

Waves of visitors set to slide into Nambour's Splash Park



Slip-sliding away in time for Spring: During school holidays the new slides will be open Monday to Sunday, 10.30am to 3pm. The two new adventure water slides measure 60 and 67 metres in length.

THE Sunshine Coast's newest community water park is set to attract even more visitors to the region's hinterland heart.

Sunshine Coast Council will officially open the vibrant \$3.26 million Nambour Aquatic Centre Splash Park on Friday 16 September, boasting more than 580 square metres of healthy and active water play for people of all ages and abilities.

The complete Splash Park features a zerodepth and fully accessible splash pad along with toddler slides, water jet features and tipping buckets, two new adventure water slides measuring 60 and 67 metres in length, new landscaping, shade sails, and 44 additional car

parking spaces for pool patrons.

The new adventure water slides will officially open to the community from Saturday 17 September.

The pool and zero-depth splash pad are open as normal now.

Sunshine Coast Council Mayor Mark Jamieson said the new Splash Park would ensure Nambour remained an attractive family destination and provide a social uplift for the

"Projects like the new Nambour Splash Park connect communities, with residents now able to come together to enjoy a water wonderland in the heart of the hinterland," Mayor Jamieson

"We recognise Nambour as a vital anchor for our region. As such, the town has featured extensively in Council's \$847 million budget this financial year.

"In addition to the Splash Park and the recently awarded Nambour Forecourt Revitalisation, planning is now underway for Nambour's Namba Place Revitalisation Project which will see streetscape improvement projects on Currie Street, Howard Street and Mill Street, along with the Nambour Administration Precinct project which will further connect council with the community.

"Together, these projects provide a significant opportunity to drive renewed visitation and investment into Nambour and our surrounding hinterland communities.

Sunshine Coast Council Division 10 Coun-

cillor David Law said the multi-functional Splash Park would put Nambour on the tourism map and further cater for a growing population of hinterland residents.

"There has been an incredible appetite for the new Splash Park," Cr Law said.

"The zero-depth splash pad has been a major drawcard since opening earlier this year with little ones thoroughly enjoying water play, even during Queensland's cooler months.

"With warmer weather approaching and the addition of two huge water slides, I imagine thrill-seekers of all ages will welcome a plunge at this great facility.

"As well as providing hours of family fun, the Splash Park encourages children's physical and sensory development through interaction with water play elements.

"Together with the existing 50-metre lap pool and 25 metre indoor pool, I believe the Nambour Aquatic Centre has set a new benchmark for community waterparks in our region."

Member for Nicklin Rob Skelton said his Government was delivering for Nambour and the Sunshine Coast through the Works for Queensland Program.



Staff urged to not clog key parking spaces in main street

WOOMBYE store owners are concerned that local business employee's cars are parking illegally over the two hour limit and affecting the economy of the town.

Shop owners have reportedly urged staff to please leave the main street's more convenient car parks for customers to allow parking space turnover and more trade.

WCBA Vice-president Grant Palethorpe was aware of the issue and said his organisation had suggested to Council they send out their parking inspectors over a period of several weeks.

The idea put forward is the inspectors would not issue infringement notices, but rather leave a reminder note reiterating the new parking limits," Mr Palethorpe said.

Div 5 Cr Winston Johnston thanked Woombye business owners for taking proactive action by requesting that all staff of Woombye businesses park in areas other than the Main Street.

"In reality this matter is a no-brainer and we would all like to think that all business owners will in future ensure that their employees respect the need to keep valuable parking spaces available for customers," Cr Johnston

Mr Palethorpe said the issue of staff parking for lengthy periods seemed to come up every few months.

"It's likely around new employees to town not being aware of the time limits and the impact it has on business," he said.

"We implore business owners to remind their staff time limits for parking do apply. And they need to park away from the centre of town, whether that is Hill, Wakefield or Barts Streets. Dangerous operation and robbery charges arise from alleged rampage across Coast

POLICE have arrested a man who allegedly stole a vehicle from a woman feeding her baby at Maroochydore yesterday, charging him with more than 20 offences including at Woombye.

It will be alleged that the man broke into a number of Brisbane addresses on September 1, stealing vehicles from Morningside, Kedron and Gordon Park.

It is further alleged that the next morning around 6.20am, the same man broke into a home at Minyama and stole a Landcruiser. The Landcruiser was then witnessed allegedly travelling at speed on the wrong side of the Nambour Connection Road, forcing other drivers to take evasive action.

After abandoning the Landcruiser in Woombye around 9.20am, the man then allegedly broke into a Woombye residence where he was confronted by a female resident. The man grabbed her, demanding car keys, before fleeing the scene in another Landcruiser.

The vehicle was later abandoned at Buddina

where the man entered another home and made threats to the occupants, before stealing their Landcruiser.

He drove the stolen car to a shopping centre at Maroochydore, then on foot approached a woman sitting in a vehicle feeding a baby.

The man allegedly ordered the woman and infant from the vehicle before fleeing the scene

The stolen vehicle stopped at Sippy Downs where the alleged driver, a 35-year-old man, was immediately taken into custody.

He has since been charged with: 1 x Armed robbery (use personal violence); 1 x Robbery; 2 x Dangerous operation of a motor vehicle; 6 x Burglary; 6 x Unlawful use of motor vehicle; 1 x Enter premises and commit indictable offence; 1 x Attempted enter premises; 1 x Stealing; 1 x Attempted UUMV; 1 x Wilful damage.

He was remanded in custody and is due to appear in Maroochydore Magistrates Court, November 4.

Brad Beetson represents Artie at Allianz Stadium recognition

NAMBOUR Crushers Rugby League stalwart Brad Beetson flew to Sydney recently for a special celebration in honour of his late father, the immortal Arthur Beetson.

Artie was one of five Sydney sporting greats including Nicholas Shehadie, Betty Cuthbert, Johnny Warren and Ron Coote whose names will adorn the stadium on a "Ring of Champions" that lines the concourse of the \$828 million venue.

The new stadium opened to the public for Friday night's Round 25 match between Artie's old club, Sydney Roosters, and South Sydney Rabbitohs.

Brad said the recognition of his father represented a chance to inspire young Indigenous athletes for years to come.

"It was a great honour for the family and

another great acknowledgement of our father's legacy, not only for his contributions to the game, but as a great Indigenous Australian.

"Dad spent over 20 years with the Roosters, playing, coaching and as a talent scout.

"To think that a new generation of fans will be touched by his legacy is a great tribute to our father."

The Beetson and Coote stand is fittingly at the eastern end of the Roosters' new state-of-the-art home ground. Beetson was Rooster #615. He played 131 matches for the Club from 1971 to 1978 and is considered one of the greatest forwards to have played the game. A Rugby League Immortal, Beetson captained the club to backto-back premierships in 1974-75, earning man of the match honours in the 1974 Grand Final which ended a 29-year title drought.

Fancy a walk through the treetops?

How you can help shape Maleny's new eco-park

AS planning progresses for the proposed Sunshine Coast ecological park, Sunshine Coast Council is now calling for community input on a draft concept of the project.

Following the project's first round of community consultation in May, Sunshine Coast Council is inviting residents and visitors to have their say on the draft concept, and indicate which features they'd like to see in the proposed new park via an interactive map.

The ecological park aligns with council's commitment to nurture and grow its green spaces and is located across 65 hectares of council-acquired land, adjacent to Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve in Maleny.

Environment and Liveability Portfolio Councillor Cr Cox said the second stage of community consultation would build on earlier feedback and was an opportunity to further share, test and provide feedback on proposed ideas to help inform a draft master plan.

"The proposed Sunshine Coast Ecological Park will be the first of its kind for our community and a wonderful place for recreation and wellness, ecology and restoration, plus research, education and culture," Cr Cox said

"To ensure the project delivers the desired mix of recreation, green space and ecological conservation, this next stage of engagement will help us understand which features are a priority for our community and stakeholders.

"Our first stage of community consultation demonstrated strong support for the ecological park to create new habitat for wildlife, and incorporate the stories, history and values of the Jinibara peoples, the traditional custodians of the land.

"There were also fantastic insights around the need to consider accessibility and connec-

tivity, and incorporate designated areas for recreation and nature play.

"In line with our Environment and Livea-

bility Strategy 2017, the proposed ecological park is a unique opportunity to enhance our conservation and recreation credentials for the entire Sunshine Coast community and visitors to enjoy.

"An Excellence Advisory Panel and Community Reference Group have been established to help inform the development of a master plan and continue to provide feedback throughout all stages of the master planning process.

"Council is also working alongside Traditional Custodians to understand the cultural and traditional heritage of the site and respectfully integrate history into the design of the park.

"I'd like to thank everyone who has so far taken the time to share their views on the project.

"People can provide feedback on the draft concept until September 14, either online or by chatting to the project team at one of the pop-up events.

"The Sunshine Coast ecological park will be a beautiful place for both Sunshine Coast locals and visitors, so we'd like to hear from everyone."

The second stage of community engagement will inform the project's draft master plan, which will be shared for public comment in early 2023.

He guided them from a finals berth in 2019 to a preliminary final in 2020 before the grand final loss last year.

So a win on Saturday would see the club come full circle as it gathers momentum toward next year's promotion to Division 1.

"Last year our lead-up to the final was horrendous," Birchmore said. "We were worn out. We didn't even have a clubhouse.

Blues rise from easy-beats to AFL powerhouse

WHEN Bruce Bell took on the role of Hinterland Blues Australian Football Club president in 2015 he took on a club that was the easybeats of the competition.

The place was bleeding fans, profits, juniors and coaches. Even the senior players were deserting the

It was the end of 2015, a disastrous season for the Blues who had been prematurely promoted to the semi-professional, salary-capped Division 1 North competition.

"We were really unprepared for Division 1 from a player depth perspective, really unprepared from a facility perspective and also from a financial perspective and, on the field, we got absolutely poleaxed," said Bell, who was Junior President at that time.

"So our seniors that year didn't win a game and the average losing margin was 150 points and then at the end of 2015, basically the place imploded. We had a massive player walkout.'

"And, due to unforeseen circumstances, we found ourselves without a coach. There was an AGM, and I was basically the last man standing, and they said, 'well you're it for pres-

The club had \$6000 in the bank and it owed \$40,000.

Thus began a massive rebuilding phase that has culminated in this Saturday's QFA North Division 2 Grand Final against Alexandra Hills Bombers at Wilston Grange and Bell being named the Toyota AFL Queensland Community Football Volunteer of

"I was pretty humbled to be advised of the award," said Bell.

"It's nice to be recognised. But, where our club is at, is as a result of a small band of incredible volunteers, players, coaches and supporters and of course, the support of my wife





Bell said the club decided to go back to Division 4 for 2016 in order to rebuild. And rebuild they have. It took only one year for them to return to Division 2.

And in 2023 the Blues are back in Division 1.

tion that has seen it pay off its debts, attract a great coach and key players and restructure on strong founda-

"We engaged a consulting company (Club Map) that works with codes nationally," said Bell.

"And for me, the big thing I got out of it was to get your seniors and finances right.

"If your seniors are winning and successful, it snowballs and everybody wants to be a part of that."

Even so, Bell says the club is fam-

team which made the finals this year.

"We're about community. We're about inclusion. Anyone that walks through the door here gets a game of footy," he said. "We started a women's team and they are an integral part of the club. We blend our men's and women's program together. They'll do pre-season training together, they socialize together to help promote that club atmosphere.

"Phillip Birchmore coming on as coach has been huge," said Bell. "Phil leaves no stone unturned and puts everything into the role on and off the

"His recruitment efforts are the stuff of legend. You can't argue with his win/loss ratio but he also genuinely cares about everyone under his

The senior players, too, have been a huge part of the club's revival, and not just for their talent on the field.

Bell says they are not afraid to roll up their sleeves and do the jobs traditionally done by volunteers on game day supported by an incredible band of junior parents and other volun-

He said the challenges had helped forge a fighting spirit at the club and made it tough.

"We thrive on adversity," he said. "We are used to running on the smell of an oily rag. Last year we made a grand final operating out the back of a six-by-three metre donger in the car park. We had no clubhouse. Couldn't play on our home ground the entire year. Then this year we had the floods. We just get on with it, we just do it."

"It's great to get some runs on the board for the Nambour CBD," said IAmNambour Brand Ambassador Rhonda Billett. "And there is more


One item on the agenda for the group was the increasing pressure surrounding parking in the Nambour CBD.

Memorial lecture honours K'gari advocate

DR John Sinclair AO was one of the outstanding environmental activists of our time.

With others, Dr Sinclair spent decades campaigning to stop sand mining and logging on Fraser Island, before it was World Heritage-listed in 1992.

Dr Sinclair came to public attention when he formed the Fraser Island Defenders Organisation, known as FIDO, in 1971. He took the then-Queensland premier Sir Joh Bjelke-Petersen's government to court for failing to protect the natural environment of Fraser Island.

The two-decade battle left him bankrupt.

But the public attention his conservation bid received paved the way for Fraser Island to become one of the world's most recognisable World Heritage-listed sites. Mr Sinclair refused to be deterred. He held his head high and eventually achieved his aim. Sand mining on K'gari ended.

Sadly Dr Sinclair passed away in 2019 aged 79. The Fraser Island Defenders Organisation (FIDO) have established the John Sinclair Memorial Lecture to honour the contribution he made to conservation in Australia.

The 2022 lecture will be delivered by renowned Environmental Scientist, Professor Ian Lowe AO, a long time friend of Dr Sinclair's.

"All are vegan, organic and cruelty free," she added.



The van is equipped with a state-of-the-art breast screening machine and is a fresh and more spacious version of the previous model.

Chief Radiographer Shane Judd said the machine on board was the same as the ones at Nambour Hospital and the service's other BreastScreen sites.

"Women having a breast screen can be assured of the same high-quality service whether they visit the van or one of our other six sites on the coast," she said.

"Women should book ahead to make sure they can get an appointment at a time that best suits them." Ms Judd said.

Appointments start at 7.45am and there are Saturday appointments available.

BreastScreen Queensland provides free breast cancer screening for women 40 years and over. No doctor's referral is required, and appointments take less than 30 minutes. Bookings can be made by calling 13 20 50 or visiting breastscreen.qld.gov.au

• 75% of women diagnosed with breast cancer are over 50. Younger women do get breast cancer, but the risk of breast cancer increases dramatically after the age of 50.

What Kim has done is to take those images and layer those memories and events in a very personal way, to explore the history of the family and the artist. This can be a comforting and confronting experience. It is a credit to the Old Ambo that they are able to display challenging works by artists such as Kim," said John.

They find refuge in the home of the eccentric Boatwright sisters who not only teach the pair about beekeeping, but ultimately lead Lily to the truth about her absent mother and abusive father. It grossed nearly \$40 million at the US Box Office.

Nambour's first butcher (and philosopher) Patrick Reilly

Moment in Time: Patrick Reilly, c1920

PICTURED is Patrick Reilly, c.1920, in a horse-drawn cart at the northern end of Currie Street.

In the background is the butcher's shop owned by George Donaldson, after whom Donaldson Road is named.

Born in about 1840, Irishman Patrick Reilly became a plough boy on the Cusack family farm and travelled to Australia with them, later trying his luck on the goldfields and in the shearing shed. When the Cusacks purchased the property in Nambour, Patrick was appointed manager.

Patrick was responsible for creating a farm in the vicinity of today's railway station. The farm was considered wonderfully prolific, and in fact became a great source of the limited food supply required by the adjacent settlers.

By about 1893, Patrick Reilly had

opened Nambour's first butcher shop with bark walls and roof and batten doors. He would kill a bullock when Nambour ran out of meat. It was reported in the Nambour Chronicle that a local settler, Mr F. M. Murtagh reminisced - I remember one Christmas Eve a well-known lady from Petrie's Creek got a fine joint, 15 to 20 lbs in

weight, and after examining it said, 'Oh Mr Reilly, look at all the bone.' Reilly put down his chopper and said, 'Well Missus if ye can show me how to grow beef without bone, I'll be pleased to serve ye'.

The name Reilly Road in Nambour reminds us of Patrick Reilly who, after his death in 1922, was described as witty and humorous, tolerant, forgiving, generous, peaceful and, above all, a philosopher. It was believed that he would have described his well-attended funeral as a "rate good send-off".








Nation-wide drop in property prices

PROPERTY values have dived on the Sunshine Coast and beyond, bringing an apparent end to a two-year boom. Values are down -4.5% across the Sunshine Coast.

CoreLogic's national Home Value Index (HVI) recorded a fourth consecutive month of decline in August, with the downturn accelerating and becoming more geographically broad-based.

Down -1.6% over the month, the national

index recorded the largest month-on-month decline since 1983.

Every capital city apart from Darwin is now in a housing downturn, with a similar scenario playing out across the rest-of-state regions.

Sydney led the down-swing, with values falling -2.3% over the month, however weaker conditions in Brisbane accelerated sharply through August, with values falling -1.8%.
