THE Nambour Lapidary Club will be playing host to the 2022 Gemfest at the Nambour Showgrounds this Saturday (October 8) from 8am to 4pm.

Brazen thieves target businesses

NAMBOUR shop owners are struggling to come to terms with a series of break-ins last week.

Vapers Den in Queen Street, Golf Programs Australia (GPAI) in Currie St, Crafters Heart Cafe in Price Street, the CWA Hall in Short Street and some shops at Nambour Plaza (Free Choice Tobacconist and Donut King) were targeted on Thursday and Friday nights.

There is CCTV footage of the raids and Crafters Heart Cafe owner Jamie Brady says he knows who was responsible. "I confronted him the other day. But what are you going to do? He's just a young kid."

Jamie, a Social and Youth Worker, renovated and created the not-for-profit cafe and op shop at 44 Price Street with his partner Josie Heslop.

Jamie was philosophical about the break-ins and said it was part of a larger problem. "The reason we started the enterprise was to help these young kids," he said. "That's why we are here. It's the sort of thing I used to do as a kid. But I changed. I chose a different path and we want to help these kids do the same.

"Only thing is we don't have any money to fix what's broken, so we just have to deal with it for now."


He said the thief or thieves broke in Thursday night and then returned Friday gaining access via a different point.

"Thursday they came in under the roller door. They pried it up and rolled under. So then we put a bolt on it and got a new till, because they took the first one.

said thieves also targeted his shop Thursday night and then returned Friday.

But Darrell said he beefed up his already-comprehensive security after the first break-in and they were unable to gain entry the second night.

"We have security cameras," he said. "Most of the places do.

"The police have one perpetrator's fingerprints and identified him as a 51-year-old, apparently.

"It's obviously a gang, even though there's one fellow who seems to be significant on the footage. I believe he's assisted by a whole crew.

"They smashed our till and took \$100 and they took some tools and tried to break in to our charity bus's fuel tank.

"So I think the first visit was to just do recon (reconnaissance) and find out what they could possibly get the next night.

"I can see where they've tried to break in the second night. They fiddled with our security lights and I can see where they tried to gain access again. But it was too strong, I'd really secured it."

Darrell was hopeful forensics could match

up prints found at other break-in sites.

Worryingly, he said the brazen perpetrators did not appear to be worried by cameras, alarms or sensor lights.

Darrell's wife Michelle was frustrated with the situation. She said Nambour used to have a night watchman to patrol the streets and she wanted businesses to consider a return to that initiative.

"We need a night watchman wbecause there's not enough activity at night on the street," she said. "When we go around at night, it's all quiet and businesses are just such sitting ducks."

The couple said they had noticed an increase in illegal activity in Nambour in recent months.

"Six months ago or thereabouts, we had a new crew come into town and I think they're increasing their drug distribution and I think

they're targeting young people," said Michelle. Darrell said the broader issue was that the police were tied up seeing to domestic violence issues and pressure needed to be exerted at the political level.

Michelle said it took them three years to raise funds to fit out the bus, which was damaged in the raid.

"We haven't come to terms with what we're going to do yet," she said.

Police have CCTV footage of suspect

OFFICER in Charge Nambour Police Station Senior Sergeant Gary Brayley said police were investigating the spate of CBD break-ins.

"We definitely had quite a severe spike in break-ins Thursday night-Friday morning," he said.

"But we have secured some CCTV footage and our enquiries are continuing in respect to all

of those. We've only got one person depicted in the Nambour footage at this stage. That's not to say there aren't more. "We've got a few ideas

"We've got a few ideas of who it might be but we can't confirm the identity of any suspect at the moment."

Sen Sgt Brayley encouraged people with information or

CCTV footage to come forward. "If your business has any useful CCTV footage, or if you can review footage taken between 11pm Thursday evening and 6am Friday morning, if you see any suspect characters in that footage give us a call." Sen Sgt Bravley said Yandina had also had a

"We had two spikes in break and enters in Yandina in the previous couple of weeks too. And we have charged a juvenile regarding those, and we do have another suspect. And similarly those enquiries are continuing. It's possible the Yandina offences and these ones are linked but I've got nothing concrete to confirm that."

Sen Sgt Brayley said Nambour State College was also broken in to on the weekend and some damage done to the admin block "but that may not be connected to the other break-ins".

"We worked hard to get that bus and it was ready to go for our fundraising, and now we don't know what we're going to do."

Machete attack also reported

Meanwhile, police will continue investigating a machete attack in Nambour at the weekend.

A man aged in his 20s suffered a wound to his arm after being slashed by a machete in Huntingdale Drive in Nambour on Sunday October 2.



THE move is over. The doors have been open is a fun place for little kids and it's a fun outing for a few weeks in its new premises at Majestic Cinemas. And now it's down to just the fin-

ishing touches as Sunshine Coast Pinball prepares for its October 14 official Grand Opening.

Owner Vaughan Jones said he was always confident the move from the former Currie Street location to upstairs next to the cinema made sense, and early indications are he was right.

"Just in the last week or two I've gone, 'Wow, it's going to be okay'," he said. "Because we weren't sure. Everything's a bit of a gamble, isn't it? But we can see the support is here for it. The feedback has been really strong, which is the most important thing. People are coming in and looking at the new venue

and saying, 'Wow, this is awesome. Well done'. "There were almost no reasons not to move here. The big takeaway for us is the huge dedicated bar/servery area, which gives us the opportunity to do everything from selling beers and spirits on tap through to making milkshakes and things like that. We couldn't do that at our other shop. There's also a big kitchen here for us to fire up. That will be like a phase-two of our launch – hot food and seated dining and things like that."

The Nambour arcade is considered to be a benchmark venue for Australian Pinball, one of the best in the country for enthusiasts.

But Vaughan said it continued to appeal to everyone from youngsters to serious players. "It

> players, players who are developing, youth players and competitive players. It operates on a lot of levels."


> Certainly, players of all levels will enjoy the latest pinball machine, Medieval Madness.

"For a lot of our members the next stage is to create settings in silver into which these beautiful gems can be set. They make wonderful, meaningful gifts for a loved one, family members and friends," he said.

"Alternatively they can be sold off at Gemfest and there will be many examples of our members' work offered at reasonable prices.'

For people interested in lapidary, the Nambour Club provides gem polishing instruction and has a professional silversmith who undertakes silversmithing courses in the clubhouse.

"There is a fee to do the silversmithing course and students are required to become club members so they can continue to use our facilities once their course is completed," said Mr Millington.

Small batch label wins big at Gin Distillers Awards

A small batch distillery nestled in rural Towen Mountain founded by two nurses, has been recognised at the recent 2022 Australian Gin Distillers Association Awards.

Kate Gibney and Megan Coffey only launched Steampunk Distillery in July last year but have already been recognised nationally for their Gin and Vodka.

Steampunk Distillery won two Silver and a Bronze award for the three Gins submitted to the Australian Gin Distillers Association Awards under Classic Dry Gin, Contemporary Style Gin and Over Proof/ Navy Gin.

Megan said the awards meant a great deal to the relative beginners. "This is fantastic validation for our

efforts, ultimately it is the ongoing and positive feedback from our customers who have found us and our spirits which gives the greatest joy,' she said.

Kate said the pair enjoyed experimenting with new flavours and incorporating botanicals from their property, and from local producers.

"Now spring is here, we have the return of our Rhuby Myrtle Pink Gin, a fan favourite. We keep this gin seasonal, so we can incorporate

locally grown handpicked botanicals, and avoid using colour enhancers or fixatives for a pale blushing pink.

"Connection to our community and quality of our product is highly important to us.'

Steampunk Distillery has a gin or vodka to suit most palates, five of which are staple. The range includes 'Matron' (Navy) Gin, Rhuby Myrtle Gin, Lemon Eucalypt Gin, Dry Gin, CardaBOM Gin, Vodka, Kaffir and Ardent Vodka. The nurse distillers also produce Limoncello, another fan favourite.

"All of our spirits are grape based, with our vodka fermented from grape concentrate," said Kate.

"We distill the vodka three times to produce an incredibly delicious, smooth, clean taste."

Steampunk is a craft micro-distillery, meaning it only produces 35-100 bottles at a time. It offers a rural tasting experience tucked away in Towen Mountain.

In addition to this year's recognition, Kate and Megan were awarded Silver at last year's Australian Distilled Spirits Awards for their Lemon Eucalypt Gin and Vodka.

Steampunk Distillery Vodkas and Gins are locally stocked at 1887 Bottleshop in Nambour and Yandina. You can also enjoy them at Frankies Woombye, Rick's Garage and Chew Chew Bistro in Palmwoods. The range is also available at select independent bottle shops and bars on the Sunshine Coast.


"St Francis was a 12th century Saint who loved the animals and natural world and preached that they are our sisters and brothers on the journey through life," said Rev Bird.



Yandina bowlers raise \$660 for cancer care

CLUB Yandina – Yandina Bowls Club members have proved they have hearts of gold donating \$660 to Bloomhill Cancer Care.

The donation comes in the wake of the passing of several members to the disease. "Sadly, we've had quite a few of our bowling

members pass away in recent years to cancer, said Chairman Leon Granzien.

"One of our most recent was Wayne Cottrell, who was our part-time greenkeeper.

"We decided to have a Memorial Bowls Day called Cottys Day, which we held earlier in the year.

"Since then, we decided we'd have a Memorial Day to include all our bowlers who have passed.

"The wife of our bowling member, Ash Smith, had a cancer scare and I know that she was cared for by Bloomhill. "It was his suggestion to the Board of Management that for the recent Memorial Day, we donate part of the proceeds to Bloomhill.

"I don't see why, in the future, we wouldn't have an annual Memorial Day and make a donation once a year to Bloomhill."

Bloomhill Donations and Fundraising Manager Tessa Biddles thanked Club Yandina for its kindness.

"Bloomhill runs on the proceeds of 10 op shops and on donations. Around 25 percent of our income is donations," she said.

"This level of donations make a huge difference to actually being able to provide people with the care services that we do.

"Please know that this is a huge donation to us, so thank you."

Bloomhill CEO Christopher John agreed \$660 went a long way in caring for a cancer patient.

"On average it costs us \$1400 a year to provide subsidized care and support for an entire year for a client," he said.

"So \$660 is equivalent to about six months of care for a client. It goes a long way.

"Six months for some of our clients may help get them through a range of chemotherapy.

"To be able to provide that subsidised support through those months of treatment is a significant thing that will make a difference.

"When we talk about it being meaningful, that's what we mean."

Back in 1992, a group of Burnside residents asked the Police Service to approve the foundation of a Neighbourhood Watch group, to act as a community hub, sharing information on Crime Prevention, Home Security and Personal Safety.

A newsletter was distributed and the group held meetings in the Hibiscus Retirement Resort in Carter Road every two months, building a local network of keen eyes and ears to help Police combat crime and help residents feel safer.

Eight years ago, group meetings were moved to the Burnside State Primary School, and an enlarged quarterly newsletter was produced, along with increased use of Social Media to spread the word and meet increasingly IT-driven community expectations.

So to mark this milestone, we're seeking information to help us write the story of how we began 30 years ago, who started the ball rolling and what inspired them.





Nambour mourns loss of driving force in local sport

Vale Fay Gibson, Nambour

FAY Gibson was born Fay Marina Evans and grew up on a property in Jondaryan, just west of Toowoomba. It was here her love of sport began, playing tennis against her 6 older brothers and sisters from a young age. She moved to Nambour at the age of 12 and in her late teens made it to the top division of the Maroochy Tennis Competitions.

She was introduced to badminton at the age of 17 and this quickly became her passion. When she was 18, she won the Sunshine Coast Badminton Association (SCBA) Open ladies singles winning 10 times until she was 32. During those earlier years while at the top she won mixed doubles with husband Lyle 16 times and the Ladies Doubles 10 times.

Throughout her sporting career, Fay had won various State titles and first played for Queensland when she was 21. She represented Qld in the open team at the Australian Championships 15 times. Despite major setbacks with two broken Achilles tendons and bouts of ross river fever, she continued representing her state in the open team until she was 39. She also competed in the Australian Masters in 1991 and the world masters in 1994 at 55.

Along with her sporting achievements, 'Mrs Gibbo' focused on what she could give back, volunteering with Sunshine Coast sporting organisations for over 60 years through roles as President, Secretary, Treasurer and Fundraiser.

Fay was a driving force to achieve the construction of a hall for Badminton at the Nambour Showgrounds. Fay steered a SCBA fund-raising committee from 1970 and organised catering at local Balls and the Nambour Show for over 20 years as well running canteens for Badminton for the majority of 40 years of her involvement. She also took on running the Nambour Cricket


for 30 years.

Once the new hall was built, Fay was booking officer from 1976, taking on extra roles in the early stages of vacuuming, stocking the fridges and even cleaning the toilets.

Sunshine Coast Council Division 10 Councillor David Law said he was pleased to work with the community and their pooches to deliver a new dog off leash area close to town.

"The new fenced site offers the community a good overall layout to enjoy time outdoors with their furry companion in a well-located area away from other park users," Cr Law said.

"The space is easily accessible for all our community members, with ramps and rails. It's also close to car parking while being far enough away from the main road and traffic to give our dog owners ease of mind.

"Council's records show there is one dog registered for every seven people and that's why there was a strong need for a dog offleash facility in the local area – considering the nearest unfenced dog off-leash area is Petrie Park, Nambour and the nearest fenced facility is at Federation Park, Palmwoods.

"I would like to thank long-time Mapleton local and advocate for the project, Hank Cedric Wade, who championed this project, as well as the many community members who provided feedback last year to help determine their favoured site."

Following community feedback in 2019, the community identified three potential locations for a dog off leash area.

In March 2021, council sought further feedback to determine the preferred location being Mapleton Lilyponds Park.

Mr Wade said he was pleased to see the gates

Howzat? Nev pads up for Palmwoods Cricket Club at 79 years of age

AT 79 Woombye's Nev Kratzmann is still at the crease. He's padding up for Palmwoods Cricket Club this weekend. The club games are in addition to his commitments to the Queensland over 70s side.

"I still enjoy the game. I'm going to play for Palmwoods this year in the fixtures on Saturdays. I open the batting and bowl a bit of slow stuff (off spin)," he said.

"I'll probably play sixth grade or something like that. I don't know. They haven't picked the team yet. I'm a bit slower in the field than I used to be but they often put me in the slips."

Nev practices and exercises every day at his Woombye home in addition to regular training sessions with Palmwoods and Queensland.

"I do an hour or so every day. My wife, Anne, comes down. We've got the table tennis table down there and she's a pretty handy player. So she comes down and we have a half-an-hour of table tennis, which is pretty good. You get a good workout with that. Then I get on the treadmill, I do stretches and stuff and then I hit balls with the board. It's better than sitting and watching TV or whatever."

Clearly, sporting prowess runs in the family. Nev's son, Andrew Kratzmann, 50, played first grade on the Coast and scored a century in a game just before Christmas.

"And they said he was the oldest player to get 100 in a first grade in the Sunshine Coast comp ever," said Nev.

Nev's son, Mark, who was Junior Wimbledon, Junior US and Junior Australian champion back in the day, took up cricket again recently and captained the Sunshine Coast over 50s the season before last.

"He ended up winning player of the year for the comp. And Andrew, who played on the tennis tour as well, now plays in the over 50s cricket and has been pretty successful."

His granddaughter, Courtney Sippel, 21, plays for Queensland Fire and Brisbane Heat and made the Australia A side last year.

Nev's grandson, Jacob Dennien, 31, is cap-

tain of Tewantin-Noosa first grade and led the team to an unbeaten run last season.

Meanwhile, Nev's other two grandsons, Samuel Dennien and Jared Sippel, played A-Grade Cricket for Wests Premier Grade in Brisbane. "Wests went through and won the two-day final."

Nev said the secret to his family's sporting success came down to time spent practicing. "I think the main thing is work ethic. My daughter (Leanne Sippel) who's a bowen therapist, she's run every morning for the last two years. Hasn't missed a morning in that time, rain, hail or shine.

"We've all got ability. A lot of kids have got ability, but you've also got to have the ability to work. Watching people on the tennis tour, it was so competitive. And you've got people who come

from pretty low economic backgrounds and they're out there working. So, to keep up with those guys, we've got to work."

Nev said the most memorable game he played was for South Queensland Country in a two-day game against the Sheffield Shield side in Bundaberg. "They batted first and got 550 and gave us Sunday after lunch to get the runs. Greg Chappell got 150. It was worth being on the field just to watch that innings. But it was one time I was glad I wasn't in the team as a bowler!

"I batted number three and was in, in the first over, with two balls to face. Jeff Thompson was bowling and the only fielder in front of square on either side was Sam Trimble at silly mid-on. The first ball I was at least a metre behind it,

and Sam laughed, and I laughed too. I ended up being 14 not out when it rained and I got the trophy – a bottle of Bundaberg rum – for the highest score in our team. I hit Thommo for two fours, but he also got me on the shoulder with a bouncer."

Looking ahead, Nev is looking forward to a trip to Launceston in November for the Australian Over 70s tournament and has no plans to hang up the whites just yet.

"Travelling to England, New Zealand and South Africa with these teams and my brother, Brian, and wife Anne has been a highlight of my sporting life. I have no plans to stop anytime soon, and while I am still able, I will continue playing and enjoying this great game of cricket."

"After much consultation and travelling throughout Queensland, QCWA branches were formed and Ruth Fairfax became the founding President of the QCWA in 1922," Diane said.

Throughout the early years of the QCWA, branch members helped many rural communities survive the economic depression and consequent unemployment by providing essential food and clothing to many struggling families.

During World War Two the QCWA stepped in again to lend their support to the war effort. In recent years, millions of dollars have been raised, including fundraising by CWA branches

towards various drought, flood, and fire relief appeals.

One hundred years later, the QCWA has over 220 branches operating in rural remote, regional towns and cities throughout Queensland. It is active in all states and territories throughout Australia.

"The CWA is famously known for their Tea and Scones but there is so much more to this Association, including advocacy to Local, State, and Federal governments," said Diana. The CWA raises issues such as medical and dental services, education, environment and water resources and so much more, particularly those that affect communities in remote and rural areas."

The Maleny Branch was formed in 1928 and continues to support their local community to this day. They have provided financial support to the Maleny Girls Guides, local schools Chaplaincy, shelter boxes, provided catering to members of their local Probus Club, Tea and Scones at the annual show, street stalls, information days, and fundraising for drought and flood relief.

Woombye Community Library News by Cathy Cash

THERE is no denying the Woombye School of Arts Hall incorporating the Community Library is a focal point of Blackall Street. The hall has a proud history of service to the local community, including hosting the Library in rooms at the front of the hall since 1898.

In the early years the building witnessed the formation of various sporting and community bodies, political associations, lobby groups, producer bodies, concerts and balls, magic lantern shows and the very first films to be shown in Woombye in 1906. There were also visits by evangelists and temperance crusaders. In 1924 at a meeting in the School of Arts hall the Alexandra Headlands Lifesaving Club was formed.

In 2018 the Woombye 150th anniversary celebrations saw 40 framed pictures of the hall's history placed on the walls of both halls. These provide a fascinating glimpse into the past life of the town and it's keystone "peoples" building.

These days the School of Arts hall is as busy and community focussed as ever with a varied clientele booking sessions in both the upper main hall and the smaller lower hall. There are several dancing groups, martial arts, Tai Chi, yoga and sewing groups to name a few.

At the library, we look forward to the delivery of the Woombye Placemaking Streetscape rede-

velopment which will break ground early this month. The community engagement process undertaken by council in the lead up to this project showed that people who live or work in Woombye wanted to see more shady trees, attractive green space, seating and gardens, better pedestrian access, safe crossings and improved parking. World-renown pianists return to Lucas Parklands at Montville

THE world class classical music concerts for which Lucas Parklands at Montville has become known are continuing, with maestro Piers Lane AOto headline several big-name performances from early October.

Follow up concerts in November will feature Konstantin Shamray and Kristian Chong, and in December, Daniel Le and Allie Wang.

Maestro Lane, arguably Australia's most famous classical musician, is scheduled to perform at the Sunshine Coast venue on October 5; however, he has now confirmed that he will perform a second concert for local music lovers on October 6.

In the October concerts, maestro Lane will present a mid-week recital of works by Franz Liszt and Edvard Grieg – including Grieg's Holberg Suite, Liszt's Sonata in B minor and Christmas Tree Suite 4-10, followed by Grieg's Piano Sonata.

Provisional School founded by local families

THIS one teacher school was typical of the number of small country schools in this area. A lengthy article in the *Nambour Chronical* reported that the building was the result of parents campaigning for a school and was paid for with seventy pounds raised by local families and twenty pounds from the Education Department.

The only complaint seemed to be the naming of the school. "Older residents claim that it

should be something like 'Pillawillamon' being the name got for it from the Aboriginals thereabouts, the last man of whom, known as old 'Martin', has been some time dead".

Like many other country schools, dwindling attendance forced the closure of the school in 1959 and children were transported to Nambour to complete their schooling in the bewildering environment of the 'big schools.'

Assessment reveals impact of major hinterland landslips

THE impact of a series of major landslips caused by recent weather events has been assessed with a dozen Sunshine Coast roads now facing significant repairs.

Heavy rain hit the region between February and May with the worst affected areas being Bald Knob, Wootha (west of Maleny), Glenview, Eudlo, Coolum, Peachester, Montville and Towen Mountain.

The cost of rebuilding the most damaged roads is estimated at \$15 million and could take up to two years with highest priority being given to those with the most significant impact.

Local Disaster Management Group Chair and Mayor Mark Jamieson said recovery and rectification works started immediately and would continue for some time.

"At the time of the severe weather events, council crews closed roads for our community's safety, with recovery from these severe weather events continuing for a long time after the immediate threat passes," Mayor Jamieson said.

"Geotechnical assessments have identified 12 major landslip sites that require engineered solutions and funding support.

"The assistance will be provided through the jointly funded Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA).

"Council continues to work closely with the Queensland Reconstruction Authority, all levels of government, along with emergency and community agencies, to support our community as the region navigates the long-term impacts of the flooding events."

The 12 major landslip sites across our region include:

- Policeman Spur Road, Wootha
- Bald Knob Road, Bald Knob
- Leeding Road, Glenview
- Perrins Road, Eudlo
- First Bay, Coolum
- River Road, Peachester
- Narrows Road, Montville
- Towen Mountain Road, Towen Mountain
- Hovard Road Slip 1, Bald Knob • Hovard Road - Slip 2, Bald Knob
- Tanawha Tourist Drive, Tanawha
- Old Maleny Road, Landsborough

Sunshine Coast Council Division 5 Councillor Winston Johnston thanked the community for their patience while council carried out the funding.

"Some roads have been closed or reduced to single lane access, based on preliminary reports about road stability," Cr Johnston said. "While this is inconvenient, the road closures

"While this is inconvenient, the road closures are necessary for the safety of residents and road users.

"The landslide at Hovard Road, Bald Knob has closed off the thoroughfare, and I'm eager to see repair works start soon to help minimise the impact on Bald Knob residents and surrounding communities.

"Landslip repair works include removing soil and vegetation debris, constructing mass block retaining walls, buried pile and beam walls, drainage works, road reconstruction and stabilising sloped hillsides.

"Design works have started for this job which will be a vastly complex construction project which is estimated to cost \$5 million and one that is unlikely to be completed until 2024.

"We are liaising with the affected local residents, and we are providing as much information as we can to keep the community informed throughout the construction works."

From April to June 2022, council invested \$4.4 million into our road network, rehabilitating and resurfacing 10.8 kilometres of local roads to improve community safety.

Almost \$23 million was invested on a total of 82.5 kilometres of roads across our region in the 2021–22 financial year – that's 641,418m². This year's completed works are an increase of 29 kilometres on the prior year.

Council's road safety tips

Use the Road Look Up website to find out if you should report road damage to local council or Transport and Main Roads.

Check council's Roads Hub mapping tool to check for delays before heading out on the roads.

If you see a pothole, don't assume someone else has already reported it. Do your good deed for the day and report it for the safety of other road users.

Council maintains almost 3000km of local roads and bridges throughout the region.

It's council's number one priority to keep our roads and users safe, so we have repair crews on the ground every day closely monitoring and maintaining emerging potholes.

IF you're lucky enough, as was Nature Watch photographer Don McGlusky of Diddillibah, to spot one of these spiders feeding then taking a picture is a piece of cake as they are more interested in lunch than in the photographer.

THERE are about 2100 species of crab spiders making up four different Clades throughout the world. The specie common in Australia, particularly the East Coast, belong to the Thomisus Clade. This specie is predominately either white or yellow: being able to change colour according to the flower colour. They are ambush predators hiding until a pollinator such as a bee or butterfly or other insect arrives. Their retreat is a folded leaf lined with spider silk. Its egg sacs are laid in a folded leaf, and the cream colored eggs, typically 1 mm in diameter, range between 200 and 370 in number. The body length of the female is up to 10 mm, the male 6.2 mm including legs, the spider is around 3 cm across. They are venomous causing local pain, dizziness, nausea and bite site swelling which usually subsides after about two hours. The specimen in the photo was photographed on an Alamanda flower.



Reseal program

The Division 5, 2022-23 road resurfacing and rehabilitation program has started which means you might start to notice pathways and roads being repaired. A range of roads in Maleny, Curramore, Conondale, Woombye, Witta, Palmwods, Hunchy, Bald Knob, Mooloolaba and Ilkley will undergo spray seal resurfacing, asphalt resurfacing, rehabilitation and reconstruction works. Once these works are completed by Christmas (weather and site conditions permitting), only a relatively small number of roads and streets in Division 5 will still require resurfacing and renewal. Hopefully they will be completed in 2023-24, with the occasional extra few being planned as needed in subsequent financial years.

Sunshine Coast Commuter Advocate

On Wednesday August 24 I met with Nicklin MP Robert Skelton, who won the seat at the 2020 election by 84 (two-party preferred) votes.

I arranged the meeting because I wanted him to understand the tortuous history of our single-track rail line that, to this day, still extends 39km from Beerburrum into Nambour.

The Beerburrum to Nambour (B2N) rail project was announced over four years ago.

Another rail project under consideration by the state is the 37km Direct Sunshine Coast Line (DSCL), formerly known as CAMCOS.

It was started by the Government in 2006, and stopped by them circa 2007. Apparently we need another business case to decide if it should proceed – when it had previously been fit to proceed under the Beattie Government.

No decision yet on the DSCL, with the excuse from the Transport Minister being that they need to finish the business case.

The recently announced \$62 billion Hydro-Power plan includes a 60-page glossy brochure – but no business cases.

Initial studies too, are underway for the Borumba pumped hydro and Pioneer-Burdekin pumped hydro projects – and they are announced, but the rail line isn't?

It's time for the Minister to explain this double standard.

I met with Robert Skelton and representatives from the Department of Transport and Main Roads.

We discussed aspects and short-comings of the B2N project and the advantages of duplicating rail all the way to Nambour, primarily to improve freight and our supply line to Cairns. The collateral advantage is that it will improve passenger services.

The weakest point in that 1680km line is from Beerburrum to Nambour.

The B2N Stage 2 plan is unfunded.

Stage 2 would improve freight by extending passing loops - but only for 950m long trains, still well short of the 1500m train lengths required.

Now the good news.

On Thursday 25 August in a Facebook question, a couple asked Robert:

"What about the long awaited rail duplication? When will it happen, so many people ask."

I leave you with this wonderful response from our Nicklin MP:

"I won't make any grand announcement in this. I've listened to a lot of people and also checked the facts (Jeffrey Addison ... www.facebook.com/jjaddison).

"I will make the case for duplication because it's right, it's been promised here and there by different people and parties since the time of the Bjelkie Peterson government.

"It is and always was a piece of nationbuilding infrastructure that has been needed on our eastern seaboard since Federation.

"As stated I won't comment until I have a concrete guarantee that this is happening. Understand there are a lot of pieces to pull together but if ever there is a time. It's always now.

"I will lobby hard for this as it stacks up on many levels not only for our region but the state and nation.

"I'm hopeful of the day we see trains passing each other on their way north and south." Mission accomplished.


