

Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show returns to Nambour June 11-13

WITH online tickets, car park shuttle buses and all your favourite show staples, enjoying a day out at the Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show will be an absolute breeze.

Back this year at Nambour Showgrounds from 11-13 June, Show Manager Penny Walsh said show organisers had worked closely with Queensland Health over the past 12 months in light of COVID-19.

"We have done everything possible to make sure we get it right and ensure that Sunshine Coast families and visitors will have a safe and fun experience at the show," Ms Walsh said. "We have rearranged the layout of the showgrounds to allow for social distancing.

"All the unique Sunshine Coast Show traditions our community knows and loves, such as our much-loved competitions, animals, food, sideshow alley, showbags and entertainment will be back. 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Ingenious wearable art on display at Show

THE work of award winning Nambour photographer and wearable art designer Larissa Salton will be showcased at the Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show.

"My hope is that my work will touch people and make them think," Larissa said. "I think that people appreciate and enjoy the texture and colour of my art, and the fact that it is not fake or mass produced out of a factory."

Larissa had always been a creative person but her venture into wearable art began in 2018 when she created a wearable art piece for a photographic shoot.

"It was a Charles Dickens inspired dress, made out of paper," Larissa said. "I entered it in the Nambour Show and it won. After the exhibition, I was actually going to burn the dress for a photography project, but Jenny McKay (who was a Sunshine Coast Councillor at the time), would not hear of it and the dress basically spent the following year going 'on tour' from the Nambour Council chambers, Caloundra Regional Gallery, Caloundra Photography Club to the Brisbane Botanical gar-

Wendy Roe founder of Australian Wearable Art Festival asking if it could be used as a display in the Berkelouw Book store window at Eumundi for advertising the festival here on the Sunshine Coast."

At this year's Nambour Show Larissa will be dressing six mannequins, based on the events of the past two years "The Elements" of air, earth, spirit, water and fire.

"Each piece has a placard



which explains what it represents," Larissa said. "I have used a very broad array of materials including polystyrene, papier mâché, curtain material, damask, cotton, chicken feathers, paper, books, maple tree leaf and

seeds and natural dyes. Every gown also has a stunning headpiece."

Larissa re-purposes and up-cycles materials from Op Shops, Recycling Centres or donations from friends and family to create her pieces. "I love the idea of re-thinking, recycling, reusing and repurposing materials to create art. Over the past year people have become more interested in arts and crafts and generally getting back to basics. It is one of the positive things to have come out of what has been a very difficult time for so many."

Last year, Larissa started holding photography workshops to shoot her wearable art pieces. "I have been thrilled with the enthusiasm from local photographers for this concept and completely blown away by the talent we have here on the Sunshine Coast."

In response to the popularity of her wearable art pieces, Larissa has also started wearable art workshops. "It is immensely gratifying that people are tapping into what I am doing and exploring their own creativity while at the same time, recycling and repurposing materials from all sorts of places. It is an exciting time for people to express themselves in this way."

Suncoast Christian College introduces therapy dog

SUNCOAST Christian College is delighted to introduce therapy dog Jasper, a gentle one-year-old brown and white Border Collie.

Jasper started work at the College last week after many months of training and preparation. The Therapy Dog Program supports the health and well-being of students in the Suncoast community. Similar programs are in place in many schools.

Suncoast Christian College VETiS Coordinator Leanne Abrahams completed specialised training with Jasper so that together they have become a certified human-canine therapy team.

Mrs Abrahams said Jasper would support student engagement, assist with social skill development, and aid with self-regulation and calming through individual interventions, small group and class interventions, and visits at various College events.

All students and staff can choose to interact with Jasper if they feel comfortable. He will be closely monitored and managed using verbal commands, leads, and a collar to control his behaviour.

Research shows the positive impact animals have on our health and well-being. Through the development of the human-animal bond (HAB), we can experience reductions in blood pressure, increased oxytocin levels (associated with love and bonding), a decrease in cortisol levels (stress hormone), among many other beneficial physiological and emotional responses. Since animals are non-judgmental and provide unconditional love, they can assist in increasing the

engagement between teacher and student and help as an intrinsic motivator to support participation.


In preparation for this placement, Mrs Abrahams and Jasper have completed an intensive course through Therapy Dogs Australia. Throughout his training, Jasper has demonstrated a high level of obedience and good behaviour, making him suitable to work with children within a school environment.

"We are really excited to have Jasper on the team," said Principal Greg Mattiske.

"This is a wonderful initiative that will bring many benefits to our students in terms of their general well-being over time. Just seeing his smiling puppy face gives a boost to your day. I am not sure who is more excited, the staff or the students!"

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Winter is here: are you fire safety ready?

WINTER is the peak season for responded to 65 structure house fires, with firefighters responding to an average of 40 incidents per week around the state.

With winter now upon us, Queensland Fire & Emergency Services Acting Area Commander Ashley Dickson urges everyone to think about home fire safety.

Speaking at Nambour Fire Station in Bli Bli Road the Acting Area Commander reinforced the importance of smoke alarms, a fire escape plan and key safety messages to ensure safety this winter.

"Last winter in North Coast alone firefighters fires," Mr Dickson said.

"House fires can move fast and can happen to anyone in any type of home. Having working smoke alarms and a well practised fire escape plan will save lives.

"Don't be complacent and think it won't happen to you. The reality is most fires are caused by every day items such as cooking equipment, faulty or poorly maintained appliances, and flammable materials placed too close to heat sources."

Mr Dickson said it was important for household to have working interconnected photo electric smoke alarms.

He also urged families to create and practice a fire escape plan. "More than a third of young families don't know what they do in the event of a house fire," he said.

"A fire escape plan takes less than five minutes and is a simple way to ensure your family knows how to make their way out of a burning house. Young people and the elderly are most at risk so it's especially important to consider how they will escape safelv.

"I can't wait to ride Green Park again and catch up with everyone," said Jeff. "I've joined forces with the Team-Moto group and am looking forward to helping get more riders on the two-wheels in the future."

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Roadworks brings business to a halt

'It's hard enough trying to stay open without this,' says owner

AN auto-electrician struggling to keep his doors open because of disruptive roadworks is calling on people to support his and other businesses in the street.

"I knew the roadworks were coming but I just didn't realise it would have such a massive effect on my business," said Jeremy Tomholt, owner of Dirty Trix Garage.

Jeremy's business has been brought to a standstill because of roadworks around Nambour's Arundell Avenue and Mill Lane intersection.

"I'm not having a whinge or having a sook," said Jeremy. "The workers have been good. We did know this was going to happen and it will be nice when it's finished. But no-one could have known how much it would affect us. The roadworks have been going a month now. And it's just killing my business," Jeremy said. "I just have nothing at the moment. The entrance to my business looks terrible and no-one can gain access."

Jeremy said it looked like there was going to be at least another three months of no walk-in or drive-in traffic to his yard.

"And I rely on that traffic. And it's not just me, it's the guys next door and out the back."

The father of five whose wife also has a business in Nambour said if things didn't pick up he may have to look at closing shop.

"It's hard enough to make

ends meet when you've got work coming in, let alone when there's hardly any at all," he said. "It was a struggle to get the business set up. And finally, this year, we made money — and now this has come about."

Jeremy wanted to get the word out that the businesses were still there and they needed work, now, more than ever.

He said a letter from Council says work would continue until mid-August, weather permitting. "Which means if it rains it will take longer," he said.



Our bees forage the biodiverse rainforests, sclerophyll forests, orchards, and home gardens of the Sunshine Coast Hinterland. Due to the strategic locations of our apiary sites, our bees can visit almost every garden between Maleny and Mapleton.

Because we do not use migratory beekeeping methods (migratory bee keeping is the constant movement of hives either for pollination or seeking different nectar flows), our honey is of mixed floral origin depending upon seasonal and local conditions; it expresses the Terroir, or poetry of

Hinterland Bees' swarm and bee removal service have us travelling all over the Sunshine Coast, rescuing bees, normally honey bees often from inside the walls and ceilings of houses. We relocate

these colonies to our quarantine apiary at North Maleny, nurturing them into managed honey-production colonies. At Hinterland Bees, we are about more than just selling honey and removing bee hives from unwanted places; we are about saving bees and doing it as sustainably and ethically as possible. Part of our ethos is to educate our customers and clients to appreciate the importance of bees and their role in pollinating the food we eat and the plants in our natural environment.



Action needed to stem 'tide of abuse and family violence driven by pornogaphy'

CHAIR of the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Social Policy and Legal Affairs Andrew Wallace has welcomed the Government's response to the Committee's Inquiry into age verification for online pornography and wagering but called for urgent action on the Committee's recommendations to end the harms caused by childhood exposure to porn.

"Getting this done now is important, not just because we care about our boys, but because we care about the women they will one day meet."

"Our Committee found that children as young as eight are inadvertently exposed to hard-core, violent pornography whilst surfing the internet. According to parents, teachers and the young people themselves, this has led to significant emotional, psychological, and later on in life, sexual health repercussions. Young women are being subjected to sexual abuse by those who are trying to emulate what is being portrayed by the porn industry as normal. This needs to end vesterday.'

The Government's response to the Protecting the Age of Innocence report, tabled in the House of Representatives on Tuesday, accepted the Committee's recommendation to direct the eSafety Commissioner to expeditiously develop a roadmap for the implementation of mandatory age verification for online pornography. In total the Government accepted in whole or in principle five of the six recommendations.

"I welcome the Government's response to the Protecting the Age of Innocence report, but we need urgent action on implementation right away. The hard work needs to begin right now."

Mr Wallace drew the increasingly understood link between the issues of childhood exposure to pornography and rising domestic and family

"Having chaired inquiries into both of these issues, what's painfully clear to me now is that the prevalence of family, domestic and sexual

violence is being exacerbated by the explosion of hard-core violent porn, particularly as it is being accessed by young people."

"Some of these young men who are experimenting and exploring their own sexuality will live out those experiences viewed online, to the extreme detriment of their partner. Is it any wonder that we are seeing such concerning levels of violence in our homes across Australia? If we genuinely care about women being exposed to violence, then we have to start caring about our young people being exposed to pornography." he said.



I have unbelievable energy, the quality of my sleep is better, and I have learned some very valuable life lessons.

"I want to make the point that while this journey is simple, it is not easy. And it starts with setting your mind up for success. In my experience, that is the first and most important step. You need to make the decision and be one hundred percent honest with yourself.

You must clean up your mind, and then clean up your fridge. I tell the people that I work with that if you are an emotional eater, your mind must be stronger than your feelings because there are going to be days that are rough.

"I have noticed that over the past 12 months, people are more conscious than ever of self care, and the importance of nurturing habits that support them to live the lives they want to live. I am committed to coaching others who are ready to change their life and there is nothing more rewarding than to see people, who were just like me, transforming and feeling a sense of pride.







News campaign paves way for speed reduction in Palmwoods

by Sunshine Coast Daily journalist Natalie Wynn

PALMWOODS will have its speed limit reduced as of next week after a community campaign led by the Sunshine Coast Daily.

The Pave the way for Palmwoods campaign has had a win with the State Government agreeing to reduce the speed limit through the town centre.

The existing 50km/h speed limit along Margaret Street, from east of the Chevallum Road intersection to west of the Post Office, will be lowered to 40km/h from next week.

The speed limit reduction on the 500m stretch comes in response to widespread community

Calls for the upgrade of the Chevallum Road, Jubilee Drive, Margaret Street and Woombye Palmwoods Road intersection have been growing for the past few months.

With the Sunshine Coast Daily launching the Pave the way for Palmwoods campaign to give the people of Palmwoods a voice.

Residents, businesses and workers from the area were given the opportunity to have their say as part of the campaign, highlighting issues with the speed limit as well as the intersections throughout the increasingly busy town.

As well as former council and state government representatives and a road safety expert in a bid to understand the complex safety issues and find a workable solution.

In late-April, the State Government said it had started to investigate short-term solutions to the longstanding issues plaguing the growing area.

However, a funding war erupted between the State and Federal members over funding which would see the rail bridge overpass upgraded.

Nicklin MP Robert Skelton told the Daily at the time, the intersection at Chevallum Road and Woombye Palmwoods Road was somewhat of a "sticky wicket" with any safety upgrades reliant on the North Coast rail duplication.

"It would be nice if we could get an agreement from the Federal Government with the rail duplication because they could work concurrently," he said.

While Fisher MP Andrew Wallace squarely





labelled the issue as the state government's

During the course of the campaign, the Daily also observed traffic in the area as part of its investigations.

More than 60 motorists failed to stop at two notorious Palmwoods intersections in the space of just three hours and countless others did not give way during the survey.

Member for Nicklin Rob Skelton said he was pleased with the decision to lower the speed

"We've listened to the community and the Speed Management Committee has done its review," Mr Skelton said.

"Hopefully, this change will slow drivers down through town and help put the focus on improving safety on the roads through Palm-

"If all motorists observe the new speed limit and drive to conditions, then we're already on the way to seeing some positive changes in driver behaviour on our local roads.'







The school will celebrate 100 years of education from October 23 to 21, 2021.


The events will provide opportunities to catch up with old friends and relive memories as visitors tour the school - both old and new locations.

"Your stories will strengthen the case to protect others," said Lorraine. "James was an experienced cyclist and always wore his helmet."

"Accidental deaths and head injuries involving cyclists, skateboarders and climbers are appearing far too regularly, especially now, as cycling to school and elsewhere is being encouraged," said Bob.

Our question to parents is 'are your children's, so-called safety helmets really safe if they fall off their bikes and hit their head on the road'?'



Famous pianist Piers Lane praises Montville venue's 'intimate' setting

AUSTRALIAN concert pianist Piers Lane has thrilled classical music lovers with two sold out recitals at the prestigious Lucas Parklands auditorium at Montville.

The venue is fast becoming a magnet for world class classical musicians with local residents relishing the chance to experience the world's best in intimate and private surroundings.

"It is extraordinary that you have this place in the middle of the rainforest, and it's so beautiful acoustically, with a lovely Steinway (piano), and the audience able to sit around and in really intimate contact with the pianist," Maestro Lane said after his concerts.

"We were playing slightly 'in the round' this time and it was a lovely feeling to have that contact with people and close communication."

Maestro Lane is regarded as one of the world's great Chopin interpreters of today. "So much of this music was written for this sort of occasion: Chopin mainly played in salons... he hated playing in big halls, and he had a very intimate sound, so it was appreciated in these smaller circumstances, so I feel it's the right place to play nocturnes and waltzes," Mr Lane said.

"And Beethoven as well. They didn't have these massive concert halls in those days so the music was written for people to get in on it, really



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

Students took part in a variety of hands-on learning activities, including Future Water Dreaming, Rights of Nature and Human Decision Making, Wayupa Wurrk, Oz Harvest Use It Up Challenge, the Council of all Beings and Exploring Iinibara Natural Earth Pigments.

Year 5 student Olivia said her favou-

rite activity was Future Water Dreaming.

"We had to find out how much water to give to each town and still have enough water left in the river. Each of us had a chance to figure out how we would do it and then the group chose the best solution," she said.

The engaging activities helped our future leaders and environmental champions build relationships with and learn from Kabi Kabi and Jinibara Traditional Custodians along with other First Nations People and other environmental specialists. Students will now work together at school guided by their teacher, Ms Jaenke, and other mentors on their own project aimed at inspiring other young people to learn and care for the environment.

The speed limit on a section of Woombye-Palmwoods Road (known locally as Margaret Street) will soon be reduced in response to community concerns. I am pleased with the decision, which followed a review by the Speed Management Committee of vehicle speeds on Margaret Street.

of the Queensland Rail Train Crewing Practices

The 'Fixing the Trains Final report December Quarter 2020' was quietly issued, undated, sometime around the end of April 2021.

It skipped the Q3 September Quarter 2020 report that the June Quarter report referenced - but never-the-less it's finally been completed. Well, almost completed.

Recommendation 10 of the Commission of Inquiry was to 'Target a structural surplus of staff.'

This item is listed as complete on page 6 of the final report.

In the previous June Quarter 2020 report, it was listed as 'In progress.'

We now learn that targets for that staff surplus have been reviewed by Queensland Rail.

How you can review a Commission of Inquiry recommendation and change it to save money must make for a unique process?

It is equivalent to moving the goal posts to in this case - a cheaper location.

It also explains why the CRU was shut down suddenly without fanfare in December 2020 without interim reports.

This is part of Minister Mark Bailey's sum-

"... I also acknowledge that we still have some way to go to realise the aspiration to deliver not only a world class rail service, but a world class public transport service. It is for this reason that Recommendation 36a-c remains open."

Oops, no mention of the Recommendation 10 changes.

This is how the report explained it:

"The initial target set in the Strachan Inquiry, to deliver the timetable without the systematic reliance on overtime would significantly increase Traincrew cost through increases in unproductive shifts for traincrew. The target set by Queensland Rail is consistent with other jurisdictions and maintains the reliability of the service, thus meeting the intent of the recommendation. This approach minimises the overall traincrew cost."

This Final report lists among its key achievements since the October 2016 Rail-Fail as:

"200 new guards trained by October 2018" and '200 new drivers trained by December 2019".

The fact is the net figures were very different, due to natural attrition by retirements, transfers and resignations.



If kangaroos do become separated, mothers will often hear the young calling. This one was so close to finding her joey.

So many kangaroos are hit by cars in that same spot on the road but some drivers just can't slow down. Macropods can jump in front of a car even when we are travelling slowly, but with a speeding car in these 'hot spots' they have no chance.






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
