Shortages lead to spike in hinterland homelessness

A growing rental crisis has led to a spike in homelessness in the hinterland with lower income earners and vulnerable people finding it too competitive to get a roof over their head.

President of Nambour St Vincent de Paul St Josephs Conference Teresa Forrest said a perfect storm of factors was placing pressure on the system.

Factors included high rents, interstate relocations, loss of jobs, lack of crisis and public housing and lack of investment in affordable accommodation.

She said the pressures were also having serious and widespread mental health impacts.

"People are living in cars, tents, by side of road and couch surfing," she said. "They are subject to assaults, falling into mental illness, not planning a future and not eating well. It's heartbreaking and distressing to see.

"It's a vicious cycle too. People are unable to secure employment if they have no fixed address and limited access to basics like washing and cooking facilities.

"Children are having to change schools or not go to school at all because homeless parents face these difficulties."

Rental crisis hits home

A Nambour property management agency says people looking for rentals in the region were getting desperate, with up to 40-50 people registering their interest when a new property comes onto the market.

With the Sunshine Coast rental vacancy rate at 0.5 per cent Jody Chatillon of REMAX Property Rentals said the situation was unprecedented. "It's the most difficult rental crisis that I have seen in my 20 years of property management," she said.

"I'm sure I speak for all the property management professionals in our area, we need more houses to lease."

"The amount of people who are genuinely about to become homeless is, without doubt, absolutely heartbreaking. So many of these are people and families who work hard and have great rental histories but are often missing out because of the sheer volume of applications for each property.

roperty. "People are so relieved to hear that their application has been successful, there are regularly tears on the other end of the line."

Ms Chatillon said it was heartbreaking that even Lily House, opened over a decade ago in response to a vital need to provide supported accommodation for women in crisis, was a victim of the rental crisis. Lily House needs to vacate their rental premises within the next few weeks

as the home is being sold.
Coast2Bay Housing Group, the

Sunshine Coast's largest community and affordable housing organisation, has also been inundated with a huge spike in enquiries for rental accommodation.

CEO, Andrew Elvin said "we work with both Government and private organisations in building affordable housing on the Sunshine Coast but we desperately need such projects given a high priority in the near future. Without such there will, unfortunately, be a rise in homeless-

ness in the area."

Real Estate Institute of Queensland CEO Antonia Mercorella urged people looking for a place to rent to work closely with property managers.

"They may know of an appropriate property before it officially hits the rental market," she said.

"Or consider cohabitation, where you may be able to look at rentals at a higher price point and which may offer more outdoor space for your pet to onion."

Maleny installation raises awareness of women's homelessness

WITH homelessness on the rise a group of Maleny women organised an artistic installation to draw attention to the issue and show support for women in need.

The Gazette asked volunteers about the "Hung out to Dry" installation which featured in Maple Street on International Women's Day, March 8.

What prompted you to initiate the Hung Out to Dry installation?

"Heather Price first heard about the Byron Bay Hung Out to Dry installation from a friend of hers. Inspired, Heather shared the idea with two close friends, Christine Clegg and Stephie Lister. Together they called a group of women around them here in Maleny, who were also inspired by the concept of supporting women facing homelessness.

"They were eager to join forces and together we co-created this installation in a very short time. We had a lot of support locally, particularly from the Maleny Neighbourhood Centre.

• In a nutshell, can you describe the installation?

"Hung out to Dry represents the community turning their back on someone. The installation reflected this through women's clothes literally hanging out to dry. The central installation represents a tragic story on the journey to womanhood that is often overlooked. The images represent the passageway of a young girl with dreams, moving through many stages of immeasurable contribution to family and community until her world falls around her.

Due to circumstances out of control now facing homelessness, she feels invisible, cast aside and hung out to dry."

• What do you hope to achieve?

"Our intention was to awaken, connect, find solutions, share ideas and inspire a call to action within our community."

What can people do to support people who are homeless?

"Local neighbourhood centres, like Maleny Neighbourhood Centre, are invaluable to people experiencing homelessness. Donations of food, bedding and hygiene products to these centres are needed.

"Without basic needs being met, the vicious cycle continues and human rights are neglected. We need initiatives at Council and state level on creating social housing and supporting neighbourhood centres.

"We also need social support to reintegrate people experiencing homelessness back into community and into the economy. It costs more to keep someone homeless than to house them.

"Again, it's all about coming together to collectively create solutions."

• Who else was involved in the installation:

Terri-Anne Goodreid, Christine Clegg, Kerrie Norris, Karla Pizzica, Rebecca Ward, Teula De'Gars, Stephanie Lister and Emma Creed all did such an incredible job and gave up so much of their time and even their own money to help from this. Also, Aunty Edna Van Hemmen welcomed us to country.

"For those who missed out seeing the installation we have put up a smaller version at the Maleny Library until the end of March. This offers women facing homelessness a chance to tell their stories."

Ms Forrest said St Vincent de Paul was doing what it could to support the vulnerable but they were being inundated with requests.

"We give out food, petrol cards if their car is their home, advice for housing, advocacy, clothing and help with bills," said Ms Forrest.

"We can assist with travel to relocate people or to help them get to family with bus or rail tickets.

"If they find a house locally, we help with furnishing and assist with storage fees."

Ms Forrest urged people to pressure Government to find solutions for affordable housing, increase rent assistance and to rein in exorbitant rent rises.

"Also maybe if people have

spare accommodation they could think about whether it is suitable for a homeless family or person," she said.

Timely grant helps ease burden

Nambour's St Vincent de Paul Society will be able to help more people thanks to a \$5000 donation last month from Sundale Community Foundation.

"These proceeds make a difference to the way in which we can now expand our support for children's education for families who are overwhelmed with the high cost of accommodation," said Ms Forrest

ONE of the founders of a local community organisation dedicated to stopping domestic and family violence has been awarded the Zonta Club of Blackall Range Woman of Achievement Award for 2021.

Maleny's Val France received the honour at an International Women's Day function at Maleny Community Centre last Monday. "Val is a wonderful advocate for women in the community," said Committee chair Ann Koenig.

"She is one of the leaders in the formation of the combined services group, which is now known as 'Speak Up Now, Stop Domestic and Family Violence'.

Ann described Val as a passionate worker who used her time and expertise as a lawyer to assist organisations with hands-on fundraising activities "from flipping burgers to making marmalade and chilli sauce for street stores, and organising concerts".

"She was involved with the Maleny IDAHO, which is the International Day Against Homophobia and Transphobia, organising a major cabaret and other events to raise funds to support gay youth and regular get togethers in local restaurants. Not only is Val passionate about the prevention of domestic and family violence, she brings this passion as well as an enormous energy to whatever she undertakes."

Val said she was grateful to Zonta for the wonderful award and delighted that Speak Up Now could rely on support from Zonta, Rotary, and the Maleny Neighbourhood Centre. "We have also been supported by the Maleny and Blackall Range Lions Club, the Maleny CWA and the local RSL, and many, many individuals."

Speak Up Now was a collaboration between Quota, Zonta and Rotary.

"We all got together and we recognised the need to work towards an all-community response to help reduce domestic violence and elder abuse in our area. It's a dirty job but someone had to do it

VOLUNTEERS pitched in and picked up 207 wheelie bins of rubbish across the Sunshine Coast earlier this month as part of Clean Up Australia Day.

There were 98 registered Coast clean up sites including 27 schools, and 71 Clean Up Australia Day sites. Groups collected almost eight tonnes of general rubbish – the equivalent to 186 wheelie bins – and recycled almost a tonne or 21 wheelie bins.

Service Delivery Councillor Winston Johnston, who participated in the Palmwoods clean-up, said Clean Up Australia Day on the Sunshine Coast had became Clean Up Australia Week this year, with schools, businesses and community groups all pitching in.

"I was proud to join in with the large number of people who took part in the clean up event organised by the Palmwoods Business Association, and to be part of a community who is safely picking up any misplaced rubbish, whenever they're out enjoying the Sunshine Coast," Cr Johnston said.

Hinterland tourism to benefit from half-price flights

THE Federal Government last week unveiled a \$1.2 billion tourism rescue package to provide an estimated 800,000 half-price plane tickets for key areas, including the Sunshine Coast.

The cheap return flights to more than a dozen regional tourism destinations will be offered across Australia to help save the ailing industries.

"As a tourism mecca, the Sunny Coast and its businesses have felt the pain throughout COVID-19," said Fairfax MP Ted O'Brien. "But the Federal Government is determined to do whatever is necessary to support our airport and local operators.

"These flights will bring thousands more tourists, which means more business for our accommodation providers, visitor attractions, restaurants, shops and bars ... and that all adds up to a lot of additional dollars for everyone on the Sunshine Coast.

"Hopefully, the visitors that arrive on these flights will not only enjoy our beautiful beaches and stay only on the coast, but they'll hire cars and head into the hinterland to visit local attractions, such as the Big Pineapple and the Ginger factory.

"If they don't head inland, they'll be missing some of the most stunning places in our region."





The next day, Thursday April 1 between 10am and 3pm, Nambour Tramway Company is opening the Western Terminus to the public for their long awaited viewing. "Also, at 4pm on Wednesday we are acknowledging the valuable assistance afforded by the many trades and service personnel who have work on the Terminus, by having a barbecue especially for them."

Member for Fairfax Ted O'Brien will open the facility, which also includes an information centre. Mr O'Brien said reactivating the heritage-listed tramline would give the former sugar town a nostalgic point of difference.

Palmwoods intersections are incredibly dangerous: petition

A Palmwoods mum has attracted about 900 signatures to her petition calling for traffic measures to improve safety at notorious intersections in town.

Jocelyn Anderson said Palmwoods needed urgent attention especially to the busy intersection under the railway bridge at the Chevallum Road and Jubilee Drive/Margaret St junction.

"The intersections of Palmwoods are becoming a life and death situation, with several crashes happening each week," she said.

"The residents are desperate for action before

These are incredibly dangerous as there is a big blind spot with the railway bridge. Families are having to run the gauntlet daily risking their

Suggestions included traffic lights, roundabouts and traffic calming measures to ease the build up of traffic on roads that have not kept pace with population growth in the area.

Dangerous intersections included Chevallum Road, Jubilee Drive, Margaret Street and the Churchill and Dunning Street intersections onto Palmwoods-Montville Road.

A petition signatory said: "To cross the road

at the bakery/chemist is to take your life into your hands - cars often at speed coming from 5 different roads."

Div 5 Cr Winston Johnston said Sunshine Coast Council had "no control or influence" regarding upgrades to the intersection which was maintained by the Queensland Government Department of Transport and Main Roads.

Member for Nicklin Rob Skelton said he was aware of Ms Anderson's concerns and was always happy to take up any concerns to the relevant authorities.

"I understand the residents' concerns and I am encouraged by the Department saying it's investigating options to improve safety," he said in response to the online petition.

A Transport and Main Roads spokesperson said they had received the petition and were currently investigating options for improved safety in the Palmwoods area.

He said he couldn't give a specific time frame at this stage as they were in discussions with council. The spokesman said they would have a better idea at the end of this week.

Sundale helps Little Dreamers to 'just be kids'

LITTLE Dreamers is an organisation that helps kids who have a lot on their shoulders. They're children who provide unpaid care for family members with a disability, illness or addiction.

Now the charity, which has helped more than 5000 young people since its launch in 2009, can do more locally thanks to a \$4500 grant from Nambour's Sundale Community Foundation.

As Australia's leading nonprofit for young carers Little Dreamers helps fill a gap in the healthcare system by assisting young people who just want to be kids.

State Manager Tu Mushenko said Little Dreamers provided direct support addressing key risk factors many young carers face, such as social isolation, educational disadvantage and poor mental and physical wellbeing.

"There are so many circumstances in which young people become carers. A young person might have a sibling with a physical or intellectual disability, grandparents who need extra support around the house, parents with a chronic illness or mental health condition, and the list goes on. We are passionate about providing respite and support to the young carers in Nambour."

The Gazette asked Ms Mushenko to tell us more about Little Dreamer's work.

Can you provide an example of how Little Dreamers helps young carers?

"Young carers often miss out on regular childhood experiences due to their caring roles, like social opportunities, school excursions, extracurricular activities, or part-time jobs. Little Dreamers aims to empower these young people both as carers, and as individuals outside of their caring roles."

What does your support 'mean' to the young kids you support?

"For many young carers, simply having a network of young people in similar caring situations can often be life-changing. For 18-year-old young carer, Bee: 'feeling like you aren't alone and what you're dealing with is valid and ok, and that there are people willing to help you and care about you is just the best'."

How can people help Little Dreamers?

"A simple way you can help is by spreading the word about young carers in your community. As many as 1 in 10 young Australians will experience a caring role, and a large per-

centage will never access support due to factors including lack of awareness and stigma.

"In addition, you can also participate in Little Dreamers' new in-schools education program, The Young Carer Project, which works with teachers and students to create a more inclusive and supportive school environment for young carers. For more information, please contact qldeducation@littledreamers.org.au."

How will the Sundale Community Foundation grant help Little Dreamers?

"The Sundale donation will be used to run a school holiday program on Thursday 8 April for young carers in the Nambour community, providing respite from their caring roles, social connection, and a fun day to just be a kid. The



holiday program will be run by BRICKS 4 KIDZ, encouraging young carers to use their imagination and create Lego masterpieces."



Minister for Transport and Main Roads Mark Bailey made some misleading statements in his response to my concerns about Maleny-Kenilworth Road (Gazette, March 3).

The LNP had plans to double the Labor Government's investment on Maleny-Kenilworth Road, not cut it. As well as fast-tracking the Cambroon section we would have put a further \$5 million towards upgrading the road between Maleny and Witta. And we would have invested more in road upgrades across the Coast - including Beerburrum Road, Caloundra Road and more.

I am shocked that the Minister touted scheduling shoulder grading and edge repairs on the road in February as "ensuring it remained safe". There is no "remained" to speak of. Minister Bailey and the Palaszczuk Labor Government are always looking for someone else to blame. Given Labor have been in power in Queensland for 25 of the past 30 years, maybe they should start by looking in the mirror. Either way, stop making excuses, just fix the road!


Time to open our eyes to homelessness

Frustrated resident calls out appalling NBN hinterland coverage

LANDERS Shoot resident Sean Clarke is calling for action on slow internet speeds in his area which he blames on the "appalling roll out of the NBN".

"My family have lived at Landers Shoot (between Palmwoods and Maleny) for near 15 years," he said. "It seems that the disregard for connectivity in the area has gotten worse, not better over the years. The lies and falsehoods proclaimed by successive governments have gotten to the point where Trump himself could learn lessons from the smoke and mirrors.

"For a service that promised minimum speeds of 25Mbps to all Australian households, we are lucky if we get 1Mbps. That is not at peak times. That is at quiet times including middle of the night."

Mr Clarke said residents in the area were forced to consider satellite services which were very expensive and offered comparatively very limited and expensive data.

He has collected data showing internet speed tests from his laptop which he said told a "depressing story".

"The norm is for less than 1Mbps - on rare occasions this jumps up to a couple of Mbps but there is no consistency whatsoever. This means working from home, phone calls, normal internet usage, online TV or movies and video

calls with family members is severely impacted. "What is the government doing about connectivity for those of us who continue to contribute taxes for a service that is hideously behind schedule, grossly overspent, ageing beyond capacity before full implementation, and that we are so infrequently able to connect to?'

Fisher MP Andrew Wallace said he had been working hard to secure NBN access for the Hinterland since his election in 2016.

"During that time I have invited representatives of the nbn and the major telcos to meet with Hinterland residents at a series of community forums, I have brought the Minister for Communications to the Glass House Mountains to hear from Sunshine Coast locals about their concerns, and I have advocated on behalf of countless constituents with their telco or the nbn directly. Although many areas of the Hinterland are now able to access the service and achieve good speeds, unfortunately the provision of the nbn in some parts of the region has been frustrated by the fact that the local council and some sections of the community have been unwilling to allow the construction of fixed wireless nbn towers at the necessary locations. I would encourage Hinterland residents who are having difficulty accessing the nbn to contact their telco to discuss the alternatives that are available to them. If those discussions do not bear fruit, then I encourage residents to contact me directly by phoning or emailing my



Precious funding helps keep kids on track at Special School

LAST month, the Nambour Special School was presented with \$10,000 in funding from the Sundale Community Foundation at a ceremony at the

Nambour RSL. Kylie Pitt, Treasurer of the Nambour Special School P&C said the money would be used to upgrade the school's muchloved bike track and purchase some new equipment. Is Fast Rail Finished?

N Friday, Infrastructure Australia (IA) released its long awaited assessment of the Fast Rail business case submitted by the North Coast Connect Consortium (NCCC) in December 2020.

The consortium comprised developer Stockland, consulting engineers SMEC, Urban planners Urbis and accountants KPMG.

The Fast Rail proposal did not proceed into Infrastructure Australia's Infrastructure Priority List for a number of reasons:

 It didn't have the support of the Queensland Government and it is not identified in any Queensland Transport Strategy. That said there is no definitive State Transport Strategy for the Sunshine Coast.

• The state didn't offer one cent towards the federally funded business case, perhaps a sign of impending doom.

• It didn't have a positive Benefit Cost Ratio (BCR), meaning that the cost of the project (at \$5.305 billion) did not match or exceed the proposed benefits it could bring, being social, economic and environmental. Infrastructure Australia listed challenging terrain, environmentally sensitive sites, and the level of detailed design in the submission - as presenting project delivery risks. Infrastructure Australia assessed the Benefit Cost Ratio at 0.47. A BCR of 1.0 is break-even point.

 North Coast Connect Consortium indicated they would not be leading the delivery of the project and couldn't confirm who would.

• Infrastructure Australia found that some benefits of the project may have been overstated and other benefits, like allowing for additional freight movements, were omitted from the economic appraisal.

An average rail speed of just 56km/h between Brisbane and Nambour isn't likely to endear public transport uptake.

That said the idea for Fast Rail isn't stonecold dead.

Infrastructure Australia left the door open for a business case that included a stronger case for the proposal, a balance of the costs and benefits (i.e. a BCR of 1.0) and illustrates options on how delivery risks can be managed.

It stated that "A program for a broader faster rail network in South East Queensland could potentially strengthen this proposal through joint shared operational items like rollingstock, shared (over-night) stabling yards and maintenance facilities.'

Queensland State Government support would be the other obvious requirement before any project could progress.

In late February, at a press conference involving the SEQ Council of Mayors director Mark Jamieson, the Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk and Australian Olympic Committee President John Coates, the SEQ Council of Mayors director and Sunshine Coast Mayor Mark Jamieson was asked about the prospect of Fast Rail connecting the region.

Mr Jamieson's response, "I think fast rail is a very important part of that."

"Moving people around will be critical," he said.

And he would be right.

But as Mr Jamieson was speaking, the Premier was heard in the background saying; "it's not in the bid, it's not in the bid!"

Unfortunately, the bid doesn't include a Fast Rail upgrade even though other infrastructure items are listed.

An average rail speed of just 56km/h between Brisbane and Nambour isn't likely to endear public transport uptake.

Just what the plan is to transport people to and from the Sunshine Coast during an Olympics in 2032 is anyone's guess.

At this point it may well be a fleet of cars or buses on a congested Bruce Highway.



This Saturday's game is against Gympie Devils away, before they take on Noosa at Crusher Park on March 27.


The Nambour Rugby League club was formed in 1985 with the amalgamation of two Nambour based leagues sides, the Souths Magpies and the All Whites.

Rare Pinkies will soon be on the hop

RECENTLY one of our carers received little twin swamp wallaby joeys into care. 'Pinkies', as we call them are furless marsupials that still have the soft pink skin that feels like satin. It is extremely rare to see twin joeys and I have never seen twin 'swampies' before. Just one is incredibly cute! They have settled well. Looking blue at the moment the eyes will soon be those beautiful big black eyes, and the skin will darken and fur will begin to grow.

Swamp wallabies soon grow into rambunctious, energetic and mischievous 'toddlers'.

They are a joy to rehabilitate and watch them developing their 'wild' instincts.

Soon after just a kilogram in weight, they love to be outside for most of the day and night, hiding in the vegetation, in between sporadic bursts of energy, or diving back into their hanging pouches for a nap.

By the time they reach two kilograms they just demand attention, usually four times a day, for their six-hourly bottle. The remainder of the time they love to eat all the weeds that sometimes threaten to take over my yard. With swamp wallabies in care, I have a very low maintenance yard. They earn their bottles of milk formula!

Maybe macropods feel they have to double

their breeding capacity! The numbers hit by cars and killed by dogs are pretty devastating. The increasing awareness of the plight of our precious wildlife means that people do now stop and check pouches and call our Hotline if there is a joey. Because the young animals are very firmly attached to the mother's teat, they cannot be just be removed from the pouch. It has to be carefully done or irreparable damage is done to the little joey.

Mona said her work weaved in and out of the past and present, often referencing previous exhibitions both conceptually and physically. A quick google search will bring forth the most sumptuous images of Mona's work and this exhibition is no exception.

"Fragile Gardens is an installation of an unknown future, anxious anticipations, rites of passage and dreamlike rituals," Ms Ryder said.

"I invite you to enter an enigmatic setting that seems as though it may have the possibility to come alive – certainly nothing is as it seems or should be

"I find materials fascinating, especially recycled or found objects that bring with them their own history.

"That's particularly relevant as exhibiting here (on the sunshine coast?) is like revisiting my childhood, having spent many precious childhood years here."

Artfully Art Curator Both Jackson said she

Artfully Art Curator Beth Jackson said she recalled seeing the exhibition 'Mona Ryder: A Survey' curated by Dr Nancy Underhill at the University Art Museum, University of Queensland back in 1984.

"I was just a student studying art history and this show made a deep impression on me. It was the first exhibition I had seen that I could describe as feminist – expressing a woman's embodied voice in a bold materiality," Ms Iackson said.

"The painted wooden ironing boards and other sculptural assemblages that incorporated domestic items were radical.

"This was before the rise of installation art and these strange forms that spoke of home life, child rearing, sexuality, interpersonal politics and emotional work were just amazing.

"Of course I had seen Judy Chicago's 'Dinner Party' and Georgia O'Keefe's magnificent flower paintings in books, but this was right here in Brisbane ... truly inspirational to this young woman and budding feminist."

"The third option is located at Mapleton Fire Brigade Park on Obi Obi Road and would also be a fenced dog off-leash area.


"Council values the input of residents and is seeking feedback so all relevant opinions are considered in the decision-making process.





Lively interest in future of funerals as council investigates eco-burials

THE future of funerals is in the spotlight following community feedback showing increased interest in more eco-friendly afterdeath experiences.

Council is investigating natural burial sites within existing cemeteries.

Natural burial is an environmentally sensitive option that an increasing number of people are choosing for their resting place or for that of a lost loved one.

The general principle of a natural burial is to be in a bushland area, or an area being regenerated through native planting, and for no toxic materials to be used for the coffin or other materials being interred. Often a communal memorial is placed adjacent to the natural burial area to provide an opportunity for loved ones to memorialise an individual.

Service Excellence Portfolio Councillor Winston Johnston said planning included identifying a suitable area within the current cemetery network which aligns with the natural burial ethos and included space for a communal memorial.

"We are also liaising with local funeral directors, as they will play an integral role in ensuring the natural burial offering meets the community's needs," Cr Johnston said.

"Plans are progressing well, and we anticipate that natural burial will be available by the end of the year."

Cr Johnston said work was underway to restore the shelter at Woombye cemetery.

Council is also working to better understand and plan for the needs of our growing population and emerging faiths in the region and what end-of-life desires need to be considered. It is already possible for sustainable, non-toxic coffins to be used in Sunshine Coast cemeteries.

Initially, Glenn overlocked carpet strips to make nice neat mats, and he sold them at the markets.


From there, his business progressed to retail shops and private work and now he exclusively does work for retail customers.

After many years it has provided a colourful interjection into the location on Howard Street.


It has undergone several repairs and rectification of impacts of graffiti over the last 14 years and the work has reached its life span. After consultation with stakeholders and a



Artisan Liquor Bill

This week in parliament, we passed a few pieces of legislation that will have positive impacts locally.

The Liquor (Artisan Liquor) Amendment Bill will create a specific license for artisan distillers and craft brewers, allowing them to get their products out in the market that much

The new license removes the limit on how much of their own product they can sell at their own premises, gives an option to be able to showcase their products at promotional events, sell their product as takeaway and online, and apply for permits to sell at public events. With so many craft brewers and artisan distillers in Nicklin, this will be a huge boost to our local economy.

Waste Reduction Bill

The Palaszczuk government has added to the success of it's single-use plastic bag ban and the container refund scheme and has also banned single-use plastic (SUP) & polystyrene straws, stirrers, plates, and cutlery.

The ban comes after thorough community consultations last year showing of the nearly 20,000 submissions received, a huge 94% were in favour of banning SUP straws, stirrers, plates, and cutlery. More profit, with less work

Business Ideas by Peter Gamgee

Booming and busting. How do you cope with the boom for those businesses lucky enough to see an upsurge in sales and turnover? In any "boom" time it is always wise to understand how you can make the most of the ride - and that does not mean just working harder to keep up. That is a recipe for busting.

Here are a few ideas on how you can keep up with being "busy" without breaking your back. In fact you can even take more time off in busy times if you manage it well. You can also realise a higher value of your business if you decide to sell or seek investment.

More or less staff? You may think that more work means more staff if the business grows. More staff may be the answer if you can get the right ones, and they have a career or succession path in your business. What also comes with more staff are the challenges of the overheads, the need to accrue liabilities for Sick, Maternity and Long Service Leave, not to mention increasing superannuation contribution. More staff will definitely be a way to help the business grow for some business owners - but not all. Before making an assumption about staff check out the other ideas in this article.

Systemisation. If all of your processes from the generation of leads (marketing & advertising), through sales and follow up service are systemised you can improve many aspects. First you will need fewer people directly employed, second you will have a powerful means of measuring and improving your business, third you will increase the sale value of your business, and open it up to other expansion options of "Duplication" noted below.

Value. Understand the value of what you offer and work on that. Simply changing to only support those products that give you the best return means you may be able to expand revenue and profit without expanding sales and support effort. Analyse your business to know what margins you make on each of your products or services. Dispense with those that make you little money - unless they are clearly "lead magnets" for what you do sell at good margins (your niche). Secondly understand this niche and increase the client perceived value of what you have to offer. Now you can increase price and hence profit. This is all about selling less, being less busy, but being able to command higher margins that customers are happy to pay for your niche products or services.

Duplicate the model. I would recommend address systemisation first. After that consider duplicating your success in one channel/ location/demographic/online presence. First analyse what makes it busy and successful and make sure you preserve that in the duplication. The duplication could be a physical presence, use of another selling channel, a licence or joint venture agreement with another non competing business owner, or another channel to market through the media.

Reduce trading hours. This needs to be treated with some caution – but it is quite feasible for some. When demand outstrips supply, those on the supply side can be more selective as to when and where they are open. If it is a physical presence - what hours make you the most profit? If you are an online business - the same applies - what hours and what channels get you the best customers? Tune the opening hours to suit. The pop-up coffee vans are a typical example - around in the morning for all the 'tradies' to drive in and get their morning coffee. By midday the owners are out surfing!



STENOCARPUS sinuatus is also called Firewheel Tree for its gorgeous red and orange flowers with yellow tips.

It's the first time flowering at the Maroochy Regional Botanic Bush Gardens and the Friends and volunteers are excited they've been waiting quite a few years to see it but it was well worth the wait in my opinion.

Its a handsome evergreen rainforest tree with not only special flowers but large deep green smooth and shiny leaves which are alternate and leathery with wavy lobed edges.

The tree is narrow growing to 20m+ having upright branches taking a few years to start flowering which occurs summer to autumn. The flowers grow straight off mature wood.

This tree is well known as a specimen tree for the garden and grows easily from seed.

When mature this tree has profuse flowers to 10cm, then brown seed capsules up to 8cm long seeds are winged.

Check out the tree it is labelled see its flowers which are decorative umbrils and look like cartwheels with the spokes.

Come to the carpark just below the A&E Centre next to the first car bay on the right at the Maroochy Regional Botanic Bush Gardens, Palm Creek Road, Tanawha.







