

Woombye owner reveals secret ingredients behind Australia's best Cheese 2023

LOCALS already knew it was the case and now it's official. Woombye is the home of Australia's best cheese.

Woombye Cheese Company's "Blackall Gold Washed Rind" was recently crowned Grand Champion product at the 2023 Australian Grand Dairy Awards beating all other cheeses in all other categories.

Woombye Cheese owner Beth O'Leary, who



Removed CA\$H for some bought the company only last year, said she she was thrilled with the win.

"It's amazing," she said. "The fact that we won over large and middle-tier Victorian cheese makers is actually incredible."

Beth said great staff and a great recipe were the secret ingredients in toppling her more fancied rivals. "I think just having a consistent team is what creates really consistent cheese. Our head cheesemaker Stefan Wilson has been here for the entirety of the business. We create and produce all our cheese by hand, using traditional methods with care and experience.

"And we've obviously got a great recipe. "And I think the milk we get from Maleny, I think the cows feed off really good pastures in

The former nurse said the purchase of the business satisfied a life-long passion.

"I've just always loved cheese," she said. "The whole romantic vision of eating cheese and sitting on your deck and having a wine and friends over. I love eating it. I love the business side. I love the whole Sunshine Coast vibe. I mean, there's so many people making amazing things up here."

Beth said Blackall Gold was "perfect for something different on your cheeseboard with its unique orange appearance".

Grand Dairy Awards Chief Judge Russel Smith said Woombye Cheese punched above its weight in winning against much larger companies.

Each year, hundreds of gold medal winning products from around the country enter the Awards judged by a panel of esteemed cheese and dairy judges.

Being named AGDA Champion is the industry's most prestigious and highly regarded accolade. The

local company's "Woombye Ash Brie", *pictured*, also won Champion White Mould Cheese.



Created using the Woombye Triple Cream Brie, the Ash Brie is carefully rolled in ash – resulting a striking black and white appearance in addition to the creamy centre.

Montville leaders unite to launch petition for a doctor

MONTVILLE community leaders are ramping up demands for access to essential health services by launching a petition to Parliament House.

"The pressure on medical centres is multi-faceted and nationwide due to several reasons including rising costs of running a practice and a skilled workforce shortage," said Federal Member for Fisher Andrew Wallace who said Montville community leaders were addressing the GP shortage in the hinterland town.

"The Montville community needs a doctor," Mr Wallace said. "The State and Federal Governments have the levers to pull to give Australian rural and regional communities the health services they deserve."

The petition states: "The Montville community is in desperate need of a doctor and calls on the Federal Government to do more to ensure a sustainable health service for the town. We, the undersigned call upon the House of Representatives to improve rural and regional incentives to address GP shortages in the Montville community."

Pharmacist Natalie Lindner, who will have the petition for the community to sign in her Montville Pharmacy, has called on the Federal Government to review Montville's classification of the Modified Monash Model.

"Montville misses out by only hundreds of metres from MM5 category rural funding zoning, which would make all the difference in attracting doctors," Ms Lindner said. "Other, less isolated communities have access to many doctors because of rural government funding, which Montville formerly received.

"Please reinstate this funding to help our town secure doctors once again.'

Montville has an ageing population - with more than 50 percent over the age of 55 and well above the state and national averages for people aged 55-84. Without a doctor service, Montville residents have to drive along steep roads on all exits of the town, including the aptly named Razorback Road.

Montville Chamber of Commerce President Shiralee Cooper, who has lived in the area since 1985, said she recalled there has always been a Montville Medical Centre.

"It is alarming to discover that we are likely to no longer have access to this essential service,"

Ms Cooper said.

"Montville has an aging population who rely on easily accessible health services. In the Year of Accessibility, it is an indictment on our health system that our village will no longer have this vitally important service. Whilst we see our aged being increasingly encouraged to stay in their homes through accessing aged care services, our elderly will no longer have a medical centre offering face to face doctor's appointments.

Many of our local families want to continue visiting a local doctor. In addition, Montville is a tourist hub with visitors of all ages frequenting our village. There have of course been occasions when they have needed a doctor urgently. With most ambulances based at least 20 minutes from Montville, having a doctor in the village can make the difference to the outcome of a medical emergency."

The Medical Centre in Montville has been closed since 16 January "due to a shortage of doctors".

Montville Village Association President Michael Bradley joined the chorus as he called upon both Federal and State Governments to address the GP shortage and ensure a sustainable medical practice operates in Montville.

"The Montville Village Association is deeply concerned that the doctor's practice is not operating, forcing residents to travel to see a doctor," Mr Bradly said. "A doctor's practice in Montville is essential and needs to be resumed as soon as possible."

Police called to Sunday rumble in Mill Lane

A rolling brawl in Nambour's Mill Lane on Sunday March 5 had to be eventually broken up by police.

A witness said the fight disturbed the tranquility of people preparing for the bi-monthly Rummagers Markets at the Tram Terminal.

"The sale was happening and next thing a fight broke out nearby," the witness said. "There was a massive fight that went from the Royal George right around to the new doctor's surgery in Mill Lane (Mill Lane Clinic) opposite Coles. And there was just people everywhere screaming. The shouting, the swearing, the fighting too. They were belting the crap out of each other. Anyway, they had to get the police down and break it up."

Police confirmed the incident last week. "We don't have much detail on the Mill Lane, Nam-

bour, one other than police were called to a street disturbance around 8.15am on Sunday (March 5)," a police spokesperson said.

Police await report into caravan park deaths

Police have wrapped up a crime scene at Nambour Caravan Park where two men in their 50s were found dead in a cabin.

Police were made aware of the deaths around 5pm on Sunday (February 26) and declared a crime scene.

Initial investigations indicate the deaths to be non-suspicious. The exact cause of the deaths is subject to post mortem examinations.

From grazing pasture to ecological parklands

Plans revealed for a 'new kind of park' in Maleny

A vision to restore grazing land in Maleny to original rainforest has been revealed by Sunshine Coast Council.

The community is invited to have their say on the proposed Sunshine Coast Ecological Park which features two treetop bridges, a forest lookout with 360 degree views over the Glass House Mountains and down to the coast, a community pavilion, operations and research facility and "forest rooms".

The 65ha cattle grazing land adjoins Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve.

Mayor Mark Jamieson said the proposed project would restore rainforests and wetlands, but it would take decades for ecosystem function to recover and flourish.

"In 30 years and beyond, council wants our next generations to benefit from the decisions we make today," Mayor Jamieson said.

"Over time, we'll have the privilege of watching the ecosystems in this park recover as species return to the restored forest and wetland

"My hope is the community will embrace this park as their own as a place to immerse in nature, connect with each other and be inspired to continue our sustainability journey.

Environment and Liveability portfolio Councillor Peter Cox said the draft master plan would be open to community feedback on council's Have Your Say website until March 20.

"This proposal will provide a unique park for the whole community, and council is committed to listening to community feedback to ensure a strong plan for the Sunshine Coast Ecological Park," Cr Cox said.

"In this third round of community consultation for the proposed park, residents and visitors can help council determine whether this plan will meet our growing community's needs and aspirations."

The draft master plan was developed with input from an excellence advisory panel, community reference group, and an engagement-led design approach that invited the community to help shape the park's mix of recreation, green space and ecological conservation.





Music store owner to serve six months in jail for sex offences

THE owner of a popular Nambour music shop has been jailed over historic child sex offences. Mark Anthony Higgins, 57, was found

guilty in the Maroochydore District Court and convicted on March 3 of two historical charges of indecent treatment of a child under 16 between August 26 1997 and August 27 1998.

Higgins



also faced two charges of inde-Mark Higgins.

cent treatment of a child under 12, but was acquitted by a jury. The music teacher is also the owner of Shake It Up Music, one of the Sunshine Coast's biggest stores and musical education providers.

Maroochydore District Court Judge Glen Cash sentenced Higgins to one year in jail, but he will only serve six months before he is released and the rest of his sentence suspended for a further six months.

The separate incidents were alleged to have taken place in Palmview and at The Gap in Brisbane.

It was alleged Higgins inappropriately touched a girl on one occasion and exposed himself to her on another.

Higgins pleaded not guilty. He chose to not give evidence and not call any witnesses.

Shake It Up music is on Currie St in Nambour. Established in 2004 it now spans over three storeys with six teaching rooms. Higgins was also a member of the popular band The Cumquats.

His shops supplied most Sunshine Coast schools and was a preferred supplier for the Queensland Government's Department of Education and Training. In light of the news Sunshine Coast Grammar has dropped Shake It Up Music as an equipment supplier.

AT one point Sam Childers was an armed guard for drug dealers. After almost being killed in a wild brawl the man they now call the 'Machine Gun Preacher' decided to turn his life around.

He embraced a life of faith in God and fought to free enslaved children in Sudan and Uganda. His life was the subject of Hollywood movie The Machine Gun Preacher starring Gerard Butler. Now Sam will be visiting Ignite Church Nambour on March 17 to share his life story.

Since turning a new leaf, Sam now speaks to huge audiences all around the world and has built one of the largest orphanages in Southern Sudan, which has fed and housed more than 1000 children. With the orphanage finished, he led armed missions to rescue children from the Lord's Resistance Army. This led to villagers calling him 'The Machine Gun Preacher'.

Today his team make around 10,000 meals every day for feeding programs in Africa & house 380 orphan children. He's also drilled dozens of wells, built schools and has major projects ongoing in South Sudan, Uganda and Ethiopia.

Ignite Church Pastor Darin Browne said he was hoping to see many people attending the event. "Sam Childers was a guy with no hope no future ... so a story like his will be inspiring and encouraging to people - that's what we need in our community."

Pastor Darin said he invited Sam because they heard he would be in the area at the time.

"To our surprise he accepted our invite. This is something huge for our community. The event is open to everyone and we hope people who may not regularly go to a church will come along and hear Sam Childers' incredible story.' The event is free, although organisers will

take up a free will offering to support Sam's work. "We'd like to think we could help him save some more children," said Pastor Darin.





New Bli Bli Cenotaph should be ready for Anzac Day

CONCRETE has been poured and work is well underway on a new Cenotaph being built at Bli Bli's Avenue of Honour in Parklakes Drive.

The significant regional monument is slated for completion in April, weather permitting, just in time for Anzac Day, which will see the site host its first local commemorative service.

The 3.4 metre Cenotaph will be located at the end of the Avenue of Honour on Parklakes Drive, providing the community with a focal point for commemorating those who have served their country in war, conflicts and peacekeeping operations.

RSL Sunshine Coast and Regional District President Ian Hall OAM said it was exciting to see works on the Cenotaph progressing well, with local RSL Sub Branches now preparing for it to be at the heart of this year's local Anzac Day commemorations.

"We're very grateful for the support we've received from government as well as the local community towards establishing a memorial within the community's Avenue of Honour," Mr Hall said.

"This monument will be a meaningful and timely reminder for the community, placing an emphasis on the importance of commemorating veterans who have served past and present."

RSL Sunshine Coast and Regional District received funding last year for the Cenotaph, including \$109,680 from the Australian Government's Saluting Their Service Commemorative Grants Program and an additional \$59,000 in Divisional Capital Works Funding from the Sunshine Coast Council.

The three-month construction project also includes installing new signage along the figtree lined Avenue of Honour and the addition of QR codes to the Avenue's Remembrance Rocks, so visitors can scan them to learn about Australia's military history.

Local architect and sculptor Cam Crossley, who has been engaged to design and build the Cenotaph, is currently at work on the monument.

worries about the charities and people who rely on the period products Share the Dignity collects.



"Two years, two months and 28 days, after hearing the words no parent wants to hear, my 12 year old son Isaac has finally finished treatment for Leukemia," said Sunshine Mitre 10's Paul Barber.

"It has been a long and hard fight, but he has come out the other side and is ready to take on the world. As bad as a cancer diagnosis is, I consider Isaac lucky as the Doctors told us very early on that this is the best type of cancer to get as it has the best cure rate (97%), and while it will be long and hard, he should live a full and normal life. Those words meant the world to me."

Blessed with a tight family unit and supportive and caring employers, the Barber family faced down Isaac's treatment with strength and a positive attitude.

"There is so much that I have learned through this journey," Paul said. "But I have to say the biggest lesson learned has been to make every day count. Family is important and work life balance is important. You need to make time for what is important right now.

"I consider myself lucky that through the whole period from diagnosis to cure, I have had the support of my employer. The amount of time off required, the number of days working from home, the number of times I have had to leave early. I would normally work more than the allotted 38 hours, but this situation saw me working at strange hours, one day in the office the next day working at 9pm in a hospital room as this fit into my son's inconsistent schedule. I couldn't have survived had I not had the support from my employer, and I am forever in their

debt.'

Tick-tock ... historic Nambour timepiece sparks interest

A photo taken in 1964 of Currie Street sparked great interest on the "Nambour, Remember When" page on Facebook recently, especially about the clock that appeared in the photo. Thanks to Nambour Museum's Barbara Want and Clive Plater the Gazette can provide the following history of the clock ...

Nambour people missed the convenience of a town hall clock, so they welcomed the appearance of this headline in the Nambour Chronicle "Memorial £150 Electric Clock for town hall building".

Having provided £200 in the 1952-53 budget, the Maroochy Shire Council approved the purchase of a town hall clock which would be a memorial to those who had made the supreme sacrifice.

Although there was some argument over the position of the clock, it was decided that it would be built above the Town

Hall shops in Currie Street and suspended so that it could be seen from both north and south. The clock was supplied by Nambour's well known jeweller Mr. J. G. Glasgow.

Shire Chairman DA Low was anxious that the clock would be in place by Anzac Day and on Anzac Day in 1953, upon returning from the Cenotaph on Coronation Avenue, the crowds assembled in the Station Square.

Standing on the balcony of the Shire Chambers, Mr Low introduced the Vicar of St John's Church of England, Rev Black, who performed the official dedication of the Memorial clock and also of the new stairs leading to the Cenotaph.

"The clock," he said "would continue to remind us that 'age does not progress and weary them'. The steady movement of the clock reminded us of the steady purpose of aims and

ideals; we shall continue to retain those principles for which theirs was the supreme sacrifice."

The clock was removed in the late 1980s and stored at the Council's Nambour works depot. It was donated to the Nambour Museum around 2010 where it was displayed with other machinery until one of the museum's volunteers liked the idea of making it work again.

It was fitted with a new mechanism and on the 7th of February 2018 it was erected on a steel pole at the museum's Bury Street entrance through the assistance of a Sunshine Coast Council grant.

The clock functioned well until last year but is currently out of service awaiting the money and time by our limited number of volunteers to 'bring the clock back to earth' for a refit. -Barabara Want and Clive Plater.



long way, from potential bankruptcy, to a ghetto takeaway shop out the front, and now to a fully open restaurant again. From here, we want to change it up."

"We're proud of our burger restaurant but we wanted to make sure we were pushing forward. We don't always get it right but we value the feedback we receive and we are always working on improving."

What won't change are DownTown's renowned burgers. "We're famous for our soft pretzel buns," said Cam. "Nobody else does anything like them. Competitors have tried to copy them but they never get it right. Ours are like a cross between an Amish pretzel and a New York bagel."

The Whalley family and their service to Nambour

WHALLEY'S store is one of the oldest buildings left in Currie Street, Nambour. But who were the Whalleys?

James Whalley, an English bookseller and preacher, relocated to Australia. In 1884 he and his son William walked from Brisbane to select 155 acres on what is now called Burnside Road (formerly Whalley's Range Road).

It was not until 1994 that the significant role that the Whalley family played in the development of Nambour was properly acknowledged. A small tributary of Petrie Creek which rose in the original Whalley selection was named Whalley Creek, followed by the naming of James Whalley Drive and Whalley Creek Close.

James was one of the first shareholders with 1200 shares and one of the first suppliers of cane to the Moreton Central Sugar Mill. In 1892 he was instrumental in building Nambour's Methodist Church and helping to establish Nambour's School of Arts.


James' son, William made a remarkable contribution to the life of Nambour. He opened Nambour's first plumbing business in 1896 and then purchased Nambour's Currie's Store in 1899. With the motto 'A Tower of Reliability' this shop and a branch in Mapleton served the people of the area for 69 years until 1965. William's service to the community was remarkable: Justice of the Peace from 1889, chairman of the Moreton Central Sugar Mill and involved with the Show Society, local lodge, bowling green, Ambulance and Rotary Club and was the first chairman of the Nambour Hospital Board.

William's brother Richard 'Hellie' served as a councillor on Maroochy Shire Council from 1927 to 1936 and as chairman from 1939 to 1943. He was also heavily involved as a member, trustee, chairman and president of many local organizations.

This is a family who contributed so much to the community of Nambour and district.



Moment in Time from Nambour Museum

THE Collins name was synonymous with Currie Street, Nambour, from 1907 when Collins & Co., Drapers, Men's Outfitters & Grocers was opened in Currie Street by Mr Lou Collins.

The era of Collins Café began in 1927 when Mrs Ruby Collins advertised her new special Saturday menu of chicken patties, toasted buns and mayonnaise of crab.

From that time for over 40 years, Collins café was THE café and meeting place for residents of the area. At street level there was the traditional café, but downstairs a large cabaret area became the centre of the town's night life, hosting wedding receptions, farewells, balls, meetings, bridge afternoons and in 1938, Madam Vermersh, the celebrated French Tea Cup Entertainer.

In the late 1930s, the café was signed over to Ruby's sons, Jack and Robert. Jack's wife Babe remembered the war years with American and Australian soldiers in the area. "Meals were expected at all hours and the café often remained open till 2am only to re-open at 8am." In the 1950s, Collins Café catered for everyone – teenagers met for a lime spider, housewives enjoyed a cup of tea and scones for two shillings and sixpence (25 cents), children loved a banana split as a special treat, shoppers gathered to enjoy a three course dinner for 6 shillings (60 cents) and tradesmen collected their lunch of Collins pies.

Collins pies were legendary in the district prompting this advertisement in the Nambour Chronicle in December 1954:

"His shirt was a wreck and his pants full of holes His socks were and his boot had no soles. They gave him two bob. Now don't drink that, one cries.

No chance pals, he yipped. I'm for Collins Pies." The closure of Collins café was met with horror and disbelief by its many customers. Two of Collins' original plates and menus on display in the Nambour Museum revive happy memories of this icon of Currie Street.

15,000 Australian families have had the rug pulled out from underneath them after the Labor Government axed a life-changing medicine from the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) which is used to manage diabetes.

Priority for Sofia and Isaac are two released wildlife is ensuring they are

100 percent fit both physically and psychologically. There is no compromise in preparation for this reintroduction to their natural habitat, and the choice of suitable habitat.

This week I examine the State's latest move on infrastructure for the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

It's a big step backward (some would say a lie) from their published IOC Future Host Commission Questionnaire Response Final Submission made in May 2021.

Astonishingly, last Thursday, Deputy Premier Steven Miles announced Queensland would go it alone on the infrastructure body, in direct contravention to commitments made to the IOC in that document.

There will be no independent Olympic Co-ordination Authority (OCA) comprising the three levels of government, as had been designated on page 5.

'To assure the effective delivery of legacy over the 10+10+ year programme, the agency to be created to coordinate all government services and Games-related infrastructure, the Olympic Coordination Authority (OCA), will be responsible for legacy oversight and, where required, delivery.'

Perhaps this page 10 excerpt explains why:

'Within 12 months of appointment as host city, OCA will publish its first report which will include an outline of monitoring methodology mapped to a detailed legacy delivery programme and specific quantifiable targets alongside ... quality measures.'

We were awarded the Games at the 138th session of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) in Tokyo on 21 July 2021.

The document stipulated that OCA [and OCOG) would be established 5 months after the Games were awarded.

What is alarming is this politicisation of the Games' legacy and infrastructure.

That first report from OCA was due in July 2022. It didn't occur.

A monitored legacy delivery programme and specific targets aren't part of their plan?

Decisions will be shared between Mr Miles' Department of State Development and the Premier's Department of Premier and Cabinet. A co-ordinating agency will be developed within existing departments.

What could possibly go wrong?

Who needs a business case for a \$2.7 billion Premier-led whim?

Who will be there to resist the whims?

Public servants, whose existence in the role rely upon political masters?

Let's compare their record on Queensland's delivery of a smaller event, the Commonwealth Games, in 2018.

It was a nightmare for public transport, especially from the Sunshine Coast.

Our rail services suffered their severest of cuts in the century-plus long history of our rail line.

Looks like our abysmal record may be broken again in 2032.

It was a massacre of our trains.

27% of our services were slashed to give the Gold Coast extra trains.

An average return journey from Nambour, via public transport to the Games was 7 hours 25 minutes (not including event duration). From Maroochydore it was 8 hours 40 minutes.

From Brisbane you could get to 100% (261 events) via public transport.

From Caboolture, Cleveland, Ipswich, Ferny Grove and Shorncliffe that figure was 97.7% and above.

But from Nambour it was 54% (141 events) and from Maroochydore just 26% (68 events).

Queensland's infrastructure promises don't match funded reality. Section 1 Q01 Vision of the document states:

this decision and ensure Fiasp is reinstated on the PBS immediately.






