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It's Showtime! Bigscreen adds new dimension to main arena

A 10 metre by 4 metre curved screen in the main arena will add a new dimension in entertainment to this year's Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show according to President Rowan O'Hara.

"Every year we say the Show is bigger and better than ever, but with this new big screen technology it really is true," Mr O'Hara said. "It's bold new technology. So, for instance, people watching fireworks will be treated to an accompanying video presentation on the screen tracing our history from First Nations people, the local sugar cane industry right through to the history of the Coast."

The theme this year is "Country to Coast Together We Are Stronger".

Other program highlights include wild west arena spectacular *Rooftop Express* which stars *Rawhide*, a 980kg "outlaw" bison, that Director Dave Manchon chases around on horseback to lead him up to stand on the back of a trailer.

The interactive, family-friendly display celebrates the heroes of the outback and features ponies, donkeys, bison and Australian stock horses as well as stock men and women.

Mr O'Hara said vintage speedway cars and speedway bikes would be popular events as would action-packed freestyle motocross production Aussie FMX.

"The FMX Freestyle motorbikes come with a twist this year but I'm not telling you what the twist is," he said.

As always the Show features a strong Equestrian line-up as the event is the perfect warm-up to the World Cup which follows soon after.

Beef and dairy cattle sections will be strong given the return of involvement from schools from Dakabin, Caboolture and Noosa com-



peting for prizes.

In the pavilion interest will revolve around the central theme for the year, the pineapple.

"And we're also partnering with the QCWA to help promote their 100th anniversary," said Mr O'Hara. "On that note, QCWA Nambour & North Coast Division President Patsy Lee will officially open the show."

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Traditional platform to celebrate farmers and our food chain

Q&A with former Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show Society President Jenny McKay.

• What does the Show mean to you?

The show has been a part of my life for decades. Until recently four generations of my family volunteered at the show. My mother in her late 80s loved show time and anything that she could assist with from putting letters in envelopes to wiping up after the volunteers at Show time, provided her with invaluable mental and social benefits.

• How important is the Nambour Show for the community?

Decades ago, the Nambour Show Committee looked to the future and renamed the Show the Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show. The Show is in Nambour but is the Agricultural show from "Coast to Country" on the Sunshine Coast. Over 30 Community Groups from a wide range of interests volunteer and benefit financially from this event. Funds raised by these groups then are invested into activities from support to research. People are passionate about where their food comes from and this is a traditional platform to celebrate farmers and our food chain.

• How does the local area benefit from having the Show?

Communities benefit socially and economically from the Show. A national study showed that local shows put millions into their local community and a show of our size provides a wide range of economic benefits from mechanics/fuel etc from side show alley guild members as Nambour is their last stop before heading to the far north Queensland. This is where they do their repairs etc. Many small businesses and individuals earn a part of their income from the event. It provides a strong platform for participation and that also provides social and mental health benefits.

SHOWS are a massive part of life for the O'Hara family. Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show Society President Rowan O'Hara met his wife Ellie at the Ekka and both maintain a deep appreciation of the cultural and financial benefits shows bring to local communities.

Rowan said agricultural shows were quite unique in that they offered something for everyone, whether you wanted to volunteer, visit or take part in a contest.

"The show is the only event in the community that absolutely anyone can be a part of," he said. "Whether it be entering a cake, riding a horse, showing a chicken, entering a jam or a Lego piece everyone can join in. As the saying goes, there's something for everyone. It really is across the ages and cultures and caters to all aspects of the community.

"Shows also give back to all sectors of the community. Everyone who contributes reaps the benefits. People love to be connected and involved in this way and the local show is shaped so much by the community.'

Ellie said Shows were central to Rowan's very being and his passion had grown with fatherhood. "To be able to contribute and bring together the community in a way that's purely for the development of the community is so important to him," she said. "Agriculture on the Sunshine Coast is becoming quite unique and niche and we can help showcase this evolution to a wide audi-

Range pioneers' homestead returns to family ownership

MORE than a century of history is being restored to family hands after Tanderra House Flaxton was purchased last week by the great-greatgrandson of Blackall Range pioneers Joseph and Alice Dixon who built the original homestead.

Real estate agent Roger Loughnan said it was wonderful to see the magnificent property returned to the family. The estate was purchased by great-greatgrandson Matthew Clarke and his wife Sarah.

"It's a fascinating piece of local history and lovely to see the story come full circle as the home is returned to family hands more than a hundred years later," Roger said. "Matthew and Sarah have changed the homestead name back to its original 'Chermside' out of respect for the Dixon legacy.

"It's also important to acknowledge the role owners for the past 20 years, Geoff and Ann Hocking, have played in maintaining the gardens and upgrading the house in such a tasteful and sympathetic manner. The heritage-listed house could not have been in better

Joseph and Alice Dixon constructed the family homestead, Chermside, at Flaxton on their 790-acre citrus and dairy property about 1909. The house today is vastly different in size and layout and the name was changed to Tanderra House in the 1970s.

The homestead when constructed was a typical "Queenslander" with wide-open verandahs. Internally the ceilings were high as there was no air-conditioning in that era. The floors to the main building are the original pit sawn

Alice Dixon passed in 1927 and Joseph two years later, when Alice died it was during a spell of very wet weather and it was not possible to have the burial on Mapleton. Hence she was interred in the small cemetery plot along

alongside her.


The bones of the original homestead are still evident, and all the work performed through the decades has been completed with both passion and longevity in mind. Each of the minders of the residence over the years have added their mark to what Joseph Dixon started and one would hope that the same will be said in another 100 years.

Some of the trees date back to the time when the house was first constructed, notably the huge Magnolia Grandiflora. The home forms a stately backdrop to the gardens which have been continually developed by the Hockings.

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Wallace reveals thoughts on election loss and road ahead

Q&A Interview with Andrew Wallace, Federal MP for Fisher

· Is it difficult for you to remain positive given the electoral damage inflicted at the May 21 election?

While it wasn't the national result we worked so hard for, we secured a great result locally in Fisher. It's a privilege to have been given a third term to help Sunshine Coast families and their businesses get ahead by building better roads and rail, boosting mental health outcomes, backing small businesses and manufacturers, and protecting the unique character of our local community.

· How does the swing against you sit within the wider context of the swing against the Coalition? How do you explain the backlash against the Coalition on Saturday?

The swing in Fisher was consistent with national figures, however there are a number of votes still to count. Noticeably, the largest swing was not to Labor, but to the United Australia Party and Pauline Hanson's One Nation. This is also consistent with the national trend, in which conservative minor parties claimed the vast majority of swinging votes outside of major cities. As of 24 May 2022, the Coalition secured nearly 370,000 more votes than Labor (who saw a swing against them) and over 303,000 more than in 2019. This shows that this wasn't just a single national election, but 151 local elections, reflecting the vast array of views and concerns within our local communities. It clearly wasn't a vote for Labor, but by-and-large, a vote to be heard by many on the centre-right.

Is the message that the Coalition needs to do more to appeal to conservatives or does it need to appeal more to progressives?

Over the next few months, we'll engage in a process of reflection and evaluation, and I don't want to pre-empt that process. What I will say is that our great Coalition, which has won nearly two-thirds of Federal Elections since 1946, is at its best when we stay true to



our core values. We believe in freedom as the building block of a fair society; family as the foundation of resilient communities; strong economic management; the dignity of individuals; smaller government which facilitates peoples' potential, protects private property and rewards effort; and ensuring we leave Australia better off, for those to come.

We're a broad-church, but we're a centre-right broad-church and these are values shared by everyday Australians.

· How will the result effect your ability to achieve outcomes for Fisher?

I'll continue doing what I've always done: fighting for the issues that affect us in Fisher. I expect it will be harder and while I've never served in opposition, I'm undaunted by the task ahead. When it comes to road and rail infrastructure, I'll continue to push Labor to get on-board with Sunshine Coast Rail, and I'll fight against Council's light-rail project. When it comes to mental health, I'll continue to fight for our fair share of services, including a much-needed Veterans Wellbeing Centre, which a re-elected Liberal National Government pledged. And I'll back local businesses, including those in emerging sectors like space, defence, health sciences, and high-tech manufacturing, to ensure they're not left highand-dry by this new Federal Government, as we saw under previous iterations of Labor.


• Who would you like to see become Opposition Leader? (Ed: this question was asked before Monday's announcement that Peter **Dutton and Sussan Ley would lead the party)**

In addition to face-to-face discussions, I have also launched a survey (see www. tedobrien.com.au). My hope is to learn every possible lesson from the election so that I can better represent our local community in the next term of government.

• You're always very positive. Is it hard to stay positive given the electoral damage? Where to from here, as a party?

Life will be different in opposition, I remain optimistic about our future as a region and a nation. I'm grateful to local residents for entrusting me to continue to serve as their Federal Member, and I'll continue working as hard as ever.

•What are your local (hinterland) priorities going forward?

I want to see the big road and rail projects that I secured money for delivered, including the \$301 million Bruce Highway upgrade at the Nambour Connection Road - Maroochydore Road interchange and the \$550 million for Stage 1 of the Beerburrum to Nambour (B2N) rail upgrade. I also want to see smaller projects for which I secured funding delivered, including upgrades of community facilities and the building of homeless shelters.

Moving forward, I will continue fighting for an improved Stage 2 of the B2N project; that is, full duplication – that's two tracks – all the way

to Nambour. I secured \$5 million last year for this improved solution to be designed and we await matched funding from the Queensland Government. I am calling on the newly elected Federal Labor Government to honour the \$5 million commitment and the Queensland Government to match it.

• Do you think the Coalition swung too far to the left on climate change (as Matt Canavan says) or did it go too far to the right (as Simon Birmingham seems to be saying)?

Climate change will continue to be an important factor moving forward, and it's too complex an area of public policy to simplify into left versus right. Protecting our way of life has always been a priority for me, and that includes protecting our local environment. This will continue to be the case moving forward.

• Who would you have liked to see become Opposition Leader?

In a show of strength and unity, the Liberal Party has elected Queensland MP Peter Dutton as our new leader and Sussan Ley as our new deputy leader. They are the best leadership team to take us forward.

• What does the result mean for your role on the Olympics committee?

I will no longer hold my roles on the 2032 Games, but I will continue to work closely with all stakeholders to ensure the Sunshine Coast extracts every possible benefit from the Games.

Rain means traffic jams will continue for a while yet

FRUSTRATED motorists will have to wait another year for disruptions to ease on the Maroochydore Road and Nambour Connection Road roundabout, *pictured above*.

The Department of Transport and Main Roads has advised Nicklin MP Rob Skelton that rain has caused delays to the project timelines.

"Unfortunately the completion date for the Bruce Highway – Maroochydore Road Interchange has been pushed back to mid-2023 due to recent wet weather impacting the site, I appreciate the community's patience while the project is being completed."

Construction started in early June 2020 and completion had been expected late this year.

Mr Skelton had better news about nearby works.

"I look forward to the opening of the newly relocated Exit 200 to Mons Rd next month," Mr Skelton said. "The exit will connect to a new roundabout at the intersection of Chevallum Road and Rainforest Road and will form part of the western service road running alongside the Bruce Highway."

The Maroochydore Road and Mons Road Interchanges project is part of the Bruce Highway Upgrade Program to improve safety, ease congestion and cater for future traffic growth.

The \$301.25 million project will convert the existing Maroochydore Road and Nambour Connection Road roundabout to a fully controlled signalised interchange.

Located in the geographical centre of the Kabi Kabi First Nations Peoples traditional land, Nambour is a place of great significance, said Cr

"The Namba Place Revitalisation Project (NPRP) draws on previous community engagement and planning with community groups and council, outlining a vision for Nambour's future," he said.

"This project will provide a clear and detailed understanding of how the town centre will look and function, how much it will cost, and provide a roadmap for when each stage of construction can occur.

"In the early stages of the NPRP, council conducted a series of conversations with key community groups, a Think Tank workshop and reconsidered all the plans and documents produced over the last 10 years on Nambour's town centre.

"Further feedback and collaboration with the community will occur and I am encouraging our residents and local businesses to get involved at those points – so watch this space to have your say."

Council fees slashed to activate Precinct

SUNSHINE Coast Council will make it easier and more cost effective for theatres, bars, night-clubs or hotel traders to establish in the Nambour Special Entertainment Precinct, slashing development application fees by 50% to incentivise new business start-ups.

"Council wants the Nambour Special Entertainment Precinct to become the best it can be and providing this type of incentive to encourage new entertainment-related investment in this area is one of the ways we are supporting this outcome," Cr Law said.

"The Material Change of Use fee incentives will provide financial assistance for local businesses and community groups establishing in the precinct, which is only the second of its kind in Queensland, the first being in James Street, Fortitude Valley.

"It will provide venues with greater certainty about where and how they can operate including the relevant noise levels.

"It has been a tough couple of years for the entertainment industry, and we are committed to continue encouraging and providing assistance to the industry on the Sunshine Coast."

Infrastructure charges for development within targeted Nambour areas continue to be discounted by half to increase demand and create long-term employment in the area.

Cr Law said council's infill development incentives, which reduce infrastructure charges, had been extended by three years to June 2025 and covered targeted areas in both Nambour and Caloundra.

"The total amount of all infill incentive

approvals is limited to a maximum of \$10 million overall, so individual incentives will be granted on a first in, first served basis," Cr Law said.

"I encourage potential applicants to contact council to understand the criteria and explore payment options."

Focus on Entertainment scene

PEACE Run Records event organiser and Nambour local Andrea Kirwin said she was excited to program more events and be part of growing Nambour's entertainment scene into the future.

"We have some great shows lined up in Nambour and consistent activation is

what is going to make Nambour into a key destination for live music," Miss Kirwin said.

"We've watched the Nambour Forecourt Live events grow in attendance over the past year, and our boutique music events on Queen Street and Black Box Theatre are also gaining traction as people realise there's things happening in

With this in mind, the future of our assets like the Eddie de Vere Building is an important priority for our Council and we anticipate that we will see refurbishments including a district

level library, community meeting spaces and improvements to the Customer contact centre."

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Dive into some books with depth at Woombye Library

LIKE most avid readers I find I like to challenge myself from time to time with a book that I suspect will not be a bright and breezy read. Fortunately the collection at the Woombye Community Library has something for everyone.

• Home Fire by Kamila Shamsie centres on the story of three British Muslim siblings following each on their individual journeys across continents negotiating extreme politics and the push-pull of familial love and faith-based loyalties. It is a contemporary retelling of Sophocles Antigone which was written in 5th century BC and like the original it builds to a memorable and shocking conclusion.

· One of Australia's favourite authors Tim Winton has produced a gritty story of survival in his 2018 book *The Shepherd's Hut* which is set in the remote and brutal landscape of the West Australian desert. Jaxie Clackton is a runaway from an abusive father and narrates his story in rough Aussie slang which is unashamedly heavy with expletives. On his quest to find and reunite with his absent girlfriend, Jaxie meets an eccentric exiled priest living in an abandoned hut in the middle of nowhere and the two make an uncomfortable but ultimately redemptive

· In American Dirt by Jeanine Cummins we follow Mexican mother Lydia and her young son Luca who are forced to flee their home under threat of death from drug lords in Acapulco. They must negotiate unimaginable challenges on route to achieve their vision of a safer future in America, despite being undocumented migrants. There are harrowing descriptions of the pair roof-riding the high-speed train known as "La Bestia" (The Beast) with other desperate migrants travelling north in an attempt to reach

While all these books initially left me feeling a little emotionally battered, I did truly enjoy the richness of the reading and the well-crafted exploration of scenarios that took me way out of my comfort zone.

Maybe my next read will be light and fluffy. A Mills and Boon perhaps? Or not ...

The Muche Studio was established in 1978 by Bodo & Robyn and continues together with their daughters Carley Muche Walker and Tania




Muche, in the Somerset Region and in Maleny. The family shares a deep passion for wildlife and commitment to sustainable conservation and to adventurous travels across the globe.

Most pieces were initially drawn by Robyn, a highly respected artist and naturalist and then sculpted by Bodo in clay and wax and then taken through all the exacting stages of the lost wax casting process (which has been utilised since ancient times) to create the final bronzes. The exhibition includes clear descriptions of this intriguing process. This is a delightful opportunity to enjoy world-class art and the magnificent rainforest,

NAMBOUR resident and mother of seven sons Eileen Smith turned 100 on May 21 and celebrated with all her boys at Nambour Bowls



NAMBOUR Museum has a special display running for in June to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee after 70 years of service.

"We have some real gems included in this display, much of which has come from private collections for the occasion," said spokesperson Brooke McMahon.

Although Queen Elizabeth II has never visited Nambour on her many tours of Australia, local street names remind us of highlights of her life.

· ELIZABETH WAY: Named to honour the Queen's Coronation at Westminster Abbey on 2 June 1953.

• QUEEN STREET: On 3 February 1954, the royal barge docked at Farm Cove and Queen Elizabeth became the first reigning monarch to visit Australia. Queen Street formed part of the business block in conjunction with Ann and Lowe Street when it was officially opened on 5 November 1954

· WINDSOR ROAD: The name was selected "to honour the Royal family and Jubilee Year." Jubilee year in 1977 celebrated Queen Elizabeth's 25th year on the throne.

• CORONATION AVENUE: On 12 May 1937, Coronation Avenue was named to honour the coronation of Queen Elizabeth's father, King George VI. The following article appeared in the Nambour Chronicle. "Recognizing the influence of celebrations connected with the rising generation, functions throughout the various localities of the North Coast District on Wednesday last, demonstrated affection of Throne and Empire, and the desire for a more intense recognition of that freedom and prestige, and the moulding of the highest ideals and characteristics for which

British Empire stands."

Bumbag, phone found by divers in search for missing Nambour man

SUNSHINE Coast detectives on Monday released images of items located as part of the investigation into the disappearance of Nambour man,

The 20-year-old was last seen in the Mooloolaba area at approximately midnight on Sunday, May 22.

Nate was reported missing on Tuesday May 24 as he had made no contact with friends or

Investigations led dive squad officers to conduct a thorough search of Mooloolaba canals near Brisbane Road and River Esplanade Mooloolaba, where a phone and bumbag believed to be Nate's were located.

The dive squad completed the search between May 26 and May 27 with no other items of interest located. Investigations are ongoing.

Detectives appeal to anyone who was near Brisbane Road and River Esplanade Mooloolaba on the evening of Saturday May 21 or the following morning, who may have relevant information, CCTV or dashcam footage in the area at the time to contact police.

Anyone with information regarding the 20-year-old's whereabouts is urged to come forward, anonymous reports can be made.

What's new with Mobile Libraries?

SUNSHINE Coast Libraries is about to introduce a new mobile library timetable to better reflect community demand and patterns of use.

The new schedule, effective from May 30, will change for some current stops and new stops will be introduced to respond to more people choosing to live on the Sunshine Coast.

Sunshine Coast Council Community Portfolio Councillor David Law said the new timetable would provide a more flexible, targeted service that met community demand for Library services. "Council works with the community every day to ensure we continue to provide great services," said Cr Law.

"More people are choosing to move to the Sunshine Coast and, to ensure everyone has access to a library, council reviewed our mobile library service.

"We found some mobile library stops were under-utilised with borrowing habits changing over time. As a result of the review, three stops have been updated with new times and days -Meridan Plains, Palmwoods and Peregian Springs - and the Glasshouse Mountains stop will no longer be included in the mobile library stops.

"Beerwah Library is located within five kilometres of the previous Glasshouse Mountains Mobile Library stop and is open six days a week with a click-and-collect service available to all

"The new timetable ensures more equitable access to library services across the region."

For customers unable to access alternative libraries, there are also other ways to access library services.

Library staff are happy to discuss alternative options with customers affected by these

These may include the Home Library service which is available for borrowers who are unable to visit their local library due to illness, disability or limited mobility and have no one who can visit the library on their behalf.

Borrowers are connected with a volunteer who chooses, delivers and returns books and other library items based on the borrower's preferences.

Borrowers can also use the Council Link service, an affordable transport service available for people 60 and over, people with a disability or mobility impairment (DSP concession card holders), carers and minors accompanying eligible people (carer's card or companion card holders).

The new Mobile Library timetable will begin on Monday May 30. To keep up-to-date on library news, subscribe to the library eNewsletter or head to the Library website.

Spitting image: Nambour Artist creates personalised portraiture dolls to order

NAMBOUR'S Molly Galpin is a self taught artist who started her creative journey back in the 90s, after completing a lead lighting course.

"I have always been inspired by recycling and nature, and lead lighting opened my world to creativity," said Molly. "I ren-ovated several old houses and windows with colour, mosaics, unique lampshades and mirrors, and that was the start of my love affair with art and colour"

"In 2018 I started to paint with acrylics, a big change from soldering, however I mainly paint reverse on glass, and I dare to be different," Molly said. "I love to create whimsical and unique pieces".

Molly's art journey has evolved as she has found new ways to express her ideas.

"Last year I hand stitched 4 dolls which were representations of my grandchildren," said Molly. "It was the beginning of my new passion to make portraiture

dolls. They were sewn up on my trusty Elna sewing machine that I bought when I was 17!

"Since moving to the Sunshine Coast, I have made a great many connections, and dear friends

amongst the artistic community, and I decided to make 'the artist the subject'. I approached a couple of local artists and am so thrilled that they were happy to participate".

Molly's dolls are made with a "soft face" of fabric which has hand stitched features, enhanced with acrylic paint. The clothing is matched to the artist's personality.

'Others dolls are 'hard face' and are made from air dry clay, paper mache,or recycled lawn bowls," Molly explained. "Their bodies are often recycled pottery vases, boxes, bottles, teapots, fabric and glue.

Molly has made over 70 dolls and each original doll takes on an uncanny resemblance to

Museum restores historic railcar

NAMBOUR Museum Volunteers have recently completed the cosmetic restoration of the Moreton Sugar Mill's historic railcar 'Flyer'.

The Flyer was constructed at the mill in 1933 from a kit of parts. It was used to transport maintenance crews as well as members of the staff on tours of inspection around the cane areas east of Nambour. It earned its name due to its high speed. On the downside, its speed resulted in many derailments during its working life.

The Flyer was retired from active service around 1960 and rested on the mill's dead line until the 1970s when it left the district for 'preservation'. In 1987 it was tracked down, purchased and returned to the district in a very dilapidated condition by my family.

The frame was rebuilt, and the wheels received some welding repairs courtesy of the sugar mill's workshop. What existed at that time was reassembled in 1989 and stored until being

donated to the Nambour Museum in 2019. The recent cosmetic restoration mainly involved the construction of a new timber body and repainting. It was funded by a Heritage Grant from the Sunshine Coast Council.

Council wants to sell Lot 1 for \$850,000 in a swap for Lot 2 which they will purchase for \$130,000 in a mutually beneficial arrangement.

Maleny land swap to proceed

THE sale of a 8,223-square metre block in Maleny will go ahead despite concerns Council would be selling to a property developer for a modest sum and not putting the sale out to tender or auction.

Sunshine Coast Council voted last week to sell the block on the outskirts of Maleny to housing developer Maleny Estates for \$850,000.

In exchange for the parcel, the developer would hand over a narrow block - about 1300 square metres — for \$130,000. This would allow council to lay water and sewerage infrastructure, and connect nearby roadways.

Councillors David Law and Joe Natoli voted against the motion, raising concerns of a lack of information and clarity about the deal.

However, Division 5 Councillor Winston Johnston said suggestions the land was worth up to \$1.7m were "farcical". He said the deal was a clear and common-sense solution that was in the interests of council, the community and the

Under Queensland law, councils are meant to sell off "valuable" assets either by tender or by auction.

However, council officers reported that this was an allowed exception because it was in the public interest for the land to go to the devel-

Their report says the council does not need the land, and resuming the smaller lot would be more expensive than the land swap.

"Given the remote location of proposed Lot 1 and restricted access, it is not considered appropriate to dispose of the parcel by the way of tender or auction," the report says.

The blade on the saw carries a small electrical signal and when skin contacts the blade the safety system fires the brake, stopping the blade in less than 5 milliseconds. They have also purchased a new state of the art metal bandsaw, which significantly reduces the chance of accidents in the metal workshop.

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Proud Maleny has always supported its annual show

A MAJOR milestone in Maleny's history was celebrated on the weekend as the hinterland town celebrated its 100th year of Maleny Agricultural Shows.

Shows have been a part of Australian culture since 1822 and are strongly connected to local communities through educational, competitive, social and cultural experiences

If a town could talk, Maleny would have so many stories to tell about those early pioneer days to the alternative picturesque region visitors and residents on the Sunshine Coast now enjoy.

There are memories of the hardships of isolation, droughts and heavy rainfall causing problems for both transportation and stock, memories of the township where large general stores in Maple St stood on each side of the road opposite each other.

Hunts was on one side of Maleny's Maple St and Tytherleighs Store on the other. Both stocked just about everything farming families required in those earlier days.

Gone are the days of the bullocky and his team attempting to cross the Obi Obi Creek, scrambling over the slippery creek bed with a full wagon and load bogged to the axles.

The sealed roads we have today would have been only a pipedream for those hard-working wise cracking bullockies of the

Agricultural shows such as Maleny's would not be successful without the tireless work of local volunteers who provide so much of their time to make the show a success for all who visit and compete.

Maleny still has a country atmosphere and is such a picturesque, lush region.

The show organises special competitions to encourage rural youth including show princess, charity person.

Not-to-be-missed are the horse events, beef cattle and dairy sections, exhibits of champion livestock and competitive horsemanship which includes some of the best showjumping and dressage in Queensland.

Everyone loves the grand parade displays and the naughty Shetland ponies being led by children.

Needleworkers and the best cooks of the district vie for champion sponge cake or pickle or marmalade maker, still using their secret family recipes handed down through the generations.

School children of the district proudly produce their best work to display as they would have done over the years and to top it off kids get the day off school on Friday, June 2 to attend

All competitors hope for the blue ribbon of first prize, but it does not matter if you win or try your best, it is about keeping the culture of our Australian country shows alive with the activities that have been continued and enjoyed since the early days.

Sideshow workers spruik their rides inviting people to "come and have a go" and enjoy all types of competitive thrills. The mechanical clown faces are always a favourite with little ones hoping to win a big stuffed toy if they are

The ghost train and the octopus ride will attract the teenagers and all those who dare to be scared. The grand parade is a wonderful sight featuring many types of cattle and the beauty of a well groomed horse and rider.

If we could turn back the clock to 1922 when Maleny's first show opened, the area was a very

different place and things were done differently. A wood stove was how the cooking was done

and if mother was lucky she would have an ice chest or later a kerosene refrigerator to keep food cool. This was an Australian invention in 1923 and electricity did not come to the region until late 1939.

In 1927 the entertainment committee of the Maleny Show Society held a pioneers ball at the Maleny School of Arts in honour of the hardworking pioneers of the district. Mr A. Bryce welcomed the guests by saying it was to honour the men and women who, with stout hearts, had laid the foundation of what was today a prosperous community.

Stout hearts were needed during the Great Depression and unfortunately the show was abandoned in 1932, 1934 and 1935. A drought which caused great hardship in 1950 also caused it to be cancelled in that year. And of course there was no Show in 2020 because of Covid.

In 1990 the alternative needs of local Maleny residents saw vegetarian food served at the Maleny Show and it sold out by 5pm on the first

Delicious foods are still served at the show and many types of foods are on offer these days. Many of the recipes and cakes on display are perhaps from those early Maleny and district pioneering family recipes handwritten into exercise books handed down over many years.

THE Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) has increased its cash rate, which will likely continue to rise over the next couple of years. In this article, I'll explain

why this is happening, how high rates could go, and offer tips to ensure your financial goals are still being met.

Prior to the announcement on the May 3, the RBA hadn't increased rates since 2010, and in this time, interest dropped to historic lows. And while an increase has been projected and discussed for some time, it's still important to understand the underlying cause of why this happens.

"The unemployment rate is at 4%, the lowest level since 2008, and inflation is too high at 5%, the highest rate since the GST was introduced in 2001," said BOQ Chief Economist Peter Munckton.

Without the increase, inflation would be too high — so curbing spending through rate rises is the action the RBA takes during times like these. Conversely, when the economy needs stimulating, the RBA will lower interest rates, which is what we have seen in recent years.

Now that the rates have been initially increased, we can expect several further increases. 'Most economists expect the cash rate to reach at least 1.5%, with most of that move happening by the end of this year,' says




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

One of its chicks is partially exposed. The original transparency has won many awards in the Natural History section at international exhibitions including a gold and silver medal".

Federal Labor honours \$1.6B for

CAMCOS

SATURDAY week saw a

change of government in Canberra with Labor Prime Minister Anthony Albanese now at the helm. While both major parties suffered first preference vote reductions compared to the last

federal election in 2019, Labor's -0.5% swing wasn't as great as the Coalition's -4.9% swing. Labor gained power with 32.8% of the first preference vote.

The two-party preferred vote stands at 48%for the Coalition and 52% for Labor.

The Greens increased their vote by 1.36% since the last election (11.76% overall), winning Brisbane seats in the process.

This would have to be of concern to the state government. It may just provide the impetus to do more in

the public transport / active transport space. Things like rail duplication to Nambour should be on the agenda, along with removal of rail level crossings which would be mutually

beneficial to both vehicles and trains. Parklands, just north of Nambour, is hosting the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Game's Mountain Bike events.

That venue holds 10,000 people. Nambour should be on the list for an Olympic sized transport upgrade.

What will this change mean for public transport and in particular rail to the Sunshine Coast?

First up, the good news.

I asked on a number of occasions via Twitter, whether an Albanese government would honour the \$1.6 billion promised by the federal Coalition for the \$3.2 billion 37km CAMCOS rail line into Maroochydore.

On Friday election eve, we got an answer. Shadow Minister Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development Catherine King told the Courier-Mail (May 19, 2022): "a federal Labor Government would honour the \$1.6 billion committed but discussions with the state government would need to be had about the project timeline and costings before sign off."

On 4 May, I asked whether Labor would reduce the Coalition's federal/state 80/20 funding split back to 50/50 like they did when Labor was last in power.

That request via their website received no response, despite the website stating: 'If we are able to respond to your enquiry, you'll usually hear from us within 7 days.

It's a crucial question.

The unfunded second stage of the Beerburrum to Nambour (B2N) project hinges on it - and it needs design changes.

For years the Palaszczuk government blamed the Coalition for not funding B2N in an 80/20 split despite the fact it's state government land and a state-owned asset. They were paying 100 per cent for it the last time they extended it.

Gone will be the ability to blame the federal government for not funding or holding up Queensland projects - as has been their catch-cry excuse.


As for the cost increases, the state government has only themselves to blame.

If they had carried out the works back when they promised them, they'd have saved literally billions and we would have had duplicated rail into Maroochydore and Nambour.


The Premier has been a Minister of this government during the decade long underfunding of bus/rail projects on the Sunshine Coast.
