sation now known internationally as Red Cross and Red Crescent.



## 'It's all about the people': Volunteer Brian's 18 year hospital bedside vigil

BRIAN Day OAM has spent most of his life volunteering. Either as a gay activist, in public health, and now with palliative care patients at Soldiers Memorial Maleny Hospital.

"My partner made enough money for me to be a volunteer, and we decided that's what I should do," Mr Day said. "I had experience in palliative care."

Driven by a deep commitment to public health Brian has spent countless hours by the bedside of people suffering chronic illness. He has volunteered at Maleny hospital for 18 years.

"I have a passion for public health, I was raised to. We were raised to respect public health, and also that you have to contribute in life."

Mr Day said the Maleny hospital's approach to palliative care was holistic, unique, and very valuable.

"They let you come and go, and partners virtually live here with their loved ones for a time if they need to," he said. "There's a whole community of involvement in death which for me is very, very healthy. Quite often it's really clinical, but here it's all about the people. It's really focused on the person and their needs.

"Good palliative care is applied at the time of diagnosis - and they might get better - and then there's end of life care, and they are quite different. They do it well here."

Sunshine Coast Hospital and Health Service celebrated National Volunteer Week (17-23 May, 2021) a time to thank people like Brian who give so much time and energy to the health and care of others.

SCHHS spokesperson Michelle Acworth said many volunteers like Brian had their own stories that motivated them to serve their communities so admirably.

"Some are previous patients or had loved ones cared for at the facility," she said. "They say they want to be a part of the team that had such a positive impact on the care their loved one received.

"Many radiation patients like to celebrate the end of their treatment by wanting to volunteer in that area.

"The radiation role provides a unique opportunity for the volunteer to build a special bond with the patient throughout the treatment."

## Streetscaping to light way for bright future

WORK is progressing on a \$500,000 Nambour Streetscaping Improvement Project to revitalise the town with creative lighting, public artwork, footpath art, banners and a marketing campaign.

The project, being coordinated by Reimagine Nambour, was made possible thanks to federal funding secured by Member for Fairfax Ted O'Brien.

Local urban design company, Pomo, is managing the project with Pomo Design Director Mr Stephen Burton reporting directly to the Reimagine Nambour board.

"All project work is progressing well, the creative lighting design is in the final stages with permission and support from stakeholders and property owners almost completed," said Reimagine Nambour Chairman Peter Boyce.

"There are seven key streetscaping locations that include entry points into Nambour as well as lighting through Currie St to enhance the atmosphere in the Special Entertainment Precinct.

Mr Boyce said locations for street sculptures within

the Special Entertainment Precinct required site visits and extensive engagement with stakeholders to identify potential spaces for three street sculptures, one of which will feature interactive technology and lighting.

"More than 30 artists submitted expressions of interest last month and the number of highly regarded artists eager to be part of the sculptural opportunity in Nambour is very exciting.

From these expressions,

Sunshine Coast Regional Council will assist in shortlisting the artists who will be invited to respond to the sculptural brief and specifications. Nambour residents will then view the proposals and vote for their favourite sculpture.

"A number of locations have been identified to place banners celebrating the new Nambour brand," Mr Boyce said. "The goal is to highlight the entry and exit points and increase awareness towards the town centre."

## Celebratory events to herald new brand and bright future for Nambour

A series of events will be held in the Garden at the Nambour Tram Terminus heralding Nambour's new brand design and looking towards a bright future for the former sugar town. The events will mark a milestone in the work being done by Reimagine Nambour, established in February 2020 to support the economic transition and development of the community.



## Bryan takes on desert race on legendary Harley

NAMBOUR motorcyclist Bryan Farrow will take on Australia's most gruelling desert race next month - and he will ride a Harley-Davidson with a legendary pedigree that's sure to claim the spotlight.

Even to finish the tough 460km race will be a world first for the pair.

Mr Farrow, who owns Farrow's Customs Motorcycle Mechanics, has ridden motorcycles since the age of three, and Harley-Davidsons since age 15, on all sorts of terrain. But racing in the upcoming Finke Desert Race at Alice Springs next month, where racers reach speeds of 160kph through unpredictable soft bull dust, dry rocky river beds, soft sand, and over sharp tyre-shredding shale, will be a new experience.

"The race is mainly about testing yourself, your equipment, and your team, and how you can go on terrain on which realistically you

shouldn't be riding fast," Mr Farrow said.

"No preparation will emulate the event you can't ride anywhere that will be 'Finke', it's impossible - just because it's got every sort of terrain you can find, and the high speeds, so we're trying to prepare the best we can with what we have, but there's nothing that compares to Finke."

Farrow is confident in the team that's preparing him and his very special bike. He'll be riding a modified Harley-Davidson XR-1200 built by Alexandra Headland motorcycle engineer Gavin Walker. This very bike was ridden by Crusty Demon rider Seth Enslow to extend daredevil Evel Knievel's world jump record by 13 metres in Sydney in 2010 and also by Crusty Demon Kain Saul to complete the first ever Har-

ley-Davidson backflip in 2009.
"I definitely wanted to do the Finke on a Harley, and Seth Enslow was a hero of mine as a kid - I used to sit and watch him with the Crusty Demons all-day every-day - and then Gavin turned up with the bike and 10-year-old Bryan would kick my ass if I didn't take the opportu-

nity," Farrow explained.
"I've raced Harleys on motocross tracks, I've raced Harleys on flat tracks, I do stunt riding on Harleys, so putting a Harley through its paces isn't uncommon for me, but putting it through

this sort of challenge is uncommon for anyone. I've never laid eyes on red dirt before let alone ridden it, so it'll be interesting.

"This bike has already done two world firsts, so we're hoping to get the trifecta and get Finke done too, as the first Harley ever to finish it."

It's the first time Harley-Davidsons will compete in the Finke, with three Harleys entered in this year's event.

"Finishing is the absolute goal, no matter what, but on the same token, with the experience Bryan has with motorbike riding and the time and effort we're spending to make the bike right, we will be aiming to upset a lot of fancy motocross teams," engineer Walker said of Farrow's quest. "He's a brilliant motorcycle rider in his own backyard, absolutely one of the best, but we're taking him to someone else's backyard which he's never been to before, and he will be tested well-and-truly above the average person in that race."

Such gruelling events can cause life-long injuries to riders, including serious nerve damage to hands and arms as well as joint damage to knees, not to mention the serious risks from

Farrow's preparation has been relentless. He has been practice riding on every surface he can - including heaps of beach and soft sand riding. He's also been hitting the weights at the gym and doing plenty of swimming and cardio to get his fitness to a level able to withstand long hours of gruelling riding on an unconventional 260kg bike.

Even so, the team believes they and the Harley are ready for the challenge.

"There's so many people that believe that we won't do it, and that fuels our fire that makes us think, 'Yep, that's alright, let them think what they want, we can definitely do this'.

"It puts an extra chip on our shoulders to show them what's up and get it done."

# Counsellor: 'If you're struggling we can help fast'

Carolyn said hardly anyone knew there were alternatives to seeking help through your GP with a mental health care plan.

"Counsellors registered with a peak governing counselling body offer a quicker, more affordable alternative way to access support for many mental health concerns such as depression, anxiety, stress, grief and loss, and trauma just to name a few," she said.

"There are many registered counsellors who are in private practice and located around the hinterland towns of the Coast, with minimal waiting times to see clients.

"Registered counsellors are university-educated, many of them locally at USC. They undertake continuing professional development and supervision yearly to maintain registration and use evidenced-based therapeutic techniques."

Carolyn said many registered counsellors charged fees around the 'gap' you would pay if you were to wait to see other Allied Mental Health Professionals under Medicare.

## Nambour celebrates tram design and Terminus opening

NAMBOUR'S tram design and terminus opening were the result of nine years hard slog by a number of exceptional people, according to Tramway Company Chairman Greg Rogerson

Speaking at the May 14 opening Mr Rogerson paid tribute to a number of people who had helped with the project over the years.

And he was already looking ahead to stage 2 of the project.

"The construction and official opening of this magnificent terminus will help bring us round the discussion table with both State and Federal Governments and indeed the Sunshine Coast Regional Council in an endeavour to help fund Stage 2 of the overall project to get rail lines into the Nambour Showgrounds.

He described his board as "a bunch of exceptionally good people, hell bent on giving Nambour the chance to have a point of difference, something that will stand this town out from all others and give Nambour the chance to prosper and it's residents to feel justifiably proud!"

Mr Rogerson paid special tribute to Roy and Nola Thompson, Rob Forrester and the late Michael Foley for their generosity, passion and dedication to Nambour.

"Roy and Nola Thompson's actions are legendary," he said.

"I first met Roy Thompson a couple of years back, in fact 2 days before an Ordinary Council Meeting in Caloundra, where the TNT Co were having to face off an Officer Recommendation Report to 'scrap' the then 7½ year tram project due to a cost 'blow out' and significant changes.

"After a 15-minute detailed personal discussion, Roy and Nola Thompson had pledged a donation of \$1 million to our project and the rest is history.

He acknowledged TNT Co Board members

Peter Clark, Rod Tustall, Kristen Beckhaus, Steve Brazier, Paul Moriarity, Rod Wilkins, Rhonda Billet, Tristan Lindner, Ron King and Wayne Knetter.

Mr Rogerson made special mention of Peter Clark who voluntarily built all the timber componentry and project managed the terminus construction.

Mr Rogerson said at the outset of the project, the Nambour Community had to raise \$600,000 "which was our educated guess to be the cost of a tram".

"Tramfest was born and about 50 volunteers would assemble once a month to put together and then pull apart the best music and food fest imaginable right here in Howard Street."

Mr Rogerson said the Terminus wouldn't have been possible without Mark Higgins and Elissa Wake – Shake It Up Music, Clayton's Towing – Bill and Mike Clayton, DW Sound – Heath Moore, The Sunshine Coast Antique Car Club Members, The Freemasons of Nambour and District, Robert Paulger – Paulgers Engineering, Maudsley's Excauvations – Nial and Linda Maudsley, my neighbourhood Image Flat fraternity, The Oaks Family Cane Farm – headed by Gordon and Christine Oaks and local electrical firm Marrs Electrical - Alan Marr.

Mr Rogerson said The building of the terminus wouldn't have been possible if not for the \$2 million dollars plus injection of Sunshine Coast Council funds toward the Nambour Tram Project.

The trackwork leading into the terminus was constructed by Shadforth Civil and the project managed and engineered by Covey Associates.

"To Ray Shadforth and your Shadforth Civil Team and Kevin Covey, Matt Taylor and Stephen Braiden and your Covey Associates Team we thank you immensely for the manner and standard of work performed.

"I would like to highlight that 95% of the architectural work was done by Trevor on a pro bono basis."

Mr Rogerson said it had been a pleasure to work with Fairfax MP Ted O'Brien. "Without the support of the Federal Government in supplying TNT Co with a \$500,000 Stronger Regions Grant we wouldn't have found the impetus to get to 'first base' with this project.

"From day one, Ted O'Brien has believed in







Nambour and believed in TNT Co's vision of activating the heritage listed cane train lines for the ongoing viability and prosperity of this great town."

Mr Rogerson said tram designer Russell Anderson's input was exactly the impetus the project needed at the right time. "He's an exceptional artist, tradesperson and an exceptional human being," Mr Rogerson



## **Ceremony raises** awareness of family & domestic violence

DOMESTIC violence experts and local political leaders have spoken out about the crisis gripping communities across Australia.

About 100 people gathered at a Candlelight Ceremony in Maleny's Tesch Park Thursday May 20 to honour people who had died due to an act of domestic or family violence.

"I was grateful that our speakers were willing to travel and to support this local event and to deliver such high caliber speeches," said Val France of Speak Up Now who organised the gathering as part of Domestic and Family Violence Prevention Month.

Speaker Tania Felstead, a Red Rose Foundation advocate, said one woman a week was dying due to domestic violence at the hands of a current or former partner.

'These are women who have been loved and cherished," she said. "They had a right to live and that right has been taken away. We are giving them a voice and we will continue to take action in their honour."

Ms Felstead said many deaths were preventable as they were, in many cases, predictable.

"We want to bring these issues out of the home and into the community," she said. "In the quest of safety for all. It is the least we can do for those women who have lost their lives.'

Div 5 Cr Winston Johnston said domestic and family violence was a terrible scourge on society. "The only way we can do something is to recognize it do something about it and try and help those who have suffered it's conse-

Coordinator of Sunshine Coast Regional Domestic and Family Violence Service Stacy Oehlman said even one life lost to domestic and family violence was too many. "And unfortunately the numbers continue to rise," she said. Ms Oehlman said suicides that occurred as a result of domestic violence were not

included in those figures, nor were the incalculable number of acts of violence in homes that were not recorded or not reported to police.

Glass House MP Andrew Powell said domestic and family violence was an issue that demanded a bipartisan approach and he was proud that both sides of state politics recognised this and were cooperating on the issue.

There are many causes of family and domestic violence and we need to look at how to prevent them," he said. "I hope we can start dealing with the roots of those problems not just the tragic outcomes."

## Pornography a major issue, says Wallace

Member for Fisher Andrew Wallace said one in six women will be victims of domestic violence at some time in their lives, "It was an awakening for me to see that family, domestic and sexual violence is so widespread in our

"Gentlemen, in particular, if we are going to change the cultures in this country it is by and large up to us.'

Mr Wallace pointed to the corrosive effect online pornography was having on young boys.

"What we now know is with the internet young people are being exposed to hard core violent porn from the age of eight. There is a cohort of young men who are addicted to pornography and with a weird and unrealistic view of what sex and relationships are about."

He said hard core porn was having a damaging effect on the minds of young men and: "I can't believe how the dots have not been joined, to date, between hard core porn and family, domestic and sexual violence."

## 'The most dangerous place for many people is in their own homes. This is not acceptable'

top Sunshine Coast policewoman has spoken about the domestic violence crisis on the Sunshine Coast and hinterland including the intense pressure on her colleagues and the overwhelming and sometimes devastating scenes they confront.

Senior Sergeant Kate Teasdale, Officer in Charge Domestic and Family Violence and Vulnerable Persons Unit told a Candlelight Ceremony in Maleny's Tesch Park last week of the impact that recent "horrific" Domestic and Family Violence events had on the community and the police service.

"I, along with my colleagues, stand together with you and share in your frustration, anger, disbelief and utter disgust at each of these tragic events and murmur the same words you do also ... 'No. Not again'," Snr Sgt Teasdale

"Our communities are justifiably sick of this preventable aspect of our world which causes significant harm to victim survivors and so many others caught in the wider web."

Snr Sgt Teasdale said Queensland Police were taking major steps to prevent domestic and family violence. She quoted Assistant Commissioner Ben Marcus who recently said "the most dangerous place in Australia for many isn't in dark alley ways, or on flooded Queensland roads — it's in their own homes. This is where we all have the right to feel completely safe, but sadly not everyone feels this. This is not OK."

Snr Sgt Teasdale said domestic and family violence was the most complex area of policing she had worked in. "It is often unreported or underreported and it places some of our community members in particularly difficult circumstances, because it exists in secret.

"Some acts of domestic and family violence involve physical violence – but many do not. Some involve intersections with other social issues including drugs, alcohol and homelessness - but many do not. Some acts are committed over a protracted period of time - but many are not. Some victim survivors recognise themselves to be victims of domestic and family violence – but many do not. Some offenders may be suspected by others to be perpetrating domestic and family violence but many are not. Many of the relationships involve children, who quickly become children at risk, but many do not. Some victim survivors simply want to end the relationship and escape the violence - but many do not."

Snr Sgt Teasdale said Police Commissioner Katarina Carroll had refocused and strengthened Queensland's collective fight against domestic and family violence. "Commissioner Carroll is challenging us and inspiring us to prevent, disrupt, respond to and investigate each and every incident of domestic and family violence - and we are fully committed to this challenge.

"Your police service has recently established a new Domestic and Family Violence and Vulnerable Persons Command. This is a major step on the road to defeating this enduring social issue. This Command is dedicated solely to our prevention and response strategies and tactics around DFV. This is significant.

Snr Sgt Teasdale pledged to continue to work collaboratively with agency partners to fight domestic and family violence in every form

and keep victims and children safe.

"I am in awe of our first response police who at all times of the day and night, attend highly emotive and often dangerous domestic incidents and take all steps necessary to protect victims and children from further harm.

"We know there is no quick fix to this insidious and complex issue that continues to plague our communities and the very freedoms that every person is entitled to. But we also know that we can't simply arrest our way out of this problem. If it were that simple, we would have overcome it many years ago. The problem that we face as a community is not simple, and neither is the solution.

"The theme of DFV Prevention month is -'we all play our part'. I can't think of a better way to sum up the challenges we together face in overcoming this insidious problem. But it also sums up our collective opportunity."

"We know that the support of the community in addressing domestic and family violence is absolutely critical. Together as a community, including your police service, we must focus on changing behaviours, attitudes and cultures

## Parents call for facilities upgrade at popular Palmwoods skatepark

A group of parents recently met with Division 5 Cr Winston Johnston to discuss the need for improved facilities at the Palmwoods skate park.

Palmwoods resident, Michelle Young explains "There are many responsible parents who accompany their children to the skate park to supervise them and make sure they are being respectful of others and the skate park grounds. Many of these parents also bring younger children and babies when they are supervising the kids using the park, so it is really important that there is a toilet and bubbler at the grounds for everyone to use.

"The cricket club has the lease over the sports grounds and recently extended one of their fences out into the shaded area where some parents sat in the afternoon to escape the sun. This took away the option to climb over the small fence and access the toilets behind the tennis courts in the cricket club house. A lot of parents who attend the skate park were unaware there was a toilet block behind these facilities, so many are driving into town near the hall to use the toilets.

"Having visited a number of skateparks around the coast, I found that many had half shade sails and a bubbler for the kids to drink out of, as well as seating. Our local skate park is well loved and used by many people from Palmwoods and the surrounding areas, and the parents often clean up the grounds and remove any rubbish that gets left around. A lot of us carry a broom or a blower in our cars to clean out the bowl as sometimes when council mows the area, they leave the grass clippings in the bowl and on the pathways which become a slip hazard to the children."

Councillor Johnston has committed to fund construction of a shade sail for the park with \$42,000 that has been allocated in next year's budget.

"I am also currently investigating the cost of erecting two seats, and a water bubbler," Cr Johnston said. "Now that I am aware of the situation I will endeavour to find a solution to the provision of access to neighbouring toilet amenities for users of the skate park."

This is all promising for the families concerned. "For me the number one priority was to get access to the toilets behind the swimming pool and in plain sight from the skatepark, said Michelle. "Anything else will be a very nice



## Servo should be rejected: YADCA

YADCA is urging Council to reject the proposed service station in Yandina because the applicant has not effectively addressed heritage objections and safety concerns raised by the whole community.

In a letter to Council YADCA President Nigel Anns said the opinions of locals, and their safety, should be taken into account.

"The fact this servo would be next to the 115-year-old Yandina School of Arts building and in the Heritage precinct should matter.

"The two hundred plus residents who have written to the Council opposing this servo

should matter. "The fact that community and business groups in Yandina all agree this is the wrong

location for a servo should matter. "The reality that local businesses must now look for off-site storage solutions because delivery trucks will not be able to get into their

nearby premises should matter," Nigel said. "YADCA understands the complexities of a code assessable application, but we trust there is still room today for Council to look at this proposal and agree that the middle of the oldest

surveyed settlement on the Sunshine Coast is not the place for a petrol station, regardless of the cladding, wood trellises and bunting the applicant promises."

YADCA also said that neither SARA nor the applicant have shown any regard for the safety of Yandina residents. "The applicant's Traffic Engineering Report raises concerns about the layout of the servo and its impact on Stevens Street, Farrell Street and the broader Yandina town," Nigel said.

"If the planners would like to stand on that corner and watch the real traffic flow, the safety issues this proposal would cause for vehicles, tankers and pedestrians would be obvious.

"However, the applicant has refused to factor in our town's growth and increased traffic in their figures. In fact, their traffic data is two years old and gathered from points well away from the site in question."

Nigel said the applicant has done a poor job of answering questions raised in Council's Information Request regarding the development. "It's a lazy response from an applicant used to getting what they want," he said.

"With the grant funding, we can ensure the preservation of this beautiful building, which is such an integral piece of Yandina's history," said president Daniel Weepers.

"At the moment, we can't run live theatre, we can't host certain community groups, and we can't fundraise or function to our full capacity.

"With the grant, we'll be able to repair several exterior walls, along with fix cladding, windows and paint the exterior of the facility in accordance with the Heritage Maintenance Schedule.

Another recipient was The Compass Institute. Head of Business and Growth Sandra Brodie said the \$16,000 contribution would go towards solar power at the Compass Farm.

"The installation of a solar system at Compass Farm will mean we have a reliable, environmentally sustainable and much more energy efficient source of power to support our operations," Ms Brodie said.

"Solar also offers significant cost savings to Compass, which can instead be re-invested back into the Farm and the critical services we provide as a not-for-profit to the young people with disabilities that we support on a daily

Council's Community Grants Program provides support to not-for-profit community groups for one-off projects, events and activities that benefit the Sunshine Coast community.

Div 5 Cr David Law said many volunteers running community facilities chose the slowdown caused by COVID-19 to plan the delivery of infrastructure projects.

"In the earlier phase of this pandemic, council had the foresight to set aside money to aid these grassroots community projects.

"This has now resulted in many great outcomes for the community, as well as delivering a solid and sustained injection into our local economy."

I always tell the kids 'there is no such thing as a mistake, just an opportunity to improve'. It's all about the willingness to practice. Some people have a natural affinity to it and others, like me, just have to work hard at it. It's like anything worth doing in life."

The Pavilion has been fitted out with solar panels and patrons will also notice the reconstructed amenities building behind the Secretary's Office. A pathway has also been installed from the amenities to the disability parking space and a further two concrete car parks have been provided.

The Secretary's Office has been extended and a large storage facility constructed.

Division 5 Councillor and Maleny Show Society President Winston Johnston was proud to see the upgrades delivered in time for this year's show.

"We are expecting a crowd of more than 6000 to support our local traders and to revel in this

The Poultry Club has impacted the children in many positive, powerful and unexpected ways. "For some of our students who suffer from separation anxiety and other emotional and social issues the Poultry Club has played an important role by providing a supportive

learning environment for them at school to ensure that they feel like they belong, which is a key value of our school," said Mrs Dykes.

"It has been delightful to see

Poultry Club members creating lasting friendships, built on respect and responsibility for the chickens and each other."

Jo said every year she had up to 100 applications from children wanting to join the Club.

Now that we understand the ways in which participation can benefit kids, it has changed the way we choose Poultry Club members. I sit with each of the teachers and we discuss which students we feel would gain the most benefit from the club.

"It is actually quite overwhelming to see children who had little confidence, or were strug-

gling to make friends, become the popular kids who have a greater sense of worth because they are in the Poultry Club. It is very special.

"We have a rooster and three hens, and this

allows us to complement curriculum activities, like hatching chicks in Science, where students learn about life and living. All of the chicken pen hay is recycled back to the garden club, so we go full circle," she said.

"Establishing the Poultry Club has been a huge learning curve and at times a fairly expensive process, but educationally it is well worth it, it is just a lovely thing, and the kids absolutely love it. Our P&C are very supportive and assist us financially with expenses and maintenance of our coop.







## Maleny buys quiet electric 'green' mower

MALENY Golf Club, in Queensland's Sunshine Coast Hinterland, has just acquired an electric greens mower which will abate morning machinery noise for the benefit of the neighbourhood and reduce the club's carbon footprint.

Course Superintendent Mick McCombe said the new environmentally-friendly Toro mower did not carry hydraulic fluids and used all-electric components for traction, steering, deck lifting and cut-

ting.

"This eliminates the risk of hydraulic fluid being spilt on our environmentally sensitive golf course and will help reduce our carbon footprint as well," Mick explained.

"It is noticeably much quieter to operate, so we can mow the greens in the morning without the neighbours hearing us, and the small on-board petrol generator, which charges the batteries, is less costly to operate."


Advanced cutting technology also regulates the speed of the cutting units in relation to ground speed, giving an even clip rate across all putting surfaces.

"This will substantially improve both the aesthetics and playability of our greens, making the mower a very welcome addition to our maintenance fleet as it will enhance our ability to produce quality putting surfaces year round," Mick said. When Mick joined the club in early 2014 he had just two old lawn spreaders to work with!





## Preliminary approval for lifestyle village

PLANS for a new lifestyle village in Highworth are a step closer after Council granted a Preliminary Approval for the development.

## Smart ticketing — or is it?

COMMUTERS on the Sunshine Coast/Caboolture and Petrie lines may have noticed some new equipment similar to Go card readers installed at some railway stations, with "out of service" signage.

These are the Cubic 'Smart Ticketing' machines set to replace the Go card readers (used since 2008).

A Go card will still be able to be used on this new equipment.

Paper tickets will also still be available at their regular, higher price (30% more).

It's part of a \$371 million Queensland Government initiative to provide commuters with more payment choices.

But this isn't 'Smart Ticketing,' it's more a case of 'Smart Payment.'

It will be implemented across all modes of public transport in the Translink areas of South East Queensland, Toowoomba, Townsville, Mackay and Cairns, and all qconnect urban buses in regional Queensland will move to the new system by 2022.

Along with the new system comes new TransLink colours, logo and font.

Smart Ticketing (ST) readers have been installed at: Albion; Northgate; Strathpine; Murrumba Downs; Petrie; Glasshouse Mountains; Beerwah; Woombye; Eumundi and Gympie North rail stations.

The technology has been tested on the Gold Coast light-rail network since December 2020 and these stations are part of the next round of trials - for heavy rail.

It's planned that by the end of 2021, commuters will be able to use ST on heavy rail with a new mobile App handling your online account.

During testing, the technology will only be used for full-fare paying adults.

If you're a child, student or concession card holder - you will have to wait a bit longer to use the payment system. It's envisioned that concession fares will be

available when the system is fully rolled out by

ST allows payment by contactless debit and credit cards, smartphones, smart watches and smart devices (like Fitbits), and includes digital wallets; Apple Pay, Google Pay and Samsung Pay.

Examples of contactless payment items are; pay-wave, tap-and-go and tap-to-pay cards which contain a computer chip, as opposed to magnetic stripe banking cards.

Visa, Mastercard and American Express credit cards are accepted.
You'll need to use the same card/method to

touch on and off.


The downside; under this 'Smart' system you get the dumbed-down discount brought in under Go card.

Eight paid trips on the same card/method in a Monday-Sunday week, means you receive halfprice travel on additional trips made during the

Commuters hoped ST would bring the 'smart' back into public transport fares, like the weekly, monthly and annual discounts we enjoyed with paper tickets.

NineSquared is a specialist economic consulting group. Their '2020 Transit Fare Benchmarking Report' had South East Queensland ranked 20th (out of 45). This was based on a single trip cost at the lowest fare. This was calculated using the relative cost in terms of time spent working at the minimum wage (10.2 minutes). SEQ ranked 21st under time spent working at the average wage (4.9 minutes) in each city - to pay for that fare.

Canberra was 16th, Hobart; 14th, Perth; 12th and Darwin ranking 5th, all fared better.




