# Farming family marks 100 years

IN 2003, the closure of the Moreton Sugar Mill in Nambour created a challenge for the Boyle family to find a productive use for their property on the rich Petrie Creek river flats at Rosemount.

Celebration.

With the sort of tenacity his grandfather had shown establishing

a cane farm in the early days, Ross Boyle began transitioning from sugar cane to a turf farm.

Looking forward, his goal was to mark 100 years of agriculture on land which had been settled by his grandparents Nicholas and Maria Boyle on October 7, 1921. This year, on October 7, Ross's dream will come true as the Boyle family of Rosemount celebrates the centenary.

And to think it all started as a virgin block of land running down to Petrie Creek.

"It was cleared and drained and

the river flats grew sugar cane, and the hill land grew a variety of small crops including beans, bananas, pineapples, papaws, ginger and tomatoes," said Ross who now owns and operates Rosemount Turf with his wife Lynelle, daughter Penelope and son-in-law Greg Pelka. "Nicholas and Maria had 11 children," said Ross. "Four sons and two sons-in-law went and fought in WW2. One was killed overseas.

"The story goes that Sam Boyle, who returned from Changi Prison

and the Burma Railway at the end of World War II, knelt and kissed the ground and said he was never leaving Nambour again. And he

Ross said the picturesque riverside land had been abundant and provided for many families over the 100 years, as well as being a beautiful location to raise children.

"There have been three generations of Boyles farming over the years and the fourth generation is ready to take over," he said.

Ross said his family's pioneering spirit and enduring ties to the area filled him with pride.

'The change from cane farming to growing turf has allowed our family legacy to continue for the next generation," he said. "However we do miss the cane trains weaving through the

valley and the cane fires on dusk."
As a small boy, Ross has memories of floating toy boats down Petrie Creek Road after heavy rain.

The valley has certainly changed in his lifetime with Petrie Creek Road now being a major arterial road between the hinterland and the coast.

Earlier this year the Boyle's commissioned a mural on the property shed to mark the Centenary Celebration.

The mural was painted by Ross Holloway to show the transition from sugar cane to turf

The family has also installed a Centenary Garden display and will be having a Centenary Celebration dinner on the October 9.

Teachers received a donation to their charity of \$200 from local businesses in return for wearing wedding dresses for the hilarious event.


Community Liaison Officer Alison Donaldson said funds would help improve facilities in the school.

# **Auxiliary High Tea helps fund** more hospital equipment

HUNDREDS of people packed Maleny Community Centre recently for the Maleny Soldiers Memorial Hospital Auxiliary's High Tea to raise money for much-needed equipment.

Auxiliary Secretary Louise Hickey said tickets sold very quickly for the event which is the auxiliary's main fundraiser for the year. "It's been well supported and local businesses have been marvellous," she said.

Funds raised will go towards the equipment for the facility which last year celebrated its 100th birthday. "Anything Queensland Health would like to provide, but that is not in the budget, we try to provide," said Louise.

"Importantly, the hospital means that people can be treated for their medical issues here and don't always have to travel down the mountain. Their loved ones can come in and see them, and we have an emergency department here too, which is so important for those urgent matters.

"People love to be able to stay locally and not have to travel off the Range. Families can visit loved ones and it's not too much of a travel burden. Everyone in the community benefits from having a well-equipped hospital. It's part of what makes a community."

The Hospital last year celebrated 100 years in the community. "It was started by the people, for the people," said Louise.

#### Serving community for 100 years

MSMH was originally built as a memorial to those who took part in World War 1. It was officially opened as a private hospital on 21 October 1920 and later gazetted as a general public hospital on 21 May 1921. The original hospital served the community until a new facility was built and officially opened on 17 October 1987. The old site now houses Maleny Ambulance Station.



In addition, as part of the Spring Fair this year, there will be three open gardens available for public viewing and an art display in one of the gardens.




"The idea is that people can either spend the morning visiting the gardens then the afternoon at the Garden Expo or vice versa," said Garden Club member Jan Maguire.

Wayne Smith has been a practising freelance artist for the past 30 + years with a broad range of experience from solo shows through to venue theming murals and public art. He completed his formal arts studies at Queensland College of Art gaining a Degree in Fine Art.

"I have a strong interest in whole of person and multi-disciplinary care. Rather than just fixing a problem and moving to the next patient I think that a good GP needs to apply creative thinking and develop a strong relationship with patients over many years."

Dr Manger is passionate about mental health and does a lot of work in that space including his role as an ambassador to Equally Well Australia.

"I have my own podcast for health professionals too, which is really rewarding. It's called The GP Show and I have been hosting this show with expert guests since 2017.

"Being the best GP you can be also involves integrating yourself at a community level.

"I have spoken at a wide range of public events including the Woodford Folk Festival and the Transitions Film Festival and run online workshops for the public in areas of health promotion to improve understanding of health and wellbeing.

### Minister visits Morcombe Foundation

Daniel Morcombe Foundation Founder Bruce Morcombe said the Program included 'Changing Futures', an

initiative aimed at identifying, responding and providing early intervention to pre-teens displaying harmful sexual behaviours.

"Primary prevention is what the Daniel Morcombe Foundation is all about," Mr Morcombe said. "And at the end of the day some of our important programs are about educating kids on how to keep safe and repairing, through therapy, these unfortunate damaged souls. And changing futures is a pilot scheme that is revolutionising the identification of youngsters that are harming children of their own age or younger.

And we can repair these young lives and ensure they do not become adult monsters. That's what Changing Futures is about. Identifying harmful sexual behaviour and repairing it before it becomes an insidious problem for the rest of their life and reducing childhood sexual abuse within Australia."

The 'Keeping Australia's Kids Safe Program' will reach over five million community members through a community education campaign.

Denise and Bruce Morcombe were also strong advocates for the establishment of the

Australian Government's Australian Centre to Counter Child Exploitation (ACCCE). On September 2 the ACCCE launched the 'Stop the Stigma' campaign, which encourages a national

conversation about child sexual abuse, urging Australians to open the discussion even if they find it uncomfortable.

"It is a credit to the Morcombes that they have continued to carry out the work that is needed to raise awareness of child sexual exploitation," said Ms Andrews. "The work that is being done by them and the people who are working here is quite frankly second to none. It has had an impact right across Australia."

In 2019 the Federal Government announced \$1.8 million in proceeds of crime funding to the Daniel Morcombe Foundation for the 'Keeping Australia's Kids Safe Program'.



# 'There's not a lot left for essentials': **Demand spikes for food charity**

A low-cost grocery store in Nambour has seen a spike in demand brought on by housing affordability and high unemployment rates.

Suncoast Christian Care is a frontline charity offering Emergency Relief, a School Pantry Program, a Food Kitchen (The Daily Bread) as well as the community grocery store in Howard Street. It has worked in the community for more than 20 years.

Suncoast Care Supervisor Belinda Clark said the low-cost grocery store allowed people experiencing financial stress to become a member and access significantly reduced-price items.

She said there had been a dramatic increase in vulnerable people having food security issues since the pandemic which led to recent rental hikes.

"Rents are super expensive and people are struggling with affordability issues and a shortage of cash at the moment," she said.

Floor Supervisor Kieran Bergs said, sadly, Nambour had a higher than average number of people struggling with substance and alcohol issues.

"It's sad to see but if they spend money on drugs and alcohol there's often not a lot left for essentials," he said. "They get stuck in a constant struggle to take care of themselves balanced against their addictions."

Despite the hardship Belinda said the job had it's rewards, mainly from the reactions of people who appreciated the kindness.

"It's lovely to see new people who come in. They think it's amazing and it helps us keep going because you can see in their eyes how grateful they are. That sort of feedback helps feed us for the fight."

Kieran agreed. "We've had more than few people walk out in tears," he said. "We get a lot of hugs. It's wonderful to see the relief on their faces. You can see them thinking 'Now I'm going to be able to make it to the next pay cheque'."

# Group to share Pathways Survey findings at forum

COMMUNITY group Maleny Pathways Working Group received an overwhelming response to a recent survey assessing the safety and accessibility of getting around Maleny without a car.

The 409 responses have been collated into a comprehensive report that shows there is a notable absence of safe, connecting pathways

Report findings will be presented at a Public Forum hosted by Maleny Forums in the Maleny Community Centre on Monday 18 October 2021.

Report co-author Cath Ovenden is keen for people to hear the survey results first-hand and provide further valuable input before the group finalises the report.

"It's clear Maleny people feel strongly about the issue with 6% of residents completing the survey. We look forward to presenting the results and taking questions from the floor," Ms Ovenden said.

Maleny's population has doubled since 1991. The town has recently been voted Australia's most welcoming town by Australian Traveller.

Spending in Maleny has increased by 20 percent in the January-March quarter compared with the same period in 2020.

"The population and tourism increase, coupled with the fact there has been no significant spending on pathways in Maleny for more than 12 years, means there are urgent community safety issues." Ms Ovenden said.

"Residents and tourists expect to be able to easily and safely walk to and around our beautiful town.

"This is not possible at the moment."



# **Residents' opposition grows** to phone tower planned for middle of Woombye

THE Woombye Community and Business Association will lead community opposition to a 40 metre telecommunications tower proposed near the middle of town.

WCBA Vice President Grant Palethorpe, who has a town planning background, said objections to the tower's location included the proximity to adjacent dwellings, sensitive nearby land uses such as the day care centre and heritage and scenic values of Woombye.

Mr Palethorpe said the proposed site was on the fringe of the rural zone, adjacent to residential dwellings to the north and east and businesses to the south. He said community sports facilities were also in close proximity.

"There are some 80 dwellings on Cary, Hill and Campbell Street alone, all within close proximity. There are numerous home-based businesses, including a child day care business that have expressed concern. Blackall Street is within a Heritage character area and also on a Scenic amenity route."

WCBA President Debbie Kimber agreed.

"This would be a prominent, conspicuous visual contradiction to the heritage 'look and feel' of Woombye," Ms Kimber said. "The proposed location is completely inappropriate. It is in town surrounded by homes! Many people are very upset and rightly so. No respect shown for their homes or the heritage identity of Woombye."

#### Awaiting response

Mr Palethorpe said at this stage the community was unaware of the applicant's response to questions put to them by Council's development assessment process. "Further, the Woombye Community & Business Association (WCBA) is unaware of any effort by the applicant, Stillmark Holding Pty Ltd, to be proactive and reach out to the community to address their concerns," he said.

Stillmark's response to Council's request for additional information (SVGazette September 1, 2021, page 12) is not yet on Council's website.

The WCBA will write a submission which will

be available for local residents and business

Mr Palethorpe said the submission would take into account Stillmark Holdings' response to Council and also address any concerns the public have raised. It can be adapted according to individual concerns.

It was important any submission was in the correct format and that it was 'properly made'.

"We expect that the public notification period is imminent," he said. "Public Notification is required for a minimum of 15 business days and commences when the applicant places a sign on the property boundary, places a Public Notice in a local newspaper and writes to each adjoining landowner."

Mr Palethorpe said the WCBA submission would focus on the Planning Scheme, and especially the Telecommunication Facilities code.

#### This code in part reads as follows:

Council requires telecommunication facilities are developed in a manner which protects public health, the environment and the amenity of surrounding premises, and requires that a telecommunications facility:

· does not unreasonably affect the amenity of surrounding premises;

• the siting and design of the proposed facility is integrated with the township's setting, is away from the main street, township gateways and is not located on a scenic route;

· will operate well within all applicable standards and will pose no threat to community wellbeing; and

• the proposed facility is located within a rural zone, rather than an urban zone.

#### Contradictory

Mr Palethorpe argues that the development application is contradictory in that the planning report states: "As such, there will be no impact - visual or otherwise - from the structure until there is a need for it to be constructed. To that end, Council and the community do not need to

be concerned that unnecessary structures will be constructed, regardless of whether there is an approval in place".


"This itself acknowledges that there will be visual impact," said Mr Palethorpe. "Offering the community cold comfort that we don't need to be concerned until it is constructed!"

Further into the report the applicant states: "In this instance a tall monopole of 40 metres is required to account for the extensive tree cover and steep topography in the surrounding area, as the panel antennas must be able to 'see' as much of the target area as possible and not be unduly obstructed by trees. A 25 or 30 metre tall monopole would not provide the same level of improvements, nor to as wide an area".

"Again we question, why select this location given the site constraints," said Mr Palethorpe. 'Wouldn't a more rural location at a higher elevation achieve the same performance, potentially enabling a shorter tower to be used.

### Mary Cairncross set to buzz this spring

THERE are an estimated 30,000 species of flies in Australia and this October, scientists are on a quest to discover those that live in Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve at Maleny, as part of Sunshine Coast Council's Tiny Giants event.

Twelve scientists, led by Queensland Museum will partner with council to uncover the hidden invertebrates that keep the rainforest ecosystem ticking. Under the microscope will be flies, spiders, ants, mites, moths, butterflies and beetles.

From October 21-24, 2021, the community is invited to join in the fun and learn directly from the scientists during four days of diverse walks, talks and workshops for all ages.

Queensland Museum Curator of Entomology Dr Christine Lambkin said little was known about most invertebrates in Australia.

"There are 178 species already recorded in Maleny and that is only just scratching the surface," Dr Lambkin said.

Sunshine Coast Council's Division 5 Councillor Winston Johnston invited the community to attend a workshop or a talk during the four-day event. "Visitors can learn about insect trapping methods, skill-up on macrophotography and butterfly identification or listen to an expert panel on how to get involved in invertebrate citizen science and much more.'



# Nambour farewells beloved Peugeot dealer

Tribute to Gerald Cullen April 2 1952- August 30 2021

POPULAR Nambour car dealership owner Gerald Cullen has been remembered as a hardworking businessman who found his passion in cars and the people he loved.

Mr Cullen, 69, sadly passed away on August 30. The second-generation car-dealership owner had strong ties to the Nambour community, having grown up in the car garage run by his father Alwyn Cullen on Lamington Terrace.

Following are extracts from a tribute by his daughter Sian Cullen read at a closed funeral held on September 11 for family and close

Gerald Gilbert William Cullen was the son of Alywn & Hilda Cullen, brother of Patricia, husband of Robyn, father of Brett and myself, father in law of Renae and grandfather of Aston

In 1951, Alwyn, Hilda and Patricia Cullen emigrated from Wales to Australia and settled on the Sunshine Coast. In late 1951 the business was started, where its stands today and was renamed, A Cullen & Son when Gerald was born in the following year on the 2nd of April 1952. A Cullen & Son will be proudly celebrating 70 years as a local family-owned business later this year. This is no mean feat in today's economic climate and it is a reflection/tribute to the hard work and commitment from Alwyn, Gerald and Brett Cullen, who has now proudly taken on the running of our family business.

In Gerald's earlier years, he attended Nambour State School and Nambour High School.

A testament to Gerald's character and nature is that some of his school friends are here with us today. They have shared memories of growing up with Gerald, "Gerry" as he was known to them, listening to bands at the Nambour Civic Hall and playing Kelly Pool at Lal Perren's snooker room. As they got older, they would camp at Cotton Tree Caravan Park and whenever a pretty girl was walking past the tent, they would go out to check the tension on the guide ropes. The catch cry became "To the

When Gerald completed school, he naturally went on to complete his mechanic apprentice-

ship at the business with his Father, Alwyn. In 1969, Gerald then met the love of his life Robyn, at a local dance in Nambour. He had apparently already "checked her out" as he admired the Mini Delux that Robyn drove at the time. As always with Gerald, everything revolved around cars. Before Gerald and Robyn married at the age of 21 on the 10th of November 1973, Gerald had already owned 24 cars. One of which was the Morris 1800 which he managed to land vertically in a ditch on the Bli Bli Road. When asked by Police how he managed to escape unharmed, he simply responded that he unclipped the racing harness he had installed and climbed out the window, in a very manner of fact attitude.

In the late 70s Gerald's passion for cars continued when he commencing racing go-carts. On 8 August 1981, I was born.

In 1983, Gerald and Robyn purchased their family home at Diddillibah which has remained the family home ever since. On the 1st of May 1984, Gerald's favourite son, Brett Arthur Alwyn Cullen was born and our little family was com-

Over the years, we were blessed to be able to travel overseas as a family, which were a result of trips that Gerald had won through his hard Peugeot, Michelin Tyres and other manufacturers the business had at the time. I recall our first overseas trip to Bali in the mid-1990's. As traditions were, it was popular to have your hair braided whilst on holidays. They continued to ask when we were out as a family and Dad would reply and lift his hat and say, "What about my hair?", Dad was balding at the time. "Funny man, they replied, funny man".

The overseas trips and awards that Gerald won through the business over the years are a true testament to his hard work, dedication and his sheer talent

of being able to talk/deal with others while never compromising his position.

The business began selling Peugeot motor vehicles in 1973 and has done so ever since. Gerald has, on numerous occasions, been recognised as the Australian Peugeot Provincial Dealer of the Year. The business and Gerald's commitment to Michelin through our business Tyres Plus, also never went unnoticed. Being predominately French companies, many trips were to France and Europe which allowed Gerald, Robyn and our family to share further special memories together.

Gerald continued his passion for cars outside of work when he purchased a Peugeot Mi16 with one of his best friends, Rod King in 1998 and competed together in Targa Tasmania, a tarmac based rally from 1999-2003. In 2001 they won their category, early modern. Many photos and memorabilia from these times are in the tea room for you to view after the service.

Before Dad passed, he made sure we knew that he would always be there looking over them and the grandchildren that are yet to come.

In summary, I would describe Dad as being like a diamond, multifaceted, strong, tough, valuable and always shone brightly in an elegant, classy and unique manner. No two diamonds are alike. Gerald was definitely one of a kind, and that's what we all loved about him.

There were smiles all around when the boat found its way into the Prep playground with the students eagerly wanting to be the first to ail on their new boat.



# Palmwoods Bowls Club to mark 90 years as a sporting social hub

"MINNIE the Moocher" and "Goodnight Sweetheart" were top of the pops and being played at all the local dances.


Rupert Murdoch and actors James Dean and William Shatner were born. Don Bradman showed off his skills, yet again, scoring 100 runs in 3 hours and 18 minutes at Blackheath. And White Nose had won the Melbourne Cup.

The year was 1931 and in the village of Palmwoods, bowling enthusiasts gathered together in the local Memorial Hall to form a bowling club, the first in the Maroochy district and the only one between Brisbane and Gympie at that

Farming locals, the Stephenson brothers, Les and Henry Benjamin (known as Stevo) with help from other keen community members, built the first green on their farm off what is now known as Old Bowling Green Road.

It had become a social and sporting hub of the district and now the process was to be formalised with the formation of a club to be known as the Palmwoods Bowling Club. Eighteen men became the foundation members of the club.

Among them were Les Stephenson, Henry Stephenson, J.T. Lowe, W. Whalley, Pat Frawley (Palmwoods School teacher), Steve Hobson, Harry Pickering, Tom Rose, Alex Millar (Palm-

woods station master), J. E. Robinson, and Jim

Early in December, a rink competition was held on the new green to celebrate the opening which was to be held officially in the new year

At the Annual General Meeting, reported on 15 January, 1932, officers elected were - President, A. Millar, Vice-presidents, J. McIntyre, J. E. Robinson and P.M. Frawley, Secretary /Treasurer H. B. Stephenson and selectors A. Millar, and T. E. Robinson.

Congratulations were conveyed to the Stephenson brothers for laying the green, rules were drawn up, reasonable subscriptions and green fees were set, and the club decided to apply for affiliation with the Queensland Bowls

By 1940, with numbers growing and the greens unable to accommodate them, the club moved to its present site, beside the Kolora Park lagoon using part of the now defunct Buderim tramway corridor and in the Council's designated "Sports Open Space" area.

Members happily provided the voluntary labour to set up the greens and it took many long arduous "working bees" to prepare the site. A tent was, at first, used as a clubroom.

The local butcher would store a keg in his cold room which was brought over with a wet bag over it to be used for functions at the club and "beer off the wood".

#### Palmwoods Ladies Bowls Club

The first meeting of the Palmwoods Ladies Bowls Club was held on Friday 8th February, 1948. Seven ladies were present and Mrs. Cozens was elected President. Play for the ladies commenced 12 February 1948.

The men's and ladies club amalgamated in 30 July 1995 and in that year the club purchased the land on which the greens were situated.

In 1957 the greenkeepers wage was 7 pounds per week. By 1963 this had climbed to 15 pounds

1950 saw the first permanent building built with extensions added to the original clubhouse in 1974, 1983 and 1985 and the current clubrooms were opened on 1 May, 1999 by chairperson Mrs S. Clyde. The deck was added

Palmwoods Bowls Club has quite a long history and without the unstinting work of volunteers, the club could have gone into extinction on many occasions.

The club's hospitality flourishes to this day. Nestled in Sunshine Coast's beautiful hinterland, this historic club is bordered by lush rainforest areas and a delightful lagoon where platypus spotting is a fun occupation.

JUST a few months ago Simon and Marlene Murray were beginning a new business venture and were looking for a logo that was synonymous with Maleny.

A cow came to mind, as is typical of many businesses here in Maleny, reflecting on our rural history.

Not wanting to use anyone else's cow they came up with their own. Millie's a little bit cheeky with her red tongue and is obviously pretty happy jumping with joy!

In the end Simon and Marlene decided to not use Millie in their new venture, Maleny Hamper Co, and put her on the shelf.

Then one day at work at Maleny IGA, Simon was approached by a customer looking for a Maleny souvenir, which wasn't perishable, and that she could give to her friends. Simon couldn't think of anything she could purchase.

Talking with Marlene later that day they came up with the idea of taking Millie off the shelf and putting the image on a t-shirt so that tourists, and locals alike, could buy something that said they love Maleny.

Having happily lived in Maleny for over 20 years, and with Marlene born in Maleny Hospital, they also felt it was time to give something back.

So the hunt for a cause which would benefit from raising awareness of its plight and at the same time receiving some proceeds from the t-shirt sales began.

They didn't have to look far. The couple had raised a son in Maleny and to keep him busy they encouraged him to swim. Marlene's also a keen swimmer so they knew that the current pool facilities didn't really cater to our climate or communities needs.

Having read about the Maleny Indoor Aquatic Centre proposal somewhere Simon decided to ring a long time friend, Steve Weyman, who he knew was involved in keeping the current pool functional.

Simon and Marlene met with the Maleny Indoor Aquatic Centre Steering Group Inc (MIAC) and tabled their proposal to begin the new aquatic centre fundraising initiative.

It is now underway, with a generous gesture from Rob and Samantha Outridge, owners of Maleny IGA, they were able to display the merchandise instore as well as making a sales funnel available through the store at massively reduced markups, to ensure maximum funding to the ambitious task in front of them.

The new Maleny Indoor Aquatic Centre has been allocated a site by Sunshine Coast Council on the Maleny Sports Park, to be positioned near the existing Beersheba Living Museum and Maleny Contract Bridge Club facilities and alongside the proposed Maleny Community Gym, Maleny Hydrotherapy Centre and sporting fields.

Unfortunately commercial pools don't come cheap and as at end of 2018 the 25 x 25 metre heated Indoor Aquatic centre was pegged at a cost of approximately \$15 Million.

Sunshine Coast Council at this stage are offering zero funding to the pool due to low population numbers and commitments else-

where but Simon and Marlene are hopeful that with the Maleny Community's support that they can get council to take notice of what's happening in their town.

Simon and Marlene, and the MIAC's first task is to raise enough funds to engage an engineer to compile a council ready engineering report. Ballpark figures are around \$200,000.

So if you're an engineer with time on your hands and a passion for our town and want to give something back maybe you could chat to the MIAC Steering Group and propose a more affordable solution.



In an ideal world we would have funds for both the track duplication to Nambour and the CAMCOS rail from Beerwah to Maroochydore and possibly the airport.


As Government doesn't have that sort of money a decision has to be as to which project will give the greatest benefit to the greatest number of people.





Yandina – will drive to Nambour to catch a train. For these hapless commuters a trip to and from Brisbane makes for an all-day saga, although a search for a car park at Nambour is about to become easier.

Two trains operate week-days and Saturdays for these hardy residents, and just one on a Sunday, departing Gympie at 3.47pm.

On week-days, the first train departs Gympie

at 5.56am, aiming to reach Brisbane by 8.48am. The second departs Gympie at 1.24pm, gener-

ally reaching Roma Street by 4.21pm. For commuters north of Nambour there's no reliable rail. Trains often being cancelled and buses provided as an alternative, causing a week-day half-hour wait at Nambour for a south-

bound train. The financial year 2018-19 (last year of available data) saw Gympie North services on-time running at 79%, including incidents outside Queensland Rail's (QR's) control. QR's on-time

target is more than 95%. 'Target' being the right word given the Sunshine Coast and Caboolture lines rarely meet

Train faults happen, but they seem to happen more often for us.

With the 33-year-old Inter-City Express (ICE) carriages retired from service recently, replacement trains running north from Nambour to Gympie require two drivers on trains not fitted with the ETCS (European Train Control System).

A \$43 million ETCS1 upgrade is under way on the track between Nambour and Gympie North.

However, what people north and south of Nambour need is frequency and reliability of public transport.

Will Queensland build proper duplication to Nambour – and not the current 'half-baked' Speculation is rife about priority for future

upgrades (read money) for track duplication to Nambour and for a new line to Caloundra and Maroochydore.

There has been much discussion about the 2032 Olympics and transport infrastructure. We have the Mountain Bike facility at Park-

lands, immediately north of Nambour. It will host Olympic events and can accommo-

date 10,000 people.

What is the funding for Sunshine Coast transport and should it be accelerated for OUR Olympic events? The Premier wants to spend \$1 billion demol-

ishing and rebuilding the Gabba in Brisbane.

Meanwhile, we have abysmal frequency and excuses for funding anything rail-like here. Brisbane and the Gold Coast seem to be

the only priorities for Olympic infrastructure

Will shuttle trains run from Beerwah to Nambour to Gympie North - through Glass House (LNP), Nicklin (ALP) and Noosa (Ind), once Beerburrum to Beerwah is finished?

Shuttles would assist people to access Nambour General Hospital and other Coast health specialists following the relocation of paediatric services and a reduction in surgeries at Gympie Hospital, forcing patients to travel to Nambour and Kawana health precincts.

And then there's the \$58 billion SEQ City Deal between the state and federal governments.

Noosa Council has applied to re-join the SEQ Council of Mayors.

Will Noosa Mayor Clare Stewart seek better rail for her ratepayers?

I hope so - two trains a day aren't enough.

IT'S baby bird season and our hotline operators have to determine whether the chicks are nestlings or fledglings. They also have to ascertain whether the young bird needs rescuing, or would removal just be a kidnapping of the poor

If fledglings are put up in a larger container like a bucket it has to have holes in the bottom and be three quarters filled with nesting material, with a sturdy branch into the container so parents can access. These birds have to be observed from a distance over the next couple of

Fledgling magpies should be left on the ground unless in immediate danger from predators, or showing signs of illness such as mouth open breathing (gaping), or twine wrapped around their legs. Often people think that there are no parents around but usually parents return within a short time. 


