A safer CBD for Nambour

Petition calls for action on drug abuse, violence, youth crime, vagrancy and menacing behaviour

RENOWNED lawyer and Reimagine Nambour Chairman Peter Boyce says he is determined to keep the issue of CBD safety high on the radar of authorities.

His comments follow the launch of an online "Petition for a Safer Town" seeking State Government action to quell drug and alcohol abuse, in-street violence, youth crime, vagrancy and menacing behaviour in Nambour.

Mr Boyce said the problems were having a demoralising effect on Nambour, causing residents to feel unsafe and businesses to suffer with shoppers reluctant to walk the streets.

"The trauma that's experienced by businesses and people in that area is unacceptable," he said. "We're desperate to make sure that this issue, the safety aspect, stays well and truly high on the agenda and doesn't go away.

"We're all happy that our own health and wellbeing and safety is not an issue. But I really feel for a lot of those people

who are trying to run a business in the CBD.

"Because they shouldn't be subjected to that sort of conduct.

"And I can tell you, when I've been to some meetings, and heard the first-hand experiences of some of those people, I have been shell-shocked by how bad it's been at times.

"And I realize every larger community has some issues about people's conduct, and the way they behave. But there's got

to be a better way.

"And why should anyone be subjected to this type of conduct from a tiny minority of people? Especially when, at the same time, we're trying to say, 'Come to Nambour. Come and enjoy our beautiful town'?

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News of 'donation tin' patrols shocks Shadow Police Minister

SHADOW Police Minister Dale Last said it was shocking that Nambour business leaders felt they needed to "hand around the donation tin" in order to keep their streets safe. The statement follows Reimagine Nambour's open letter gauging

open letter gauging interest from local businesspeople about paying for extra police patrols in **Nicklin MP Rob Skelton**

the Nambour CBD. The open letter comes amid safety concerns and seeks donations to fund two police officers to patrol the Nambour CBD.

Mr Last said the move represented a "shocking development in the Queensland crime crisis".

"The Labor State Government's crime crisis is so out of control, locals are now considering paying for basic policing services that everyone should be entitled to," Mr Last said.

"Under Labor, if you are a business owner in Nambour you will get more police; but only if you pay for it.

"Labor is more concerned with how things look, than how they are.

"Just three months ago the Premier opened the new Nambour Police Station, yet here



we have locals being requested to pay for police.

"The former LNP Member for Nicklin Marty Hunt fought hard for dedicated police on the beat in Nambour and even negotiated a free office space donated by a local landlord to be used as a police beat.

"A petition to the Parliament signed by over 2000

people in Nambour (in 2019) called for action by this Government which fell on deaf ears.

"After three terms in office the State Government has given up on listening.

"Nambour locals deserve better."

Member for Nicklin responds

MEMBER for Nicklin Rob Skelton said he was always open to people who had a valuable contribution to make.

"Unfortunately, the only track record the LNP have on crime is cutting senior police by a third and forcing police to buy their own equipment when last in government.

"Publicly available statistics show a continuing downward trend of crime in Nambour, in tandem with the rest of Queensland.

"We all need to work together to keep our community safe. Unproductive yelling from the sidelines does nothing to help our community.

"That's why we're continuing to invest in front line services and will continue to work with police and local small businesses to keep our community safe."

Threatening, unruly, bizarre behaviour commonplace

SHOPKEEPERS in Nambour CBD have to deal with regular and consistent threatening, unruly and bizarre behaviour, in addition to criminal activity and violence, as the town copes with the knock-on effects of mental health and addiction issues.

Several people, who did not wish to be named for fear of an online backlash or damage to their premises, said a drug subculture was thriving in the town.

The sub-culture, including trafficking, has developed around services such as needle exchange and availability of opioid replacement therapies like methadone.

Shopkeepers say drug deals in broad daylight are an everyday occurence.

Many know who the dealers are. One even positioned her stock to obstruct part of her window so she would not have to witness the regular criminal activity as it took place.

Another said it was common to see people "off their face melting down" on drugs. "... they walk up the street, ranting and

raving, swearing, spitting on the ground," she said.

"You never know if they are off their chops and what they are capable of. It's very confronting and scary.

"And just because we get a little bit used to it over time, doesn't mean it should be happening here, all the time."

One female shopkeeper said a fairly major incident happened every week.

While they always felt secure in their shop, she and a staff member had a "plan B escape route" prepared just in case.

Other retailers have told of bizarre behaviour where people come in to their shops and knock over stock in agressive and outlandish raids where the end objective appears to be to create havoc while shoplifting at the same time.

"This is a State Government issue and they need to clean up the situation they created," said another shop owner. "It's not nice to feel unsafe in your own town."

Most businesses agreed regular, visible police patrols in Nambour CBD would improve the situation.

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Meth clinic needs to go back to hospitals: business owner

Customers terrified of certain areas of Nambour CBD

A clearly frustrated local business owner says the Nambour CBD business community is suffering under a pattern of intimidating and antisocial behaviour on a regular basis.

The person, who did not want to be named, said she undersood that it was important to take care of vulnerable people.

But Nambour, and the CBD in particular, was coping with more than its fair share.

'It's affecting our business because some customers are terrified of walking through certain areas to come in and see us.

"So we have to try and direct them to where they can approach safely. They can't use those car parks out the back because if they have to walk through the town square (in Short Street) and walk past the element that hangs out there, they're scared.

"And I've had to, on some occasions, walk back with my customers to their car.

"And it's not necessarily the homeless, it's just some of the unruly behaviour that's going on. That's the sad thing, I suppose.

"And they're not local to Nambour. They are coming, probably off the train, and they're

coming through town to use the methadone clinic.


"And what really needs to happen is that clinic needs to go. Now! Back to the hospital, back to Sunshine Coast University Hospital. Pretty please!

"The authorities think that they can just send them here to Nambour. I think Nambour is totally duped by the council and the State Government and it's disgusting.

"Sorry. I can't stand any more. I keep thinking to myself, 'Why are we still here in business in Nambour?' Because it's not how it was when we first started years ago. People would all come down and be friendly and have a chat. Now I think they're terrified and they don't tend to linger."

The business person pointed to a disturbance across the street.

"Even right now ... with just having this element here and they're screaming and they're ranting up and down. That's what the problem is. And it's affecting everyone. No-one should have to put up with this regular, awful, threatening and intimidating behaviour.





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'Operation Lucent' to address property crime & good order offences in Nambour

Queensland Police Service issued the following statement in relation to our coverage, in the last edition, of Reimagine Nambour's initiative to gauge interest in paying for extra police patrols in the Nambour CBD.

"In July this year the new \$8.3 million Nambour Police Station was officially opened by the Queensland Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk. The station is staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week and allows the Sunshine Coast District capability to redeploy further policing resources to meet calls for service.

"The Sunshine Coast District is also able to leverage capacity from specialist commands such as the Highway Patrol Group, Forensic Crash Unit, Criminal Investigation Branch, Child Protection Investigation Unit and the District Intelligence Unit which are all housed in the new facility.

"Nambour Police Station is staffed with 30 sworn police officers and resourced with six marked police vehicles, two unmarked crime services vehicles and two forensic crash vehicles with drone

capability. "The facility was built fit for purpose and delivers professional, comprehensive policing services and capability to meet the complex demands of the Nambour community

"Police are currently undertaking Operation Lucent in Nambour to address property crime and good order offences with the deployment of resources from across the district.

"In addition, a School Based Police Officer (SBPO) regularly patrols the Central Business District and precinct in relation to youth crime.

"District Police Liaison Officers (PLOs) have also provided a presence in the CBD through



foot patrols and the "Coffee with a Cop" initiative in Nambour Plaza.

"The Oueensland Police Service remains committed to enhancing public safety in the Nambour CBD and will continue to liaise with community stakeholders in relation to any concerns.'

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Nambour **Jewellers** closing down after history of break-ins

NAMBOUR Jewellers owner Keira Fiorenza, who was the victim of several break-ins and two armed hold-ups is closing her shop for good, largely because of the toll the incidents have taken on her.

Keira suffers from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) from the armed robberies.

She says only the support of the townspeople had kept her in her business this long.



"Anyone in town, who's had any incident like that happen to them, they will say the same thing ... the community support. Oh, my goodness, I have goosebumps. It's just so precious. This town, they really get behind you. There's a true community spirit.

"I would really like just to thank the commu-nity for all of their ongoing support over the many years.

"I've worked here for 18 years, but I've owned the shop for about eight years. And the support from this town has helped me through so much.



through so much. Which has made it super hard for me to leave this shop," says Keira.

Which has made it super hard for me to leave the shop.

"But the new landlords want to renovate the shop. So I thought, 'Well, I can relocate or I can try something new in life'. And I opted for change. I'm going to be a support worker."

Keira said the first robbery happened seven years ago. "He was running toward the shop and I thought he had a gun. He was covered from head to toe. Anyway, he had a hammer, but I thought it was a gun, which was pretty terrifying

"And I had a few other robberies, smashed windows and stolen goods. The majority of the people involved have not been from Nambour." Keira said she launched a petition in 2019 campaigning for a Police Beat in town to deal with crime issues.

The petition highlighted the issue and raised media and political attention for a while. But nothing has changed since, she said.

"It went to Parliament, but nothing happened. The idea was to get a Police Beat in Nambour. It was mentioned in Parliament.

"And then (former Nicklin MP) Marty Hunt came back to report to me that they were actually removing all Police Beats.

"He said it wasn't even going to be a thing

anymore. Instead they were going to introduce mobile Police Beats from vans. But I've never even seen anything like that around Nambour."

Two petitions and 16 years later the problems are the same

Ironically, while organising the 2019 petition which went to Parliament and was signed by over 2000 people - an older petition came to light, one that gained thousands of followers. It was organised in 2006.

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Town walks fine line between helping the vulnerable and enabling a drug sub-culture

A local real estate agent says Nambour was struggling to balance the responsibility of sharing the burden when it came to helping vulnerable people and not becoming a honey pot for illegal activity.

Day & Grimes Principal Ian Black said drugs, alcohol and mental health issues were a worldwide problem. And Nambour certainly did its fair share when it came to social issues.

"Unfortunately, we are seeing now, Australia-wide, worldwide, a lot of people who, for whatever their circumstances have brought them to that level, are really now struggling to survive," he said.

"And as a result of that, their survival story brings with it a lot of things which ... a lot would regard as being socially unacceptable. And they really don't want them as part of our community.

"And that's understandable. But I think at the end of the day, what we need to do is focus more on opportunities for them to improve their lives rather than just move them on to somewhere else."

Mr Black said Nambour needed to pull its weight but not encourage and support a permanent area where criminal activity, like drug dealing and drug use, would proliferate.

"Nambour provides a lot of help in the area of social responsibility for people who are finding things difficult," he said.

"And I think in that sense, this is where Nambour has become a favourite for a lot of these people where they can get meals, they can get showers, they can get some counselling.

"But of course, there are those who are not looking to help themselves for whatever reason. "And these are the ones that – and they're in a

minority – these are the ones that are giving us the trouble we have.

"And because some of them are unsightly because of the way they dress and their general appearance, people feel a little unsafe, particularly the females in our community. "And a lot of them do speak very loudly. They use profanities.

"All these things are not helpful whatsoever to the image of Nambour. But we have to have an understanding that they are part of society and we need to try and help them somehow."

Precinct develops and promotes further investment in Nambour.

"It's the investment in Nambour that we're trying to make sure happens. But we don't want to be hamstrung by conduct that's not acceptable by any standards. I can't believe how traumatized some people are. It's just awful."

Mr Boyce's comments follow Reimagine Nambour's open letter in the last *Gazette* calling for interest from local businesses in the idea of paying for extra police patrols in the CBD.

Reimagine Nambour will also investigate

appointing "Community Police Officers" who may not have all of the powers of police officers but have powers to move on and arrest people for conduct that is unbecoming or criminal in certain circumstances.

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Build it and they will come

Palmwoods gardens a tribute to vision, hard work

former orchard farm in Palmwoods has been transformed into a popular garden oasis and tourist destination thanks to 35 years' work by its owners. Max Carmichael and a silent partner bought the property in 1987 and Max has been living in the original homestead for 22 years nurturing the former citrus orchard into a botanical gardens set out in eight unique, hand-manicured areas. A stunning cafe and bar overlook serene ponds. They named it Stonebridge Gardens after the hand-laid stone bridges that adorn the property

Max said he'd been through 1000 ton of rocks, three cement mixers and six hospitalisations (back, ankles, knees) in realising the dream.

"They say that you should build it and they will come," Max said. "I didn't know who would come, or when they'd come, or even if they'd come. But it was all about 'just do it'. So you put your faith in the amount of work you do and have faith that people will appreciate what you've done just as much as you appreciate it yourself."

And now, looking back on his achievement, it was all worthwhile.

"It's a lifetime's work," said Max. "If, at the end of it all, you're not pleased with what you've done, it'd be a terrible disappointment. But it's highly successful at the moment because of numbers of people that are coming here. The car park's full just about every day that we're open and the place is booked out. You can't ask for better than that!

"It's about management from here on and it's about having people use the gardens as we originally designed them as we open them up for weddings and functions and grand occasions." The property used to be a citrus orchard and

in 1987 Max and his business partner wanted to open a nursery but the plan evolved as that industry declined.

"The old lemon trees were something like 20 to 25 years old and they'd had it. So, I pulled them out with the old tractor.

'We cleaned up for two years just getting rid of all the rubbish around the dams, so you could actually see water," he said.

Max did most of the maintenance work on the gardens until 12 months ago. "Now we have two gardeners working for us, contractors, because of all the hedging. You can start one end and by the time you get around to it again, it all needs doing again. So, it's an impossible task. Plus mowing the place takes two days alone.



"There's spaces here for 20 metre marquees, all the way down to little areas where there's a rock table, or whatever, for half a dozen people. And huge walkways where five people can walk abreast. Grand sets of stairs, where I've seen these things in Europe and America. And I wanted to replicate something wonderful that I enjoyed totally. It's just something you don't see in Australia. If you did, it's probably gone and turned into a development somewhere.'

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Charity begins at home

Nambour-based op shop chain cares for more than 5000 orphaned, trafficked and vulnerable children

OHN and Jesma O'Hara started the first Neighbours Aid op shop 20 years ago in Nambour committed to making a difference to the lives of some of the world's needy children.

"We got a group together in 2002 and started our first Op Shop in Currie Street and the funds went to supporting children and their communities," said John. "So now, we're looking after over 5000 kids and their communities.'

These days Neighbours Aid has eight shops and has donated more than \$7 million for children's homes, education, farms, medical clinics and other services for children in poor rural and urban slum communities in third-world countries.

They have 21 people on wages in Australia and about 130 people on wages in third world countries. "We change lives now," said John. "That's the bottom line.

"We've been going to Africa for 17 years from basically very, very small beginnings. We were over in Malawi and we saw people starving. So we bought four acres and gave them a few dollars just to try and keep them going. And then we built a school there and provided work that would support that community. So it's just gone from very small beginnings to actually quite a reasonable sort of impact."

John and Jesma recently arrived back in Australia after visiting their African projects. In Malawi Neighbours Aid funds two primary schools, a high school, a medical clinic and farming initiatives. Leaders there have completed university degrees and the wellbeing of

the community has improved.

"When we first went there, particularly to Africa, there were people who were struggling to look after the orphaned and sick kids. So we built a home for them. This was a few years ago. AIDS was pretty prevalent and these kids were left without family.

"In Kenya 500,000 people were displaced because of tribal wars following elections. There were heaps of kids just left behind. So we established good systems, looking at accommodation, social workers, family connections and schooling.'

Despite the many positive outcomes, John said some of the situations were tragic and entrenched.

"So, in Kenya in particular, we've got a number of kids there, young girls with babies as a result of incest, rape, and other bad situations. And so we look after them and keep them safe.

"Our guys work with the Child Welfare Department who send the children for us to care for. And we don't just take on the children, we try to support the extended family so they

can help themselves. For instance, we just visited a grandmother who'd lost six of her own children but has got 10 grandchildren. She's trying to look after all these kids in a mud hut with very little. So we pay for the kids to go to school, we help feed them. We also fund a Vocational Training College"

Neighbours Aid has also set up schools in the slums in India and a nurses training college there with about 200 young girls from very poor backgrounds.

"We give them a four-year course and they come out being nurses. So it's pretty phenomenal what we can achieve from here just from our op shops.'

They are also trying to help communities produce food for themselves and their children.

"It all helps to give their young people work," John said. "We try to buy everything locally, building products etcetera. It helps to put more dollars into their system and encourage self-sustainability.

"A lot of these children were destitute little boys and girls when we first saw them. And now we see them ... healthy men and women with children, with jobs, doing well. It's just amazing to see

"One guy, he hadn't been to school. He was at least 12, 13 years old when we first met him. And he was destitute. He was starving. And so our people were feeding him. And I had a nurse with me when we were visiting. And this little bloke had broken his leg, and it was infected. So we took him straight away to the hospital, got him fixed

up. "That little guy is a school

teacher now. We put him through our school. He's very good with sport and very good with kids, so we put him through teacher's training college. But then, he's also running for the local parliament!'

The organisation also funds two projects in Israel supporting children with mental health issues and providing scholarships for the children of Ethiopian immigrants.

"We're no spring chickens, Jesma and I, now. We're coming up to 20 years and so it's very, very important to get the next generation continuing our work. And that's my job here as well ... to try and keep things on the boil. Also, my job is looking for other locations to open another shop and get another group of supporters there. Because the op shops bring in about 75 percent of our finances. We've got about 420 volunteers now

"So it's just amazing. It's so exciting to see this happen. I mean, obviously, they're not all success stories, but in saying that, our people, our leaders there, they're the champions. They're the guys that are boots on the ground. They're the ones that are looking after the kids and have done for years and now we see the fruits of that coming through. It's very exciting. I love it."

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Palmwoods traffic safety upgrade now complete

WORKS to improve pedestrian safety at Palmwoods, including installing a new wombat crossing and better lighting, are now complete.

Improvements in the centre of Palmwoods-Montville Road (locally known as Margaret Street) delivered wider parking bays, raised the pedestrian crossing and resurfacing throughout the project area.

A speed management treatment was installed at the western approach to Margaret Street, as well as improved streetlighting and additional warning signs to bolster compliance with the road's 40km/h speed limits.

"These improvements have created a safer environment for both motorists and pedestrians in Palmwoods," said Nicklin MP Robert Skelton. "With improved lighting, a new speed management treatment and a realignment to centre parking now delivered, we expect to see greater speed limit compliance and safer driver behaviour.

Assistant Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Carol Brown said improvements would make Margaret Street safer for all users, while maintaining the charming town centre.

Assistant Minister for Regional Development Anthony Chisholm said Palmwoods' residents would now see the benefit of safer pedestrian access. "Projects like this highlight the ongoing commitment of the Albanese Government to deliver the infrastructure and services that communities need, regardless of where they are located.

The \$1 million project was funded under the Australian Government's Road Safety Program, with the Australian Government contributing \$800,000 and the Queensland Government contributing \$200,000.


Book 'worm' of a different sort visits local business


"Nambour has gained quite the reputation

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


Photo shows centre parking and double lanes on the right, as well as footpath parking.

'Back to the Future' proposal to fix Currie Street traffic and parking woes

SOME things were just better in the old days. One of them was Nambour's parking and traffic layout. That's according to former Maroochy Shire Council Deputy Mayor Trevor Thompson.

And he seems to have a lot of support.

Mr Thompson, who is also raising the prospect of forming a hinterland shire (see separate story), says the authorities only have to look to the past to fix decades-long parking and traffic flow issues in the town's struggling main street, Currie Street.

Mr Thompson posted a picture, above, on Facebook, which received rave reviews for its ample parking and bustling streets.

"That picture shows what it was like back in the days when I was a young fellow," he said. "Nambour was the place to be and it was the place to shop.

"I know they'll probably grab the 2022 handbook and say 'it can't be done'. They always say that. They'll be trying to impose 2022 standards on a town that's over 100 years old.

"What I learned in Council was they always say no on the first ask, but you have to keep going back to them. There's always a way to get around the guys reading out of manuals rather than looking at it logically."

The photo was taken when the Bruce Highway went through town, so traffic flow would have been significant.

Mr Thompson said he had great sympathy for the traders in Currie Street competing with satellite shopping centres.

"Sadly, satellite shopping centres are detrimental to CBDs. So we have to entice people back into the main street. And if people are able to park in town then that certainly helps the shopkeepers."

Mr Thompson said centre-parking would also help to calm traffic flow. "If we have to take a little bit longer to get through town then so be it."

But he admitted the issue was complicated by Currie Street being a state-controlled road. "And the Council can't do a thing unless they get State Government approval," he said

Transport Minister Mark Bailey told the Gazette earlier this year his Department would investigate parking and traffic flow issues in Currie Street. The issue was raised by local businesswoman Deb Lawson who also organised a 1000-strong petition to Council on the matter.

A Transport and Main Roads spokesperson said recently: "We are in the early stages of investigating improvements to Currie Street in Nambour, including consideration for car parking and pedestrian connectivity options.

"We are continuing to work with Sunshine Coast Council while undertaking these investigations, as part of Council's longer-term Nambour place revitalisation project.'

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Breakaway shire proposal gathers support from locals

PUBLIC reaction to a proposal for a "hinterland shire" west of the Bruce Highway, has been so encouraging that a petition and initial public meeting is now on the table.

The man behind the breakaway shire idea, former Shire Maroochy Council Deputy Mayor Trevor Thompson, raised the issue last month.

"I feel like the feedback has been incredibly positive," he said. "People can see the benefit. It's just that it will be a huge, drawn-out process. I was just trying to find out the level of support and it's been very good.'

Last issue Mr Thompson called for a breakaway shire so hinterland residents could run their own local government, possibly from the Fred De Vere building in Currie Street.

He said it was about time people west of the Bruce were listened to by a Council that was often criticised for being out of touch with the grass roots needs of hinterland ratepayers.


Support for Mr Thompson's proposal gathered momentum on Facebook last week from residents, businesses and organisations.

"Hopefully we can get some like-minded people together," Mr Thompson said. "All I want to do is to try and do something positive. We can whinge all we want but it's no good unless you can come up with an alternative."

He said a hinterland shire of about 55,000 residents would be eminently viable.

"It's fine to say that they've been matching rates gathered in the hinterland with money spent in the hinterland but they have to factor in infrastructure charges on developments.

"What they'll try and do is compare rates collected in the hinterland to money spent in the hinterland. That's one fair way of doing it. What they won't tell you is that there have been, and continue to be, millions of infrastructure



charges paid to council from hinterland developments that are not

spent in the hinterland. For every block of land on the Sunshine Coast - I think it's between \$18,000 and \$20,000. And that has to be factored into the equation. And there is a lot of development potential in the hinterland.

"When I was in council I moved that any infrastructure charges collected from a developer in a certain area must be used in that area. "That never came about and the hinterland

has never, ever been getting a fair slice of the action from infrastructure charges from developers

"All I'm doing is throwing up fresh ideas. We have to have constructive conversations. And you can disagree or we can agree. But at least you have to have a conversation to try and invoke change.'

Hinterland shire would be a 'no-goer': insider

A person with extensive local government experience has cast doubts on the hinterland shire proposal.

The idea for a breakaway shire was put forward by former Maroochy Shire Council Deputy Mayor Trevor Thompson. His idea, to investigate forming a hinterland shire west of the Bruce Highway, has received strong support on social media. Mr Thompson said a hinterland shire would have a similar population to other Queensland Councils and would be eminently viable.

However, the insider, who did not want to be named, said a hinterland council would not have the economies of scale to work in practice.

"The reality of the situation is that you can't compare, say, Noosa Shire to a proposed hinterland shire because the hinterland just doesn't have the high value properties to raise the high value rates.

"The hinterland doesn't have the big shopping centres, we don't have the tourist resorts, we don't have the high rises, we don't have the density.

The person said the State Government was more interested in merging councils than breaking them up, because there were already a number of councils in Queensland which were struggling to be viable.

"The hinterland needs the rate base and the development potential of the Coast to prop it up, not the other way around.

"You would need a new CEO and all the bureaucracy that goes with a new council. You need at least six councillors. And all the infrastructure. It just doesn't work.

"In any case the whole local authority (not just the hinterland) would have to broadly agree (with the breakaway) because it will have an impact on the Coast as well."

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Regulated dog inspection program

Sunshine Coast Council will be undertaking a regulated dog inspection program between 1 November 2022 and 31 October 2023.

The purpose of this program is to conduct a compliance audit at premises within the region where dogs that have been regulated under the Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008 are being kept. The Act requires local governments to manage regulated dogs within their boundaries. The program will work to ensure animal owners are adhering to the mandatory conditions for keeping a regulated dog to reduce the risk posed by these animals. The wild story of survival behind Woombye²s zoo

IT'S the zoo that grew out of desperation. Now Woombye's Wildlife HQ is looking at taking on more land at the Big Pineapple, expanding its animal collection and doing night safaris.

"We really are the zoo that should never have been," said Zoo CEO Jarrod Schenk.

"The owner of the old Alma Park Zoo sold us for a housing development eight years ago. He gave us just six months to move out over 200 animals before the developers moved

in. "There was going to be no home for any of our animals and it was the most devastating experience of our lives."

Out of desperation to save the zoo and fear of what might happen to the animals Jarrod,

who was the Sun Bear keeper, and his boss at the time, Julie Seabrook, stepped in and took on ownership of the animals.

"We committed ourselves to building them a new home at the Big Pineapple," said Jarrod. "A forever home. Through saving the zoo, and keeping our dream alive, we have formed an unbreakable relationship.'

Jarrod said the new zoo family extends to the incredible keeper team who help care for the animals seven days a week.

"It has been an incredible zoo journey so far and we have always been there to support each other on such a huge responsibility as taking on all of these zoo animals' lives. The weight of it can be so heavy at times that we have to be there for each other."

As further validation for their decision the zoo has just been announced as a finalist in the Sunshine Coast Business Awards.

"In the beginning so many people told us our

zoo would not survive on the Sunshine Coast. "They said there was already a huge globally

successful zoo and we would not last 12 months. It felt a lot like David going up against Goliath. But we couldn't think about that and we just had to make the zoo survive, somehow. And now it feels incredible to think how far we have come since our early struggles.

"Being recognized as a finalist in the Sunshine Coast Business Awards was very emotional for our team," said Julie.

"It just further validated our hard work and achievement of not only moving and saving the zoo but turning it into a very successful and popular visitor destination on the coast.

[•]It was a challenging yet rewarding application process and I think sometimes we underestimate the power of the incredible story behind our zoo. One of the judges said our survival story gave her goosebumps. It felt so incredible to see our story and what we have achieved with our zoo have such an impact on these people.



"We have so much community support and it feels like this is our greatest strength.

"The locals of the Sunshine Coast are behind us and have been supporting us and we owe them so much thanks for helping us make our dream come true.'

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Doctor-developers see healthy future in

TWO doctors have opened a medical centre within their own development in Nambour amid high hopes the town is set for a resurgence.

Drs Rod Parnian and Sebastien LaFlamme went 50-50 on the multi-million dollar building opposite Coles. Mill Lane Medical Centre opened in the complex two weeks ago.

"We had a dream to build something nice and clean and modern for Nambour because we believe Nambour is the future of Sunshine Coast," said Dr Parnian, who will practice at the clinic. "I found the block and I bought it, then I called Seb and Seb said 'Yeah, I'm happy to get on board."

The doctors said Nambour was underestimated and set for major growth, especially in the build-up to the Olympics. "It is still a bit more affordable than the Coast so I think there'll be a growth and a change in demographics there," said Dr LaFlamme. "A lot of new families will settle around the area. I think it's a town that is up-and-coming. It might have been difficult for Nambour in the past decades but I think it's going to change drastically in the next decade or so."

Dr Parnian said Nambour had been dealt significant blows with the sugar mill closure and council headquarters moving to Maroochydore but he predicted things were about to change.

"I think it's a good time to get in. It's about to rise."

In fact, he had plans to develop residential/commercial projects in Price and Currie Streets.

He said the recent purchase of C-Square by Sandran Property Group and news of Rod Rod Constantinides' \$50 million plans for 60 apartments and commercial tenancies on the corner of Currie and Bury Street were clear signs investors were once more eyeing the former sugar town as a sweet investment.

Dr Parnian said only investment would overcome perceptions about Nambour which was being let down by Currie Street's empty shops.

"Currie Street is a very sad, depressed street and when people see it now, it gives the wrong impression. It puts them off," he said.

"And it attracts a lot of the wrong crowd around that area. But if development happens it will change the face of the whole town."

Elevator car parking system

"Council wasn't very welcoming. They had a lot of concerns but we got through.

"We engaged an Australian company which uses the German technology and we installed them for around \$32,000 each."

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Nesting box hobby becomes a business

MAPLETON'S Hank Wade has been providing nesting boxes for local feathered and furry residents for 18 months and has turned what started out as a hobby, into a business.

"I am 89 years old, so I am not going full tilt, but it is very rewarding and a nice bit of pocket money as well," he said.

"The first boxes I made were like Austrian chalets, and I sold them at the Eumundi markets," he said.

"They were very decorative and pretty, but I realised they were probably not entirely appropriate for our native wildlife," Hank said.

"I could see there was a need for boxes for birds, possums and microbats because our local forests are too young to provide enough natural hollows - they can take 100 years to form. Nesting boxes fill a real need in our environment," Hank explained.

"So I did some research and thanks to a number of wildlife organisations such as WIRES, The Department of Wildlife & Conservation, Wildlife Rescue South Coast, Birds in Backyards, Birdlife Australia and others who were willing to provide plans and ideas, I have come up with a number of templates for 'made for purpose' nesting boxes.

ORIGINALLY Mill Lane was not a through-road connecting Mitchell Street with Arundell Avenue. It serviced the sawmills there, one of which was the Moreton Central Sugar Mill Sawmill which operated from 1912 to 1928. It supplied timber, joinery, ironmongery and plumbing at the 'lowest possible price'.

One of its employees was Harry Mellor who learnt his trade from a Canadian. At the mill, the huge saw blades from

Canada would buckle with the heat of cutting through the giant logs and it was Harry's job to hammer them flat.

On 6 March 1928, the sawmill joined other mills in the area, blowing its whistle to alert



HE 2nd Light Horse Regiment -Woombye Troop staged the annual Beersheba Day Parade on Sunday which marked the 105th Anniversary of the famous 1917 mounted charge.

Following is the address by Lieutenant Colonel Craig Malcolm from the 2nd/14th Light Horse Regiment (Qld Mounted infantry) based at Gallipoli Baracks Enoggera.

"This year marks the 105th anniversary of the famous charge of the Australian Light Horse at Beersheba. Each year, here, at this memorial, the community gathers to remember the charge of two regiments, the 4th and the 12th.

"The Battle of Beersheba took place on the 31st October 1917, as part of a wider British offensive, known as the Battle for Gaza. The final phase of this all-day battle was the famous mounted charge by the 4th Light Horse Brigade.

"General Edmund Allenby, the newly arrived British commander of the Egyptian Expeditionary Force, planned to attack Beersheba using mounted troops of the Desert Mounted Corps, under Australian commander, Lieutenant-General Harry Chauvel, and with British troops of the 20th Corps, mostly infantry. The greatest problem for Chauvel was to find sufficient water in the Beersheba area for his mounted troops. Allenby had insisted that Beersheba must be captured on the first day of operations. On the night of the 30th of October, 40,000 Allied troops moved towards Beersheba by night over 40 kilometers.

"One soldier, Private Hunter, wrote in his diary, 'The dust was terrible. One could not see

beyond his horse's head. Those horses braved the journey, which was about 36 miles. I walked at my horse's head for about 10 miles of flat ground, giving him a rest'.

"The horses were carrying heavy packs, on average, about 120 kilograms, and their riders knew there was little water available until Beersheba. On the 31st of October, British horses attacked the Turkish positions, supported by sustained artillery bombardment by over 100 artillery pieces.

'Use your bayonets as swords. I wish you the best of luck.

"By one o'clock, they'd driven the Turks from their offensive position, to the west and southwest of Beersheba. However, the wells were still in the hands of the Turkish forces. The wells of Beersheba were vital for the welfare of the Desert Mounted Corps, many of whom's horses hadn't had water for days.

The enemy resistance to Tel El Saba, three kilometers to the east, had been stronger than expected. And after stiff fighting by the New Zealanders and Australians, they captured the strong fortifications protecting Beersheba's eastern flank. "It is said that with only a few hours of daylight remaining, Chauvel decided to send the 4th Light Horse Brigade straight at the remaining enemy trenches. Chauvel knew that the town must be taken before dark in order to secure the wells for the remaining forces.

"It was said that Colonel William Grant gave the order personally to the 12th Light Horse... 'Men, you're fighting for water. There's no water between this side of Beersheba and Esani. Use your bayonets as swords. I wish you the best of luck'.

"The charge was made across bare ground with the day's light fading. The advancing regiments soon closed on the main positions through dense Ottoman fire before the lead squadron dismounted on the enemy trenches and engaged in fierce hand to hand fighting.

"Trooper Edward Dengate would say, 'we got mounted, cantered for about a quarter of a mile up a bit of a rise lined up along the brow of a hill and paused for a moment. And then we went at 'em, the ground was none too smooth, which caused our lines to get twisted a bit... Captain Davies let out a yell at the top of his voice... that started them all... we spurred our horses... the bullets got thicker... three or four horses came down, others with no riders kept going, the saddles splashed with blood, here and there a man went running toward a dead 50 yards on my right. I could see the Turks' heads over the edge of the trenches squinting along their rifles, a lot of the fellows dismounted at that point thinking we were able to take the trenches, but most of us kept straight on'.

"31 light horsemen were killed in the charge, and 36 were wounded. Some originals of the brigade who had enlisted in 1914 included Edward Cleaver, and Albert Tibby Cotter, a famous Australian cricketer. At least 70 horses died in the charge. However, they continued on with Beersheba and most of its wells intact. The brigade took over 1100 prisoners, capturing four machine guns, and nine field guns.

"It also set the conditions for British forces to commence an offensive, which ultimately resulted in the defeat of Ottoman forces by combined British and Arab armies.

"Ladies and gentlemen, the rest is now history. The charge of Beersheba 105 years ago has gone down in military folklore. However, the spirit of these troopers remains ever present within the regiment I have the privilege to command. Although the horses have been replaced with tanks and armored fighting vehicles, the spirit, tenacity, and resilience of the Light Horse is unchanged. I thank you all for your attendance today... lest we forget."

Hot change takes toll on wildlife

THE hot weather is a shock to all - humans and animals.

The WILVOS 5441 6200 Hotline is receiving a number of calls pertaining to the change in weather.

Some people are concerned about the spots where possums decide to curl up and sleep for the day.

When they settle in before sunup they may be unaware that the metal roof is going to get very warm

Lack of housing is often a bigger problem than lack of food in many areas. Every tree matters!

A couple of years ago a wonderful man in Nambour put an insulated box on a shelf under the hot metal roof of his shed, where a possum daily slept.

The resident possum was most appreciative. She still loves returning there after her nocturnal adventures. No stomping around on the roof looking for a home!

We can all help our wildlife by putting out fresh water each day - up high if there are domestic pets or roaming neighbourhood cats. We hear many sad stories from people who make their back garden a wildlife haven, only to have local cats come in, killing so many birds, gliders, possums, and little reptiles. In this case you can phone Customer Service at your local Council and borrow a cat trap. Australian native animals are disappearing at an alarming rate and we all have to take responsibility in minimizing this devastation. When an animal is picked up in this weather the first inclination is to give it water. This is not a good idea. As with humans in a debilitated state it is not always possible for the animal to swallow, so the water goes directly into the lungs causing aspiration pneumonia. This is a major cause of death in baby birds and marsupials, as well as with injured adult animals. If distance prevents immediate veterinary attention, then an eye dropper can be used to administer a drop of water even just every five minutes. Holding a bowl up and tilting it is a killer!

Feds honour rail commitment for now

At least it wasn't cut, and for that I'm grateful, especially since Queensland lost just over \$1 billion in Federal Budget cuts.

Thankfully, Federal Labor has honoured the Coalition's \$1.6 billion rail commitment. It starts in the final year of the forward estimates (2026).

I'm not sure they can build 37km of rail and 700m of tunnel in that remaining timeframe, before the Olympics. But at least it's there. Here's what happened ...

The Budget tale of two tweets

Australian Treasurer Jim Chalmers handed down the first Labor budget since 2013.

In summary, we are in for hard times. His words, not mine.

The promise of a \$275 reduction in our electricity bills, made repeatedly by (now) Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has vaporised.

It's been replaced by the admission that electricity prices will increase 56% over the next eighteen months.

Gas prices are expected to increase by around 50% in just the next year.

In good news, there are indexed increases to pensions, extra paid parental leave and additional childcare subsidies.

On the day before the October 25 budget I reissued a Twitter message I first sent on 31 May as a thank you to the new Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government Minister, Catherine King, MP for Ballarat.

'Thank you for honouring the \$1.6 billion federal commitment for 37km CAMCOS rail from Beerwah to Maroochydore. Sincerely appreciated.'

I didn't receive a response when it was first tweeted in May, so, given that it was the day before the budget I thought I would send a gentle reminder.

It started on the eve of the May 21 federal election when the MP had stated that an incoming Labor government would honour the Coalition's promise of \$1.6 billion, being 50% of the cost of the 37km Beerwah to Maroochydore (formerly known as CAMCOS) rail project.

I wanted to honour her for being true to her word.

Within a few minutes of my tweet being reissued, it was liked by the Minister's Twitter account.

I read into this that the \$1.6 billion would be in the budget as committed and went onto ABC Sunshine Coast radio's Drive program hosted by Annie Gaffney, to let the world know on Monday afternoon.

Come Tuesday night, budget night and I rushed home from looking for the local Paynters Creek platypus, to witness the infrastructure announcements by the Treasurer.

As 7:30pm came and went, so did the budget speech but without the words I expected to hear.

I downloaded all the budget documents, and there's a plethora of them, searching for the words that would confirm the Minister's like.

I didn't find any.

Not one. So, at 9:43pm on Tuesday 25 October I tweeted.

'Dear Minister, The #SunshineCoast
