Servo a 'violation of town's character'

Yandina says 'no' to proposed service station in middle of town

A development application for a service station in Yandina that had been refused by Council may go ahead after all, following an appeal by developer Pearl Investments.

Negotiations between experts hired by Council and the developer in the Planning and Environment Court appear to be approaching reluctant agreement, according to Yandina and District Community Association. Negotiations could include the re-routing of fuel tankers along suburban streets and past a child care centre.

The issue has been of concern to YADCA and Business Yandina since January 2021. "Yandina residents have been living with the unwelcome prospect of a new service station at the Farrell Street/Stevens Street intersection in the heritage and character precinct of town," said YADCĂ president Marie Reeve.

Ms Reeve said the original plan for fuel tankers to enter and leave the station was rejected by Council, but maintained that the only other alternative was no improvement.

"The option of re-routing tankers up Stevens and Buckle Street and down Old Gympie Road is no better," she said.

"Have the traffic engineers visited the site? The corners are steep and tight. The roads are narrow and often become one-lane when cars are parked on both sides of the street. It is a medium density residential area."

Ms Reeve said safety and amenity would be sacrificed if the service station was approved and the development was inconsistent with the Service Station Code, which requires that a service station does not adversely impact upon the amenity of the surrounding local area and has safe and convenient access to the road network.

"While amendments have been made to the plans it is very hard to make a service station with its wide expanse of concrete, large advertising signs and high traffic volumes comply with the Yandina Local Plan Code which aims

to see Stevens Street enhanced as an attractive and pedestrian-friendly main street. "Nor would it comply with the

Heritage and Character overlay code where buildings in Yandina's character

area are typically 'continuous small-scale commercial buildings built to the street alignment with a narrow frontage and a predominance of street parapets of various shapes together with post-supported street awnings?"

Business Yandina President Bill Gissane said his organisation was implacably opposed to the development which he said was a violation of the town's character.

"It is not good for business and it is not good

for the community," he said. "The town's character and the community's safety and amenity should not be disregarded in favour of an ill-conceived development application.

"The proposed site is a premium vacant block in the town centre and there are undoubtedly many other developments that would otherwise enrich and enhance Yandina's character as the oldest hinterland town rather than diminishing it."

Last September the Hinterland Blues won the QFA Division 2 North Seniors Grand Final in resounding fashion against Alexandra Hills at Wilston Grange 103-66 to cap an unbeaten season.

How the 100-year-old Palmwoods rail shed was rescued

A century-old Palmwoods shed that was falling apart has been resurrected as a rustic home for coffee catchups, dinners, and specialised retail, thanks to a handful of people determined to save the building.

The old rail shed on Main Street had for years suffered a leaking roof, rotting beams and floorboards, termite damage, and foundations weakened by years of stormwater flows, and was at risk of demolition.

Building owner Marilyn Stokes, a qualified architect who operates a building access advisory, spearheaded the restoration project after acquiring the building in 2015.

"My first thoughts were, 'Oh my God, what have I done?' It was in an absolutely terrible state, but it definitely had a lot of potential being where it is on Main Street," she explained. "The floor was like walking on honeycomb -

it was completely white-anted – and all of the walls, the stud work, the rafters, everything inside, had to be replaced."


Many of the structural beams were unusual sizes and difficult to acquire. On top of that, many weatherboards needed repair and the roof needed total replacing. Colonial style windows and window hoods were added.

During the restoration, the building caught the eye of local businessman Geoff Ryan, whose needed a new home for his growing homewares and gift store 'The Shed'.

"We started having some input about the work, we were telling Marilyn our plans, what we were aiming to do, so some of her renovation turned into something that suited us as well," Mr Ryan explained.

"We didn't want to bastardise the building's





historical look by putting in mirrors, chrome, stainless steel, marble floors.

"We wanted to give it some character... If you look at the outside of the building, and when you walk in, you see exactly what you thought it would look like... and people are happy."

The rail shed was built by a cooperative of farmers around 1919, and helped store local-

ly-grown produce like pineapples and citrus, prior to freighting to Brisbane. At one stage, it was one of the busiest railway yards in Queensland, hosting 30 trains a day.

The aging shed faced an unknown future after the death in 2014 of former owner Peter Crosby, whose rural supply business was a wellknown tenant of the shed through the 2000s.

However, the completed restoration has saved the building - a credit to the efforts of those responsible.

Some of the walls of the shed are not quite plumb, as you'd expect of such an old building, but it suits the character just fine – it's also a reminder of the long and productive life this building has endured so far.

"We decided to take on the restoration as a project - it was either that or the building would have fallen apart," Ms Stokes explained.

"It has been amazing... it's all just come together so well."


Yvonne has been drawing portraits of pets in coloured pencils since 2017.

Business Writeup: Club Hotel Namba

WITH over 50 years combined experience in the industry the directors behind the recently opened Club Hotel Namba were attracted by the pub's history, its "good bones" and a presence in town that was irresistible.

And after three months' trade the business was meeting expectations.

"We're probably right on par where we wanted to be," said Director Paul Harley, who is known as 'Harley'. "But our initial phase is not just measured on the dollars, but also on the number of people dining and the repeat customers coming back.

"It's a gastro pub, if you want to call it that. It's a pub, but essentially it's a family restaurant environment within the pub. Because we don't have the loud noise of gambling machines, Keno televisions, blaring music and all that.

"It's a chance for, even three generations of a family to sit there with a bit of background music, enjoy a meal, and communicate like we used to do.'

Since opening in December last year Club Hotel Namba has served as a shining light in a street characterised more by empty shopfronts.

Harley said Nambour people had embraced the Currie Street hotel's vision to be a big, open, family-friendly style hotel without gaming.

"The locals have given awesome support," he said. "We've got regular repeat customers already. They're booking their same table, coming back. And that's what we've been trying to work on, is to just give Nambourians quality service.

"It's all on us now to maintain the smiles, the consistency, the quality and the pricing."

Big Plans

Harley said the hotel had plans to extend its food and entertainment offerings including Thursday Seafood Nights for \$11, a Friday-Saturday

supervised kids club and they're bringing back the traditional Sunday roast with all the trimmings on a Sunday.

"We've had a complete revamp of the cocktail list. And then from Easter on we're going to start looking at some solos and duos entertainment and look at some more comedy nights and a few other things."

The pub is also planning gour-met-toastie style breakfasts and afternoon meals to cater for the 2.30pm to 5.30pm timeslot when many other food outlets close their doors.

"So that if you miss your lunch or

you want to have a snack in the afternoon from Wednesday to Sunday, there's something available," said Harlev.

'Secret' falls a short walk from local park

THERE are many relatively secret places whose whereabouts only a local would know. A tranquil waterfall in Nambour certainly fits that description.

Rheanna Mahon from recently opened Pit-Stop Coffee in Price Street took this great photo of Robinson's Falls and recommended people take time out to visit the natural gem.

The falls are at the end of Waterfall Road, Nambour, which is just off Mapleton Road and directly opposite Nambour General Hospital.

There's a 10.5 hectare Cilento Bushland Conservation Reserve. It includes a grassy park area with small children's playground, BBQ and toilet amenities surrounded by bushland. After a short walk into the bush you'll find yourself at the base of the falls.

You can watch Tuckers Creek tumble down two side-by-side cascades into a pretty waterhole below.

Cilento Bushland Conservation Reserve itself is a World War II memorial. The area was occupied by the 7th Battery 2/4th Field Artillery during the Second World War.

It was donated to Maroochy Shire Council in 1952 by Sir Ralph and Dame Phyllis Cilento, who were both prominent Sunshine Coast medical practitioners.

Interestingly, they were the parents of theatre and film actress Diane Cilento, who was actor Sean Connery's first wife.

Bravery medal for Nambour man who saved boy

NAMBOUR man (Frank) Daniel Montague has been recognised for his outstanding bravery during the rescue of a young boy from a rip in Maroochydore in 2020.

Mr Montague was awarded the Commonwealth Bravery Medal, announced recently.

The incident happened on 4 September 2020 when Mr Montague was at Cotton Tree Beach and was alerted to a young boy in distress in the water.

The boy had been separated from his group and dragged approximately 30 metres by a strong current toward a dredge operating at the river mouth.

Mr Montague dived into the water and swam to the boy. He grabbed him and hung onto a dredge pipe as the current was too strong to swim back to shore.

The pipe sunk under the weight of him and the boy, and the two floated over it toward the dredge. Mr Montague swam back against the current and again held onto the pipe, which had resurfaced.

Two onlookers paddled out and put the boy onto a small kayak, but were unable to swim back against the strong current. A third onlooker arrived on a paddle board and placed Mr Montague onto the board. Mr Montague was in the water for approximately 25 minutes.

A motor skiff arrived and took the boy, and then Mr Montague, to the shore. Arriving at the shore, Mr Montague suffered a stress induced heart attack and other injuries as a result of the rescue.

The Lemon Migrant Butterfly, Catopsilia pomona

Local Nature Watch with Don McGlusky

I spent a lot of time stalking this critter. They are very active. The species is found around most of Australia's coastline.

There are four Australian Migrant species white, lemon, yellow, & orange, all somewhat similar when in flight, here are some hints to help with their identification. This species is highly variable.

There are two seasonal forms, and to add to the complexity there are intermediate forms as well: the summer form is known as the dark form and the winter form as the pale form. The dark form is most abundant from December to April. The pale form may be found throughout the year but is usually more common between April and October.

One way to help decide which form, when a specimen is photographed at rest, is the colour of its antennae, the dark form has black antennae and the pale form has pink antennae. However wing markings are also a key to helping with identification.

For males the wing markings between the dark form and the pale form is minimal.

With the females the variance is far more obvious. We have a large Cassia fistula tree which is deciduous and the new growth appears in early December followed by flowering which lasts well into February. This tree is a favourite for these butterflies on which to lay their eggs and feed on the blossom. From my research the specimen in the photo appears to be a male of the dark variance.

I had the opportunity to chat to an Olympian and ask what his career had entailed with regard to his use of public transport, in particular rail travel.

I wanted to gauge the importance of a fast, frequent, affordable rail system on an Olympian who has been everywhere, in his career both as an elite sportsman and commentator.

There was significant hype about Fast Rail in the lead-up to the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games bid – where our possible Sunshine Coast transport legacy options are in actuality old options promised in the past and never built.

A news cameraman told me how the Los Angeles Summer Olympics already had their new light-rail transport system up and running - five years before their Games' kick-off on 30 July 2028.

The Olympian is Benny Pike, who fought in the men's light heavyweight events at the 1980 Moscow Summer Olympics.

This is Benny Pike's transport story:

"I'm a born and bred local, and proud of the journey my family has had on the Sunshine Coast.

I started my boxing career at Maroochy High in 1971, winning my first bout in front of a packed audience at Nambour Civic Hall. Little did I know that my fistic ability would take me around the world for the next 50 years."

"Winning 6 National Titles, 10 State Titles, representing Australia at 2 Commonwealth Games, 1 Olympic Games, 2 World Cups, 1 World Championship, 4 Oceania Games, 4 Kings Cups, 2 Presidents Cups and numerous other tournaments around Australia."

"My media career allowed me to travel the world commentating at five Olympics and six Commonwealth Games.

There were two constants through-out, [one was] watching the world's best amateur fighters and [two, was] how many times I used a train."

"It all started after the 1978 Commonwealth Games in Canada, catching the Rocky Mountains train to Vancouver on a holiday trip to the United States.

[In] 1979 New York and [the] Montreal 1981 World Cups, I used trains to travel and sightsee.

At the 1996 Atlanta Olympics I caught the train to watch Maroochy local Clint Robinson defends his 1992 Olympic Gold.

It was an hour trip to [the] Lake outside of Atlanta; sadly Clint was relegated to silver.

The boxing venue for the 1998 Kuala Lumpur [Commonwealth] Games was at least 30 minutes away, so it was a quick [train] trip each day.

Same for the 2000 Sydney Olympics, leaving Parramatta every day to travel into work at Darling Harbour.

Melbourne 2006 Commonwealth Games was a train trip morning and night from Elsternwick to Melbourne Central.

In 2020 I went to an ABC Radio 2000 Games reunion in Darling Harbour; a train ride to and fro."

"I could go on but this really is common sense, the Sunshine Coast needs and deserves heavy rail into Maroochydore/Nambour. It's time to put politics aside and do what's best for the people of the fastest growing region in the country.

"I will catch the train for the 2032 Brisbane Games."

If released too early, their instincts just aren't fully developed.

People may talk of size in relation to release but they need to be psychologically ready as well as physically fit. If kept in care for too long they are seen, even by their own species, as a threat to food supply, housing supply and breeding activities.

The safety of an aviary can also lead to complacency and dull their wild instincts. For males especially, this can mean some harsh penalties are dealt out.

Wishing everyone safe and happy Easter holidays. Don't forget to retrieve any plastic you see in the waterways, and chop up any fishing line or baling twine into small pieces so it can't entangle our wildlife. Stationery

How to Gourmet BBQ with Matt Golinsky

Anxiety is the most common mental health condition in the country with over 2 million Australians experiencing it every year.

According to Lifeline, anxiety is "the excessive, uncontrollable and often irrational anticipation of future threats". It can be incredibly debilitating and in extreme cases have long term detrimental effects on the ability to work, interact with family and maintain relationships.

The symptoms of anxiety may include body tension, restlessness, excessive worry or fear, panic attacks, increased heart and breathing rates, catastrophising and avoidance. Because of the variety of signs and symptoms anxiety can be difficult to treat with many understandably opting for prescribed medication that almost always comes with a list of side effects.

A 2011 study found that regular massage with thermotherapy or relaxing room therapy can be effective in alleviating anxiety. The 68 trial participants with GAD were at random given 10 treatments during a 12-week period. Researchers found that all had improved their anxiety by the end of the 12-week program, as evidenced by changes in their Hamilton Anxiety Rating Scale (HARS). Interestingly, at the 26-week follow-up phase, the researchers also discovered that individuals' HARS ratings remained in decline long after the therapy was over. 


