over the years.

These include Kayrene Corkin, Bill Hankinson, Marlene Hankinson, Winston Johnston, Ed Lawley, Desley Malone, Monica Skerman and Lois

Division 5 Councillor Winston Johnston, also the Maleny Show Society President, said the film marked a significant milestone in the hinterland town.

'The Maleny Show was first held on April 24, 1923, at the Maleny showgrounds and has been held there ever since," Cr Johnston said.

"The show's success has been the result of the Maleny Show Society, an organisation which has made a significant contribution to the region over the past 10 decades, and their hard-working volunteers who prepare for many months.

"The film preserves an essential part of our Sunshine Coast heritage through the stories of these volunteers and captures the smells, sounds and sights of show time.

"It is only because of these volunteers' efforts over the past 100 years, that we are now able to interpret this incredible story.'

Since 1884: Commercial Hotel's special place in Nambour's history

THE Commercial Hotel was Nambour's first hotel built in 1884 on Showgrounds Hill by Mathew Carroll.

Walter Lanham described Carroll's Petrie Creek or Tullababa Hotel.

"It was sixty feet long and twenty feet wide and was built of sawn timber. The building had to be rebuilt Hotel.

It was the only place large enough for dances, or sprees as they were called."

In 1885, a Receiving Office was established there where mail was left to be collected by a horseback rider and also dropped off on his return.

In 1892, the licence was transferred to Mathew Carroll inr for the New Petrie Creek Hotel which had been built in 1890 on the site of today's Commercial Hotel.

The old hotel buildings were used for short periods as offices for the

Maroochy Divisional Board and as a school classroom.

After the purchase by John Currie, Currie's Nambour Hotel was described as "a two story double-verandah building containing 18



Concerns over recent TMR road restoration

I would like to say a huge thank you to all the residents of Stanley River Road. Over the years you have made such a difference in removing the mountain of invasive weeds from the road verges. Also thanks to those who gave their time to Booroobin Bushcare in helping with the Official TMR Road Restoration Project. This was on the site of the very headwaters of the great Mary River.

Also on the other side of the road at the top of the range is the headwaters of the great Stanley River. These rivers make Booroobin a special hot spot of Rainforest Biodiversity for the range.

The Lantana especially which formed a tunnel all the way into town, has now only two spots left.

There were mountains of Morning Glory, Japanese Sunflower, Maderia Vine, Moth Vine of which we removed over 2500 fruit in four hours one year, and so much more.

This stopped everyone's properties from being invaded. They all spent so many hours transforming Stanley River Road into the beautiful drive that it has become. I am so sorry to everyone who had their hard work of planting natives destroyed with the recent work done by TMR, in the name of safety. Only about 20 percent of the work was needed.

About 40 Flame Trees (which had been planted beside gateways and had no impact on road safety) were removed. They especially made the road beautiful at Christmas time for visitors and locals. We have been left with no wildlife corridors for the Koalas, and the Ephyphites have now been left open to the elements. The "bare earth attitude" is only bringing back weeds, and the lawns now cannot be mowed.

God tamed a 'terrible, wild man', and turned him into a life-long preacher

Obituary by Richard Bruinsma

CHRISTIAN minister Mike Smith was an adventurous man.

His life journey transitioned from a tough childhood in a dysfunctional family, through a supernatural conversion, and an immediate lifelong ministry.

One of 11 children, Mike was born in Liverpool, England, in 1936, growing up to become a weekend drunk and self-confessed wild man. He was a champion cyclist and sang with a local band.

In his mid-20s, Mike and a friend hitchhiked to Australia, stowing away in India before being captured and jailed for four weeks in Freemantle Jail.

He found work at the Sydney Morning Herald, where a workmate gave him a Bible, which changed his life.

"I started reading it. I found it interesting, this man called Jesus... and every night my pillow was wet with tears, I saw what I was - a dirty, filthy and proud individual - and he died for me, I couldn't get over it."

Mike immediately began gospel meetings in Sydney, distributing tracts, doorknocking, and pioneering new churches.

In 1976, at 40, he was arrested in Newcastle for street preaching. He pleaded guilty but avoided jail when a parishioner paid his fine.

"I am determined not to allow this stupid man-made law hinder the message of Christ," Mike was quoted in The Daily Mirror.

Two years later, he met Jean. They married in November 1978.

On a visit to Sri Lanka, Mike saw the poverty and the need for the Gospel. He began preaching there annually for the next 25 years.

At 80, his formal ministry ended and he semi-retired at the couple's then home in Bli

In January 2021, Mike suffered a stroke. He continued praying, reading his Bible, and remained ready to share the Gospel.

Mike suffered a fatal heart attack at his Burnside home on April 28. He was 87.

His final message: "We will meet again, when the trumpet sounds, and those in Christ will rise to meet the Lord in the air. Until that great day, keep the faith, run the race, be strong in His power and win the Victor's crown. God bless you all."

The Multi-Modal Transport **Corridor phoenix rises again**

🗖 UESDAY 11 July and a mythical infrastructure phoenix rises once again from the ashes of past state government plans.

Former Premiers' Peter Beattie and Anna Bligh, if they have good memories, will recall these 'Big Builds' but under a former pseudonym - the Multi-Modal Transport Corridor

In the latest tranche of government rebranding, we are presented with the 'Big Build' for the Sunshine Coast.

At least it isn't called the Big Build Plan; perhaps Transport and Main Roads are aware of our cynicism of anything transport-related being a plan or glossy brochure.

Plans are regularly announced, but never

Regurgitated proposals

The state is asking for your input into these regurgitated proposals.

A 2008 Fact Sheet 'What is the MMTC' described it thus:

The MMTC is a transport corridor from Caloundra Road to the Sunshine Motorway.

It will contain a motorway-standard road (Caloundra-Mooloolaba Road), local arterial road, integrated pedestrian and cycle facilities and from Creekside Boulevard north, the CAMCOS rail line.

Now, fast forward to 2023, and the recent announcement describes it thus:

The Direct Sunshine Coast Rail Line; Sunshine Motorway, Mooloolah River Interchange (MRI) Upgrade; Kawana Motorway planning and the Sunshine Coast Public Transport project (aka Sunshine Coast Mass Transit).

The most recent addition to the MMTC is the Sunshine Coast Mass Transit proposal. It explores solutions for an enhanced public transport connection between

Maroochydore and Birtinya, with a possible extension to Caloundra.

It builds on work previously undertaken by the council through its Mass Transit Options Analysis, endorsed in 2021.

No. 1 of the Big Build listed items is the Direct Sunshine Coast Line, formerly known for the past 20 years as CAMCOS rail.

It was originally proposed as a 40km coastal rail line that extended from Beerwah across to Caloundra and northwards toward Maroochydore, then over the Maroochy River to Sunshine Coast Airport, before heading west and connecting to the North Coast Line, near Yandina.

Today it is waiting upon the business case to be completed to re-determine the route, stations, staging and cost.

It is planned to reach Maroochydore with an extension to the Airport as a 'some-timein-the-future' proposal.

A connection back to the North Coast Line has long since disappeared from all maps.

Nambour study vanishes, but there is good news

It may also be why the \$6 million Nautilus study also vanished - as it looked at public transport options to connect the Northern Sunshine Coast from Maroochydore to Nambour to Noosa, via rail.

The good news is that the business case has received extra funding of \$14 million from the state government and will be completed earlier than originally scheduled, from 2025 (this is according to budget figures) to now be completed by the end of this year.

That can't happen soon enough. Still, when you consider that the 13.6km Springfield line took three years to construct, the 13km Redcliffe Peninsula Line took three years to construct (six years from Prime Minister Julia Gillard's sign off in 2010 to its opening in October 2016) and the 13km Beerburrum to Beerwah duplication hasn't started after five years, you can understand why I'm worried.

It is always such an enjoyable event, frequented by lovely people wanting to further their plant knowledge, or design and furnish their gardens. Whether living in a unit or on hectares, there is always something for everyone to add to a house or garden.

Of course, as a wildlife organization we love to encourage the planting of native seeding, flowering and fruiting trees, from miniature to huge in size! Wildlife carers have to provide their native animals in care with as much variety as possible when selecting natural native foods.

Supermarket food isn't a recommended

staple! This means growing varying plants of different sizes depending on the room available. At the expo there is plenty of opportunity to find out what natives grow naturally in our area, and what to select so we can also have beautiful flowers all year round.

Our volunteers in the WILVOS tent loved hearing of wildlife experiences and were always happy to give advice on various native animal issues – good and bad! WILVO Roslyn gave a talk in the Speaker's Tent, which led to many enquiries on the day and afterwards by email.

Our thanks to the Sunshine Coast Council for providing us with an area in their Living Backyard area. It is always a buzz of activity – love those native bees! So much work is put into erecting tents and creating instant gardens. Each year the gardens are different, and always welcoming and lovely to look at.




