NAMBOUR Lapidary Club's Gemfest is shaping up to be bigger than previous years with a record number of applications for trader sites.

Museum to mark anniversaries

20 years since mill closed, 30 since museum opened

A NEW display will be opened at the Nambour museum to coincide with two important anniversaries.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Moreton Mill closure and 30 years since the formation of the Nambour and District Historical Museum Association.

A new display featuring the pulley wheels from the lift span bridge over the Maroochy River near Dunethin Rock will be opened at a combined celebration at the museum on 14 October. The mechanism was used to lift a span of the bridge so boats could pass under.

The 100-year-old heritage listed bridge which provided a crossing for the cane trains during the Coast's sugar industry days was destroyed

in the February 2022 flood.

Museum president Clive Plater said that wheels from the bridge's lifting mechanism were saved prior to the flood.

"In June 2020 the state government removed the lift span section of the bridge. It was in danger of dropping into the river," he said.

"The bits and pieces were stored by the state government. We got the option of doing

something with them after the flood destroyed the bridge."

The museum took the six pulley wheels that were used to lift the span and the handrailing from the structure along with some of the timber and has turned the pieces into a display. Clive said the wheels, which would likely

Despite fighting for 14 days in hospital, after the accident on Sunday 3 September, Dawlon could not

Principal Lisa Cutter said Dawlon was renowned for his energising smile and love for sports. Dawlon graduated from Year 6 at Burnside State School at the end of 2022.

"His passing leaves a void among staff and students alike," she said on Facebook.

"Our thoughts and condolences are with Sukai (mum), Dawlon's siblings and extended family as they mourn such a tragic loss.

"The news of Dawlon's passing is a deep hurt for all staff who worked with him during his enrolment at Burnside State School.

From storm-damaged tree to half-tonne tables ...

The 50 year journey of a gigantic timber slabs

TIMBER slabs do not come much bigger than the half-tonne monster which recently found its way to The Slab Warehouse.

The massive piece of timber, measuring about 5m by 1.4m by 100mm thick was a huge talking point at the Yandina business.

Paul Russell, who owns The Slab Warehouse with Rick Turbille and Peter Huitema, said the slab was the largest of 10 cut from a fallen red gum in a paddock at Moree in northern New South Wales.

"It came down in the '60s. The farmer was living there as a child. He couldn't remember what year but he could remember it coming down in a big storm in the '60s when he was a child," Paul said.

"He inherited the farm years later and had tried to burn it a few times. It was too hard to move and it was in the way so he'd had a couple of goes at trying to burn it and it wouldn't burn.

"Around 2010, they wanted to build a shed where the tree was and they were going to try and have another go at burning it.

"Our sawmilling contractors saw it. I think they were working in the area and they heard about it.

"It would have been hard and slow to cut into slabs. They would have cut two slabs a day if they were lucky.'

Paul said that although the tree had been dead for 50 years, the slab still needed to be kiln dried for six months at The Slab Ware-

house to remove moisture locked inside the dry exterior and to kill any living organisms, such as borers. It was also machined flat and rough edges tidied up.

The slab was recently made into a table with steel legs for a Coes Creek couple who had visited the business for a slab top for a kitchen island bench and realised it would be perfect for their home.

"It took 10 people to move, and then, only just," Paul said.

The table can seat 18 people all up, with seven on each side and two at each end.

"I wouldn't even have that many friends," he

The sale meant the Warehouse had room to get the second of the 10 slabs in, which Paul said were similar in size.

A friend of the couple who bought the first slab is keen on a table, too, but Paul said there were eight more left for anyone else who

<u>Centenary Celebrations in Maleny:</u>

Sacred Heart Catholic Church seeks help to uncover history

BUILDING Maleny's Sacred Heart Catholic church almost 100 years ago was a community effort and parishioners hope the same community will help them mark the church's centenary.

Anne Minter, one of four volunteers trying to compile the history of Sacred Heart, hopes Maleny residents past and present and their descendants can help them piece together stories of the church.

The Sacred Heart opened and was blessed on 4 February, 1924, and a booklet on its history will be released for its centenary next

Anne said Father Leo Hayes, the parish priest at Caboolture, got the ball rolling for a Catholic church to serve the growing community of Maleny.

"A lot of it was a community project. The land was donated by a parishioner at the time, Patrick Daley," she said.

"The stumps for the church were donated by a community member, John Grigor."

Measuring 61 feet long, including the vestry and porch, the timber and tin building cost 860 pounds to build. A feature was a stained glass window,

designed by Fr Hayes, featuring a cross and a boomerang rising from a waratah representing timber-getters many of whom came from New South Wales and wattle for Queensland. Anne said Archbishop James Duhig trav-

elled from Brisbane to officiate at the opening, which was marked by three Masses with Fr Hayes and Fr Albert J Wright, of Nambour.

Anne said the first wedding at the church was that of Lorna Jane Cartmill, of Maleny, to James Norman Lane, a fruitgrower, of Pomona,

Measuring 61 feet long, including the vestry and porch, the timber and tin building cost 860 pounds to build.

The original wooden church was replaced with a larger brick building in 1974, and some timber later recycled in other buildings in Maleny.

Locals George Cowie and Patsy Lusk were the first couple married in the new building,

She has trawled through the Catholic church archives in Brisbane and Caboolture in her hunt for information about 100 years of the Sacred Heart church and has searched old newspapers on Trove.

However, there are still a lot of blanks before a booklet to mark the centenary can be produced and she is keen to hear any stories from locals and find photos from those early

"What we're trying to do is do the same thing they did at the start. We're going to the community," Anne said. "We want to find out if the local people in the local community have any memories - photos or stories - particularly for the period from 1924 to 1974."

'Only one in ten make it':

Family's battle with brain cancer spurs local generosity

WHEN a call went out to frame a footy jersey for charity, Yandina Art and Framing answered.

The business framed a signed Brisbane Broncos jersey for auction at a fundraising ball for the Brainchild Foundation, which went at auction for \$3500.

The foundation provides emotional, financial and educational support for children with brain and spinal tumours and allocates funding for research into causes and treat-

Shirley Scott, an occupational therapist, of Palmview, got the jersey signed by hitting up her boss, Rachel Ownsworth, partner of Broncos hooker Billy Walters.

Shirley and her daughter, Maggie, 19, have been supporters of the Brainchild Foundation after Maggie fought and beat brain tumours eight years ago.

At 11, Maggie was diagnosed with an ependymoma, a cancerous tumour, and a ganglioglioma, which was benign, after 12 months of headaches that doctors had said were migraines.

Maggie was admitted to the Royal Children's Hospital within 24 hours of eventually undergoing an MRI scan but the odds were not on

"We were told she'd be blind. We were told she probably wouldn't survive. Only one in 10 make it," Shirley said.

Maggie underwent six rounds of surgery plus radiation and not only survived but was fortunate to retain her vision, although she still lives with some after-effects.

Her oncologist, neurosurgeon, clinic nurse and theatre nurse were involved with Brainchild so she and her mum have made it their mission to support the organisation as a way of giving back.

After hustling the signed Bronco's jersey, Maggie rang 92.7 MIX FM seeking help to frame the jersey.

Framer extraordinaire Charmaine Temple-Smith heard the call over the radio and hit up her boss, Bill Gissane, at Yandina Art and Framing, who agreed they should do it.

At the same time, listener Gayle Jones, of Caloundra, offered to pay for the framing, so the job was done at cost price.

"We've just happy to be able to offer our support in a positive way," Bill said.

Eyeing off the finished product on Friday, Broncos fan Maggie was keen to bid for it herself but said she would not mind if it was out of her price range. "I would be happy if it goes for a lot. That would be amazing. The Brainchild Foundation is amazing.'

Fittingly it was Maggie's neurosurgeon, Dr Gert Tolleson, pictured below with Maggie, who made the winning bid on the weekend.

"We had a beautiful night with lots of tears and happiness," said Shirley.

Volunteers needed at Nambour op shop to keep kids smiling

MOST OF us do not have the skills to repair children born with cleft lips or cleft palates but there is a way for people to help if they have time on their hands.

Helping Children Smile needs volunteers to help in its Nambour op shop, which raises money for the organisation's life-changing work.

Every year, the organisation sends a team of doctors and nurses to the Philippines to perform corrective surgery on children with cleft lips and palates.

Cleft lips and cleft palates are birth defects that occur when babies' lips or mouths do not form properly before they are born.

Malika Burke, a nurse and shop coordinator for Helping Children Smile, said cleft lips and palates meant physical and emotional difficulties for children.

"They often wear masks because they're so embarrassed but it's not just that. Yes, they can have trouble talking and eating, they can dribble, their teeth grow crooked because you need your lips to keep them in, but they're also at increased risk of choking and chest infections," she said.

Helping Children Smile began in 1996 and has sent a medical team to the Philippines almost every year since to perform corrective surgeries on about 1000 children so far.

Malika has done five trips and said being part of the life-changing work was addictive.



Jenny Grant, shop coordinator Malika Burke and Lyn Nielsen are part of the team that helps fund a team of doctors and nurses in the Philippines.

"As the ward nurse, I'll take the parents while their children are having the surgery. They are often excited because this is the last time they will see their children like that," she said.

"They love their children, no matter what, but when they see their children after surgery, they're crying, everybody's crying. There's a lot of tears of joy."

Malika said each trip cost about \$40,000-\$50,000 to send a team of about a dozen doctors, nurses and anaesthetics, plus their gear, to the Philippines for about 10-14 days.

The work is funded by the op shop, donations, and sponsorships.

Malika said help in the op shop was welcome at any time but the shop was currently short on Tuesdays all day and Wednesdays and Fridays from noon until 3pm.

Donations of good quality clothing, homewares and bric-a-brac are welcome and can be dropped off at the shop in Currie Street. Cash donations and sponsorships can be arranged

OWEN Bennedick's son is missing and he does not know what else to do so he is doing what he normally does. Owen is keeping the Wappa Falls Observatory, at Yandina, open six-and-a-half days out of seven and hoping Jonothan will rejoin him

"He's always helped me with the place so it might be good for him to see it's open in a story like this," Owen said.

Jonothan, 35, left Yandina on Sat-

urday, 2 September, and was last seen at Tin Can Bay on Saturday, 9 September.

Police believe him to be with his vehicle, a silver-coloured Hyundai Accent with Queensland Registration 050 JX.

Owen said Jonothan, who had lived with him for the past 20 years, had been having a rough time

of late and he wondered if his son would ever come home.

"He was in a pretty bad frame of mind when he left," he said.

He said this was the third time Ionothan had left but the longest he had been away.

"He had a bit of a breakdown. Too much of a breakdown. He went to Mt Morgan and came back and took off again."

He said Jonothan had not touched his bank accounts since he left this time and could be living off other funds but his phone was not on and attempts to pinpoint its location had so far been unsuccessful.

Maleny mourns the loss of community dynamo **Gail Denver**

MALENY might be well known for its sense of community but Gail Denver was one of the people who put that spirit into the town.

Sport, the arts, agriculture, history, fundraising – Gail was involved in more community organisations and activities than most.

After finishing school, Gail went on to study fine arts in Brisbane but her studies were interrupted when she was diagnosed with Hodgkins

"They didn't think she would survive but she did," Simon said.

While Simon and Jane both enjoyed acting and performance, Gail was not one for the stage and instead ran the family business, Maverick Musicals and Plays, publishing musical and play scripts.

But act she could, the cricket fan once talking her way into the members' pavilion at the 'Gabba during an Ashes test on the pretence of being England bowler Graham Dilley's

"We sat there all day drinking gin and tonics," said Simon, who posed as a reporter from the Yorkshire Post in the same escapade.

While Simon's career involved a lot of travel in Australia and south-east Queensland, and Jane travelled overseas, Gail made her home in Maleny with her partner, Jim Cossins, and their son, Tom, born 30 years ago.

Gail was president of the Friends of Pattemore House, president of the Maleny Players for nearly a decade, was a committee member of the Maleny and District Sport and Rec Club, was heavily involved with the Fairview Cow Bails restoration project, the Maleny Selectors Green development committee, and the Maleny Australia Day Expo, and was a beef cattle steward at the Maleny Show for more than 30 years.

She was also instrumental in organising the Mighty Maleny Maulers, a rag-tag local cricket team which took on local MP Andrew Powell's 11 once a year in a charity

Simon said his sister loved Maleny and always found time to get involved in things.

Refreshments, including coffee and food will be available to walkers.



Brockhurst Road Delays Pile Up:

Bridge repair work extended beyond original timeline

A NAMBOUR road closed for rail bridge works since April is now expected to re-open in November, five months after the original forecast.

Repairs to the Brockhurst Road rail bridge have been an ongoing saga since damage to the bridge was detected during a routine inspection on March 26.

The bridge was closed for repairs and buses used to ferry rail passengers between Nambour and Yandina.

At the time, Queensland Rail said Brockhurst Road would be temporarily closed for three months to allow the bridge structure to be repaired while rail traffic resumed at normal speed on the bridge.

But three months has turned into more than six as the bridge works have dragged out.

Work on the Brockhurst road rail bridge that were supposed to take place in August have now been scheduled for the weekend of 14 and 15 October.

In a statement, QR's acting head of south-east Queensland Neil Backer said the work had not proceeded as planned due to employee availability.

The statement did not outline why employees were unavailable during a planned track closure although there was speculation on social media that engineers had been on strike.

Work can only be undertaken during a track closure when no trains are operating," Mr Backer said.

"Queensland Rail apologises for the delay to these works and appreciates

the community's continued patience while this important work is carried

"The works will now take place on Saturday 14 and Sunday 15 October, during a planned track closure.

"The road is expected to reopen to the public in November 2023, subject to the completion of finalisation works, weather conditions and operational requirements."

The road closure has been a nightmare for those living in the residential pocket between National Park Road and Tuckers Creek Drive.

Traffic which normally would have run along Zealey and Brockhurst Roads to Duhs Road has been diverted along Spring Myrtle and Vincent Drive, and at times ended up in Pollys Place, a cul-de-sac.

QR has undertaken to update the community as soon as a date to reopen Brockhurst Road has been confirmed. Mr Backer said the damage to the

bridge was likely caused by an overheight vehicle striking the 4.7m high "We want to remind drivers to

please plan your route in advance and know your trucking height," he said.

From grief to inspiration: A nature-based, colour technique to overcome depression

A NAMBOUR couple who find optimism through nature have released the latest in a series of books in a quest to share their technique for staying positive.

Lorraine Roberts' latest book, Colour in Nature: And the positive messages and words that come to mind, is a colouring book aimed at primary school children.


The book explains the Roberts' Balance with Colour technique, which they developed themselves while learning to cope with day-to-day negativity that came on top of their personal trauma and grief.

The technique involves choosing daily a colour from nature,

matching it with an object in nature, associating a positive action word with it, and finding a way to incorporate that word in their activities for the day.

"Lorraine discovered the technique in 2019 after the death of our son, James, a Sydney-based artist, working at the Opera House, who was cycling to the station, fell off his bike and hit his head and never recovered," said Bob. "James loved the colours of the natural world and we have made it our mission to share the technique with the community on his behalf.

Knowing James loved colours and nature, Lorraine one day was looking out to our garden, when she

suddenly described to me the message that was coming to her from just looking at colour in nature. And so, the Balance with Colour concept and technique were born. 'Nature is giving us the inspiration, because colour is there for a reason, and it costs nothing.' Lorraine told me," Bob said.

The Roberts published their first book, Balance With Colour to avoid sliding into depression, in 2019.

The Balance With Colour technique is simple and easy to learn and can be practised every day to quickly become a habit.

Lorraine authors the books, which Bob, a retired educator/ editor, edits. They sell their books

and other materials, that are teaching and learning aids, to cover the cost of spreading their message worldwide because they want to help others avoid sliding into depression and to calmly cope with the barrage of negativity thrown at all people in everyday life. These aids enable them and others to share the concept and technique.

There is a video of the same title available on YouTube to go with this latest book. They would like to see the technique used in the homes and taught in our schools.

KATIJA Wilkinson could not find a gym where she could take her kids and feel a sense of community. So she opened her own.

where the focus is not only on building women who have fit and strong bodies, minds, hearts and friendships.

"I make them work really hard but next weekend, we're doing paint and sip together,"

"There's two ladies classes in the morning and another at 5.30pm so they don't necessarily see each other so we'll get together and have a chat for an hour and a few drinks, and the weekend after that, we might do a climb up Mt Coolum."

The sense of community saw many members chip in to help Katija relocate the gym.

'We had the best class on a Friday morning,

and everybody from the gym, all the girls rallied their husbands and moved everything from 10am to 3.30pm when I went to pick the kids up from school," Katijia said.

"It's such a beautiful community we've got." Fit Kat offers weights, bootcamp sessions, yoga, plus occasional workshops on health matters such as nutrition and hormones.

While Katija also offers one-on-one personal training, most of her women pick and choose from a menu of classes at \$50 a week.

A NAMBOUR small business has set bakeries throughout Australia on notice with its result in a national contest.

Proprietor Chris Storr, who has put in long hours since opening the store in Currie Street, was very happy with the "It's only our first year in the competi-

tion. We'll find ways again to make some improvements and grow our product and get a placing next year," he said.

Chris said making a good sausage roll started with using good quality ingredients.

"We make our own pastry. We don't buy it in. It's all made here," he said.

"A lot of sausage rolls are made with a lot of breadcrumbs. We do have breadcrumbs but we don't load them with breadcrumbs. "Most of ours is meat. It's meat that has the

priority. And then you have onions, carrot, and a few spices to give it that extra flavour." The bakery's entry was made on site and then couriered to Sydney for the contest,

where products were judged both cold and hot. The Gourmet Storr has only been open as a retail bakery for about eight months.

Chris has been a baker for 24 years. head baker at the Hyatt Regency Coolum in the resort's hey-day.

About three years ago, he went out on his own, baking wholesale goods in a hired commercial kitchen.

The business grew to the point that he needed to find a more permanent arrangement, hence the move to Nambour and an unplanned switch from wholesale to retail.

"People kept asking us when we were going to open so we put out some trestle tables with what we had on a Saturday," he said.

"Then people kept asking when we were going to open every day."

Chris employs a baker, a senior staffer, and several juniors. The Gourmet Storr was open seven days a week but with bakers hard to find, Chris has pulled back to six days a week to cope with the workload.

The sunflowers' tenacity and the magnificent show enthused Tracey enough that she put in some zinnias last year.

Tracey had more flowers than she knew what to do with so she started selling them for 50 cents a stem to pay for more fertiliser.

This year, she has planted about 30 sorts of flowers, including carnations, strawflowers, stock, delphinium, foxgloves, calendula and sweet peas.

"Last year, I realised I could grow flowers. I love them. I love it. I did more this year and it ended up being wildly successful and I have far too many," she said.

Tracey picks flowers every day to encourage more flowers and stem growth suitable for cut blooms, something she learned in a workshop with Gail Farlow, of Farlow's Floriculture.

She works with her husband, Matt, in Hill Built Joinery, and they have two boys, aged 12 and 14, but has discovered a hobby for the first time in her life and loves it.

"It's the very best thing. It's really exciting for me to have a hobby for the first time in 34 years and that makes me happy, and that makes everyone else happy.'



This week we are talking about Rosellas. The strangely shaped bright red fruit is made into a deliciously tangy jam. As a bonus, rosella jam always fetches a healthy price.

Grow your own rosellas and create delicious jam

Let's make rosella jam together! Firstly, we need to grow the fruit. This is the perfect time of year to get your rosella seed-

lings in the ground, so let's get planting.

Rosellas are easy to grow and they are a hardy plant. Pests don't usually seem to bother with them and they aren't too fussy about the

soil either. They do like to be well watered and mulched though. Rosellas are a cousin of the hibiscus. They will need a sunny spot and the bush itself gets quite large and round, so it will need space to grow. Each bush will yield many kilos of fruit. Many of the nurseries will sell rosella seedlings now. After your rosella seedlings are in the ground, start collecting jars for your jam. You will also need sugar, so

when you are at the shops, occasionally buy a 2kg sugar. This way you will have all you need in a few months when we start picking fruit and making the jam. Look after your seedlings, keep them damp and watch them grow. After Christmas they will start to get tiny fruit on them and I will share with you my jam recipe so you can enjoy your own yummy jam.

If planting rosellas this week is your first gardening experience or maybe you have been growing them for years already, I am sure we can all learn from each other. The beauty about life is to share what you know, pass on tips and tricks, how to save etc. That way we all get the best outcome.

Introducing 'This Old House':

New series traces Blackall Range's architectural legacy

VERY house tells a story, and Montville's architectural gems have a rich tapestry of tales to share. Stepping into the world of "This Old House", readers are invited on a journey through time, exploring Montville's historical homes.

From the 1880s on Montville's first white settlers were selectors and the very first buildings were crude bark huts reflecting the extreme hardship in building a farming community from virgin scrub.

However, as the area prospered, the settlers built to reflect this prosperity and substantial family homes dating from 1896 through to the early 1920s were estab-

In contrast, later homes were modest in the war years and the depression years between the wars.

Many of these old houses

lived-in. Some offer insight into life during the first 50 years of settlement. Some capture the farming community of the second 50 years. Others reflect the commercial adaptability of homes to accommodate tourism and an aging demographic.

In some cases, old houses have been extended, remodelled, renovated or even demolished and replaced. Their histories are unique and intriguing and in every case, each old house deserves to be remembered.

Chermside House: A stunning landmark of Flaxton's rich past

■HIS old house stands majestically at 11 Flaxton Mill Road on the corner of what used to be Mill Road and Flaxton Drive.

It has been there for over one hundred years and along with the bamboo clump opposite, has acted as the landmark to guide many unfamiliar travellers to their destinations.

It is the place where Flaxton residents once met to thrash out the important decisions which would ultimately affect their futures.

During the early 1900s, 'Dixon's Place' was the hub of the community and much of Flaxton's history is inexorably tied to this architecturally attractive edifice and its pleasant garden surrounds.

Pioneer settler of Buderim, Joseph Chapman Dixon, selected 784 acres (317ha.) of land at Flaxton in 1881 and began by harvesting the cedar and beech trees and clearing the virgin forests.

He planted citrus and bananas and built up a herd of dairy cows. Isolated and with no mod-cons, the family did not take up residence there until 1905.

In 1908, they moved from their original pit-sawn house to the comfort of their newly constructed house which they named Chermside.

Building a house in this remote place serviced by nothing more than bush

tracks was in no way an easy

Fortunately, pit sawyers were working in the vicinity and were able to supply some of the sawn timber including the beech-wood flooring. According to Pugh's Almanac, C.J. Wyer was already operating a sawmill at Flaxton in 1900, and so the builders had another local source of supply.

Built for coolness

Like most Queensland colonial style houses, Chermside was built for coolness which meant high ceilings and spacious verandahs.

The wide front verandah affords views across to the coastal towns of Caloundra and Mooloolaba.

Before the Flaxton Provisional State School opened in 1922, Dixon's verandahs often became the venue for dances and social evenings.

The house was frequently made available to host meetings and special events and ladies of the CWA met there on numerous occasions.

Chermside was surrounded by superb gardens of trees shrubs and flowers, the handiwork of Alice Dixon.

When Alice died in 1927, the Nambour Chronicle paid tribute to her work in creating this beautiful oasis.

The article also mentioned the Dixon's hospitality in providing for many distinguished visitors which included State Governors, past and present.

When J.C. Dixon Snr. died in 1929, his son Joseph Jnr. took

New owners Matthew and Sarah Clarke at what was Tanderra House but which they renamed Chermside, as it was

over the farm and he and his family moved into Chermside.

originally known.

They maintained the house, gardens and out-buildings for many years.

After the Dixon era, the house was converted into a bed and breakfast and renamed Tanderra, purportedly an aboriginal word meaning restful.

Some additions and modifications were carried out, but the house still retains most of its original colonial appearance and charm

Beautiful gardens

The gardens, once overgrown are now restored and the camphor laurels, palms, bunyas and frangipani remain as reminders of times long past.

In more recent times Tanderra was purchased by Joseph and Alice Dixon's great, great grandson and his wife.

As a tribute to the Dixon families, they changed the name of this historic home back to Chermside and are proud to be part of its story.



IT'S been a very hectic week in the egg incubator. WILVOs have had a number of calls about nests that have been abandoned for some reason, in one case with a dead parent found nearby.

WILVOS are the only wildlife organization on the Sunshine Coast to have offered a 24 hour Hotline for so many years. Others try, but it is not easy maintaining a roster and all the work that goes with it. But we have wonderful, willing volunteers who want to have training in Hotline duty, transport or learning how to care for our native animals.

Back to the incubator. There was an odd noise coming from somewhere when I was getting food ready for the little orphaned wallaby, possum and feathertail glider. I looked in the egg incubator and there was the little lone lorikeet egg, all hatched.

I was glad that it had hatched first as the

other occupants were all much larger and could have trampled the little egg. A week later this little one is tiny but thriving.

Six days later it sounded like there was an elephant in the egg incubator. This time one of the four plovers had hatched. More plovers! This was closely followed by his sibling and within 24 hours, all four eggs had hatched. I am just thankful they learn to self feed very quickly, as they do with their parents.

Now there are just 11 wood duck eggs. They will be a handful if all hatch.

Thank you as always to people who are so observant of wildlife in their backyard.


