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DV workloads heap pressure on stretched local police

NAMBOUR Senior Sergeant Police Officer in Charge Gary Brayley has provided local insight into how growing workloads around domestic and family violence, drugs and mental health are placing mounting pressure on police.

He said domestic violence was placing massive demands on manpower as the service struggled to maintain community expectations.

With increasing demand for officers to provide services above and beyond the realm of traditional policing, he pinpointed the complex work involved in and around domestic violence as a major time-demand on police nationwide.

"It's everywhere, it's a big job, it's a big problem, and it's time-consuming as well," Sen Sgt Brayley said. "It's a complex process that we're required to undertake to take action, depending on the nature of the incident that occurred.

"Out of all the crime that I review every single week, I could probably say it probably makes up 55 to 60 percent of our reports. But in terms of the labour involved, compared to taking a report of a break-and-enter or a stolen car, it far

"In addition to DV we have a lot of calls for service in relation to mental health, people having mental health episodes, people threatening to commit suicide, and more. As a follow-on from that, our time is involved with people in our custody that probably should be at the hospital, but the hospitals are doing their best to process patients, etc. And of course we can't let someone go who's in a vulnerable situation.

"So now we become the custodian of that person while we wait for the hospital. It's a difficult one to answer, but domestic violence and mental health would probably be the two biggest issues we face."

Despite the pressures Sen Sgt Brayley told the

meeting Police were doing all they could to prioritise responsibilities and keep everyone safe.

"The people that live in this town have every right to feel safe, to move about town and do business," he said.

"It's our job to make sure that that is achieved. It's just a matter of trying to make the best use of the resources we have to try and sustain some sort of police presence in our community.'

He said domestic violence was a problem everywhere, not just Nambour.

"It certainly has increased over the past 10 years. I've been tracking domestic violence, for

the whole time I've been in Nambour, and it is really climbing. It probably plateaued three or four years ago, but I'm seeing a bit of increase

Sgt Brayley's comments follow a report in the Courier-Mail last month that police were responding to about 140 calls a day from desperate Queenslanders threatening suicide, which is around a 58 per cent increase in six years.

In addition, the Queensland Times reported last year that, on average, Queensland police respond to 295 domestic violence incidents across the state daily - an increase of 10 per cent year-on-year since 2018.

The newspaper report said a growth of domestic and family violence was occurring, but greater community confidence in policing response, and population growth were contributing factors.

Sgt Brayley's comments come in light of a Reimagine Nambour Safety Meeting last month which discussed plans to raise \$1.2 million for a leading-edge program to improve safety in the CBD and surrounds.

RECENTLY I had the pleasure of sitting with Miss Pixie Annat MBE OAM at the Anzac Day commemoration at St Andrew's War Memorial Hospital in Brisbane, where she served as Matron and then CEO for a period of 27 years until her retirement in 1992. Hers is a name well known and respected in nursing circles in south east Queensland having been a trailblazer in the field for much of her career.

Born and raised in Palmwoods and training both at the RBH and Nambour Hospital, her inspiring life story is captured in a biography by author Colleen Clur titled "Champion of Nurses". The book draws on anecdotes from Pixie's personal journey and documents the important contributions made by medical colleagues during her more than 50-year career working in healthcare.

Now 92 years of age and still sporting her trademark cheeky grin, she only recently ceased hospital volunteering at her beloved St Andrew's when the onset of Covid-19 in the community interrupted her momentum. On Queensland Day in 2021, Pixie was named as one of Queensland Greats by the state government.

At Woombye Community Library "Champion of Nurses" is just one of the titles on the shelves describing the vital and varied work undertaken by nurses in both hospital and community settings.

Author Annette Brayley has published three fascinating collections of stories in her books titled "Bush Nurses", "Our Vietnam Nurses" and "Nurses


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High Tea and music for Mother's Day

Some time ago this pair of Buff Banded Rails moved into Diddilibah resident Don McGlusky's fern garden. "There is a water feature containing a rock thus giving access to the water," explained Don. "These birds inhabit swamps and water courses where dense vegetation provides cover. "Naturally they are not often seen being very secretive birds. Where this pair came from is a mystery as suitable habitat is a long way from where we live. They nested and produced three jet black chicks. In the space of a fortnight the chicks lost their black down and had taken on their juvenile plumage. This is when the family disappeared. "From arrival to departure covered many weeks and as they were only a couple of meters from a bedroom window I was able to photograph them from inside the house. It was fascinating to be able to record progress over such an interesting period."



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ANZAC crowds back in force to remember fallen

HUNDREDS of people lined Mathew Street and gathered at Quota Memorial Park to support the return of Nambour's ANZAC Day parade and service last Monday.

This year's ANZAC day address was given by retired New Zealand Army Captain Guy Bridson, who toured Cambodia and East Timor, and provided his perspectives on the Australian-Kiwi relationship.

KIWIS' HEAVY WAR TOLL

"In 1914 New Zealand's population was a meagre one million, yet we deployed 100,000 souls to fight in that war," said Mr Bridson.

"Sixty percent of these souls were either

killed or wounded, which is one of the highest tolls per capita. My family lost two brothers, which is a story repeated in many families across our small country."

Mr Bridson said the spirit of the ANZACs lifted both Aussies' and Kiwi soldiers' spirits in times of conflict.

"Aussies should be assured that Kiwis are true blue," he said.

"And we're up to the task. We will watch your backs if need be. Our defence force might be small. But it is well-trained and has some of the best equipment available. It is like a short, very sharp dagger which will slip straight back in to the Australian scabbard when the time comes.'

He said modern Kiwi units were both "terrified and determined" not to let the side down in terms of skills and readiness for conflict.

"We trained tirelessly on pre-deployment and set the standard for future deployments," he said.



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






ANZAC Day report from the Nambour Chronicle 70 years ago ...

The Nambour Chronicle and North Coast News published for 80 years from 1903 to 1983. Clem Renouf, who is mentioned in the article and who spoke at the parade, is quite famous. He was responsible for the Quota organisation eliminating polio from the world.



LONGEST AND MOST SPECTACULAR ANZAC PARADE

Solemn Commemoration at Nambour

Nambour has not previously witnessed a more colourful and lengthy Anzac commemoration parade than that which proceeded from the Court House to the Cenotaph in Coronation Avenue on Friday last. All the programmed units marched to the rhythmic beat and music of the Maroochy Disfrict and Caledonian Pipe bands playing at intervals en route. The procession was viewed by hundreds who lined the streets and footpaths along the line of progress.

paths along the line of progress.

The usual procedure was followed at the halting point in front of the memorial, and the laying cf wreaths at the base of the strne was carried out with impressiveness and dignity. The park was presented in its best dress, the foliage sparkling in the near noon sunlight.

The scene at the conclusion by the contribution of floral emblems was one in which thoughts of tribute and sacrifice spoke more poignantly than mere utterance. The sacred stillness falling upon the assemblage called to memory the phrase that "they being dead yet speaketh." and indicated to a thoughtful audience that sacrifices such as were being honoured should be the clarion call to a newer and more soulful citizenship. Such was the atmosphere created.

"Anzac Day is not just another public holiday; it is not just a fervent pageant; it is not just a parade of military prowess. It is a challenge to each of us to take up the torch handed on to us and to keep it burning brightly in our own lives and in the lives, of those whose loved ones came not back."

The above thoughts were expressed in an address at the Nambour cenotaph by Mr. C. W. B. Renouf to the units that had comprised the procession and the large assemblage in the precincts of the memorial park.

Continuing Mr. Renouf said the challenge is to do our bit to preserve the democratic way of life for which Australian men and women have fought, and

do his bit to resist this subtle foe!

It is nevertheless a heritage we are pleased, anxious and willing to grasp and to enjoy, heedless sometimes I fear, of the legacy of want and despair that goes with it—a legacy handed down to us by men and women who died that we might live, and enjoy living. In Queensland this \$2.5. Legacy. Jone calls for \$15,000 to supplement the meagre allowance paid by a grateful people to the dependants of men who died that we might live—many for the princely sum of 5-a day.

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'Maintenance backlog jeopardizing road safety'

THE estimated cost of the deferred maintenance backlog for state roads has reached a massive \$5.73 billion, according to Glass House MP Andrew Powell.

Mr Powell last Thursday (April 28) invited LNP Shadow Transport Minister Steve Minnikin to Glass House to see firsthand a number of crumbling roads in desperate need of maintenance.

He said the North Coast region had a deferred maintenance backlog of \$875 million.

In the Glass House electorate, he said that meant less money for maintenance on Maleny-Kenilworth Road from Maleny to Witta and at Cambroon, Maleny-Landsborough Road on the "climb" and upgrades to Steve Irwin Way.

"Every day my office receives calls from disgruntled road users wondering why these key connections are crumbling to pieces," said Mr Powell.

Mr Minnikin visited Maleny-Landsborough Road where drivers have to swerve between lanes to avoid several wide patches of deteriorated bitumen.

"Locals are rightly demanding the worst areas should have been patched by now particularly given the road started surface started sliding down the hill seven months ago. Sure, there might need to be a more long-lasting resurfacing task required, but the road simply isn't safe in the meantime,'

"While Cross River Rail - Labor's 'big black hole' sucks up all the cash, road users outside of inner



Andrew Powell and Steve Minnikin toured local roads last week.

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Painting captures moment ringer wrangles bullock to the ground in 13.5 seconds

RENOWNED Maleny artist Gary Myers has been commissioned to recreate a remarkable moment captured on film more than 100 years ago.

Buderim couple Grant and Sharon Ryan of RMG Global Trading wanted a statement piece for their home, drawing on the story behind the day Grant's great-grandfather, Tom Lawton, won 500 pounds at the Brisbane Exhibition Grounds in Brisbane for throwing a bullock in 13.5 seconds.

A newspaper article from the time reports that a Professor Bates came to Australia in August 1913 and issued an open challenge to any Australian who could "throw and tie a bullock in the best time that he could".

When Tom read of this challenge in the newspaper he reportedly said to his wife: "I am a married man with nine children, this is a lot of money. I am going to Brisbane and I think I can beat this bloke".

The cattleman from Juandah Station near Wandoan then put his horse Rattler and himself on the train in Miles bound for Brisbane.

Tom used his method of throwing, "which was by the tail and using the American style of using

ropes" to win the bet. "On August 13, 1913, at the Brisbane Exhibition Grounds before a very big crowd Tom threw his Bullock in 13.5 seconds. Prof Bates took 42 seconds! So

Tom returned to Juandah 500 Pounds

better off," the article reads. Apparently the technique involved the ringer using his horse to first knock the bull off its feet. He would leap off his horse, grab the bull by the tail and when it turned on him, it would be off balance. In that spilt second the ringer twisted its tail and the bull fell to the ground. A rope was then used to secure

Gary said he was delighted to bring the incredible feat to life in the painting. "It was such a great story to recreate, a fantastic subject to work with and a pleasure to recreate such an iconic moment for the Ryans," he said.

Grant said the oil painting about his famous forebear would take pride of place in his family home in Buderim.

"Tom was quite the adventurer," he said. "At one time he drove the Cobb & Co coach on the Surat-Yuelba Road.



THE Eastern, Scottish and Australian Bank Ltd (known as the ES&A bank) opened in Nambour on 21 June 1906 with manager Arthur Bennett.

Their early premises were of timber construction adjacent to William Whalley's store on Currie Street.

Major fires in Currie Street were a problem for property owners, so in 1921 when the ES&A acquired the London Bank of Australia, the bank consolidated its operations within Currie Street's first brick building, the premises of the London Bank at 66 Currie Street.

It stood on the stretch of Currie Street between Centenary Square and the old Club Hotel.

Escaping the fires of later years, business continued in this building until the early 1950s when modern banking premises were con-

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

Book covers Witta area's links to German immigrants

IN the late 19th Century, the district now known as Witta was settled by predominantly Germanic immigrants.

They called their homeland Teutoburg. Local historian and archaeologist, Dr Steve Chaddock, and author Dale Jacobsen collaborated to produce Teutoburg to Witta, an illustrated book which tells the story of the formation of this community.

Following is a review by archaeologist, Dr Judy Powell, who will officially launch the book at the Witta Recreational Club on Sunday 15th May from 11am.

Teutoburg to Witta: a review by Dr Judy Powell

THE unsung heroes of much historical activity across Australia are the local historians and genealogists who document, at a small scale, the lives and events of their local area.

By undertaking basic archival research and recounting the stories of individuals and families, these researchers are helping contribute to a broader understanding of Australia's history.

Writer Dale Jacobsen and archaeologist and anthropologist Steve Chaddock have combined to produce "Teutoburg to Witta. How European settlement helped make Maleny", a richly illustrated and documented history of the area they

The story covers a sixty year period that begins in the 1860s when a group of German immigrants arrived in Brisbane and moved to the Logan district south of Brisbane - 'Little Germany'. By 1887, a year of massive flooding, a group of eighteen German families applied for selections in the Blackall Range. These settlers progressively moved their families into an area of dense vine forests, deep volcanic soils and geographic isolation. In memory of one of the defining events in German history, they named the area 'Teutoburg'.

Chaddock and Jacobsen describe the lives of these early families - their early farming ventures, their campaign to provide a Provisional School, their growing sense of community as expressed through church and social activities. Always the stories are told with a sense of each individual - the odd scandal, the tragedies of early death, the hardships and humour. Music and dance feature, as do smoked sausage and

When dairying became the dominant industry, the focus of activity moved away from Teutoburg toward the nearby settlement of Maleny where a Cooperative Butter Factory was built, first in 1904 and then a larger factory in

But what brought Teutoburg (the name, not the locality) to an end was what had brought it into being in the first place - nationalism.

Just as the very word "Teutoburg" invokes a great national myth (the defeat of the Romans by Germanic tribes in 9 CE), so too it was anti-German sentiment during World War I that led, in 1916, to the re-gazettal of the locality and its renaming as Witta.

"Teutoburg to Witta. How European Settlement helped make Maleny" is a useful addition to the history of the Sunshine Coast hinterland and the stories of the early European settlers of the area will be a reading delight to those who know



Excerpts from the book

"Top of my list of happy memories is our wonderfully happy carefree childhood in a loving family home with Mum, Dad and my brother, where we gained our right or wrong conscience with its strong self-discipline. Consequently, even with friends and neighbours some distance away, we were trusted to roam (singly or together), often passing 'swaggies' camping in their haunts - and there was no need of any 'stranger danger' fear in those days. Whereas in today's society, these teachings have become a necessity!

"We could never forget the glorious environment of the Sunshine Coast and its hinterland. We swam in the large natural swimming hole in our Petrie Creek, or traipsed at leisure through scrub and bushland, across farms, and even collected clay to make clay marbles in our wood-stove oven.

"Every day we bucketed water from the tanks on low tank stands, up the twelve back stairs, for all the household needs, and in winter, bathed in the biggest of the galvanised laundry tubs set



in front of the wood stove in the kitchen.

"Monday was always Mum's weekly wash day. Just outside, downstairs, was the wood-burning copper boiler which Dad filled using buckets of tank water, as he also did the four varying sized galvanised wash-tubs on the long bench under the house.

Then having stoked and set the fire burning under the copper, he was down at the farm well before 7am, leaving Mum 'sorting the clothes' on the verandah (There were no synthetic materials in those days - but a few silks or woollens which had to be gently hand washed were put aside for later).

Everything else went into the copper boiler using the same water throughout. Therefore, large whites went in first (sheets, pillowcases, tablecloths etc.) for twenty minutes boiling. Next to go in were the white clothes, followed in turn by towels etc. through to 'darks' and lastly heavy work clothes - each lot at least twenty minutes (longer if very soiled).

"Tank water always had to be used conservatively, (there was no other available). In drought times, tank water levels became very low, so this water was restricted to 'drinking water only'.

This was when Dad harnessed the horse to the sled on which he strapped half a tank and went down to the creek to bucket half a load.

This creek water, though discoloured, had to suffice for all other purposes - including the laundry. So when this had to be, Mum's pride and joy in her 'whites' was shattered because even the 'blue bag' was helpless!

Pineapples grew everywhere when I was a youngster. They were both sides of Blackall Range Road, right from Goughs hill above the Railway bridge (now all houses), out to Menary Road - except for Suley's property, (now Harvey's) which was a dairy from about 1937 when all the lovely gum trees were knocked down.

"Redmond Road right up to opposite us, skirted pineapple farms - as well as from Woombye up to the school where all those houses are and lots of other roads too.

"Springs of lovely water abounded. Our gully down towards Petrie Creek was always wet and flowing, as was the spring that came out of our eastern dip, now camphor laurel trees, and gushed across Grimshaw's dip in his track."



"This residency brings exciting opportunities for the local dance sector to learn from Lewis at his daily open classes for dance students and emerging dance professionals.

81st Anniversary of the Easter Battle for Tobruk

EASTER Monday 14th April 1941 was a critical day in the battle of Tobruk and the famous siege that was to follow. On this day Corporal Jack Edmonston of the 2/17th Battalion was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross, the first VC to an Australian during World War II.

The German forces under the command of General Rommel anticipated a quick victory at Tobruk and Rommel sent a Panzer [Tank] battalion into battle under the command of experienced Lieutenant Colonel Gustav Ponath who would subsequently die on this day. The Australians under the command of General Morshead let the tanks past their outer defences and into the line of the 'dug in' 25 ponders of the Royal Horse Artillery. While the artillery took care of many tanks and routed the rest, the Australian infantry engaged the German infantry that were following the tanks.

The result was the first defeat of the German army in World War II and the start of the famous Siege of Tobruk where the Australians held off the German's advance towards the Suez Canal for eight months.


The 2/15th Battalion played a prominent role in this battle and many men from the Nambour area were members of this battalion. The Nambour Museum has a room dedicated to the 2/15th Battalion and our local servicemen.

Budget backlog is wrecking roads

Last week, I brought the LNP Shadow Minister for Transport and Main Roads, Steve Minnikin MP, to Glass House to see firsthand a number of crumbling Hinterland roads in desperate need of maintenance. The estimated cost of the deferred maintenance backlog for roads across the state has reached a massive \$5.73 billion. The North Coast region has a deferred maintenance backlog of \$875 million.

That means less money for upgrades to Maleny-Kenilworth Road, Maleny-Landsborough Road and Steve Irwin Way. On his trip, Mr Minnikin paid special attention to Maleny-Landsborough Road where drivers have to swerve between lanes to avoid several wide patches of deteriorated bitumen on the climb out of Landsborough and to the deplorable state of the Maleny-Kenilworth Road at Cambroon.

Frustratingly, the Labor Government was warned by the Auditor-General three years ago that there were serious problems with Queensland's roads. And they've done nothing to fix it.

Hinterland Healing

I recently had the opportunity to tag along with Shiralee from the Montville Chamber of Commerce and Scott from Maleny Commerce to play "Santa", delivering "Hinterland Healing" packages to flood-affected business owners in Gympie, Woolooga and Goomeri. The recipients were so grateful after all of the adversity they have had to face.


Ambulance Ramping on the Rise

WILVOS occasionally get calls to our hotline asking how to attract birds to a garden. The most effective and easiest option is a birdbath of clean water each day.

Of course, we can improve upon that by planting fruiting and flowering native shrubs, along with some seeding grasses. I love to watch visiting birds of all colours, shapes and sizes! Some stay to make a nest and raise chicks.

What about the carnivorous birds? Magpies, peewees and kookaburras will love it when you dig up a few worms for them while you are gardening, or you could start a worm farm! Sadly we are seeing an increasing number of birds come in that are diagnosed with metabolic bone disease. The young ones are often found on the ground. Their fragile little bones are bent and fracture so easily when suffering from this very preventable disease.

Unfortunately, well-meaning people are feeding bread, cheese or mince to the birds. Of course they will eat it and go to every house that will feed them. Meanwhile they are missing out on all the important nutrition they get from their natural foods. The result is disastrous. Many a carer has been brought to tears seeing the xrays of a bird that has deformed legs that just cannot support the body. The incorrect diet fed to adult birds carries through to chicks when they hatch.

So please, if a magpie comes to visit you, just dig up some worms or find some bugs in your trees or 'vege' garden. They will love them and they will then continue to eat all those pests in your garden. The smart birds are the flycatchers. They don't come to ground, they just hunt the insects on the wing. Great little workers!

Fair cop! Are the state's penalties equitable?

The Oueensland Government will substantially raise traffic fines from 1 July.

But are these increases too much for some and petty cash for others?

The value of a penalty unit used to determine the severity of fines normally increases each year by 3.5 per cent, unless the Queensland Treasurer makes a different ruling before 31

In 2020 the penalty unit was frozen so there was no change on 1 July that year, a gift due to the impacts of Covid.

In 2021 the Queensland Government decided to increase the penalty based upon two years of consumer price index (CPI) increases, thus making up for lost fine.

In 2022, as of 1 July, the value of the penalty unit will rise by 4.3 per cent, with this figure exceeding the legislated increase.

Listed below are the offences to avoid. And remember you start with 0 points and they accumulate.

A driver on a learners or provisional licence will be sanctioned if they accumulate more than 4 points in any one year period.

A driver on an open licence will be sanctioned if they accumulate more than 12 points in any three year period.

Fines to avoid

- Red traffic light fine increased from \$413 to \$575 [3 demerit points].
- Speeding 1-10 km over limit fine increased from \$183 to \$287 [1 demerit point].
- Speeding 11-20 km over limit fine increased from \$275 to \$431 [3 demerit points].
- Speeding 21-30 km over limit fine increased from \$459 to \$646 [4 demerit points].
- Speeding 31-40 km over limit fine increased from \$643 to \$1078 [6 demerit points]. • Speeding > 40 km over limit - fine increased
- from \$1286 to \$1653 [8 demerit points] with 6 months automatic suspension. • Not wearing seatbelt – fine increased from \$413 to \$1078 and [4 demerit points] was 3.

I was talking to the Rev Dr David Logan on this matter.

Reverend Logan served for 15 years in a Road Rescue Team in New South Wales. He's seen first-hand the carnage and sadness of road

He suggested that a pensioner pays far more than a professional when it comes to traffic penalties.

He had researched the average incomes of pensioners and shop assistants through to surgeons and compared each to the cost of living and gave examples of the impact of fines.

Using the seatbelt offence, he showed the impact of a \$1078 fine upon their weekly cost of living.

After paying the fine;

The surgeon had \$6,663 left to pay for neces-

The shop assistant had no income that week for necessities, and the following week still owed \$216 and had \$646 to pay for two weeks' necessities. The pensioner had no income for 2 weeks


and in the third week had just \$351 to pay for 3 weeks' necessities. He's written to the Premier to raise his idea of

a day-fine system linked to income.

Other nations using a day-fine system include Estonia, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, France and Switzerland.

Here's to fairer future fines.


