"We have created different shopping zones at the entrance, and used original ginger crates and timber panelling to display our gorgeous ginger and gourmet

Yandina festival postponed

'It was just too risky, especially with the ongoing lockdowns around the country'

UNCERTAINTY regarding COVID-19 restrictions has caused the postponement of a festival to celebrate Yandina's 150th Year.

"We had been very much looking forward to holding a huge celebration for Yandina, but the ongoing uncertainty around the COVID situation has made it extremely difficult," said Yandina 150 Year Street Fair Celebration Committee Chairman, John O'Leary.

The committee regretfully made the decision this month. The original date for the celebration was 20th September this year and was going to be combined with the annual Street Fair, which is traditionally held in August.

"The original September 20 (2020) date was chosen because it was the closest date to the Yandina proclamation on the 23rd September 1870," Mr O'Leary said. "We were anticipating crowds of up to 10,000 people for the duration of the event but we all felt that it was just too risky, especially with the ongoing lockdowns around the country.

"It would also be very difficult to organise such a large scale event and do it justice in such a short time frame. It is just too much of a gamble."

Fellow committee member Rev Dave Tidey, of the Yandina Baptist Church said the State and Federal Governments had issued stages of restrictions being relaxed, but the event would not comply with any of those stages. "The closest we come is being defined as an Expo, but that style of event is simply not do-able because there would be no gates or security. We definitely don't want to be responsible for starting another cluster of infection."

The Committee agreed to hold the live event celebration on September 12 next year.

"We have chosen this date because it falls within the school term and not during the holidays. We felt it was important that local schools were involved," Mr O'Leary said. "It is such a historic time for our community."

In the meantime the committe is organising smaller scale events to mark the historic milestone in an appropriate manner.

The Committee will also be developing a series of articles about the history of Yandina to run online over the coming months.

The focus of the articles will be on the Indigenous history of Yandina, the early settlers, the agricultural history and the historic buildings in the area. The Committee also discussed the much loved annual Street Fair, which will be run in September 2021 in conjunction with the 150 year celebration. Tenders called for Nambour station

THE State Government's \$9 million commitment to provide a new Nambour police station has edged a step closer with tenders being called earlier this month.

Police minister Mark Ryan said the \$9 million commitment will support an average of 30 direct full-time equivalent jobs during construction. The QPS advises that, weather permitting, the

construction stage is scheduled to start soon and is expected to be completed in about 15 months. "Building this kind of infrastructure benefits our world class police service and it also bene-

fits the community," Mr Ryan said. He said the Palaszczuk Government committed to deliver a new Nambour police station at the last election.

YADCA calls for meeting over blind spot danger

YANDINA and District Community Association is calling for an urgent meeting with Council, state government and police over a housing development that will result in residents being forced to use a deadly blind corner.

YADCA member David Tidey, who lives opposite the proposed development at 61 Old Gympie Road, warned: "Someone is going to die on this corner."

He has already contacted Council to warn them of the road safety concerns that he and other residents share; and now YADCA has written to Council as well.

All but four of the 39 blocks in the development will be accessed from Colemans Road; but developers plan to put access to those four allotments on the blind corner at 61 Old Gympie

YADCA Secretary Kahren Wentworth said: "Several YADCA members who use this road regularly are concerned at this proposal, which we believe shows a total disregard for the safety of the community "This bend is already well known as a dan-

gerous section of the road and to suggest placing driveways there is astounding," she said. "We are calling for these four blocks to be removed from the plan or be reconfigured to

have access via Colemans Road." David Tidey pointed out that the development was originally designed 13 years ago. "A

Local clubs get share of \$734k funding

SPORTING groups across the region have scored a much needed boost to keep their fields in shape thanks to Sunshine Coast Council's 2020 Sports Field Maintenance Funding

Forty-six sporting clubs will share in \$734,051 and receive expert advice each year to 30 June 2023 to contribute towards the cost of maintaining their fields.

Economic Portfolio Councillor Jason O'Pray said he was pleased to see the continuation of the popular program that started in 2011.

"Council is assisting clubs to deliver quality playing surfaces for key sporting groups in our healthy, smart and creative region," Cr O'Pray

"This funding also injects a timely boost to many local clubs which, unfortunately due to Rugby League Football - \$3,947 the novel coronavirus (COVID-19), have fallen on tough times."



Yandina Hotel gets a timely facelift

AFTER months of lockdown, the iconic Yandina Hotel has been given a much needed renovation, and re-opened for business again on July

"The Hotel is 129 years old and this is the first time in its history that it has closed its doors,' said owner, Rob Kingston

"The renovations began two days into lockdown. It just seemed like a very good opportunity to get the bigger jobs done and keep my staff employed with the assistance of JobKeeper."

Built on Gympie Road around 1888, the Australian Hotel (as it was originally named) was granted a licence in 1889. In 1891 it was hitched to a team of bullocks and moved on skids to its current site in Stevens Street.

"During the move, the Pub continued to serve beer, it didn't close even then," said Rob. "In fact, while it was moving, the publican's wife was upstairs giving birth! If the walls could only talk it would be fascinating."

The Hotel is Heritage listed and Rob and his team have been extremely respectful of this. "There are some sections of original flooring which needed to be concrete sanded to bring them back to the beautiful pale honey colour they are now," Rob said.

"Newer sections have been designed to fit into the original architecture in an almost seamless way and we have added some quirky touches as well, including timber chairs from Poland and a stunning Blue Gum bench bar which was sourced from a local farm," he said. "It seemed fitting because this was traditionally a Pub for farmers and labourers."

Rob purchased the Pub on July 3, 2017. In that time, he has added upgrades such as air conditioning and new furniture, and has worked hard on the bistro to give it a family friendly feel.

On his third anniversary in the business, Rob reopened the Hotel with just three days notice. "It was a pretty hectic three days, that's for sure," he said.

"We thought we had an extra week, so it was all hands on deck to re-stock and get ready to look after customers again. We also had to prepare for COVID compliance, which is obviously something we all need to be aware of now."

One of the biggest challenges faced in

re-opening was supplying beer on tap. "You wouldn't believe it, but it was extremely difficult to get kegs in for the opening," said Rob.

"On our first day back we were forced to sell bottled beer because kegs were so thin on the ground. And after months of lockdown, all everyone wanted to drink was draught beer. But by the second day, we had it sorted."

At the moment, the Hotel is serving meals and providing some live music. "Our patrons are really looking forward to a meal out and some entertainment," Rob said. "Hopefully as time passes, and restrictions are relaxed we will be able to offer more live music and dancing."

After her 100 day beauty sleep, Yandina's grand old lady still has some way to go to being fully restored to her former glory.

"Our upstairs accommodation is being given a once over now and will reopen when it is complete," Rob said. "There are sure to be plenty more stories in the old girl yet."





JobKeeper extension is welcome news

At the federal level it's been about the economy, the future of JobKeeper and the Coronavirus Supplement this past week and there is some good news. On the health front, Queensland is also continuing to perform well.

JobKeeper

The JobKeeper Payment will be extended beyond the end of September under a refined. two-tiered payment system. From 28 September through to 3 January next year, the rate for eligible employees will reduce to \$1,200 a fortnight, while a lower payment of \$750 will apply for employees who worked less than 20 hours a week (in the month of February, pre-COVID). The following quarter those payments will be \$1000 and \$650 respectively. You can find links to more information and facts sheets on my website in the News section.

Coronavirus Supplement

The temporary Coronavirus Supplement for those on income support, including JobSeeker, will be extended until 31 December. The \$550 a fortnight supplement continues until 24 September & from 25 September until 31 December the Supplement will be \$250 a fortnight.

Economic Outlook

Treasurer Josh Frydenberg also updated the Economic and Fiscal Outlook and while the figures were sobering they were not unexpected. In response to Coronavirus, Government expenses like welfare and stimulus measures increased, while revenue from tax receipts fell dramatically. For the 19/20 financial year we have seen a budget deficit of \$86 billion with the budget deficit for the current financial year estimated at \$185 billion. The official unemployment rate is also expected to rise above 9 percent by Christmas. Nonetheless, the figures also proved that Australia is in a much better position than other comparable nations across the world. The measured response of the Morrison Government is working. 

"I pretty much started in the trade straight out of school, and apart from taking a few years off in between, it is what I have done all my life,"

"To minimise the risk of cracking it is really important not to install a thinner layer than this. I know that some operators apply a 75mm layer and this is just not going to give as good a

Bevan also uses a high quality concrete to ensure a better and harder wearing result. "I use Cordwells 25mpa concrete, which is a Sunshine Coast product that meets a range of industry and environmental standards," he said. "It is a

stronger mix and the end finish is exceptional." While the materials are more expensive for Bevan to use, he does not pass this cost on to his clients. "The different types of jobs I do include driveways, pathways, patios and shed slabs," said Bevan. "I can do plain, coloured, stencilled, stamped and exposed concrete. It really

depends on what my customers want. It is my choice to use a better quality, more expensive product, so I don't feel right about passing that

Yandina Print Rain brings safe as News **changes focus** conditions for

THE Courier-Mail will be printed in Yandina as News Corp shifts printing operations from Murarrie to the Sunshine Coast site.

The Courier-Mail, The Daily Telegraph, The Australian and The Sunday Mail will now be printed at Yandina.

The move comes amid a transition to digital-only editions of regional and community newspapers including the Sunshine Coast Daily and associated weeklies.

The vast bulk of the company's regional and community portfolio is now digital-only. The Murarrie press, in Brisbane's east, which

has been operating since 1995 will be phrased out by April 2021. The Yandina site has newer presses with the heat-set printing capability used for magazines,

catalogues and inserts. Yandina, which prints the Sunshine Valley Gazette, will print five dedicated editions of The Courier-Mail for audiences in Central Queensland, Wide Bay, and the Sunshine Coast, as well as its Queensland country and Brisbane metropolitan editions.

In addition it will publish the Queensland, Coffs Harbour, Grafton and Lismore editions of The Daily Telegraph, as well as The Australian and The Sunday Mail.
