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MAPLETON IGA owners Kelly & Linda Anderson have been left reeling by a massive price hike which could see their annual power bill increase by \$160,000

Mr Anderson said he was stunned after receiving his most recent bill, when he worked out his annual power bill would almost quadruple from \$58,000 a year to more than \$218,000.

⁷This will cripple my business and is completely unsustainable," Mr Anderson said.

"We are desperately looking for a way to

quickly offset our electricity costs going forward because the alternative is to shut up shop for good."

The family-owned business of 26 years is already in the process of installing as many solar panels as they can on the roof. The electricity bill shows the peak energy charge rate for the premises is set to increase from 6.5453 to 25.5743 cents per kilowatt-hour when the 24-month contract period rolls over on November 1 – an increase of nearly 300 per

cent.

The off-peak rate will rise from 4.4459 to 16.0345 cents per kilowatt-hour, a 260 per cent increase.

"I saw Energy Minister Chris Bowen patting himself on the back for supposedly keeping the lights on in Australia while I'm considering turning mine off for good," Mr Anderson said.

"This is unacceptable in a country that produces so much power." I simply cannot wait for Australia to have a discussion on Modular

Nuclear power as the Clean and Green way forward for our power base load. When the sun goes down and there is no wind, we have not the current technology to economically and commercially store power with the current batteries."

Mr Anderson said AGL told him the price hike was "out of their control" and had pointed to the war in Ukraine and the increase in gas prices as the reason for the power crunch.

Fairfax MP and Shadow Minister for Climate Change and Energy Ted O'Brien, whose party has been in power for the past nine years, said it was the Albanese Government who would be held to account if small and family businesses started struggling. He said this was because, before the election, Labor had consistently promised to cut power bills. "Only last month Labor was promising to cut power bills and now they're in office, the Australian people expect nothing less than delivery on this promise," said Mr O'Brien. Federal Energy Minister Chris Bowen said

Federal Energy Minister Chris Bowen said recently "a decade of changing energy policies" meant there was "not enough investment in energy storage and non-renewable energy".

"We can start and we have started but it is not going to happen immediately. What we can do is over the next few years get it built, get the pressure on energy prices through renewable energy, I think Australians understand that you don't fix this in a day and we have never pretended we can."

AGL said Mr Anderson's original contract two years ago had been made when costs were "substantially lower" and the increase was "in line" with what was occurring in the market.

Most small businesses are on the "regulated standing offer" in Queensland and should see an average increase of about 13.4 per cent.

However, Mapleton IGA is classified as a commercial/industrial customer and must contract on an individual basis with energy retailers. Its prices are set largely at market rates.

Budget delivers for Nambour

council with the community.

"I'm pleased to see a number of pathways planned in Yandina and Nambour, connecting the hinterland community and improving our active transport connectivity."

Cr Law said road safety improvement would see the Pringle Road intersection at Panorama Drive in Nambour upgraded to clearly define the main throughfare.

"Kanes Road in Bridges will also be upgraded

to a sealed road.

"Our parks in Obi Obi, Kenilworth, Eerwah Vale, Nambour and North Arm will receive upgrades so our community can continue to enjoy our open spaces, and ensure our youngsters can play safely with playground renewal, carpark construction and fence renewal."

BUSINESS and community groups have reacted positively to the recognition shown to Nambour in the Sunshine Coast Council Budget handed down last week.

"The Division 10 Budget allocation was great news for Nambour. We are thrilled," said Tram Co director Rhonda Billett.

Ms Billett said Nambour Chamber of Commerce, Reimagine Nambour, Nambour Retailers Group and Tramco had been meeting regularly with Cr David Law and Council Economic Development and Town Planning staff to align, consolidate and promote priorities for the town.

"I've spoken with members of the four community organisations tonight (June 23) and they are thrilled with the budget for Nambour, the highlights are a good fit. The groups will now come together again in July and get ready to bring significant change to Nambour."

Ms Billett said it was important the groups presented a united front to work with Council to get the best possible outcomes for the town.

This allocation is amazing for Nambour and demonstrates Sunshine Coast Council's commitment to the town.

Ms Billett said the four groups were working to deliver new Nambour Events, CBD Revitalisation and Business Activation.

Rates up 5%. Discount scrapped for good

SUNSHINE Coast ratepayers face a minimum general rates rise of five per cent (or \$63.50) to \$1332.50 under Council's \$847 million 2022-23 budget adopted last Thursday.

As well, the early payment discount, which was scrapped in 2021, will not be returned. Council said last year the early payment discount was discontinued so it could re-establish its \$5m Disaster Rehabilitation Reserve.

Most residents (59 per cent) will pay the minimum rates but many who had seen land valuations soar in March would experience massive increases of up to 38 per cent. Across the Sunshine Coast land values increased 28.4 per cent, but some suburbs went up 80 per cent.

The minimum rates threshold applies to land values up to \$370,000. Mayor Jamieson said

council understood property owners were concerned about the impacts on their rates following recent increases in property valuations.

"While council is required, by law, to use the State Government's valuation figures to calculate the general rate, we have made adjustments to our rating categories to mitigate the full impact of the valuation increase.

"We know that the State Government valuation increases have ranged from 9.5 to 80.7 per cent, however with what council has done in this budget, the rate increase will generally not be anywhere near those percentages.

"The majority of the principal place of residence properties – around 60% of all residential properties - will see a 5% or \$63.50 increase in their general rate."



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Clubs, parks and roads benefit in **Division 5**

AN upgrade to the Warriors Football Club at Palmwoods, beautifying Woombye, maintaining the green heart at Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve and upgrades to Maroochy Botanic Gardens are some of the Sunshine Coast Council 2022-23 Budget highlights for Division 5.

Division 5 Councillor Winston Johnston said there was a range of exciting projects for his community as part of Council's \$847 million budget which was handed down last Thursday (June 23).

"This includes kicking goals for the Palmwoods Warriors Football club which will receive a \$600,000 upgrade," Cr Johnston said.

"One of my top priorities is to keep our small communities, residents and farmers connected on our country roads.

"That's why this budget will deliver upgrades, reseals, lane widening, rehabilitations and bridge improvements to several roads including Brandenburg Road in Mooloolah Valley, Stage 5 works for Glenview Road in Glenview, portions of Perrins Road and Mossy Bank Roads in Eudlo and various roads in Maleny, Chevallum, Wootha and Woombye.

"Focusing on upgrading our road network will improve access and safety for our daily commutes and all road users including pedestrians and cyclists.

"There will also be a number of other upgrades taking place in the hinterland including track renewals at Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve which covers 55 hectares of tranquil rainforest with diverse flora and wildlife.

"The Ecological Park Master Plan will move forward and the Butterfly Walk will also undergo some renewal work and installation of interpretive signage to help visitors discover new and dramatic scenery.

"Funding has also been allocated for future planning of Maroochy Botanic Garden Masterplan's 'Eucalypt Glades' which aims to build on visitor experience.


"Council's 2022-23 budget allocation will see funding to complete Woombye's new-look streetscape, which is progressing quite nicely since preliminary works on the additional car parking on Hill, Blackall and Keli streets wrapped up early-March.

"More than \$970,000 has been allocated to complete the second phase of works, which will start mid-year, to create a cool and shady main street, improve pedestrian accessibility and calm traffic."

Cr Johnston said higher in the hinterland, design funding would be invested to start consultation and planning for some minor streetscape upgrades in Montville and Maleny to improve the day-to-day experience of people living, working and visiting the popular hinterland towns.

"Placemaking projects are an important part of enhancing those aspects our residents already love about their lively townships," he said. "Many lookouts, parks and playgrounds across Division 5 will also be upgraded with assets being replaced or installed, including signage, barbecues, shelters, playgrounds and



Tram accreditation track is clear and now it's full steam ahead

IT'S been a long journey for the Nambour Tram project, with some delays and detours, but the final destination is in sight after a major milestone was reached this month.

TramCo welcomed a certificate of accreditation from the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator (ONRSR) which cleared the way to the

project's new completion date mid next year.

Chairman Greg Rogerson was proud and relieved the locally designed and built tram had passed the crucial but onerous milestone.

"We understand our obligation and responsibility to make sure that this tram is absolutely fully compliant with the Department of Transport and Main Roads and the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator (ONRSR)," he said. "And that it is truly fit-for-purpose and compliant. We have a great responsibility. Council have invested a couple of million dollars into the project and we have received well in excess of \$2 million from Rod and Jan Forrester and Roy and Nola Thompson. We have to make sure everything is perfect. And so it takes time."

The interactive tram is being designed by renowned Witta kinetic artist Russell Anderson in his typical vibrant and eye-catching style.

Described by Federal Member for Fairfax Ted O'Brien at last year's design launch as "a moving piece of street theatre" the much-anticipated battery and solar-powered tram was expected to be operational by the end of last year.

But Mr Rogerson said the team was now hoping to have the tram on the tracks mid 2023.

"We're all working towards June-July next year, now that we've satisfied this major compliance requirement. Getting that approval was

"It's an extremely complex and rigorous process and it's taking longer than we anticipated, but we firmly believe the longer we go down this journey it will not only be a great attraction for Nambour, it will be the best tram of its kind in the world. We genuinely believe that.

Nambour Tramway Company director Rhonda Billett said the heritage-listed tramline was expected to provide Nambour with a rich, historical point of difference and help drive tourism and support the local economy.

"We've been through a very drawn-out pro-

cess but it's full steam ahead now that this behind-the-scenes groundwork has been completed," she said.

The battery-powered tram will run between Nambour Mill Village Shopping Centre to the southern end of Quota Park between Repco and Aldi, and along Mill and Howard Streets.

The project has faced criticism locally as "tram to nowhere", with some saying the journey terminates only a relatively short distance away. The initial designs were criticised as boring and there has been mixed response on the current steam punk-inspired option.

Supporters, including Member for Fairfax Ted O'Brien, predict it will be a key ingredient in sparking life into the Nambour CBD.

Engineers Kevin Covey and Stephen Braiden from Consulting Engineers Covey Associates have been collaborating with Mr Anderson on the meticulous build.

Revolutionary Power Source

Meanwhile, TNC Co has hinted that they are progressing with a revolutionary new power source for the Tram. They have indicated that, after completion of trials and data logging of the relevant technology, they will be able to confidently share it with the general public within a few weeks.

Parking & safety improved for Palmwoods pedestrians

A plan to improve parking and pedestrian safety in Palmwoods is taking shape with works starting in the coming months.

Locals were invited to have their say between April and May this year on a revised concept design for improvements on Margaret Street,

Key features of the proposal included a car parking area in the centre of the road with wider than standard bays, a new pedestrian crossing near Rick's Garage, a raised speed platform and a U-turn facility.

The \$1m project is funded under the Australian Government's Road Safety Program with the Commonwealth Government contributing \$800,000 and the Queensland Government contributing \$200,000.

Construction is expected to start in the next 12 months and take about two months to complete, weather permitting.

In addition to this work, an assessment is underway for potential upgrades to the Jubilee Drive and Chevallum Road intersections.

Compass Head of Business and Growth Sandra Brodie said the Connections Café opened six years ago with the goal of providing real world vocational opportunities and training for people with disabilities.

This included food preparation, cooking, waiting on tables, point of sale and even barista skills. "Compass Connections Café has become one of our most successful and vibrant social enterprises," said Sandra.

"The community has really embraced us since day one and have become part of the fabric of the café.

"The best part is seeing the interactions between customers and our Trainees. The Trainees love engaging with people and take real pride in serving them. They know they have a genuine, valued role to play every day and that really shines through. They bring so much joy and presence into every encounter, and because of that our customers are always walking away with a smile and an experience of something that feels unique."

More than 50 Trainees have taken vocational training at the café since it opened in 2016. They all work closely in a supported environment alongside full-time staff to ensure customers have a memorable experience. The team serves breakfast and lunch, as well as sweet treats that are all made in-house, plus a full selection of coffees, teas and milkshakes from Monday to Friday.

"Whilst the café has been operating successfully for six years, we saw the potential to really take it to the next level," said Sandra.

"A big driver for that comes from our vision to raise the profile of people with disabilities and to shift perceptions of what they are capable of.

"The end result of our stage one refurbishment of the café is incredible. It's not only a café with a purpose, it's a showcase of the incredible talents across Compass and it's presented in a way that's worthy of any trendy city in Australia.

Customers are greeted with a stunning range of artwork on the wall and shelves, which have been produced by Compass trainees, and 80% of the furniture is either second-hand or re-purposed from across the Sunshine Coast community, so it's got that funky feel which makes you want to stay a little longer while you soak in the atmosphere," Sandra said.

Community pitches in

Compass CEO David Dangerfield said the Café's three-week major transformation would not have been possible without the support of the local business community.

What we have created is something unique, a destination café with a purpose, that has become a hallmark of the Nambour community. And it would not have been possible without the assistance of our long-term partners at Cricks Sunshine Coast who have supported us since we first opened six years ago.

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
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Nambour mourns passing of respected real estate identity

WELL-RESPECTED and loved local real estate agent Terry Hinds sadly passed away at age 81 on June 14 at his family home in Nambour after an ongoing battle with prostate cancer.

The tributes and outpouring of love for Terry are a testament to the impact he had on so many during his life.

"I think dad would be absolutely touched by the people who have reached out to our family, and who have travelled from all around the country to pay their respects," said his daughter Toni.

One of four children, Terry was born in Collinsville in 1940. From early on, his great love of sport was evident. He was introduced to rugby at Townsville Grammar School, where he attended as a boarder. His passion for football only grew and in 1964 he played hooker in the premiership winning Townsville Brothers Rugby League team.

Terry entered the workforce in the Collinsville mines as a cadet surveyor and pay clerk. This work then led to a job at the local abattoir as an assistant accountant.

It was at this time that Terry met his beloved wife Ursula. Terry and Ursula moved to Brisbane in 1971 where Terry worked with Trans Australia Airlines for ten years. In 1974 they moved to Nambour and bought the Nambour Toy and Sports Store.

Terry Hinds will be sadly missed. "He was a person who said it like it was, and always spoke with a bit of cheek."

Over the years Terry and Ursula became proud and loving parents to their daughter Toni and son Ian. "Dad loved the outdoors and we have so many wonderful memories of him taking us camping, fishing and crabbing," Toni said. "He was a man who said it like it was, but he also had an incredible sense of fun and always spoke with a bit of cheek."

Through his Toy and Sports business, Terry was able to make ongoing contributions to the sports he loved so much. "Dad spent decades volunteering for sporting clubs and organisations in all kinds of ways," said Toni.

Amongst other things, Terry coached the Nambour PCYC youth team and sold raffle tickets at the Royal George Hotel to raise money for a shaded stand for parents at local cricket

He held positions with the Nambour Golf Club, the Sunshine Coast Rugby League Judiciary and the Sunshine Coast Sportsmen Association.


Mr Hinds is remembered as a savvy and energetic businessman who first went into real estate in 1980 after helping to establish LJ Hooker in Nambour. He then worked for First National Real Estate before starting his own agency in 2001. From that point, Terry operated Terry Hinds Real Estate out of his Nambour home. In an industry that is tough, competitive and often erratic in nature, Terry was overwhelmingly regarded as a steadfast man of the highest integrity and principles.

"Since my dad passed, I have been a little overwhelmed by stories of his compassion and kindness," Toni said. "There were so many times when he gave people a chance when they were unable to rent a property because they had been property owners and had no rental history. Sometimes they were women escaping violent situations. My dad always gave people a go and more times than I can mention, these same people went on to become our best tenants.

"But that was just my dad. He was always helping people. His kindness and devotion to his family are just a part of the reason we loved him so much.'

Terry continued to work with Toni in the family business, helping with the management and book work in the years before his passing.

Mr Hinds was remembered as a loving husband to Ursula, wonderful father to Toni and Ian and devoted poppy to Tiahna and Levi.

Changes to public transport fares


CHANGES to public transport fares will be rolled out across the hinterland this year following a review of bus fares and zones.

On Monday, July 4 a new fare and zone structure will be introduced across the urban bus network in preparation for the implementation of 'Smart Ticketing'.

Eudlo resident mentioned in the Queen's Birthday Honours 2022

EUDLO'S Clive Plater has been awarded an Order of Australia Medal [OAM] in this year's Queen's Birthday Honours for Services to Community History.

Clive has been involved with the Nambour & District Historical Museum since its incorporation 29 years ago and is in his 16th year as president. Born and bred in Nambour, he is a proud fourth generation local whose great-grandfather, G L Bury was the first Chairman of the Moreton Central Sugar Mill.

Having two great-grandfathers, two grandfathers, father and three uncles involved with the local sugar industry it is no wonder Clive has a great interest in preserving our local history. He authored a book Locomotives of the Moreton Central Sugar Mill in 2013 which was launched by Governor Penelope Wensley AC to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the mill's closure.

One of Clive's uncles was killed in World War II. The family's military history goes back to the 1850s Crimean War in which one of his great-great-grandfathers died. Hence a prominent military section has been established at the Nambour Museum to honour our local

Clive and his father, Edgar Plater, started collecting historical items being discarded by the Moreton Sugar Mill back in the 1970s long before the establishment of a local museum and the family retains a substantial private collection that at times supplements special displays at the Nambour Museum.

Clive also served as an Honorary Warden with the archeology branch of the Department of Aboriginal Affairs from 1979 to 1988 and five years as a member of the Sunshine Coast Council's Heritage Reference Group.

As luck would have it Clive and wife Lorelle were on Norfolk Island for their annual visit when the Queen's Birthday Honours were announced. Clive said it was rather special to be on Norfolk Island for the Queen's Birthday public holiday where the Queen is held in such high regard and God save the Queen is still the national anthem.

Local internet provider offers freedom from broadband rage

"INTERNET provider rage" has for many people become an aggravating and inconvenient fact of life online.

"People are often locked into lengthy contracts with their provider and can't change. This is incredibly frustrating", said Freedom Broadband Manager, Peter Pilt. "As the name suggests,

Freedom Broadband is all about giving you the freedom to change provider at any time".

Freedom Broadband is a Maroochydore based business with nine stores between Beenleigh and Rockhampton.

We employ 20 staff, so we are small but hungry," Peter said.

"And we have 'stores with a door'. Service is paramount for us. We are providing the type of personalised service and support that the big telcos have abandoned.

"I am constantly shocked at how difficult corporate Australia has made it to do business. Most companies bury their phone number on their website, and when you do finally manage to locate a support number, you are kept waiting, only to eventually be transferred to a call centre. It is not good enough."

Unlike most large internet providers, Freedom Broadband does not provide email addresses or have lock in contracts.

"Big telcos are able to lock your modem so you can't move.

"I've seen people stuck on three year contracts with no way of getting out of them," Peter explained. "We use TP link modems so you can be with us for a month, or ten years. The choice is all yours."

Peter personally delivers modems to his customers and is able to assist in the connection of phones, smart TVs, Alexa and iPads.

"This is particularly useful for my elderly customers or those who are not especially tech savvy," Peter said.

"We are usually able to solve problems for our customers fast."

Freedom Broadband also has a philanthropic commitment to support DV Safe Phone, a local organisation that recycles unwanted phones and distributes them to people who are in domestic violence situations.

"It is fairly typical that domestic violence perpetrators confiscate their victims' phones," said Peter. "This leaves them completely isolated and vulnerable. DV Safe Phones recycles donated phones by clearing them and putting in a new SIM card.

"This can be hidden by the victim and used in cases of emergency. It is a practical way to assist people in dangerous situations.

"Five dollars a month from every Freedom Broadband account is donated to this fantastic initiative".

Offsets & redraws and how they help



AN offset account and redraw facility could help you to pay down your home loan more quickly and reduce your interest When choosing between the two, it's vital

to consider your own individual circumstances as they both offer slightly different approaches to mortgage repayments.

What is an Offset Account?

An offset account is a stand-alone savings account that is linked to your home loan, with the same lender.

You can make regular or one-off deposits to your offset account and withdraw from it as needed. In this sense, it operates like a normal transactional savings account.

It even comes with a debit card, enabling you to withdraw cash from an ATM, the same as your savings account.

The primary difference between a traditional account and an offset account is that the money in an offset account does not earn its own interest. Instead, it offsets the balance in that account, against your mortgage balance.

In other words, at the end of each day the

account balance is subtracted from your home loan balance before interest is calculated. This reduces the amount of interest you pay on your mortgage because the interest charged on your home loan is calculated on your loan balance minus the funds held in your offset account.

What is a Redraw Facility?

A redraw facility is not a separate account from your home loan. Instead, it is a feature of a variable rate mortgage that enables you to make additional repayments into your home loan, above the minimum payment amount. This reduces the balance owing on your home loan, which means you will pay less interest and can pay your loan off more quickly.

A redraw facility also enables you to withdraw from those additional repayments at any time, should you need to. However, you must have been making additional repayments beforehand. If you do make a withdrawal, the balance of your home loan will also increase by the amount withdrawn and your interest costs will go up too.

Local property tide turns to a buyers' market amid interest rates pressures

RISING interest rates and an influx of property on to the market has resulted in a rebalancing of local home prices in the hinterland, according to a Nambour real estate agent.

"In the last two to three weeks we have seen the move from what has been a seller's market, for the last 18 months,

market, for the last 18 months, to more of a buyers' market," said RE/MAX Nambour Director Tristan Brown, pictured.

"Essentially there is more property coming to the market for buyers to choose from. On Realesate.com, for instance, there has been an influx of new listings and that simply gives buyers a greater opportunity to shop around and find the right home for them at the right price.

"As a seller, this means you have a little bit more competition out there. So if your home is not showing value, chances are the buyer will take their money and walk until they find something else. In saying that there are still good prices to be had."

The Reserve Bank of Australia's move to raise rates earlier than expected has had a sobering effect on the property market across Australia as buyers are limited by the amount they can borrow. Earlier this year, ANZ had predicted that house prices would rise by 8 per cent on average in capital cities across Australia, but it later slashed the forecast to house values dropping by 3 per cent in 2022 on the back of unexpected rate rises for the rest of the year.

The major bank has also forecast that house prices will plunge by a further 8 per cent next year, an even bigger drop than its earlier forecast for 2023.


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



No Hits, all misses in 2022 **State Budget**

THE 2022 Queensland State Budget is a budget of broken promises and missed opportunities.

Despite a windfall of more than \$9 billion in extra revenue, the Palaszczuk Labor Government have broken their pre-election promise and brought in three new taxes.

Taxes that will eventually flow through to the cost of groceries and the price of electricity. Every local will end up paying more because of this broken promise - at a time Queenslanders face a "full blown cost of living crisis".

Over the past seven years, the Palaszczuk Labor Government has destroyed the health system, the road network and the economy in

This budget offers no immediate solutions to these and the many other problems our region

We are told the construction of three new hospitals promised in the budget will take another seven years. That's not going to address the constant ambulance ramping occurring right now at Caboolture or Sunshine Coast University Hospitals. That means one out of every two locals will still spend too long sitting in an ambulance instead of being treated in a hospital bed.

There is no new money in this budget to fix our roads, including our most dangerous roads like Mount Mee Road and the D'Aguilar Highway and it's many perilous intersections.

When it comes to housing, there's nothing new in this year's budget - not another cent towards a new home to house a Queenslander in need. At a time where families are living in tents, cars and couch surfing, this is unfathomable and inhumane.

I do, genuinely, welcome the additional funding for mental health services. My family, like so many local families, has been touched by mental illness. I know, first-hand, how desperately this investment is needed. I'm just disappointed and dismayed that it has had to be funded through a new tax.

But, sadly, that's where the good news ends. Queenslanders deserve so much better than this. This is a budget of broken promises from a government you can no longer trust.



Queensland Govt's 'Fail Revolution'

The Queensland State Government's so called 'rail revolution' was exposed recently as a 'fail revolution' with the revelation of a \$1.835 billion underspend on the Sunshine Coast.

State Labor's commitments for 'new rail projects' within the Queensland Budget represented nothing less than daylight robbery.

The Sunshine Coast is focused on three rail projects in particular and Labor is shortchanging us on every single one.

- · The former Federal Government budgeted \$390 million on a 50:50 split towards Stage 1 of the Beerburrum to Nambour rail upgrade. The State committed only \$160 million.
- The former Federal Government budgeted \$5 million on a 50:50 split to redesign Stage 2 of the Beerburrum to Nambour rail upgrade to allow for full duplication to Nambour. The State committed only \$1.25 million.
- \$1.6 billion on a 50:50 split towards a new \$3.2 billion heavy passenger rail line between Beerwah and Maroochydore to be built ahead of the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games. The State committed \$0.

I will continue fighting to secure the funding required to deliver better rail for the Sunshine

Power prices

Power bills are skyrocketing, and people are hurting. I recently visited the owner of Mapleton IGA, Kelly Anderson, who has been slugged with an additional \$160,000 on his annual electricity bill. This is unaffordable.

A global energy crisis has hit our shores and it is up to the government of the day to manage the domestic fall out.

The Coalition was managing the situation up until the May election. It's not easy, but we were able to get power bills down by 8 percent for small businesses over the last two year alone.

It is now up to Labor to manage the energy system. Labor went to the election promising to cut power bills even further. The Australian people expect nothing less than delivery on this

items for the Division 5 community including upgrades to the Warriors Football Club at Palmwoods, beautifying Woombye, maintaining the green heart at Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve and upgrades to Maroochy Botanic Gardens in Council's \$847 million 2022–23 Budget.

One of my top priorities is to keep our small communities, residents and farmers connected on our country roads. This budget will deliver upgrades, reseals, lane widening, rehabilitations and bridge improvements to several roads including Brandenburg Road in Mooloolah Valley, Stage 5 works for Glenview Road in Glenview, portions of Perrins Road and Mossy Bank Roads in Eudlo and various roads in Maleny, Chevallum, Wootha and Woombye.

A number of last year's road reseal and rehabilitation projects will be carried out over the next two financial years as a result of the rain events in February and March, and again in May. Detailed inspections have been carried out to assess the extent of the road repairs which have now been approved by the Queensland Reconstruction Authority. Some of the roads and land slips require a very detailed design so please be patient while we undertake these works.

There will also be a number of other upgrades taking place in the hinterland including track renewals at Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve which covers 55 hectares of tranquil rainforest with diverse flora and wildlife. The Ecological Park Master Plan will move forward and the Butterfly Walk will also undergo some renewal work and installation of interpretive signage to help visitors discover new and dramatic scenery.

Staying in the hinterland, design funding will also be invested to start consultation and planning for some minor streetscape upgrades in Montville and Maleny to improve the dayto-day experience of people living, working and visiting the popular hinterland towns.



Nicklin receives record funding

I'm thankful we have received record level funding across the Nicklin electorate including \$11.7 Million to go towards school infrastructure, delivering new halls at Noosa District State High, Burnside State High, and Yandina State School. We're also spending \$1.7 Million to refurbish classrooms at Noosa District State High, Nambour State College, Woombye State School and Burnside State School.

Community Centre Funding

Earlier this year the Community Support and Services committee, of which I'm a member, recommended the Government increase the base level of funding to neighbourhood and community centres. The government has listened and increased base funding from \$124,000 to \$230,000 per annum, resulting in an extra \$106,000 per year!

This additional funding allows centres to hire new staff, buy equipment and deliver additional services and support for people who need it most - including those experiencing domestic and family violence, social isolation and loneliness, homelessness, and financial stress. For vulnerable people in our community, this support can be life changing.

Health Funding

We're putting the health of Queenslanders first and foremost with our record investment in health of \$23.6 Billion. Delivering three new hospitals, a new Queensland Cancer Centre, 11 hospital expansion projects across Queensland, 2,200 new beds, new doctors, and nurses, we're supporting our frontline heroes to get their jobs done.

This includes \$1.64 billion over five years to improve mental health and wellbeing and combat substance abuse, representing the single largest investment in Mental Health in our State's history

NOT all calls to WILVOS Hotline 5441 6200 about cute furry, feathery, scaley or spiney Sometimes the call may just be about eggs, but they are no less important.

Recently plover nests of eggs came from a others to arrive. very busy sports



ground. They were in danger of being trampled. Eggs aren't removed unless all options are investigated.

The little plover chicks that have hatched in the humidicrib are patiently waiting for the last chick in their batch to appear. I'm sure their squeaking encourages any other little ones in the egg. Before the first one hatched, it was quite noisy inside the egg. It was the squeaking that alerted me to the impending event!

It was also interesting to get a call about a nest of seven emu eggs, in west from the coast. The eggs must be moved due to clearing and it is not advisable to fence off this area around the eggs. It is always important to check the reasons for removal of eggs in case there is another solution. The male hasn't begun sitting on the eggs yet. Because there are no incubation facilities on site, WILVOS were called upon.

My only experience with emus has been in having a female lay her eggs and being very excited when the male sat on them. It was a long almost two months for the very cute chicks to arrive. These chicks were removed from underneath the male and successfully hand-reared, as the female was intent on killing them!

Technology is amazing with calls coming from all over Australia. It was just last weekend that the Hotline had a call from a lady who had hit a mob of emus and had injured one. With a quick google search, a Rockhampton wildlife group agreed to solve the problem.

There is never a dull moment for our WILVO Hotline volunteers.

Bus changes are welcomed, goodbye Qconnect

MONDAY 11 July will see a few improvements to

a couple of our local bus routes here on the Coast, and the changes are warmly welcomed. It's been a while (three years).

If you use bus 611, 612 or 615 you'll see changes.

Bus 611 will now extend into Kawana Forest estate at Meridan Plains.

Bus 612 will now extend into Bli Bli to reach Parklakes 2 Estate.

A bus route 615 tweak will change the 2.23pm weekday service departure from Australia Zoo to depart at 12.53pm.

Translink are also making the temporary stop relocation to the entrance of the zoo, permanent.

Translink are extending bus 611 (currently Maroochydore to Sunshine Coast University Hospital) into Kawana Forest estate in Meridan Plains.

The service will run half-hourly on weekdays

and hourly on weekends. It will stop at two new bus stops on: Woodlands Boulevard, near the Forest Park Drive roundabout and Woodlands Boulevard at Pacific Lutheran College (drop off only).

They're extending route 612 (currently Nambour to Maroochydore) further into Bli Bli to service the Parklakes 2 estate.

This service runs hourly, seven days a week between Nambour and Maroochydore, and will stop at nine new bus stops located at Parklakes Drive, Bli Bli, Parklakes Drive near Bottlebrush Avenue, Parklakes Drive near Clarence Avenue, Parklakes Drive near Camp Flat Road, Parklakes Drive near Agnes Place and the Good Samaritan Catholic College.

Future moves

On the Bus agenda for the future is an extension of services into Palmview later this year. Routes 614 and 619 in Maroochydore will also be realigned later this year to provide access into the new City Hall and Council Chambers development in the Maroochydore CBD.

Qconnect and Queensland regional service changes

Monday 4 July will also see big changes to regional transport services in Queensland.

The Bowen, Fraser Coast, Innisfail, Sunshine Coast hinterland, Warwick and the Whitsundays' regions will join the TransLink App Journey Planner network. This is a good thing but it's still baby steps for integration.

There will be new fare zones and prices for these regional areas - but paper tickets are still the go in the regions - with no timeframe for Go Card availability yet - according to my TransLink 13 12 30 source.

For the Sunshine Coast Hinterland there will be 5 zones with prices starting at \$2.40 for a single (zone 1) ticket, \$4.80 for a daily (zone 1) ticket and \$19.20 for a Ten-trip (zone 1) ticket.

Concession fares will be half-price.

The Sunshine Coast Hinterland region includes travel from Nambour (Zone 1) up to Mapleton, Flaxton (Zone 2), then south to Montville (Zone 3) and onto Maleny and Mount Mellum (Zone 4) and reaching Landsborough railway station (Zone 5).

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
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
