Meet the artist behind new tram design

USSELL Anderson is the artist behind Nambour's new tram design. To be Lunveiled at the official opening of Nambour's Western Tram Terminus this Friday (May 14) there's a lot riding on the concept. It represents the culmination of nearly ten years work by Tramway Company Chairman Greg Rogerson and his board and marks a milestone in the reimagining of the former sugar town, once the commercial hub of the Sunshine Coast.

Even so, Russell says anyone expecting a "traditional" tram design was in for a shock. "When I pitched my idea it was a bit left-offield compared to what they were thinking," he said. "But my interest was in building an art object that was also fully functional as a working tram. Realistically, this tram's function is not primarily for transport. It's a tourist attraction. It represents the town's history. I see a lot more potential than it just being a vehicle that transports people. I think it's a lot more than that. Maybe a cultural catalyst or something like that. And if it has culture and whimsy built-in and if it has more spirit and life to it, then I hope it may become a springboard for other cultural activities and ideas and artworks in town.

"Nambour has its own energy and hopefully this will be part of that energy."

\$5m for Nambour rail study

THE Federal Government has committed \$5 million for a study into full duplication of the North Coast Rail Line between Beerburrum and Nambour.

Fairfax MP Ted O'Brien has welcomed the funding, part of a \$172 million allocation for three major transport projects in the region including \$160 million for the Mooloolah River Interchange and \$7 million for the Caloundra Transport Corridor Upgrade. The \$5 million is subject to matched funding from the state government. The North Coast Rail Line is owned and operated by the state government and is a state government responsibility.

Mr O'Brien said the commitment for a study into a better Stage 2 design for the Beerburrum to Nambour project provided residents with an opportunity to get the rail solution they deserve. "The current Stage 2 proposal for passing loops and other upgrades between Landsborough and Nambour is totally unacceptable," said Mr O'Brien. "Nothing short of full duplication of the line, that's two tracks, all the way to Nambour is what the community deserves.

"That's why I launched a campaign in February this year and this \$5 million commitment comes as a huge win for the community, especially in Nambour. A new Stage Two design should allow for full duplication to Nambour while accommodating the possibility of a fast rail solution in the future," said Mr O'Brien.

Mr Wallace said that further upgrades north of Beerwah would deliver important benefits for residents in Landsborough, Eudlo, Palmwoods, Woombye and Nambour.

"Whether you live in Caloundra, Kawana or in the hinterland, I want to see all residents on the Sunshine Coast able to access a frequent and fast rail service to travel within our region and further afield. This study into rail duplication north of Beerwah is another important step forward in making that a reality," said Mr Wallace.



Russell was nervous but philosophical about how people would react to his design. "I think there will be people that really love it and there will be people that really hate it. Because that's the way people are.

"But if you just up-rooted a conventional-looking tram and plonked it in Nambour it wouldn't work," he said. "And I didn't want to just repeat history and create a cane train. This is a passenger vehicle, but it's also got to be a work of art. It has to be a beautiful object in its own right. It has to be a beautiful thing."

Russell said his work was also inspired by a sense of fun and whimsy. "In my mind this design was inspired somewhat by the time Einstein came up with his time dilation theory. Because he was on a tram at the time and he came up with the theory driving away from the Berne station looking back at a clock. The Nambour tram is meant to travel at the speed of light to test his theory. That thought is what inspired me at an artistic level. I've always been a little whimsical in my work. Tongue in cheek humour is a part of what I do I suppose."

Mr Rogerson said he hoped the tram would be designed built and "on the tracks" within 12 months.

And not before time. "It's been a hard slog," the former Div 10 Councillor said. "It's been nine years in the making. But the good Lord looked down on the board and gave us a helping hand. We were just about exhausted trying to find a manufacturer that would do it justice, do it locally and do it at an affordable rate. And thank goodness we found Russell."

Nambour's first look at terminus & tram

THE public gets its first look at Nambour's much-anticipated tram design this Friday (May 14) from 12.30 to 3pm and Saturday (May 15) from 9.30am.

While the design has been kept under wraps it was described by Member for Fairfax Ted O'Brien — who will officially open the complex at a function on Friday morning — as "a moving piece of street theatre". The battery powered, solar regenerative tram is expected to be operational by mid next year.

The interactive tram has been designed by renowned Curramore kinetic artist Russell Anderson in his typically vibrant and eye-catching style (See story Page 1).

Nambour Tramway Company Chairman and Former Div 10 councillor Greg Rogerson said he was immensely proud and relieved that the tram was being designed locally and built on the Sunshine Coast. Engineering Consultants Covey Associates have collaborated with Russell supplying the all important engineering and accreditation required by the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator (ONRSR).

"TNTCo is exceptionally pleased that Mr Anderson has gathered a team of exceedingly competent, local professionals and trades people around him, to deliver Nambour's unique tram."


Saturday's opening also marks a huge milestone in the reimagining of the former sugar town, once the commercial hub of the Sunshine Coast.

"This project is a great example of what can be achieved when governments and the community have a dream and work together to achieve it," said Mr O'Brien. "We've brought this attraction back to life and we look forward to seeing it trundling through Nambour for many years to come. More about the Project

• Fairfax MP Ted O'Brien will officially open the project. • The tram is expected to be

operational by mid next year. • The battery-powered "Tram" will run between Nambour Mill Village Shopping Centre and the Southern end of Quota Park between Repco and Aldi, and along Mill and Howard Streets.

• The terminus project, which includes an information centre, has been funded by the Federal Government, the Sunshine Coast Council and The Nambour Tramway Company (TNT Co), with contributions from the local community including a donation from philanthropists Roy and Nola Thompson.

• Mr O'Brien secured half a million dollars of Federal funds, awarded through the National Stronger Regions Fund, to add to the \$1.1 million raised by TNT Co and the \$2.6 million by Council.

Speed reduced on Maleny–Stanley River Rd

THE speed limit on a section of Maleny-Stanley River Road at Maleny will be reduced to improve safety.

three-kilometre section Α heading west out of the Maleny township will be reduced from 80km/h to 70km/h.

Transport and Main Roads North Coast Regional Director Scott Whitaker said the reduction had been endorsed by the Sunshine Coast Speed Management Committee.

"The committee includes representatives from the Queensland Police Service, Sunshine Coast Council and Transport and Main Roads," Mr Whitaker said. "The speed limit will now be 70km/h between the 60km/h zone near Witham Road at Maleny to near River Road at Wootha."

The speed limit review considered a range of factors such as road function, environment, existing construction standard, prevailing traffic speeds and crash history.

"I urge all motorists to observe the new speed limit signs and to always drive to conditions.'

Work to implement the new limits will start in the week starting 17 May. They are expected to take four days to complete, weather and conditions permitting.

Nambour Compass Campus opening heralds new opportunities for people with disabilities

IT'S primary purpose is to provide leading-edge learning and development opportunities for young people with intellectual and physical disabilities.

But Compass Institute Founder and CEO David Dangerfield hopes his new campus in C-Square will also help change perceptions about people with disabilities.

"I refer to the facilities as campuses because of their focus on learning and development opportunities," said Mr Dangerfield. "We have always challenged the implicit notion that people with a disability are liabilities requiring welfare.

Mr Dangerfield heads the Palmwoods-based charity dedicated to providing "real futures" for people with a disability.

"Compass is a showcase that allows people with disabilities to demonstrate that they are in fact assets to their community. Like all assets their potential is unlocked through structured learning and development programs, and of course - opportunity.

"Compass also has a range of very successful social enterprises that provide the opportunity for people with disability to participate in meaningful ways in their community and to experience that sense of achievement and pride we all feel at the end of a job well done.'

Looking ahead, Compass hopes to offer market stalls, art installations, music, and other performance events throughout the C-Square public spaces. Compass will also be opening a new social enterprise retail store, Wabi Sabi, in the C-Square precinct in June.

Through Compass' innovative social enterprise model this store will sell a range of products made

Garden Expo returns for bumper 2021

QUEENSLAND'S premier gardening event - the Queensland Garden Expo - is on track to welcome thousands of visitors from far and wide to a three day celebration of all things gardening in July this year.

The nursery industry enjoyed one of its best years on record during 2020 with the recent Nursery Industry Statistics 2019-20 survey of Australian production nurseries revealing a record 2.2 billion plants were produced and sold in Australia last year.[1]

Queensland Garden Expo Event Manager Marion Beazley said while it was disappointing that the 2020 Expo had to be cancelled due to the pandemic, the resulting increase in people gardening provided an exciting opportunity for this year's event to attract new visitors.

"The Nursery Industry Survey captured the growth in people wanting to invest time in creating their own backyard oasis, particularly as more people are working from home and many are restricted in their ability to travel for holidays," Ms Beazley said.

Obi Obi upgrade not on the cards

A Kenilworth mum is wondering what has happened to State Government funding to fix the dangerous Obi Obi down-road between Mapleton and Kenilworth.

"My understanding was that Peter Wellington was able to secure funding for surveryors and funds to fix up the road and Marty Hunt said there was \$38 millon put aside to work on the road, but Rob Skelton has said there are no funds," the woman, who preferred not to be named said.

"I am just wondering why it is that a road that is being used as a major tourism road while governments are advocating job creation etcetera is not being fixed ... are there any funds and if so why can't they fix up the road and support the community who need it for work, and encourage future growth?" In 2018 former Nicklin

MP Marty Hunt asked Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey the following question: "With reference to the unsealed and dangerous sections of Obi Obi Road between Mapleton and Kenilworth, which is a tourist gateway and is inaccessible by ambulance and has been a community concern for some time: Will the Minister commit to funding and commencing upgrades to this road this year?'

In reply Mr Bailey said: "A planning study completed in April 2017 recommended widening the top of Obi Obi Road to two lanes at an estimated cost of \$18 million, and wid-ening George Wyer Scenic Drive to two lanes at an estimated cost of \$18 million.

"At this time, however, there is no funding for construction available, with funding of this upgrade competing with other priorities across the state.'

Glass House MP Andrew Powell also voiced his concerns. "How frustrating to witness the Labor Government once again recognise the danger of this road but refuse to implement timely, long term solu-tions. Along with locals, I have been calling on the Government to bring any upgrades forward as part of their COVID economic recovery plans. Maleny-Ke-nilworth Road has been abandoned for far too long. Speed reductions are Band-Aid fixes. Stump up the money and fix the road before another life is lost on it."



Montville venue mimics classical intimacy of days gone by, says pianist

WORLD famous pianist Piers Lane is relishing the chance to perform at Lucas Parklands in Montville, describing the intimate concert venue as "the way composers like Beethoven and Chopin experienced it themselves".

Mr Lane is performing two concerts at the peaceful 150seat bushland auditorium on May 29 and 30.

"I visited Lucas Parklands quite a few years ago as an audience member and loved the whole concept," Mr Lane said from his home in London. "I really enjoy more intimate music-making. Most solo piano music was composed for the salon situation rather than the huge venues it is usually performed in, so it's always special to explore it and share it the way composers like Beethoven and Chopin experienced it themselves."

The Piers Lane recital on May 29 will be unique: an hour of beautiful Chopin Nocturnes, presented at twilight in a room lit by candlelight alone. The second concert on May 30 is a 2.30pm matinee where Mr Lane will present two Beethoven sonatas followed by all the Chopin Waltzes.

Mr Lane has had his performances disrupted badly by Covid-19 and the associated travel restrictions, but that will change with his local concerts.

"I haven't given a solo performance since the Wigmore Hall in London on March 15th last year — every scheduled concert and recording was cancelled for one Covid reason or another, bar three or so postponed performances with my longterm duo partner, the now-retired British violinist Tasmin Little," Mr Lane said.

"The situation in Europe and the States is still pretty dire, so it's a real privilege that I, as an Australian, can return to playing in this way.

"I'm delighted, as always, to be coming 'home', catching up with friends in audiences everywhere, and spending a bit of time in places I have loved all my life," he said.

"I was last in Brisbane in 2019, but haven't been to the Sunshine Coast for a few years. We used to spend family holidays at Peregian when I was growing up, so that whole coastline is full of memories for me.

FOR the past 12 months the Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show committee has been quietly working behind the scenes on one of the largest annual events on the Coast.

To be held from Friday to Sunday June 11-13 at Nambour Showgrounds the hard work is paying off with organisers expecting crowds of 25,000 over three days.

"The Show is on track for a bumper year," said Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show Society President Rowan O'Hara.

"This year we'll also be catering for people with food allergies," said Penny. "There will be a more diverse range to cater for people with specific needs such as gluten free." Woombye's Sunshine & Sons will be a highlight of our Show Cellar this year with their unique Gin, Vodka and Rum and we also welcome Amrita Park Meadery with their super smooth nectar from local bees."

Wood chopping, dogs and fireworks

The three most popular questions Sunshine Coast Agricultural Show Society Office Manager Penny Daly gets asked are "when is the wood chop on, can I bring my dog and what time are the fireworks".

"The best answer is go to the website," laughed Penny. "But to save people time I can answer now ... You can only bring a dog if it's an assistance dog. The Wood chop is on Friday and Saturday from 9.30am all day. The Fireworks are at 8pm Friday and Saturday and 7pm Sunday."

"Wood chopping is not only popular at Nambour," said wood chopper of 45 years and former world champion axman Phil Campbell. "It's popular everywhere and in fact it's the second largest attraction at Sydney Royal Easter Show after the show bags."

Nambour is part of the show circuit that decides points for the year towards the Queensland Champion of Champions at the Brisbane Ekka. This year showgoers will be able to see current Standing Block World Champion Mitchell Argent and Double-Handed Sawing World Champion Jamie Head.

"It's an important show to come to," said Phil. "It brings all the best blokes here. It's also a great arena."

Penny agreed saying Nambour was an attractive venue for the big guns. "If you have a good steward you will tend to get a good field of competitors and we have a very good steward. "People sit in the grandstand and they can watch the wood chop in comfort and they can watch all the events in the main ring."

High time for a safety upgrade at notorious intersection

LOU Kellie still struggles to remember the details of the crash that landed her in hospital. The long-term Palmwoods resident was left with a concussion, memory loss and migraines as a result of the horrific crash at the corner of Chevallum and Woombye Palmwoods roads.

"I went a bit hazy, the doctor at the hospital said I probably suffered a concussion without realising it," she said.

"That's why I'm missing patches of the memory of it."

Ms Kellie was driving from Nambour with her partner Grant and her 14-year-old daughter towards the rail bridge intersection when the trio was hit by another car in October 2020.

The car was a write off.

"I hit the brakes but it was too late," Ms Kellie said.

Ms Kellie was out of work for two months and took several attempts before she was able to cross the intersection again in a car.

She and her family have since moved to Nanango. She urged authorities to fix the intersection before someone was killed.

"Something needs to be done before someone is killed there," she said.

"Traffic has worsened considerably.

Petition attracts 1200 signatures

PALMWOODS mother of two Jocelyn Anderson is behind a petition urging the State Government to fix the intersection at Jubilee Drive, Chevallum Road and Margaret Street.

The petition launched in March also called for upgrades of the intersection of Churchill and Dunning streets onto Palmwoods-Montville Road.

It has attracted about 1200 signatures on change.org.au. But Ms Anderson said recently pleas for safety upgrades had "fallen on deaf ears".

"Unfortunately, I really seriously believe it will take a fatality before they actually decide that it's terrible," she said. The 38-year-old has

repeatedly sent requests to clarify who was responsible for the intersections to the Sunshine Coast Council and new local member Robert Skelton.

The two authorities repeatedly "passed the buck" until the Daily was able to clarify that any modifications to Woombye-Palmwoods Road, Chevallum Road and Margaret Street were under the control of the Main Roads and Transport Department.

The council only controls the side streets - Jubilee Drive, Churchill Street and Dunning Street.

"It's mind boggling, no one wants to take ownership," Ms Anderson said.

State to investigate solutions

THE State Government has begun to investigate shortterm solutions to solve Palmwoods traffic woes.

Member for Nicklin Rob Skelton met with Department of Transport and Main Roads north coast regional director Scott Whitaker and several of his staff last month to discuss potential solutions to the longstanding issues plaguing the growing area.

It comes after the Sunshine Coast Daily launched the Pave the way for Palmwoods campaign to fight for safety upgrades in the Hinterland town.

Mr Skelton who has lived in Palmwoods for two months said he understood the community's fears.

The new MP has been busy travelling the roads of his new electorate and speaking to residents to get to know the area better since he was elected last October.

"It (change) needs to happen, it's been a long time," he said.

Mr Skelton agrees with suggestions from residents that an increase in development had seen extra strain placed on the road network, something he's not too keen on.

"The roads are similar to what they've always had but you've now got pressure of thousands more people," he said.

"Personally I have a bit of a problem with some of the developments because they're one way in and one way out.

"As a (former) emergency service person I think that's ridiculous and I don't like it.

"That's what makes those adjoining roads dangerous to come out of."

Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey and the Department of Transport and Main Roads director-general Neil Scales have been briefed on the town's concerns during a meeting with Mr Skelton at Parliament House last week.

Mr Skelton acknowledged the rail bridge intersection at Chevallum and Woombye Palmwoods roads was a "sticky wicket".

The Federal Government has pledged \$390 million towards the North Coast rail duplication with the state contributing \$160 million.

A stalemate has been running for more than two years about which level of government should pay for the remaining \$230 million.

He said any sort of upgrades would rely on the duplication of the rail line.

"It would be nice if we could get an agreement from the Federal Government with the rail duplication because they could work concurrently," he said.

"You can't really do anything to that bridge because it is the main north/south (line) and it would be out for weeks and the state would be crippled."

Mr Skelton said a roundabout meant trucks would have to reroute and lights would mean traffic would be banked up during peak hours

"For every solution we're pondering there seems to be something else arising," he said.

Mr Skelton said the Government was looking at shortterm solutions in the meantime, including lowering the speed limit, introducing speed bumps and installing pedestrian crossings.

The Department of Transport and Main Roads will present a brief to Minister Mark Bailey in due course.

Funding war runs safety off the tracks in Palmwoods

A war of words has erupted over the notorious rail bridge junction in Palmwoods with the federal and state governments butting heads over funding needed to fix the intersection.

Calls for the upgrade of the Chevallum Road, Jubilee Drive, Margaret Street and Woombye Palmwoods Road intersection have been growing as the community banded together to demand urgent safety works in the hinterland town.

Nicklin MP Robert Skelton told the Sunshine Coast Daily the intersection at Chevallum Road and Woombye Palmwoods Road was somewhat of a "sticky wicket" with any safety upgrades reliant on the North Coast rail duplication.

"It would be nice if we could get an agreement from the Federal Government with the rail duplication because they could work concurrently," he said.

Federal Member for Fisher Andrew Wallace has hit back, squarely labelling the issue as the state government's alone.

The Federal Government has pledged \$390 million towards the North Coast rail duplication with the state contributing \$160 million.

A stalemate has been running for more than two years about which level of government should pay for the remaining \$230 million.

"It's important to note that the federal government had no obligation to put any money towards the duplication," Mr Wallace said. "The original cost of duplicating line from Beerburrum to Landsborough was \$780 million and we went to the state and said 'we would pay for half the cost and Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk said that's not enough we want you to pay more'.

"Despite us not having obligation to pay anything."

Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey said the Federal Government was aware of how important the rail line duplication was for the Sunshine Coast.

"I've raised the need to secure a long term funding commitment for the next stage of works with the Deputy Prime Minister," he said.

"Andrew Wallace can stop playing petty politics and start playing a positive part by knocking on doors in Canberra and hitting the phones to convince his own LNP colleagues down there not to forget the Sunshine Coast."

Mr Wallace says the next stage of the rail duplication was not even on the table yet.

"The Beerwah to Nambour (stage) is the most expensive stage," he said. "They can't talk about us not coming to the party as an excuse for that intersection being a debacle when they haven't even approached us with a plan. Do they want us to design the project as well as pay for it.'

Mr Wallace has lived in nearby hinterland town Eudlo for 12 years and said he knew the intersections in Palmwoods well.

He said he had seen the Chevallum Road intersection become "more and more dangerous". "What has to happen before the state fixes it."

Top cop urges drivers to slow down, stop and obey traffic rules

DRIVERS ignoring a stop sign at a dangerous intersection in Palmwoods have been warned against their behaviour by the town's top cop after it was revealed 200 infringements had been issued in the area in the past year.

A total of 126 speeding offences were detected by officers stationed in the Palmwoods Queensland Police Service division from January 1 to December 31, in 2020.

Seventeen moving traffic offences were noted, 12 unregistered offences, eight drink driving and five disobey road signage.

Sergeant Kevin Crowley warned that the stop signs at the Chevallum Road,

Woombye Palmwoods Road and Jubilee Drive intersections should not be ignored.

He said cars turning left from those streets feel like they have good enough vision of oncoming cars to the right, therefore ignoring road rules as they pass the stop signs.

"More often than not that's the crashes that we get reported because they haven't stopped - they've looked but actually haven't seen," Sergeant Crowley said.

"If you're turning right from either of those stop signs (and) if you haven't stopped then you're just not driving well.

"You need to stop." Sergeant Crowley said the Sunshine Coast road policing unit sit at the offending intersections and 'write one (ticket) after the other'.

With the town's population growing exponentially and more development in the pipeline, the Sergeant is worried about the impacts on traffic.

"It (Palmwoods) might have been a good design 50 years ago but it's not good today," he said.

"It's really a poor design for the amount of traffic that we see, there's a lot of potential for crashes.

"With the rate of growth in the town it's just creating a lot more problems."

He's hoping the State Government will act and install traffic calming through the town's main street as well as a reduced speed limit.

But the rail bridge intersection at Chevallum Road, Jubilee Drive and Woombye Palmwoods Road remains a main concern with no solution on the horizon.

"I've been told that nothing significant is going to happen with those intersections until the rail duplication is sorted," Sergeant Crowley said.

"Who knows when that's going to happen, how long is a piece of string?

"I've been here for 10 years and I was told that in year one.

"I've been hearing it for ten years now and I expect I'll be hearing it again the whole time before I finish."

The officer says it's not just residents who have experienced near misses in the area.

"I nearly had a crash in my own car there (recently) coming out of Main Street turning right onto Margaret Street opposite the shops," Sergeant Crowley said.

"A car has pulled out of a car park, saw a break in the traffic but didn't take into account me coming out of Main Street and just pulled straight out - that just happens all the time.

"It's a 50 km/h limit through the middle of town here, realistically if you're doing 50 km/h around that bend you're going far too quickly and that's at almost any time of day."

Montville first Settled in 1887

SETTLEMENT first occurred in Montville in 1887.

The area had been extensively logged prior to this decade and the escarpment is still marked by timber "shoots" (or chutes/shutes), such as Lander's and Remington's.

Here logs were "shot" down the mountain to be hauled away to sawmills in the Council area or in Brisbane. Land was selected as early as 1881, but the first settlers did not begin to arrive until the mid-1880s. Among the first settlers were the Smith brothers, Henry (Harry), Edward and Alfred.

As with nearby Mapleton, the new arrivals quickly discovered that the land was



suited to fruit orchards and oranges, lemons, mandarins, limes and strawberries, amongst other crops, were soon planted. A provisional school was established in 1896, indicating the settlement - originally called Razorback, but officially Montville - was slowly growing.

The Blackall Range was promoted as 'Queensland's Blue Mountains' and guest houses flocked to the area, especially Montville.

Guesthouses in the village in addition to Manjalda included 'Elston', 'Mayfield', 'Belvedere', 'Awatea' and 'The Lachlan'.

Indeed, it appears Montville had the highest number of guesthouses on the Blackall Range.

The village remains popular with tourists seeking a mountain retreat and the design of many of the buildings constructed in the second half of the twentieth century was inspired by a European 'Alps' aesthetic (consonant with mountain villages).



A bright new look for Nambour forecourt


SUNSHINE Coast Council Last month gave the forecourt in front of council's Eddie De Vere building a revamp to encourage activity and bring life to the important public space.





Niece's gifts of books honour pioneering Maleny WW1 veteran

MORE than 100 years have passed but Jill Lillingstone is determined to ensure the memory of diggers who made the supreme sacrifice are never forgotten.

Jill's Uncle, Maleny digger Tom Lillingstone left Australia days after he married in 1916, and died in the "Bloody Battle of Passchendaele" October 1917. Tom was the son of well known Maleny pioneer, the Oxford educated William Hammond Lillingstone who built the school on land he selected in 1887 and was school master for 22 years.

Tom refused to fire a weapon and served instead on the frontlines as a medic. "I have letters from Tom's war mates at the time of his death, and army documents," Jill said. 'There's a postcard from his pocket, singed by the shell that killed him. I even have the dinner fork he used in the trenches. Tom was one of thousands of Australians who died overseas at this time and throughout my life I've worked to ensure accurate details are gathered, retained and passed on. Information is from family records and national archives, all serving to preserve this important part of history.'

Jill is promoting an initiative to present books to schools, perhaps in lieu of laying a wreath at monuments, to remember our fallen Maleny has garnered soldiers. interstate interest in the initiative and while not unique to Maleny other RSL's have requested details, including Melbourne.

"Tom is remembered on Maleny's RSL WW1 Honour Board, and in the "Walk of Remembrance". Given his strong interest in education, it's fitting that 104 years on, he can still help contribute to children's learning in this way. "This does not have to replace traditional Cenotaph remembrances, and will not suit everyone,

but it is gaining popularity," said Jill. "It encourages children to take a greater interest, brings added meaning to war remembrances and involves the community".

Maleny's RSL Chris Brooker said: I am not sure of the origins, but Maleny RSL have promoted this type of tribute for many years." "Basically, on ANZAC Day, we

encourage community groups and individuals to lay a book tribute instead of wreath at the Cenotaph. The organization or individual arranges for a tribute to be inscribed in the front cover eg "Donated to Maleny High School by Rotary Club of Maleny, ANZAC Day 2021". The books are wrapped and the name of the recipient written on the wrapping to ensure books go to the intended recipient without unwrapping," he said. "The books can be directed to any organization (school, hospital, nursing home) that requires them and are usually organized beforehand to ensure the recipient knows they are coming, are appropriate and not duplicated".

On Wednesday 21st April Jill Lillingstone presented "Fighting on the Home Front, The Legacy of Women in WW1" to Maleny High at the Cenotaph. The book's Author, Kate Adie OBE, former BBC's chief news correspondent, reported from war zones around the world. "While whole streets of men disappeared to fight, women at home were counted on as never before or there would be no victory. Princesses to parlour maids stepped away from their formal roles to take on the needs of the country," Ms Adie said. Jill feels that today's youth is largely unaware of how Australia's everyday life was affected by wars when, despite grief and hardship, women had to not only carry on but do men's work too, ploughing fields, mending fences, and in industry.







A major problem with our native animals is the feeding of bread. Councils have signs around which are often ignored, to the detriment of wildlife health. If one person breaks up a slice of bread and feeds it to a flock of water or land birds, then it wouldn't do long term damage. The Sunshine Coast Mass Transit Project has been in the news last week, mostly for all the

wrong reasons. Public consultation has opened and you have until June 22 to 'have your say.'

Just Google (or Duck Duck Go) Sunshine Coast Mass Transit Project - Sunshine Coast Council.

I congratulate the Sunshine Coast Council (SCC) for taking on the State Government's transport responsibility and initiating the plans. Someone's got to do it.

It should be noted the Council's Mass Transit 'strategic' plan incorporates upgrading the heavy rail line from Beerwah to Nambour, adding a heavy rail line from Beerwah to Maroochydore (via the CAMCOS corridor), includes an improved high frequency bus network to other key destinations such as the hinterland, and notes an improved network of feeder buses, park'n'rides and active transport connections.

I just hope that they're aware that the state will require their pound of fiscal flesh, as seen with the light-rail funding for the Gold Coast (GC).

The third stage of GC light rail comprises a federal commitment of \$395.6 million, a state commitment of around \$548.5 million and a Local Government commitment of \$91.5 million.

It will cost over \$1 billion for 6.7km of new track. That's almost \$150 million per kilometre.

This is where one of my main concerns lie, the severe cost of the infrastructure per km and its record of construction cost explosions - as occurred in Sydney and on the Gold Coast.

The SC Mass Transit report has sparked political controversy and 'not in my back-yard' angst.

It was originally touted as a Light-Rail plan. Then, after not wanting to be seen to favour one transport system, the all-encompassing Mass Transit moniker was created.

The Council draft document titled 'Sunshine Coast Mass Transit Draft Options Analysis April 2021' is a 358-page assessment.

I must confess that at the time of writing I have not read through it all - but I will. Because it will surely contain lots of public transport relevant information and data on the growth that our beautiful region is experiencing.

This growth has been forced upon us by the state, but more people keep happening (including in my household) and they all need to live somewhere and travel.

The downside to this is that, to date, the State has not provided the public transport that our burgeoning region requires.

Instead we get road upgrades to the Bruce Highway, expanding it from 4 lanes to 6.

I'm not sure if anyone can say when the lane expansions may end, but clearly we can't keep building more lanes.


