The judges were astounded by the poultry exhibits and the extremely high standard of exhibits across the board. The fresh flowers and floral arrangements in particular, were incredible this year. The gate and bar figures were the highest in

Ray White Rodeo raises \$97,773 for community groups

THE Ray White Nambour Rodeo, in just its third year, has achieved remarkable success by raising \$97,773 for Nambour community groups.

Money will be shared between Reimagine Nambour, Nambour Tramway Company and Sundale Community Foundation. Additionally, \$10,000 has been pledged to the Nambour Men's Shed, for when they find a much-needed new

Ray White Principal Matt O'Grady said he was proud to support Nambour's development through the generous funding.

"We look forward to getting those funds out to the groups that need it to actually help make Nambour the place it should be," he said. "This is exactly what we envisaged for this rodeo. This money is for people that are on the streets doing the work and the funds go to the people that need it. That's what we want."

This year, the rodeo faced no significant obstacles, unlike the inaugural event in 2021,

which was impacted by COVID restrictions, and the rain-affected event in 2022. The numbers reflect the rodeo's growing popularity, with ticket sales reaching 3,983 and 4,800 drinks sold, resulting in the impressive total.

Notably, this year's rodeo featured a full points rodeo, including all events. The day saw a diverse range of attendees, particularly families with young children, who enjoyed the various activities. The event experienced a surge in attendance as the day progressed, with the bar bustling and sales of rum and beer skyrocketing.

An analysis of ticket sales data revealed that 84 percent of attendees were from outside Nambour, highlighting the event's ability to draw people to town.

Sundale Community Foundation Chair Caroline Hutchinson thanked Mr O'Grady for the

\$10,000 donation which would be distributed to support projects run by local community groups.

The Nambour Men's Shed, faced with the task of finding a new home by September, received recognition for its essential work in supporting local men's mental health. Mr O'Grady pledged a \$10,000 donation to the club upon securing a new location.

Mr O'Grady thanked sponsors, including Cricks, Mackellar, Snap Fitness, Done & Dusted, Ray White Commercial, Cronau Enterprises, and Mason Finance Group, as well as the dedicated volunteers who contributed to the success of the event.

Deep Blue Line program plots path to life lessons

DEEP Blue Line is a police officer led mentoring program that aims to enhance young people's positive sense of self, boost self-esteem, provide a variety of positive life experiences, encourage goal setting behaviours and expose participants to healthy role models.

Weekly sessions deliver life-skills sessions and interactions with mentors based around the key learning areas of communication, wellbeing and positive futures. The program provides a mix of club-based sessions, activities, experiences and excursions, and culminates in a three-day adventure based camp.

Thanks to sponsorship from the Community Bank Woombye & Districts, an 8-week Deep Blue Line program has just been completed with seven teenage boys from Nambour.

"The young men who participate in these programs have generally come onto the radar because of anti social behaviour or they have been expelled, or are at risk of being expelled, or have already entered the juvenile justice system," said Police Sergeant, Mick Hughes.

"Often-times these young men lack positive adult male role models in their lives and through these interventions we hope to not only teach them important life skills, but to give them positive experiences and ongoing relationships with the police.'

The most recent program was facilitated by Sergeant Hughes and Senior Constable Marty Hunt who is based at Nambour State College.

"A big aspect of what we do is to teach boys about taking healthy risks, discouraging anti-social behaviour and moving away from conflict and negative influences," he said.

"And much of what we do is simple stuff that most people take for granted. This can be anything from learning to make eye contact with people and shake hands, to simple nutrition

and meal preparation, and conflict and risk management.

From cooking and eating together to racing at the Big Kart Track

"We use a variety of engaging and fun ways to do this from cooking and eating meals together, driving at the Big Kart Track, going to NRL games and diving with the seals at Underwater World," Sergeant Hughes said.

"At the end of each camp we get the kids to write a letter to themselves and we mail it to them 6 months later. Our goal is to keep the connection going beyond the camp and we have young men now who are looking forward to future camps and leadership camps.

Sergeant Hughes said he has been blown away by the generosity of the local businesses who have thrown their support behind the Deep Blue Line.

"Community Bank Woombye & Districts have been particularly generous, and The Big Kart Track, Ken Mills Toyota, Sealife Aquarium and Fruity Life have all been incredible," he said.

"As a Community bank who looks to improve as many areas of our local community as possible, we felt that the Deep Blue Line program offers some invaluable life lessons to a younger generation, through positive everyday activities and events - sneaking the learning into the fun," said Bank Manager, Hayley Saunders.

"The program is very well structured and the benefits are apparent."

"Sergeant Mick has an obvious passion and commitment to the program and is a strong advocate for the local youth," added Bank Director, Stephen Marshall.

Heartwarming conversations filled the air, forging new connections and strengthening existing bonds. The beautifully arranged tables, were adorned with flowers and contagious smiles.



Unearthed time capsule reveals RangeCare's history

'The time capsule symbolizes the organization's resilience, spirit, growth, and hope for the future—an embodiment of the people who created it and the world they once lived in."

Gillie Warren, a Life Member with a longstanding connection to RangeCare, expressed her appreciation for the organization's growth without losing touch with its clients. She highlighted the significant progress made in the past decade to meet the increasing demand for

Burnside ban helps inspire **State moves** for digital detox

SINCE its pioneering decision to ban phones on campus in 2008, Burnside State High School has become a shining example of the transformative impact the policy can have on student engagement and culture.

Now, the Head's Up Alliance is campaigning for a smart-phone ban across all Queensland state high schools.

Having led the way on this issue for over a decade, the school community at Burnside experiences the daily benefits.

Principal Kerri Dunn had just arrived at the school and was shocked that students were even using their phones during Parade.

"There were students taking phone calls while I was addressing them," Ms Dunn said. "At the time I thought 'I am not going to be able to deal with this!'.

In practice, the ban proved to be quite simple.

"It was a very easy recipe," said Ms Dunn. "Good relationships and consultation with our parents and school community was the key. Support for the idea from parents and teachers was unanimous and I found that everyone got on board very quickly."

At Burnside phones are out of sight during school time and have to be kept in pockets or

"If they are seen they are confiscated and students have to hand them in at the admin office or hand them over," Ms Dunn explained.
"On the third strike, parents have to collect. In some cases parents even say 'oh they can go without them for the weekend'!

"If a student has their phone out I do not even have to say anything. They just know they



Crafting comfort & joy:

Sunshine Linus weaves warmth & kindness for people in need

IN June 2010, twenty crafters gathered in Forest Glen to launch a not-for-profit organisation called Sunshine Linus Inc.

Their mission was to provide, without charge, quilts and other comforts to people in need on the Sunshine Coast.

They were mostly mature, retired women who wished to support the welfare of needy people in the community by employing the many and varied hand-crafting skills they had developed over their lifetimes.

Now based in Nambour, Sunshine Linus receives donations of craft resources from the community from which they create items which are desired and requested and donate the completed items entirely free to organisations who will benefit.

"We had the skills, and we had the time, and we knew the community had the resources such as fabrics and yarns to donate and help us put to good use," said founding member Judie Bellingham.

"We started by making quilts of all sizes for patients in nursing homes, children in hospitals, and palliative care patients. Word soon spread around the health care community and before long we were receiving requests for lots of different items from nursing homes, hospitals, special needs schools, women's retreats and disability services to name a few."

Some of the items they provide to hospitals include breast pillows, drainage bags and catheter covers, scrub caps, operating gowns for children, quilts, towelling heat pack covers and treatment bags to hold medicines and x-rays on discharge.

Nursing homes receive wheely-walker bags, clothing protectors and bibs, crochet lap rugs and shawls, touchy feely sensory items for dementia patients and so much more.

Neonatal Units receive premature bonnets and peanut pillows, Baby Angel Pods, Bereavement packs and other comforts.

Women's Retreats, community service organisations such as St Vincent's, the Mens Shed and the Salvation Army benefit from a huge array of items including quilts and bedding, handmade clothing for adults and children, toiletry items in toiletry bags, sleepwear, jumpers, beanies and socks, overnight bags and more.

Special schoolteachers are given touchy feely sensory items for their students to use in a teaching setting including sensory mats, aprons, wall hangings, fabric games and weighted toys.

Police stations are provided with activity

bags for children who are temporarily held in custody situations at police stations.

"The bags are made with happy bright fabrics and contain a load of goodies to occupy and distract the children including pencils, paper, little games, pj's, toiletries etc," said

'Woombye will be back to normal soon but we need your support,' says business owner

WOOMBYE'S new-look Blackall Street will be open for business by June 28. And it can't come too soon for the Blackall Street businesses struggling with reduced trade over the past seven months due to parking, traffic, and visitor disruptions.

Council's Blackall Street Streetscape Project has stifled patronage of the bustling town, according to one business owner.

She said the roadworks, which began October last year, had been "extremely detrimental" to her and other businesses.

"The number of customers has severely dropped and so our takings have dropped," she said. "It's been an extremely stressful time, coupled with inflation rising and our mortgages rising. We only hope that our customers will return once this is all over.

"I've had my business in Woombye for over 11 years and this is the hardest and most stressful it's ever been and we need people

to come back to town. All the businesses are feeling the effects."

The opening of a Heritage Trail, associated with the Streetscape Project, will take place on June 28 with construction work due to be completed before that date.

'My suggestion is that on the completion of the streetscape, once all the roadworks etc are gone, maybe the Woombye Business and Community Association could do a big push and spread the word that 'Woombye is open for business again and businesses need your support'," said the businessperson.

Council's Placemaking Team consulted with the Woombye community, starting in November 2020, regarding the makeover.

Shady street trees and garden beds have been planted to cool the footpath, beautify and extend the green, leafy look and feel, to the west of the town centre.

Shopfront wraps brighten CBD square

AN empty tenancy in the Nambour CBD has been brightened with shop front window wraps showcasing parking solutions in town and the Nambour Vintage Op Shop Map.

Nambour Chamber of Commerce, Nambour Tram Co, Nambour Retailers Group and Reimagine Nambour collaborated on the project with Sunshine Coast Council. The work was completed by Graeme Brown and Brett Warren of SignTown in Nambour at the former Jacksons Cafe which has remained empty for some years and fronts the town square on the corner of Lowe and Short Streets.

"We wanted to add some colour and vibrancy until the space becomes tenanted," said Nambour Groups organiser and local businesswoman Rhonda Billett.

Ms Billett said the most popular pages on the www.IAmNambour.com.au web site include the Vintage Shopping Map followed closely by the Nambour Parking Map.

"These window wraps are delivering on sharing the popular I Am Nambour web site pages featuring the maps created last year even

"After a successful launch of the I am Nambour Brand and #ExploreNambour concepts at the start of this year, we are really seeing some positive results.

"At this early stage things are looking very encouraging from an economic improvement perspective for Nambour. This is something that our Nambour Groups can be very proud of achieving together.'

Council's quarry lease plan raises trucking safety concerns

A growing number of locals are concerned about a possible increase in heavy truck usage due to Sunshine Coast Council's intentions regarding the Dulong and Image Flat Quarries, according to a resident.

Council is seeking Expressions of Interest to lease the quarry sites to a suitably qualified commercial operator.

"At the end of the EOI process, Council has the option to either continue to operate the Image Flat and Dulong quarry sites or to lease the quarries to a commercial operator," a Council spokesperson said.

However a statement from David Prior of Image Flat Road, on behalf of other concerned residents, raises safety concerns.

"Sadly, Council has shown little concern for the public or the obvious safety issues over the years in this matter," he said.

"There is no denying (this) will greatly increase the heavy truck usage on the main 'residential' roads between the two quarries. This requires navigating the serious S bends down the range, passing small medical centres, a local shopping centre, a newly established child daycare centre, a disability rehabilitation centre, a roundabout with a public bus stop, and numerous school bus services.

"Should Council proceed with this course of action, they are taking a very big safety gamble at the public's expense.'

Mr Prior said the effective usefulness of the quarries had all but passed. This was evidenced by Council's own assessment that they are no longer viable to operate.

"However, Council has now embarked on a last-ditch attempt to gouge some final revenue from what has been a worthy enterprise and good servant to the community in the past, but now becomes a very real safety risk to the community it once served. Now is the time for Council to act creatively and find a way to close these tired old sites requiring them to take on responsibility and the challenges ahead in relation to the foregoing safety issues.'

Council's Group Executive of Built Infrastructure Scott Taylor said he understood there was community apprehension regarding future quarrying activities in Dulong and Image Flat.

"Since January, Council has been listening to the concerns raised by the community and has facilitated the formation of a Quarry Stakeholder Liaison Group (SLG). The SLG aims to connect community representatives and stakeholders to inform interested parties of the EOI process and any changes to quarry operations that may result from an EOI, if successful," Mr Taylor said.

"Until current arrangements change, Sunshine Coast Council will continue quarrying at Image Flat Quarry and Dulong Quarry in order to provide access to high-grade materials that enable Council to deliver infrastructure to the region in a cost-effective manner."

A council spokesperson said heavy vehicles did not require permission to access the local road network when complying with the general access vehicle conditions set by the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator or existing regulatory signage.

This system ensures over-size or over-mass vehicles are not granted access to unsuitable routes where they may pose a risk to public safety or damage road infrastructure. Council is committed to road safety and advises that the Quarry team conduct safety discussions and inductions for all drivers to the quarry."

The spokesperson said traffic investigations were underway on Sherwell and Image Flat Roads to gain greater insight into current vehicle volumes and speeds. The quarries have been operational for about 50 years. Council uses rock products for 2597km of sealed roads and 474km of unsealed roads.

Div 10 Cr David Law said his position had been clear from the outset.

"When this was considered by Council at the December 2022 Ordinary Meeting I voted against the decision to make an expression of interest to the private sector for the operations of the quarries.

"I have attended the public meetings with the local community to provide information and hear the concerns first-hand from them. I will continue to provide my full support to the community to ensure the best outcome and to support this. I chair the stakeholder liaison group for the local residents of the quarries to engage with the council executives leading the expression of interest process."

"This year certainly proved that people still enjoy agricultural Shows and that they continue to play an important role in our community."









Montville book honours the sacrifices of local WW1 soldiers

FOR more than 100 years the Montville district has acknowledged that the continued peace we enjoy in Australia began with the sacrifice

made by those who served in the First World War.

But the community never really knew very much about those men who went to war from their district. Until now. The latest book in the "Montville Stories Series' puts together the stories of the 53 young men from the Montville district who enlisted in World War One

and explains how their community supported and honoured them.

Montville Remembers: World War One 1914 – 1919, written by Gordon Plowman and Cate Patterson provides a brief historical context and then presents via a roll call the service of each soldier and his life before and after the

"The book also recounts the support the community gave them while they were serving, how it was one of only a few communities at that time to honour them with its own medal and a unique memorial, and how it celebrated their return and helped them recover their health and sense of place in the community," said Cate.

"Most were able to lead full and productive lives on their return, a testament to their character and to the community support they received before, during and after the war."

During the war years a Montville Patriotic Committee was formed. It worked with the Red Cross to provide send-offs and care parcels for soldiers and to provide for struggling families and repatriated wounded. It conducted peace marches and welcomed home the soldiers who returned. The work of the Patriotic Committee is detailed in the book.

The book also gives the history of the Montville Memorial Gate and Pillars that record the names of those who enlisted, those who were rejected and those who died in active service, and details the memorial trees planted by the school children for the fallen soldiers.



Urgent notice: Council's pump out service is ending. Time running out for owners

THE Mapleton and District Community Association (MADCA) has issued an urgent reminder to all properties utilising the Pump Out Service organised by the Sunshine Coast Council.

MADCA Pump Out Subcommittee Chair, Tony Brett, advises the service is set to end on July 9 this year and property owners are advised to make alternative arrangements before the deadline.

"After July 9, there will be no further collections unless alternative arrangements have been made," he said.

Mr Brett emphasised the need for property owners or their representatives to act promptly to secure independent alternatives.

Mr Brett said many property owners may not be aware of the impending change.

"I am aware information and news relating to this change has not reached some remote owners of rental properties, property managers and body corporates.

"To assist, people should contact the owners of your residence or properties under your management that might be impacted, to ensure they have alternative arrangements in place before July 9, 2023."

He said some properties may be suitable for on-site liquid waste processing.

Council extends fee relief for temporary housing

SUNSHINE Coast Council will continue to waive permit fees for those having to temporarily live in a tent, car, caravan or mobile home who, due to extenuating circumstances, find it difficult to pay.

This comes as Council recognises the impact of the housing crisis and increasing cost of living pressures.

Community Portfolio Councillor David Law said it was important to provide reassurance to vulnerable people who were living in some form of temporary accommodation.

"Earlier this year we could only reduce the fees associated with temporary dwellings for the current budget cycle, but I want to highlight that those reduced fees will continue into the new financial year," Cr Law said.

The reduced fee of \$0 came into effect from February 24, 2023, and information on Council's website can assist applicants in understanding and navigating the approval process.

Approval is for a limited duration, depending on the type of temporary home:

- · less than three months for a tent
- · six months for a car
- · 18 months for a bus, caravan, or mobile

Where more time is required, the fee to reapply for a temporary home approval is \$392.

However, where Council has previously waived the fee, Council will again take into account any extenuating circumstances.

Traditional owners acknowledged at Chenrezig Institute smoking ceremony

MOOLOOLAH Kabi Kabi/ Gubbi Gubbi Aunty Bridgette Chilli Davis performed a special Smoking Ceremony and Welcome to Country at Chenrezig Institute on May 16 to acknowledge the site's traditional owners.

A crowd of 80 people attended including Federal Fisher MP Andrew Wallace, Mayor Mark Jamieson and Councillor Maria Suarez.

A painting by Auntie Bridgette was unveiled. It represented the traditional owners' spiritual connections to the culturally sacred site.

Established in 1974 Chenrezig Institute for Wisdom Culture is the first ever Tibetan Buddhist Meditation Centre in Australia and one of the first in the Western world.

The Institute sits on 160 acres of once unused, sparsely forested land above Eudlo and Mooloolah. The area is now a lush regenerated subtropical rainforest complete with native wildlife which serves as a retreat for Buddhist study and meditation.

Chenrezig Institute conducts courses to the general public in Buddhist philosophy and psychology, sacred art painting and crafts, yoga, creative writing and the 'Dharma Kids' children's workshop.

It offers accommodation facilities, a vegetarian Big Love Cafe, an art studio, a wellbeing centre for venue hire, and the Garden of Enlightenment, where people house the ashes of their loved ones in a beautiful setting.



Forgive our scepticism on the latest vision for rail by Jeffrey Addison, Sunshine

Tuesday 23 May saw a very important planning document slip quietly into the public

There was no fanfare, nor official government notice, just an announcement on social media platform LinkedIn.

The document was the "Southern Sunshine Coast Public Transport Strategy (SSCPTS)" dated March 2023, produced by the Department of Transport and Main Roads.

I downloaded a copy and saved it for when it will later likely disappear amongst the other unfulfilled strategies, plans and studies that governments do not want found - or worse still, don't want referenced in some-

Documents similar to this for the SEQ region – for example "Connecting SEQ 2031" (produced in 2011) – have vague motherhood statements on transport and detailed glossaries on infrastructure, with grand intentions that sound good. But they actually mean nothing without equivalent budget expendi-

At least Connecting SEQ 2031 (produced in 2011) had this caveat: "Connecting SEQ 2031 is not intended to be backed by full government funding".
I'll refer to it as "Con SEQ 2031" from here

on - as that shortened name seems more appropriate.

Con SEQ 2031 is an ideas document (they call it vision), where the visions get pushed back by another decade with every version

And, just like a vision, they vaporise only to reappear in the following renamed visionary, strategic, glossy brochure.

Here's an excerpt to prove my point from Con SEQ 2031.

The rail network will be expanded with new rail lines, including Cross River Rail and extensions to north-west Brisbane, Kippa-Ring, Maroochydore, Redbank Plains, Ripley, Flagstone and Gold Coast Airport.

Of those proposed eight rail line extensions, only Cross River Rail and Kippa-Ring have come to fruition.

Con SEQ 2031, p5, shows the Indicative 2031 passenger rail network concept.

It drew a heavy rail line into Maroochydore. Now to the latest SSCPTS scheme which contains some alarming new visions, of the short-sighted variety.

Bear in mind rail to Maroochydore was promised by the Beattie government in 2007. It was to come to Caloundra by 2015 and Maroochydore by 2020.

There's the \$6 million investment planning study in progress, due for completion by 2024.

The Palaszczuk government has made no financial commitment towards its construction and with the Queensland budget due to be handed down on Tuesday 13 June; time's running out.

It's one sentence, repeated twice in SSCPTS, on pp4 and 11, that raises questions about the process of the investment planning study underway, and reveals a possible cut back of the 37km railway, at Birtinya.

"The strategy will be used to inform more detailed planning and business case assess-

So SSCPTS likely over-rides current and future studies.

"The strategy will provide strategic network context for the detailed business case for a rail line extension into the southern Sunshine Coast and a high-frequency public transport connection between Maroochydore and Birtinya ...".

This is where it gets murky.

Use live traps to avoid secondary risks

THE cold weather arrives and all those pesky little animals want to move inside! As soon as this happens, many people reach for some cruel options to deal with the problem.

Rat baits are often chosen. The anticoagulant poi-

sons cause internal bleeding that results

in a painful death, taking up to ten days for the poor animal to die. These also cause so much loss of life to our

native animals if they eat the bait. It is the secondary poisoning that also makes the death count add up. The dead mouse dies out in the middle of the yard and along comes a bird thinking it has found an easy meal. Many of these products are said to be safe for native animals. Our WILVOS 5441 6200 Hotline says otherwise. We have picked up too many animals in the latter stages of dying.

Some baits, such as Racumin, are said to minimize the risk of this secondary poisoning. Personally, I'd rather use live traps. Then the animal/s can be checked to see if a feral or a native species.

To make baits more inaccessible to animals such as possums, the bait can be secured inside a small pipe, or other inaccessible place. I'd prefer to eliminate these toxic elements from our environment. It is distressing to pick up a sick possum, that is later found to have ingested bait.

Usually they are very emaciated and often bleeding from body cavities. One I collected from North Arm some months ago was at death's door but was still trying to drink from the swimming pool.

Don't get me started on glue traps! Fortunately, there is more awareness of the suffering caused by these solutions. It always seems rather weird that some people don't realize that animals feel pain too.




